



Whise Discipleship By Jan Whise

LIVING LIFE AS A DISCIPLE BY LOVING AS A DISCIPLE

1) Jesus said, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this, all men will know that you are _____,

if you love one another." (John 13:34-35 NIV)

This love Jesus speaks of is not the same as our human love for one another. Jesus' kind of love is miraculous, and only possible because of what we have become according to 2 Corinthians 5:17: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a _____ creation; the old has gone the new has come!"

As God's new creations we are "containers" of God's kind of love - for God himself, for our brothers and sisters in Christ and for those who do not know him. Romans 5:5b explains that "God has poured out his love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom he has given us."

2) Therefore, having God's love in us through the Holy Spirit, can we then obey Jesus' command to love one another in such a way that others will know we are his disciples. Why?

Does this mean we can actually love those whose temperaments differ from ours, whose ways we scorn, whose lifestyles make us feel they are not deserving of being loved?

Remember, we're not speaking of unbelievers, but of those who belong to the Body of Christ, to our church, to our circle, to that committee on which we serve.

What is your reaction to the "new command" of our Lord, telling us he expects us to love one another in such a way that others can see we are his disciples? (Remember that the "new command" is to the "new creation" where God has poured in *his* love.)

3) One of our difficulties in loving comes from trying to love out of our human love, our natural response to others.

Jesus calls us to love out of God's love, a miracle of possibility that exists in every true believer in Christ.

Loving another with God's love means we will want and pray for and work towards achieving God's best for that person. What does this way of defining God's love say to you?

What does this say about the emotional response we feel we need (that warm "fuzzy") in order to "love" another?

4) Human love, that emotionally deep caring we have for some (while rejecting others), leads to human sympathy, which leads to the thought, "I must do something to help."

Intertwined with the need to do something is the sense of guilt if I do not respond. And guilt says, "If you really cared, you would" When have you responded to a need out of guilt?

5) God's love differs in that it responds to need with Goddirected compassion. "When he [Jesus] saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd." (Matt. 9:36)

"When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them...." (Matt. 14:14)

"Jesus had compassion on them and touched their eyes. Immediately they received their sight and followed him." (Matt. 20:34)

Oswald Chambers warned believers that every need is not the call of God. Yet how can we as Christians turn away from a need, especially if the plight of the needy one arouses our sympathy?

Jesus said, "...the Son can do nothing by himself; he can do only what he sees his Father doing..." (John 5:19) and "...I do nothing on my own but speak just what the Father has taught me." (John 8:28b)

Why did Jesus respond to the crowd or the blind men as he did?

Surely the God who led Jesus by the Holy Spirit, will lead us by that same Spirit to know who, what and how the Father wants us to express his compassion within the Body of Christ.

God's love in a disciple responds to the needy brother or sister by asking, "Lord, what do you want to do through me in this situation?"

Responding out of God's love will cause us to do only what God shows as best. In comparison, a human love response, determined by human assessment of need, usually does too much or too little, expects appreciation and seeks to find self-satisfaction in responding. God's love seeks only to love another as God loves, with no determination of "deserves" or expectation of return. Remember, "**But God demonstrates his own love for us in this:** *While we were still sinners*, Christ **died for us.** (Romans 5:8, italics mine)

THINK ABOUT IT:

If you are willing, there's a way, as a disciple, to begin "practicing" God's love.

• Make a list of those you have trouble "feeling" loving toward in the body of believers.

• Pray for each one, asking God to bring *his* very best into each life, meeting their needs *his* way.

• Thank God for loving those individuals through *his* love in you.

• Be willing to do whatever God might ask you to do as an expression of *his* love.

Remember - we are to love one another with God's love because no human love can bear the strain or patiently endure the cost of such a non-judgmental, never-failing relationship.

"...As I have loved you, so you must love one another." (John 13:34b)

Passionate Spirituality - "Spiritual Disciplines"

Last month I wrote about some of the specific "spiritual disciplines" or "means of grace," beginning with some of those which are most familiar like worship, prayer, communion, baptism, study, and service.

When studying the spiritual disciplines, I was surprised "retreats" were not included. In thinking about it, I realized how many of the spiritual disciplines we can explore, corporately or individually, while on a retreat. Therefore a retreat is not considered a spiritual discipline in and of itself. On most retreats we have **worship**, **prayer**, **celebration**, and **Bible study**; most also offer a time for **communion**. Often we are given the opportunity to participate in a healing service. During these various retreat offerings we also have an opportunity for confession (to God).

Most retreat centers like ours in Leesburg are wonderful settings for **meditation** on God's Word and for private **prayer**. In Leesburg, our prayer labyrinth, path of silence, outdoor chapel, and the many swings and benches overlooking Lake Griffin are all invitations to listen for His still, small voice. **Solitude** and **silence** can be found if you make the effort to find a quiet place. **Fellowship** is a part of any retreat, much of which occurs in the dining hall over tasty meals.

If you wish to learn more about the spiritual disciplines, two good resources are *The Renovaré Spiritual Formation Bible*, Richard J. Foster and others, eds. and *Celebration of Discipline*, Richard J. Foster. They are both available through Cokesbury or <u>www.renovare.org</u>. Any time you would like to talk about any of the spiritual disciplines or have questions, please feel free to give me a call.

Let's practice the spiritual disciplines as often as we can and notice how God uses them to reveal Himself to us. I'll be praying you see Him at work.

To "volunteer" means many things to many people. We recently had a new member ask why SHARE no longer required anyone to volunteer services in the community. That question prompts us to remind each of you that, even though it is no longer required, it is needed now more than ever. Each one of us, with a simple gesture, can "volunteer" our services. Here are some simple things you might consider:

♦ Ask a neighbor if they want to go with you to the grocery or drug store. It will help save on fuel cost, which we all know is high right now. And it might provide you company on a rather mundane outing.

♦Got an extra helping of that dinner you love to make? Offer it to a neighbor. It might provide them a good meal and allows you to do a well-neighbor check.

♦ If you can do yard work, walk a dog or don't mind doing dishes (!) offer to help someone with an everyday chore. It's sometimes the small things that mean the most.

♦If that neighbor can't get out to the store with you, offer to pick up something they need. (Chances are they'll think of you next time they go.)

♦ Food pantries and agencies are in need of nonperishable foods all year. Take advantage of the buy-oneget-one free offers and donate to the organization of your choice.

Remember, there are many ways to "volunteer" and help our community of neighbors.

Riding home from the nursing home, where my Dad is a hospice patient, I was struck by how our current lives seem to straddle two seasons. While we try to care for Dad, who is changing like autumn leaves as his dementia in-

creases and his body weakens, we also anticipate the "spring-like" birth of a new grandchild in early October. Sometimes it feels quite overwhelming, with sadness as Dad declines and worry for our son and daughter-in-law's high-risk pregnancy. As a couple, they have already dealt with a "vanishing twin," so family members and friends are cautiously optimistic that Stacie will carry the survivor to term and deliver a healthy Baby Cary in Texas.

Many of us are separated by long distances from those that we love the most. This can compound feelings of anxiety or loneliness or fear.

I share this with you because even though we may be Stephen Leaders, we sometimes need to reach out for support. This help may come from hospice social workers, close friends, siblings, grown children, or fellow Stephen Ministers. As you face your own challenges, please remember that it is not a sign of weakness but of strength to accept help - to receive one-on-one weekly visits and phone support from fellow members of our congregation who have been called and trained to walk beside you through your own dark valleys, whatever they may be.

Another Way to Give

Have you ever considered giving life insurance to the church or other charitable causes? It is a method of giving a Deferred Gift that some people find worth considering. Do you have a policy on your life that was intended to protect a spouse who will no longer need it, a child who is now a financially independent adult, or to complete payment of a mortgage already paid in full? If so you may be one of many people with somewhat obsolete life insurance.

Depending upon your situation, you might consider: (1) naming the church as <u>primary beneficiary</u> of a policy you no longer need, (2) naming the church as <u>secondary beneficiary</u> in case the primary beneficiary predeceases you, or (3) naming the church as the <u>final beneficiary</u> if all other beneficiaries have predeceased you.


If you give the church (or other charity) a paid-up policy you already own, you can deduct an amount equal to the approximate cash value up to 50% of your AGI. If the amount is over 50% you can deduct a portion in the year of the gift and spread the rest over the next 5 years. If you give a policy on which you are still paying premiums, you may deduct each future premium payment as a charitable gift, as well as an amount equal to the cash value at the time the gift is made.

A charitable gift of life insurance is simple and immediate. The proceeds are paid in cash immediately at death and are not subject to possible shrinkage from probate costs. A change of beneficiary is made easily by contacting the life insurance company.

Example: Mr. and Mrs. U. R. Generous decided to give a life insurance policy to their church. Mr. Generous, age 72, had a whole life policy with a face value of \$65,000 on which he had been paying premiums for many years. First, he arranged for the dividends to cover all future premiums. Then he made their church the irrevocable owner and beneficiary of the policy. (Mrs. Generous and their two adult children will be well cared for through the estate that Mrs. Generous will inherit at her husband's death ant that the children will inherit when both Mr. and Mrs. Generous have passed on).

Mr. and Mrs. Generous are pleased with the size of their future gift and with the ease with which they were able to make it. They also enjoyed the sizable income tax deduction they were able to take in the year of the gift, plus the amount they were able to carry forward.

A perilous adventure on the high seas, a starcrossed love affair, mob violence, rioting and attempted assassination are not the elements one might expect in a film about the founder of Methodism, but the director and producer of "Wesley" believes that the dramatic and often surprising story of John Wesley will attract moviegoers of all faiths, as well as warm their hearts.

"It has all the elements that you'd want to put into a movie," said John Jackman, whose films include "Passing Moment," "Windsor Knot" and "An Uncommon Union."

The independent feature film traces the life of Wesley as an outwardly religious young man who undergoes a spiritual renewal that leads to a revolutionary ministry.

It is scheduled for release as early as October, though locations have not yet been announced. Jackman spent more than a thousand hours researching Wesley's life. The script is based largely on the journals of both John and Charles Wesley and will focus on the "core spiritual journey of Wesley."

According to Jackman, the film is not an intellectual discourse on Wesleyan theology, and it doesn't emphasize details that distinguish Methodism from other Christian movements. "I'm hoping that we're going to hit a crossover audience, that this isn't just going to be of interest to Methodists," Jackman said. "Some of the stuff that would be very sectarian also, of course, is not going to appeal to a modern audience - and probably wouldn't even appeal to modern Methodists."

Burgess Jenkins, who plays Wesley, is a method actor, and approached the role by trying, as much as possible, to become the character. "It was probably the most profound experience I've had as an actor in embodying another character - not just John's accent or his gait or his posture, but his ideology," said Jenkins, whose film credits include "The Reaping" and "Remember the Titans."

Jenkins describes Wesley as "academic in mind, a bit naïve in heart, a bit lost in soul...ultimately earnest.... But, at the core of all of that was a desire for God's will, a desire for greatness for God, and to glorify God in everything he did."

"Let them wander up and down..." (Psalm 59:14)

A few weeks ago, I met with Bill Gilbert and Dave Benthusen, who had kindly sought my input into furnishing and accessorizing the new Youth Center. We had an interesting discussion regarding flooring, cabinetry, electronics, and furniture. In examining the space itself, I found myself excitedly envisioning the future possibilities once this space is made available to us. The area is much larger than our previous space and will allow for multiple activity centers and the amount of storage space will be most welcomed! The plans call for the installation of speakers and television screens, so music and videos will be readily available for the kids, and the microwave and small fridge will allow us to have snacks and drinks at hand. Clean and Green

"When life hands you lemons, make lemonade!" Most of us have heard this statement often over the years, and some of us might also even admit to having said it on occasion, especially to children who were whining. "That's not fair..." But do we actually know much about lemons, their origins, their many uses? A bit of research has provided me with some interesting information which I'd like to share with you.

Lemons are widely thought to have originated in the Middle East, in what is now Iraq, and were highly valued by royalty and tradesmen. Like salt and many spices, lemons were a form of currency because they were rare. Now they are grown throughout the Mediterranean region, southern Africa, South America, the Pacific and Caribbean islands, and the southern United States, so they are more widely available. (Although recently they're becoming somewhat pricey, so perhaps we'll return to the days of only royalty having access!)

Around the house, lemons certainly are versatile. Mounded in a bowl, they make an attractive focus on a counter or table, and their scent sweetens the air. To refresh stale air throughout the house, slice a lemon and simmer it in a pot of water (no lid) for an hour or so; the scent will permeate your home.

To clean strong odors (onions, garlic, fish, or other offensive scents) from your hands, rub the cut side of a quarter lemon over the skin, or wash with a 50/50 solution of lemon juice and water. This same technique will work for berry, ink, or many other stains on your skin. For ladies with blonde, white or silver hair, a lemon juice rinse after shampooing can produce a lovely shine; just add 1-2 tablespoons of lemon juice to a quart of warm water, rinse through your hair, allow it to sit for 2-3 minutes, then rinse with clear water.

If your aluminum pots are looking a bit dull, you can restore a shine by rubbing the cut side of a lemon over the surface. Adding some salt and elbow grease to copper bottoms will restore their shine, too, without using harsh chemicals.

And let us not forget: We can always add lemon slices to water, iced tea, and other beverages; we can sprinkle lemon juice on salads, vegetables, and fish or seafood; and WE CAN MAKE LEMONADE!

(Since lemons are acidic, you may want to use protective gloves when working with this fruit, especially if you have sensitive skin.)

Breast cancer affects one in eight women during their lives. Breast cancer kills more women in the United States than any cancer except lung cancer. No one knows thy some women get breast cancer, but there are a number of risk factors. Risks that you cannot change include:

- Age the chance of getting breast cancer rises as a woman gets older.
- Genes there are two genes, BRCA1 and BRCA2, that greatly increase the risk. Women who have family members with breast or ovarian cancer may wish to be tested.
- Personal factors beginning periods before age 12 or going through menopause after age 55.

Others risks include being overweight, using hormone replacement therapy, taking birth control pills, drinking alcohol, not having children, having your first child after age 35, or having dense breasts.

Breast cancer prevention: Lifestyle choices and more

"Breast cancer prevention starts with your own health habits---such as staying physically active, limiting alcohol and eating right. Can healthy eating and regular exercise really contribute to breast cancer prevention? So far, the evidence says yes. What's more, if you combine these riskreducing habits with limiting your exposure to substances that promote the disease, you'll benefit even more.

When it comes to breast cancer prevention, the risks you can't control--such as your age and genetic makeup--may loom large, but there are some breast cancer prevention steps you can always take on your own. Although these measures provide no guarantee that you won't develop the disease, they'll give you a start toward breast cancer prevention."

By mid-September, all of this infrastructure should be in place in the walls and ceiling, and dry wall will follow immediately after.





Please pray for a peaceful solution and for the country not to abandon democracy, which the protest leaders are blaming for the problems because too much power is given to the rural majority, whom the protestors consider ill-informed and susceptible to vote buying.

 \Rightarrow Many of you have continued to ask about Elaine's health, which has been a struggle for almost three years now. Well, there finally may be a light at the end of the tunnel. After working for a year with a missionary doctor, Elaine's intestinal disease is under control along with almost all of her other autoimmune-related ailments. As for the debilitating muscle/joint pain that remains as the final piece in the autoimmune disease puzzle, we have made the decision to start a long-term treatment plan that is already showing promise. that Alexander Solzhenitsyn, the famed Russian author who died last month, provides us with one of the greatest testimonies to the importance of Christian suffering:

"It was granted to me to carry away from my prison years on my bent back, which nearly broke beneath its load, this essential experience: how a human being becomes evil and how good.

"In the intoxication of youthful successes I had felt myself to be infallible, and I was therefore cruel. In the surfeit of power I was a murderer and an oppressor. In my most evil moments I was convinced that I was doing good, and I was well supplied with systematic arguments.

"It was only when I lay there on rotting prison straw that I sensed within myself the first stirrings of good. Gradually it was disclosed to me that the line separating good and evil passes not through states, nor between classes, nor between political parties either – but right through every human heart – and through all human hearts.

"...That is why I turn back to the years of my imprisonment and say, sometimes to the astonishment of those about me, '*Bless you*, *prison*!' I nourished my soul there, and I say without hesitation: '*Bless you*, *prison*, *for having been in my life*!"'

Siberian Greetings!

It's October and that means only one thing in Siberia...winter is almost here. We had an extremely busy summer and fall so we really haven't written much information with 'real meat' in quite a while.

May, June and part of July we spent most of our time on the road to and from the village. We were able to spend four days a week with the folks there, trying to build more relationships, working on the buildings & garden, and swimming in the river to cool off. The summer temperatures were in the high 90's, and there's no air-conditioning in Siberia yet. Village life has proven to move much slower and is another culture for us. We *love* being there and know without a doubt it's where we're supposed to be. As 'outsiders' it will take a lot of time and prayer to become more accepted.

The last weeks of July we were able to help the deaf fellowship with one of their camps. It was so wonderful to be back on Lake Baikal again and working at the camp. Laura volunteered to work in the kitchen so the ladies from the fellowship could be a part of the camp in more important ways. This camp was an outreach to new peoplewe were honored to be small part of the camp, working alongside people we had reached 8 or 9 years earlier.

Kevin was sports/ activities director...after a few days, he realized he's not in his 20's anymore. Also, for the first time (for us anyway), the campers slept in a round tent called a Yurt. The Buriat and Mongols were nomads and used this type of "home" because they're easy to pack up and move. What's even more exciting is that they can be "winterized" with heavier wool material and a stove so that people can camp by the

lake throughout the winter months. We can't wait to try it out and share our experience with you. You can find these tents everywhere in Mongolia today, which brings us to our August adventure....

Another 90 day visa had ended by the first week of August and once again we found ourselves on a bus heading south to Mon-



golia to get another 90 day visa. We had given papers to the local authorities for temporary residency three months earlier knowing that we might still have to make another trip out of the country. We were praying this would be our last. The trip began on a rainy day which we thought should be great. The buses usually have air conditioning but it doesn't always work well if at all...that can make a 12 hour trip a little "warm" in the summer heat. So, the trip began well until we were about an hour outside the city when the bus blew out one of its back tires. Not such a big deal as it was the inside tire, and we knew we'd have a stop within the next hour before the border. The driver assured us it was OK, and he'd fix the problem later. We drove on that tire for the next 11 hours with people beeping and waving at us to stop. The bus rode fine, but we're sure you aren't supposed to keep driving on one less tire through the mountains of Russia and Mongolia. Thank you, prayer warriors!

We did arrive safely, and the next day we sent out our papers through DHL to the US for our new visas. (We had found this to be quicker and cheaper in the long run.) *Had* is the key word here. All was going great back in the US; five days after we had mailed our papers they were on their way back to Mongolia...so we thought. To make a very long story short...the package was mislabeled and sent to Venezuela, twice, also to Panama, twice, then back to the US where it sat for two extra days. As you can see, it took much longer than we expected (16 days), and we spent most of the month in Mongolia instead of being back in Russia. Our landlady had decided she wanted to move back home and would like to be in by the 1st of Sept. This was not a big surprise. We had talked about it in the past, but the timing was just a bit short. Again, our Provider brought us to a very nice apt. for a little less money just in time for us to move on the first. It was as empty as the last apartment was full, so we had to scramble to find a stove, kitchen cabinets, and a few other essentials.

The best news came the first week of September. We received the call that they had approved us for temporary residency in Russia. We now have visas for three years and will no longer have to leave unless we *want* or *need* to leave the country. *His* timing is perfect so we rejoice in answered prayers.

As you can see from the above, none of this could have been accomplished without your continued lifting us up to the Father. So we thank you and look forward with great anticipation to see what the next few months will hold for us.

We will be working on doing some Community Development Projects with the Nursing home located right behind our office. We will let you know in the next letter how you can become a part of helping the older and less fortunate people in this very needy home.

Also we want to develop a relationship with the orphanage in the Village for another Community Development project; the needs are simple yet enormous.

"Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world." James 1:27

The work is at times overwhelming, the need for more workers is great; but we also trust that He will stir the hearts of those we meet as we share the hope and love of our precious Savior.


