

Overeating and over-imbibing, many took communion in an irreverent and self-centered manner. So we don't take communion bread as a "snack" or enjoy the grape juice as a refreshment, but could it be that we sometimes take communion in an unworthy manner? THE "GOOD NEWS"!

What happened on that first Easter Sunday? How did events unfold that morning some 2000 years ago?

We don't know for sure. There was no video camera recording when the women (or a woman) arrived at the tomb. We don't know whether the stone was rolled back before or after they arrived. The different writers tell slightly different stories about what happened so we don't know the exact chronology.

But do we need to know? Do we have to have the details written in stone, videotaped, notarized? What matters is the event itself—that it happened—and we can see and share in the results.

Whether there were three women or just one, whether the stone was rolled back before the women arrived or after they got there, whether there were angels present or not really doesn't matter. What matters is that the tomb was empty, and on that one detail all the writers agree.

What matters is that death took a back seat to life. All that evil can do, all that seemed to be final, ultimate, finished, was just a bump in the road on the way to the truth: He is Risen! The tomb was empty, and the one who was dead is alive! God raised Jesus from the dead and gave us the promise that we who believe in him will be raised as he was. Through Jesus Christ we have been given eternal life.

We know the resurrection happened because of the change it made in the lives of the people involved and in the history of the world. The disciples who fled in fear, the mob who cried, "Crucify him," the soldiers who were just doing their duty—all found their lives changed by what happened on that weekend. Within weeks, those same scared disciples were boldly preaching that Jesus had risen, not letting the power of the Sanhedrin or of Rome intimidate them.

What happened that day? Many of the details will be forever obscured by the fog of time and history. But the one thing we know in our hearts is that Jesus who was dead is alive and as he lives, so we also will live. This is the message of Easter; it is the core of what it means to be a Christian. This is the "good news" we have been called to share with others so they can then share in the joy and peace and hope we have received from our risen Lord.

Easter is not a celebration of what was, no matter the uncertain details. It is not something we look back on with nostalgia. Easter is a celebration of what is to come. We celebrate the assurance of an eternal life and an eternal relationship with the God of all creation through the death and resurrection of his Son.

This is what Christianity is all about, the core of what it means to be a follower of Jesus Christ: "He IS RISEN!" "He IS RISEN INDEED!"

Walking on the Path Patience Nave

"In everything give thanks, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." 1 Thessalonians 5:18

A couple books of the Bible I have been reading are having a tremendous influence on my thinking. I read verses I memorized long ago, and suddenly it is as though they were new to me. The above verse is one of those.

"In everything give thanks," Paul says to the Thessalonians. Many times I have struggled with that. Give thanks when someone we love dies? Give thanks when someone suffers? Give thanks when life seems difficult? Give thanks when someone says something cruel? I have finally learned that God is not asking me to be thankful for the event or the action but to be thankful for him and his ever present interaction in my life in the midst of the difficult situations. So maybe I have dealt with the "in everything give thanks" part of the verse.

But today I saw the second part of that verse with new insight. I am to give thanks because it is *God's will* for me to do so. My giving thanks has nothing to do with circumstances. It has nothing to do with feeling. Giving thanks really has nothing to do with anything but my obedience. If I want to live my life according to God's will, to be obedient, I will *"in everything give thanks."* This understanding seems to put a whole new slant on the verse.

My friends in Haiti have learned this lesson. In the midst of the chaos following the earthquake, I have seen many lift a hand to the sky and declare, "*Bondye bon tout ton e tat ton Bondye bon*!" God is good every day; every day God is good!

Prayer: Father, teach us to be a people who love you and praise you and thank you every day, not because things are good or smooth or untroubled but because it pleases you for us to be obedient to your will. Amen.

Since St. Patrick's Day fell on a Youth Group meeting day, we learned about Patrick, Ireland, and wearing of the green, as well as other traditions of the day. And we sampled varieties of Irish Soda Bread! With Palm Sunday approaching, we focused on the significance of the day and the importance of Holy Week in the Christian calendar. The month concluded with a Passover Seder, so the students would understand the history, form, and significance of the Last Supper, as observed by Jesus and His disciples.

In April, we will be looking at the Ten Commandments from both historical and contemporary perspectives. There should be some interesting discussions around the table.

Lest you think the Youth Group meetings are just another class, rest assured that the kids make good use of the ping pong tables, board games, air hockey table, and the Wii. They are quite competitive and enjoy the variety of recreation available to them. With more daylight hours on the horizon, we hope to have some outdoors activities to burn off some of that excess energy.

Christian Education and Ministries Patience Nave

Some time ago Pastor Mark and I made a list of the ministries of our church, and we found we actually work through small groups and individuals on almost 100 different ministries. It would be easy to settle down and not even listen to a suggestion for another ministry, but that is not the way we function. We have a wonderful problem. Our people want to serve!

So let me tell you about the latest addition to our ever-growing list of ministries.

One of our newest Bible studies told me that they would like to find some kind of outreach, something they can do in response to all they are learning. Coincidentally, Debbie Lattin had recently called me to see if we would like to be part of the Citrus County Harvest, Inc. ministry to give food to the children in the county who probably have little or nothing to eat on the weekend. You may have read about this ministry recently in the Chronicle, a ministry that Hernando United Methodist Church is doing for the Hernando children.

I went to Hernando, to the old Lakeview School, to see the work in progress. Harvest raises the money to buy the food, buys the food, takes it to the center in Hernando for packaging in the book bags of the children, collects the bags and delivers them to the school. All the volunteers do is pack the bags for delivery. The packing process took 17 minutes. I timed it! In that time they prepared 32 bags with food for 49 children. I came away amazed and excited that we had been asked to do the same thing for Homosassa Elementary.

So listen for more information about this exciting new ministry. I talked to Debbie today, and we are going to meet next week to finalize plans. We will then organize two teams of about ten people, and the teams will take turns preparing the bags—one team one week, and the other the next. The Bible study will take one team, and I have an idea for the makeup of the other team. We'll probably never have to prepare for more than 50 children, but won't we get an enormous blessing from knowing that **50 children** are eating well each weekend because ten of us spent 20 minutes preparing food?

"As you have done for the least of these," Jesus said. I think he is going to be pleased, and I love to imagine that he is smiling as we work!

The Journey Through Lent To Easter

As we continue our journey through Lent toward Easter, there is one thing we can not avoid. That one thing is the cross!

Without Christ's crucifixion, there would have been no resurrection for anyone. If Christ were not crucified for our sins, where would we be? It's something to contemplate. Without the cross, we would still be in our sin and struggling with the impossible task of trying to obey the Law.

Over the years I've heard a lot of talk about the Apostle Paul's theology, his supposed views about various things, and particularly his emphasis on the cross. Nothing in the Scriptures which Paul wrote ever seemed out of kilter – to me anyway. I gained new understanding recently when I read <u>Cruciformity: Paul's Narrative Spirituality of the Cross</u> (required reading for The Academy for Spiritual Formation). The author addressed some of the points of contention about Paul's theology of the cross, explaining in great detail the spirituality of the cross. He points out how the love of Christ led him to endure the cross and how this same type of love needs to be our motivation.

I've come to the understanding that to become more Christ-like, we must endure our own type of cross bearing. While not literally bearing the cross, we go through things that cause us to grow spiritually and develop those characteristics which are more Christ-like than the worldly characteristics we once had. Obviously this journey to Christ-likeness is a process which takes much longer than a single Lenten season. This spiritual formation process will need to continue throughout our Christian journey.

Fortunately we don't make this journey alone. We have fellow travelers who understand and come alongside. There are encouragers who help us see the path more clearly. Most importantly, it is God who starts us on the journey through his prevenient grace, continues to guide us through justifying grace and completes our journey in His sanctifying grace.

We have many wonderful tools to cause us to be more open to His working in our lives. A list of spiritual disciplines is available in the Narthex. Descriptions of "other" prayer methods are on the Spiritual Formation Bulletin Board in the Administration/Education Building. The Prayer Labyrinth will be available on Good Friday from 9 – 8 and on Holy Saturday from 9 – 3. Please use every opportunity to intentionally spend time with Christ – remember what He has done for us!

READING IS FUN – ENJOY A GOOD BOOK

• "A Good Yarn" another good book by Debbie Macomber – Lydia Hoffman opened her shop, A Good Yarn, a year ago and has found happiness with Brad Goetz but suddenly his ex-wife has appeared on the scene. The book also follows Elise Beaumont, a retired librarian, who has joined one of Lydia's popular knitting classes. Elise and Bethanne Hamlin are both facing fallout from divorce and having problems trying to reshape their lives. Courtney Pulanski is a depressed and overweight teenager. She's staying with her grandmother who's trying to help her. Like so many women, these four find companionship and comfort in each other and in this age-old craft. Who would have thought that knitting socks could change your life?

• "The Jasmine Moon Murder" by Laura Childs, a book for mystery lovers - Theodosia Browning, owner of the Indigo Tea Shop, is always happy to contribute to worthy causes. She and her staff are catering an elegant if unusual Charleston society event. It's a "Ghost Crawl" through the spooky grounds of the historic Jasmine Cemetery, complete with hired "ghosts." The event is sponsored by a local medical organization, and the organizer, Dr. Jasper Davis, doesn't get to enjoy the proceedings because unfortunately, during the Crawl's theatrical number, he drops dead. Theodosia has a sensitive nose for trouble, and, before long, chasing down the culprit gets her in hot water up to her neck.

• "The Perfect Life" by Robin Lee Hatcher. Katherine Clarkson has the perfect life – married to Brad, a loving and handsome man, respected in their church and community, with two grown daughters on the verge of starting families of their own, a thriving ministry, good friends and a comfortable life. She has it all until the day a reporter appears with shocking allegations of Brad's financial impropriety at his foundation and worse, an affair with a former employee. How can she survive the loss of what she thought was the perfect life?

• "Lady of Milkweed Manor" by Julie Klassen – Even a proper vicar's daughter can make a mistake, and now Charlotte Lamb must pay a high price for her fall. To avoid the prying eyes of all who knew her, she hides herself away in London's forbidding Milkweed Manor, a place of mystery and lore, of old secrets and new birth. Once there, she comes face-to-face with a suitor from her past, who now hides secrets of his own. Both are determined, with God's help, to protect those they love. But neither can imagine the depth of sacrifice that will be required. Sprinkled with fascinating details about the lives of women in Regency, England, this is a moving romantic drama about the redemption of past failings and the beauty of sacrificial love.

• "What Once We Loved" by Jane Kirkpatrick – Book 3 of Kinship and Courage Series. A circle of fascinating, courageous women in a challenging setting of the OregonCalifornia 1850's frontier, these big-hearted heroines face past and present challenges with unswerving dreams and hardscrabble labor. Eventually their faith and friendship triumph over daily struggles and wrong-headed, past decisions.

• "Beyond This Moment" by Tamera Alexander – When Dr. Molly Whitcomb, Professor of Romance Languages, steps off the train in Colorado Territory, she makes a choice – one that goes against everything she stands for, yet it's the only choice that offers her a chance to regain a fraction of all she's lost. Sheriff James McPhersons's instincts sense Professor Whitcomb is hiding something – he just doesn't know what. When he does learn Molly's secret, his own reputation is undermined when Molly's reinvented life begins to unravel. It threatens his job, the stability of Timber Ridge and what he always knew to be true about himself. An amazing story.

• "Jillian Dare" by Melanie M. Jeschke – Things are looking up for Jillian Dare. She has left her Shenandoah Valley foster home behind and is striking out on her own. She lands a job as a nanny at a large country estate in the rolling foothills of Virginia and is enthralled with the beauty of her new home.. Her young charge, Cadence Remington, is a delight and she even has the opportunity to travel frequently to the family castle in England. When she meets her handsome but moody employer, Ethan, she realizes she is falling in love with her boss. How can a humble girl with no connections ever hope to win a successful entrepreneur from a wealthy family? And what dark secrets from the past is he hiding? This contemporary story is inspired by the well-loved classic "Jane Eyr." It's a timeless romance.

• "The Wildwater Walking Club" by Claire Cook – The women of this club are a delightful trio, full of heart and determination. As they literally put one foot in front of the other, the three friends find unlikely paths that point them toward more fulfilling lives.

• "Full Circle," an easy-to-read novel by Davis Bunn – He's a hotshot financial analyst who has lost it all. She's a brokenhearted world traveler forced to come home and beg for money. His job hangs by a thread; her dreams of making a difference in Africa are circling the drain. But sparks fly – and danger threatens – when these two wounded souls must work together to solve a mystery and right a wrong.

• "Mercy & Eagleflight" by Michael Phillips – Young, inexperienced evangelist's assistant, Mercy Randolph, suddenly finds herself alone and penniless in a small Kansas town in the 1890's. As she tries to preach to the uninterested townspeople, her spiritual foundations are tested by a most unusual card playing cowboy with an even more unusual name – Jeremiah Eagleflight. Challenged by their dialogue, Mercy must explore deep within herself to discover her true conviction while Jeremiah deals with questions of belief he has never considered. Meanwhile, a vengeful troublemaker, bent on murder, threatens whatever happiness Mercy and Eagleflight hope to find.



A Good Way to Give - <u>and</u> Receive!

In the current economic climate of very low interest rates on regular Savings accounts, Money Market accounts, and Certificates of Deposit, **Charitable Gift Annuities** offer an attractive option. **CGAs** are a good way to "give" and to "receive." You can provide yourself an excellent rate of return with guaranteed payments for the rest of your life <u>and</u>, at the same time, make a significant gift to your church after your death.

You can have as many as two annuitants, which is common for married couples who want to ensure that both spouses receive income for the remainder of their lives. Then, upon the death of the second annuitant, the remainder of the principal of the gift annuity will be disbursed to the church to be used in whatever manner you designate.

You are entitled to a charitable income tax deduction for the gift portion of the annuity in the year of the gift. If you fund the annuity with appreciated assets, such as stocks, you may also avoid the tax on a portion of any capital gain. The annuity will not become part of your estate, thus avoiding any estate taxes and probate costs.

Example: Jim and Jo Ann Robertson (ages 80 and 78) decide to fund a Charitable Gift Annuity with \$30,000 and name their church as the beneficiary. At their ages, the rate of return is 6% which means that \$1,800 a year will be paid to them (or to the survivor) as long as they live. Slightly more than \$1,300 will be taxfree. They will also receive a charitable income tax deduction of more than \$12,800 in the year of the gift. In addition, Mr. and Mrs. Robertson have the satisfaction of knowing that, at the death of the surviving spouse, their church will receive the remainder portion.

The Academy For Spiritual Formation By Marilyn Watson

The courses at the last session of The Academy For Spiritual Formation were "New Testament Spirituality" taught by the Rev. Dr. Robert Mulholland and "Liturgy and Spirituality" taught by the Rev. Dr. Don Saliers. Dr. Mulholland is Professor of New Testament and Vice President and Chief Academic Officer at Asbury Theological Seminary. Dr. Saliers is the Wm. R. Cannon Distinguished Professor of Theology and Worship, Emeritus, at Emory University's Candler School of Theology. Dr. Saliers is the author of a number of books and a contributor to the <u>United Methodist Hymnal</u>, <u>The Book of Worship</u>, and <u>Upper Room Worshipbook</u>.

Our church will be blessed from the opportunity I had for an hour of one-on-one time with Dr. Saliers. During this time we discussed our church's particular worship and spirituality. Dr. Saliers is a passionate Christian man of profound insight, ideas, talent, and judgment. His ideas for us are amazingly insightful. The course he taught focused on the movements within a worship service, the power of liturgy, the corporate expression of who we are, and the seasons of the liturgical year.

Dr. Mulholland is "radically abandoned to God" and "radically available" to Him as well. Through his example, as he taught, we learned more than just New Testament Spirituality! We studied ways people come to and grow in Christ, how to implement programs geared to their spiritual growth, and so much more.

It was a blessing for me to be able to lead the worship service one evening. As a bonus, the Lord blessed me with something I'd never experienced before – snow!

I look forward to sharing insights with you that I received from this session at the Academy.

ITEMS NEEDED FOR HOMELESS

- Lighter clothing for the warmer weather: i.e. shorts, t-shirts, flip-flops, sandals, white socks, baseball caps. (At this time there are no women in need of clothing.)
- Antiperspirants, razors, small sized toothpaste, t-brushes, mouth wash, hand cream and also small tissue packs.
- Tarps.
- Mosquito netting, bug repellant, citronella candles, "Off" mosquito coils, and the like.
- 1 Lb. Propane tanks for cooking. Wal-Mart sells (2) Pkg. canisters for (plus, minus) \$5.60/6.50. The off-brand are good.
- Always a need for D & C batteries.
- "Pop-top" cans of soup.
- Reusable tote bags (limited to + -) no more than 20.
- Monthly need for donations of "laundry soap" in 50 oz. containers. Jerry and Jan break it down into 12 to 16 oz. (easy to carry) containers in clean plastic water or soda bottles to fit into a backpack.
- A limited amount of bleach (for washing socks & tea shirtspreferably t-shirts with no writing).
- Small portable radios (to help get storm warnings).

These are needed over the warm season, but "not all at once." Thanks to all who provide these important items for our friends in the woods.

The Church Bell By John Gibbs

One of the listed "six Church Treasures" of the original First United Methodist Church of Homosassa is our Church Bell.

The Bell was first placed high atop the then First Methodist Church in old Homosassa in the late 1930s. It was dedicated in 1937. There it rang the Call to Worship for some 35 years.

This Bell was a gift given to the Church by Mr. R. W. McMullen, a retiring Atlantic Coast Line Railroad conductor, who requested and received it from the ACL Railroad for this specific purpose. Contrary to local legend, the bell was not from a locomotive that reached Homosassa.

In 1981, our Bell was placed aloft the second Sanctuary by a group headed by Joe Henry. In later years this building would become our first fellowship hall.

Rev. John Denmark was pastor at the time the Bell was crane-lifted up and into the rooftop cupola. The cupola roof was then put in place with the Cross surmounting it.

The Church Bell is now placed between the (third) Sanctuary and the Education Building, on a Georgia black granite block, with a cast iron dedicatory plaque attached. The gold color of the solid brass bell contrasts beautifully with the rich black of the granite. On February 26, 2010, the complete Bell Monument was crane-lifted over the walkway roof and onto the prepared site.

The contractor was Travis LaPerle of La-Perle Monuments, Inverness. The LaPerle Company did the metal and granite work, site preparation and crane work.

> All costs incurred were by a single donation. No church funds were used. The Bell Monument Committee, formed in August, 2009, consisted of Rev.

Richard Evans Chairman, Jack Schrock, Joe Henry and John Gibbs. The Bell Monument was re-dedicated to the Glory of God and dedicated to the memory of Linda M. Schrock, on March

21, 2010. The dedication was done by Pastor Mark Whittaker and Rev. Richard Evans, with the congregation at each of the three services participating.



The number 1779 on the bell frame is thought to be the unknown foundry's bell casting number--it's 1,779th bell cast. On the solid brass bell and on the bell frame is the number 307, the number of the coal-fired steam locomotive of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad on which the bell rang.

Additional history of our Church Bell can be found on Pages 102-104 of "The First Hundred Years" written by Evelyn C. Bash, then Church Historian, and printed in the year 2000. Some of the history given here is referenced from that publication.

Another railroad locomotive bell, also complete with a heaven-pointing ringing arm, but with an outside ringing cord to the ground, can be seen high atop the Congregational Church in Tavares, Florida. This is the oldest church building and congregation in Tavares.

Instrumental Music: Some talented instrumentalists, including harpists, rehearse periodically and play occasionally on Sunday mornings and at special events.

<u>Sacred Dancers</u>: This inter-generational group prepares and performs interpretive dance presentations occasionally on Sundays and for seasonal worship services and programs.



Crisis Counseling: Pastor Whittaker, or another staff member, is available in crisis situations and will suggest further community resources if needed.


Hospital Visitation: Pastor Whittaker regularly visits in local hospitals. Members and friends need to notify the church office when they, or a member of their family, are hospitalized.

As we head into the month of heavy pollution and increasing heat here in *Chiang Mai*, we are thankful for three things: air conditioning, the coming two-week April school break, and your prayers! Thanks for regularly lifting up our requests to the Lord; we know the brown haze surrounding the city can't block His answers.

<u>Praises</u>

After much prayer and discussion, we feel that God is asking Elaine to step away from her teaching ministry at Grace International School at the conclusion of this school year (June 1) in order to focus all her ministry time on the work of our new PIONEERS church-planting team. While Elaine has been blessed to serve at the school teaching 2nd grade for five years now, we feel that our church-planting work, which is really flourishing, is deserving of all of her ministry time. In addition, Elaine feels the need to give more direct time to Joe and the boys and to take back some of the family responsibilities that Joe has covered for the past five years. We are thankful to the Lord for His clear guidance in this matter and are excited by what He has for us in the coming years. We also ask for your prayers for Elaine to transition well from mostly school-based ministry into full-time Thai ministry.

✤ Our new team (The HOME Team) has its third official Thai partnership. Praise God! Following a survey trip and much prayer and debate, we decided to partner with *Aajaan Dapoe* in western Chiang Mai province. As we shared last month, *Dapoe* is an evangelist who is working to share the good news in six villages that have only one Christian. Please pray that our team would be effective in the coming months and years in assisting *Dapoe* in his ministry.

✤ Praise God that we had a great series of meetings recently with a PIONEERS family already serving in Chiang Mai who is interested in joining our team. As they contact their supporters and others about this change back into hands-on church-planting work, please pray that they would receive confirmation and encouragement about this move and about the exciting ministries the Lord has already prepared for them.

As we have been lining up Thai partnerships over the past six months for our team, there has been one thing missing: **missionary teammates**. Well, that is about to change! We are so thankful that the Lord is in charge of this process as every step has been completed in His timing. That is no different as we have turned our attention to finding teammates. Already, one family is making plans to join our team (see third praise item above), and there have been two other families and two singles who have been introduced to us as possible teammates in just the past six weeks. All these folks would be excellent fits in our partnerships, so we would ask for you to pray that the Lord clearly lead every one of these missionaries to our team if that is what He desires. Our Thai partners are waiting! ✤ We wanted to give you a quick update on our financial situation after our plea for help late last fall. At this time, we are at 90% of our monthly support goal, which is an encouraging increase from 75% last fall. We need an additional \$540 per month to finally get back to 100% support. In addition, after receiving \$11,000 in one-time gifts, we now need just \$5,000 more to be totally caught up in terms of business-expense reimbursements that are still owed to us. Praise God for the generosity of so many people and churches; please pray that these final financial goals would be met soon so that we can move forward in Thai ministry on firm financial ground.

✤ We had a meeting on Saturday with another prospective Thai partner for our team who has a tremendously fruitful and potentially large ministry. This work could lead to churches/community centers being planted in several inner-city areas across northern Thailand. Please pray for wisdom and clear direction for all involved as we consider how The HOME Team might assist this promising work.

✤ We are making plans for Brittany to come back to Thailand for three months to visit us this summer during college break. The visa situation here has become a lot more tricky and complicated for tourists recently, so please pray for wisdom for us to find the best/cheapest way to keep her here legally all summer long.

In addition to these home-study times, they also come together once a month to prepare a meal for the fellowship. These monthly meals have become a huge success... everyone loves the extra fellowship and of course the great meals.

The ladies are also working on various crafts projects. A fellow worker is great at such activities and has the ladies excited about doing some special things for the building where we meet. They are working on banners for Easter and hope to make others to hang permanently in the hall. The younger gals are working on making jewelry from beads and shells... not certain if they will be selling them or just making them for gifts, so we'll keep you posted.

Kevin and our teammate Doug have been helping out at a local alcohol/drug rehab center. They travel weekly to the center to teach the men on different topics, bringing them closer to a better knowledge of their Savior. Alcoholism in Russia is such a national problem that the President of the Russian Federation, President Dmitry Medvedev, recently acknowledged, "Alcoholism in Russia has become a 'national disaster'." Just 40% of this year's high school graduates are likely to live to the pension age of 55-60, according to World Health Organization figures quoted

by Health Minister Tatyana Golikova. Doctors believe alcohol-related diseases cause around half of all deaths of Russians between the ages of 15 and 54. As you can see, this problem is enormous...but, there's hope. Please join us in prayer for this nation, for this problem.

Moving--Within a few short months, our lease for the apartment in the city will end as will Laura's commitment to help teach "her girls". After much prayer and consideration, we've decided this is the best time to make the move out into the village. For the past two years, we've been spending part of a week in the city and part in the village. This makes building up the fellowship difficult at best. We believe the local officials will allow us to live and register in the village since we have been "in country" now for many years. Still, it's easier than chopping wood, hauling water in from a well, and using an outhouse at -40. Pray with us as we make yet another move to a much smaller region ... knowing it IS where He leads.


