

The Rev. Glendon Harris shares a story told by Buffalo Bill Cody. Buffalo Bill recounted how an English visitor to the West was riding through a Rocky Mountain canyon one day. Suddenly a tremendous gust of wind swooped down and actually carried the Englishman off the seat of his wagon. After he picked himself up and combed the sand and gravel out of his whiskers, he said, "I say! I think you overdo ventilation in this country."

In the second chapter of Acts, we read that there is power in the wind - and even more power in the Breath of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit came swooping on the wind into that upper room where the disciples and the followers of Jesus had been praying and waiting. The Spirit gave them the ability to speak in different languages and brought a holy boldness to Peter so he could preach the good news of the Gospel to the crowd that had gathered. The Holy Spirit moved and convicted the partisan crowd of Jews who had gathered to celebrate the Jewish festival of Pentecost.

The Holy Spirit is also gentle. He is the still, small voice of God speaking to us of God's presence and power. He is the breath that filled the once dry bones in Ezekiel so they came alive, even as He breathes God's life into us who believe. The Holy Spirit is the presence of God in our lives every day, speaking to us if we are willing to listen.

The Holy Spirit provides each of us with at least one gift that is particularly suited to the person he has created us to be. He gives gifts to be used in establishing the Kingdom of God. Paul writes, "There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord." (1 Corinthians 12:4-5) Then he adds, "Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good." (1 Corinthians12:7) Each person's gift is valuable, and when we fail to function in our giftedness, a piece of the whole is missing.

The Holy Spirit inspires our worship and fills us with the presence and power of God as we celebrate the good news that Jesus Christ is risen. When we sing, when we pray, when we take communion, the Holy Spirit is present.

Paul tells us how the Spirit helps our prayer life: "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints in accordance with God's will." (Romans 8:26-27)

When the Holy Spirit came at Pentecost, there was more than just wind and fire. It was a time of the opening of men's hearts to the presence of God. Today the Holy Spirit is among us, God present in our lives each day. Our celebration of Pentecost is also more than just wind and fire - it is our opportunity to open our lives to God's presence and to celebrate.

THE DISCIPLE AND THE HOLY SPIRIT

It's always hard when someone we love leaves us. Children especially dislike having a parent go away, even for a short time. But when the parent promises, "I will send you something special," it makes the parting somewhat easier. The child has something to anticipate.

1) Jesus had explained to his disciples that he must return to his Father in heaven, and they were grieving at the thought of his leaving them. He said to them, "But I tell you the truth: It is for your good that I am going away. Unless I go away, the Counselor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. He will convict the world of guilt..." (John. 16:7-8a)

Who is Jesus promising to send them?

We know from other passages of scripture that Jesus is promising to send them the Holy Spirit. What is to be one of the functions of the Holy Spirit when he comes?

2) Then, just before Jesus ascended to the Father, he told his followers: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." (Acts 1:4-5)

Why was it important for them to wait for the promised Holy Spirit before they went out to witness?

3) Jesus told them plainly, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Notice the widening circle - from their base city of Jerusalem, through their land of Judah, and then to the land of the Samaritans who were commonly looked down upon by the Jews - and then to all the world, which would include the heathen Gentiles.

What does Jesus' promise to his followers then mean to us today?

4)After witnessing Jesus' ascension, the disciples gathered together in a room in Jerusalem - to pray and to wait for the mysterious Holy Spirit Jesus had promised. What would happen? How would he come? Would they recognize this "Counselor" when he arrived? What questions would you have been asking?

5) In Acts 2, we read: "When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them." (Acts 2:1-4) Suddenly the gift was here; he had come just as Jesus promised. Imagine yourself in this Bible setting. What do you think your reaction would have been?

What two things happened to the believers who had been waiting?

In the crowd were God-fearing Jews from every nation, and each person heard the disciples speaking in his own language. Why were these two things important for the beginning of the church?

6) Then in Acts 2:14-40, we read the powerful sermon that Peter, a common fisherman but now gifted by the Holy Spirit, preached to the crowd. Verses 40-41 tell how Peter warned and pleaded, "Save yourselves from this corrupt generation." About 3,000 people believed and were baptized. Looking back at Jesus' promise in Acts 1, what had Peter been empowered to do?

From John 16:8a in question one, what had the Holy Spirit done?

THINK ABOUT IT:

• When God gives you the opportunity to share the good news with a person or a group, what will the Holy Spirit empower you to do?

• As you share, what is the role of the Holy Spirit in the process? Do we sometimes try to fulfill his role, feeling we have failed to share effectively if we can't bring a person to believe?

onstruction Is Underway!

Construction of our new Fellowship Center is now underway. Bollenback Builders has been busy demolishing the old buildings and preparing for construction of the new facility. Shortly after Easter they began setting up their work center, disconnecting electrical, plumbing, security, and sprinkler systems, installing barriers between the areas to be demolished and the areas to be renovated, removing interior walls, shoring up roof trusses, removing sheet rock, ceilings, insulation, plumbing and electric lines, and preparing for complete removal of the old fellowship hall, kitchen, thrift-shop workroom, and vestibule. By the time you read this newsletter, construction fencing should be in place, and the old buildings may be gone completely.

We were able to remove and store all equipment that we can use in the new structure and to donate many serviceable items that we cannot re-use to various community charities. The demolition sub-contractor will salvage steel, copper, and other materials during the demolition process, and even the concrete block walls will be crushed and recycled as construction materials. Relatively little will end up in the land fill.

Jim Tierney is Bollenback's on-site supervisor; he will be present and supervising all work every day during the construction period. Jim has installed several new doors in the hallway between the construction area and the administrative building. We ask that you do not enter the construction area at any time, for your safety and to avoid liability issues with the various sub-contractors. It's not safe there, and we certainly don't want anyone getting hurt.

We will try to keep you well-informed of the construction progress throughout the next 10 or 11 months. Photos associated with this article illustrate the progress to date, and future issues of Genesis will illustrate work underway at those times. In addition, Theresa Weber, Church Administrator, has established a construction bulletin board in the Administrative building (on the wall opposite her office). We will also post photos on the church website at www.lumc.org on a regular basis. Please visit those locations frequently to see how we are doing.

Mission Trip to Haiti

<u>Monday March 24:</u> The FUMCH Bus picked up team members: Maggie Skidmore from Kanas city, MO, Bonnie Falk from Milwaukee, WI, and our FUMCH members Sharon Smith, Patience Nave & Ann Eckman at 4:15 p.m. to drive to Clearwater, where 13 team members stayed

overnight at the beautiful home of Wally & Susan Voege. Suitcases were opened, repacked, weighed, labeled and deemed ready for departure to the airport check-in on Tuesday AM. We had little sleep that night and left the house at 3:30 AM, Tuesday, for the airport.



Tuesday, March 25:

Bill Brobst, our FUMCH bus driver, with some team members, organized the loading of "check-in" bags on the bus, and the unloading of the suitcases, plus our carry-ons, from the bus at the airport. Each suitcase weighed close to 50 pounds. Twenty-eight suitcases were checked in and boarding passes obtained in a timely fashion.

It was a short flight to Miami. Customs went smoother than expected. At Port au Prince's Customs, the Rev. Milord, a native Haitian, from FL, met us and helped us thru customs, easing an otherwise tense situation with



the medical supplies we were bringing into the country.

Arrangements had been made for us to stay in Petit Goave, at the Methodist Guest House, for our week in Haiti. During our 5-hour

ride, we had opportunity to

observe from the road the concrete homes with tin roofs, trash on roadways and side-streets, and the apparent poverty of the

Haitian people. Approaching Petit Grove there was natural beauty to be seen in the water of the Canal of Gonave, in the ripening fruit of the banana and palm trees, and in the harvesting of the sugarcane fields, as we approached.

Dinner was a feast at the Methodist Guest House

mixed vegetable dish with pasta, goat roast tips, cole slaw, and chocolate chip ice cream for dessert. They have limited food supplies, and yet they gave to us generously.



Wednesday, March 26: The first day we hit the



<u>o:</u> The first day we fit the floor running. The 12persons' medical mission was the primary focus. Sharon Smith, a co-leader, ordered medical supplies based on assumptions of what might be needed; the team had no idea what lay before them. The Medical Clinic was set-up at the Olivier Methodist Church.

It was so interesting to see what the children enjoyed playing. We tried to teach them dodge ball with beach balls, but they did not understand. They were just happy to keep hitting the ball up in the air, and we counted how many times before it hit the ground. They loved the face painting that

The little girls liked to touch our light hair, and they were even fascinated by the veins in our hands which you could not easily see in their little brown hands.

<u>Thursday, March 27:</u> We gave the children worm pills to swallow

and then they were given a piece of candy. We put a cross on their hand to tell who had been given the pills. The pills are very bitter, but even then some of the children tried to rub off the cross so they could get more pills and so have another piece of candy.



Children were taught about tooth care with toothbrushes. Ann created a song for children to know when and how to brush their teeth. A few older brothers and fathers came too. Mostly, they wanted a toothbrush like the children had

received.

Six of the team went to the Methodist Grade and High School in Petit Goave, where they taught preventive dental care and distributed toothbrushes, toothpastes and



pencils to the 500 students and staff. There were almost 600 of each item handed out. The rest of the team held a second day's Clinic at Olivier. The school project took all morning and part of the afternoon.

<u>Friday, March 28:</u> Early Friday, Sharon Smith and six team members left early for a rural school and church in the mountainous town of Carrenage.

What a road! What an experience! We traveled for some time after leaving the main highway, driving up the mountainous road. We had no idea how far it was, and it was a bumpy ride. There would be huge boulders in the road or path and large mud holes. We saw few people or signs of

grade and high school. The teachers had not been paid since December 2007, giving up their salaries to feed the children.



from everywhere to see the visitors. Someone had picked fresh coconuts from the surrounding palm trees. A

man used a ma-



chete to carefully cut the tops off, carefully, right down to the final membrane of the coconut. They showed us how to puncture the membrane and drink the coconut juice. They bought chairs from the houses nearby and made a row of them where we could sit and eat our refreshments. Later,

the coconuts were cut in half so we could enjoy scooping out the coconut meat. Of their little, they gave much.

Our churches can make a difference in Haiti. The need is great and opportunities are many with the school-age children of Carlenage. There are approximately 600 people in this community, with 100-150 students in the school. Some of the things needed are a deep well for community wa-



ter, a work team to repair and paint the facility, and to build a new latrine, money for principal and teacher salaries, school supplies and school lunches.

At devotion time, Bonnie Falk shared John Wesley's quote, "To the world, you are just one person. To one person, you may be the world."

Saturday, March 29: The United Methodist Church owns a currently non-producing Experimental Farm outside of Petit Goave. The farm has the potential for becoming a profitable working farm once again.

The Clinic was held at the Experimental Farm Pavilion and other buildings, with areas set up for doctor's treatment rooms. Patients were seen by the medical team and medications were given. The children colored pictures

and had their hands and faces were painted with a heart, a flower or balloons.

Our Clinic work was finished.

Sunday, March 30: The leaders divided the team for the Methodist **Church's Sunday Services** at Petit Goave town church. and at Olivier. We sang in Haitian Creole from their hymnal.



Team co-leaders informed us of 2 team members and their churches who had donated \$1400 for Haitian projects. Carrenage, the rural school, had the greatest need, and the teachers' back-salaries from December were paid and monies for school lunches were provided. Our Medical team provided an additional \$500 toward the same project - \$1900 total. Bonnie Falk's Church gave \$485 for the toilet facilities at the Carlenage School. The superintendent was overjoved!

Monday, April 1: The trip home was 20 hours long. The airplane was late from Port au Prince so we missed our connecting flight from Miami to Tampa. Bill Brobst waited for us through all of our delays. It was just after 11:00 PM we left from Tampa and headed for Homosassa.



Thank you for your prayers, support, encouragement, and love. How inadequate those words seem. We praise God for each and every one of you. We felt your prayers every day. Those prayers kept us safe and gave us strength every minute. Your prayers let us realize that the Haitian people just needed the love of Jesus in their life.

Our accommodations and the food were so much more than we expected. The food was wonderful. We had rice and beans every evening meal along with things like a mixed vegetable dish and goat meat. There were delicious juices and a bread pudding made with sweet potatoes. We even had spaghetti with onions and hot dogs for breakfast. There was always bottled water for us to fill our water bottles.

There were cold-water showers but even that felt good after a day in the sun and heat. We often remarked on how the women looked so fresh and their clothes so clean. We saw them washing their clothes in the water that had come down from the mountains after the rain. Their white skirts were so white and their hair always so neat.

At times we would feel frustrated that we could do so little – almost nothing it seemed - to help these people. But then we had to be reminded that God was not asking us to clean up all the garbage or build lovely homes for them. His greatest command is that we love others as He loves us.

Where There's a WILL, There's a Way! By Rev. Richard Evans

I continue to be amazed at statistics that cite the large number of people - even my age or older - who do not have a WILL. A national poll, conducted last fall by Bankrate Inc, showed that 57% of Americans had made <u>no such provision</u>. Although three quarters of the respondents said that everyone needs a will, many simply don't follow through. Of those 50 years and older, 63% <u>do</u> have a will, although 90% of that age group said that they want to make their death as easy as possible on their families.

I suppose it is a human tendency to postpone or avoid things that seem sad and unpleasant - like death. But the results of such procrastination can be huge. Without a valid WILL or TRUST, the state decides how assets get distributed, heirs may quarrel over property, and parents may not be able to determine who will care for their dependent children. Preparing a WILL is one of the most important and considerate things you can do for your surviving family members - and for yourself.

Although some "do-it-yourselfers" decide to write their own, a simple WILL drafted by an attorney usually is worth the cost of several hundred dollars - both to avoid mistakes and to benefit from legal advice. For more complex estates, a Revocable Living TRUST may be a good alternative. The cost may be several thousand dollars but the result, usually, is to avoid probate. The combined costs of a WILL and probate often are similar to the cost of preparing a Revocable Living TRUST.

Once you have a WILL or TRUST, however, don't become too complacent. Those documents should be reviewed periodically, and possibly revised, as your circumstances change. A good rule of thumb is to review them at least every 10 years and/or when you change your residence to a different state.

When you create or revise your will, why not name your church (and possibly some favorite charities) among the beneficiaries of your estate? That is a wonderful way to extend your Christian stewardship beyond your lifetime. If you would like to discuss possibilities for specific designation of such a gift to our church, just give me a call (563-5833). And if your bequest to First United Methodist Church of Homosassa is invested in the Permanent Endowment Fund, the annual earnings will keep on "giving" <u>for-</u> ever - in your memory. What a legacy!

As I write this article for Genesis, I'll borrow words from an old song and begin by saying that "I've got [not Georgia but] Haiti on my mind."

It is Thursday, April 3 (articles for *Genesis* are due the first Friday of each month for the following month). We returned on April 1, and I haven't fully made the transition back. I will try to not allow Haiti to be my only topic of conversation for the next weeks, but, for right now, my thoughts and heart are still not settled back in Homosassa.

First, I must thank you for allowing me to go and represent you there. The trip was difficult, exhausting, challenging, emotionally devastating, physically draining, and heartwarming, rewarding, spiritually enriching, and memorable. Can all that be? Yes.

The Haitian dire poverty, their lack of hope, and the emptiness in their eyes broke my heart. Children and adults reached out to touch us and to have us touch them. The need was beyond my comprehension, and so we gave our complete concentration and attention to whatever task was at hand. I constantly thought of two verses from the scriptures: "As you do for the least of these, you do for me," and "Christ in me, the hope of glory." I couldn't really talk to them, so I talked to the Lord instead, asking Him to somehow let them know that my love for Him causes me to do for Him through them. As I held and painted little Haitian faces, I asked Him to let some portion of Him in me use my hands to touch them at their point of need. I told them in my terribly crude Haitian Creole that they are beautiful and that Jesus loves them.

The need is enormous, and the initial response is to feel defeated in just knowing that we cannot change what we see. I was greatly helped when one of our team members gave us a little card one morning when she gave the team devotion. It reads, "To the world, you may be one person. To one person, you may be the world." I constantly looked for ways in which we can be the "the world" to a small group of people, to find ways our church can make a small difference. I found that way in a little community of about 600.

For right now, just know that I thought of the church often, thanked God for you and your continued generous hearts, and prayed for ways to represent you well there. I am glad to be home, to see my church family, to enjoy good drinking water and hot showers. It will also be awhile before I eat rice and beans again.



Vacation Bible School is next month. We still need volunteers to work with the children, and all new volunteers must be screened. Please call or come to see me - SOON - if you are willing to work with the children for one week in June. We expect more children this year.

YOUTH NEWS

April 15th marked my one-year anniversary of working with the youth of this church. It's been a year of learning, exploring, enjoying, and working together. We've helped and supported one another, weathered tragedies, celebrated good times, and become a family. We've prayed for the Lord's guidance (often), for His forgiveness (often), and to express our thankfulness to Him for His many gifts to us (not often enough.) Through all of these experiences, we have been drawn more closely together.

Most of you recall that the vending machine in the previous church hall was vandalized months back. In all honesty, it would have been removed anyway when the razing of the building began. The income from that machine, however, was a major part of the Youth Group's support for our two mission children, Ralph (in the Philippines) and Lissette (in Ecquador.) Although the income from recycling printer ink cartridges also goes to the same purpose, it is not sufficient to pay the entire bill each month. We discussed other means of raising money to help these voung people, who are members of families living on less than \$200.00 per month, but being without kitchen and fellowship hall facilities severely limited our options for the time being. Samantha Mc Callister donated her birthday money, which was a very giving act (and the Lord smiled.) Finally, the group decided that instead of their usual Sunday lunch of pizza, subs, or sandwiches, one Sunday each month we would have just peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. The money saved by not buying more substantial food would go towards supporting our mission kids abroad. It's really not much of a sacrifice for us, but it can make a huge difference to Ralph and Lissette, and their families. I'm pleased that our Youth Group members made this choice (and the Lord smiled again.)

During April, we held a Seder, the traditional Passover meal, learning the significance of each portion of the meal and the relevance in the life of Jesus. This year, Passover began the evening of April 19th; we had our observation on April 13th so the youth would understand what their Jewish friends and neighbors were experiencing.

CLEAN AND GREEN

So...are you the pint bottle or the gallon jug type? I'm referring to vinegar of course. Some purchase the pint bottle of white vinegar and it lasts for months, if not an entire year; others (myself included,) buy it often by the gallon. Please allow me to tell you what I do with all that vinegar.

Vinegar (which actually means "sour wine") can be made from any number of plants, including berries, fruit, potatoes, grains, and even honey. Among it's many uses are flavoring and preserving foods, dyeing Easter eggs, healing wounds, providing a hair rinse, and cleaning household items. One major advantage - it never needs to be refrigerated.

Since my husband has numerous allergies and is sensitive to many irritants, I have learned to use vinegar as a fabric softener when doing laundry. One-half cup added to the final rinse will neutralize soap, remove soap film, soften the clothes, and remove static cling without the effects of many commercial softeners. (NO, your clothing will not smell like salad dressing.)

If the steam vents in your iron (You DO still have an iron, don't you?) are clogged, empty the water reservoir and fill it with vinegar, then plug it in setting upright. Select the High setting and let it steam away. The vents should clear of any blockages. When they are all spewing steam, turn off and unplug the iron, let it cool, empty any remaining vinegar out of the reservoir, and refill with clean water.

Are there patent leather shoes in your closet? Polish them with a clean cloth dipped in vinegar - dab it on, rub it in, and wipe it off to restore that gleaming shine.

Deodorize drains, garbage disposals, waste receptacles, storage containers, the dishwasher, and cutting boards with white vinegar. If you have rust or other stains on porcelain sinks, dampen paper towels with vinegar and lay them over the stains. When the towels are almost dry, remove them and rub the stained area. Most stains will disappear, or at least be significantly reduced. You can also repel most ants and kill most weeds by spraying them with full-strength white vinegar.

Best of all, none of these uses will seriously impact the environment as so many harsh chemicals would. Vinegar is better for <u>vour</u> health (especially the respiratory system) and the earth's health. So go forth....and buy a gallon of white vinegar (the least expensive one works as well as the more expensive brand.)

FUMCH takes possession of 2 new AED's from Phillips Heartstart.

An automated external defibrillator is used in cases of lifethreatening cardiac arrhythmias which have led to cardiac deaths. It is able to treat them through defibrillation, the application of electrical therapy which stops the arrhythmia, allowing the heart to re-establish an effective rhythm.



AEDs are held by trained personnel, but are designed to be simple to use for the layman. The use of AEDs is taught in first aid, first responder, and basic life support (BLS) level CPR classes. Look for more information in the future as to the training and utilization of this life-saving equipment at FUMCH.

FROM HOMOSASSA TO HAITI...WITH LOVE (And a Few Tears)

Last July when I sent an e-mail to the Conference office, in response to a short article in the Conference Newsletter, I never dreamed of the huge outpouring of love, prayers, moral support and financial support that would ensue. At that point the only thought was that it might be nice to join a medical team going to Haiti, to experience a short term mission in another country, as I had already been to Guatemala ten times. "The rest of the story" is told elsewhere in this issue. I just want each of you to know how very grateful I am to be a part of this family of Christians. If you contributed in some way to this endeavor that was not recognized, please know that EVERYTHING that was done, or given, or prayed for was VERY much appreciated!!!

Praises

We had an encouraging and uplifting Easter season. The Cool Shade of Life Church (CSLC) women's group decorated eggs (for the first time in their lives) to use at an egg



hunt at church on Sunday, where we held a joyous sunrise service. After that, our family settled in for delicious treats, thanks to the grandparents and our friends, the Cooks, from Jacksonville, Fla.



We capped the weekend off by watching *The Jesus Film*. It is a great encouragement to see many of our members inviting family, friends and co-workers and sharing the Good News with them. Joe attended the special session of the Evangelical Fellowship of Thailand (EFT) for three days late last month as the representative of the "Pioneers International Organization in Thailand" board.

It was a unique chance to consider the challenges and opportunities that face Christians in a country where less than 1% of the people follow Christ. Joe was encouraged by the 300 Thai Christian leaders' commitment and devotion to the Lord. Joe wrapped up his teaching on spiritual disciplines during adult Sunday School on the 30^{th} and will now move on to teach at the Wednesday small group for awhile.

<u>Prayers:</u> The PIONEERS team on which we have served for $3\frac{1}{2}$ years is dissolving. Two of the four remaining units (there were seven couples when we started!) are spearheading new efforts while the third unit was not interested in a new venture. Please pray for wisdom and clear direction as we consider whether the Lord wants to expand our ministry in Thailand.

Speaking of PIONEERS, please continue to pray for our mission agency registration papers to be approved by the EFT. EFT committees have now said that Joe cannot be the chairman of the new "Pioneers International Organization in Thailand" board because he does not get his visa through EFT. This will require a shift in duties among the board, so pray for clear direction in that process as well. Please pray for Joe's teaching on Christian character traits on Wednesdays at small group, during which time he will seek to have church members share their experiences in practicing these traits (love, forgiveness, joy, etc.). Also, pray for *Dtum* as he takes over on Sunday mornings, teaching about "Christianity and Thai customs." He will explain how Thai Christians should respond biblically to the many cultural activities that have strong Buddhist ties.

Thanks to the many people who have asked about Elaine's health. The new medicine she is taking seems to be working on her chronic intestinal illness, however, her body's autoimmune disorder is now causing very painful arthritis. Please continue to pray for full health and for wisdom as the missionary doctor working with Elaine seeks the best solution to what we hope is the last major autoimmune problem.

Please continue to pray for Phadaan Baptist Church, a sister church in Lamphun Province, which borders Chiang Mai. The church was attacked with rocks, fire and gunfire by more than 10 people in late January. To give a bit of background, Phadaan is a village of about 150 households, 11 of which were Christian. Those houses were all in one area, but when a 12th household in a different section accepted the Lord, the village leaders complained that this house was blocking the spirits worshipped by most of the villagers. The leaders have been told that it thus makes sense to worship Christ rather than the spirits who are afraid of Him, but they remain hardened to this fact. Please pray for Pastor Tu and his wife, Nok, along with the other believers to remain strong in their faith as the village elders want all the Christian households removed. Pray for wisdom in whether to rebuild the church and pastor's home and for finances. This church is one of 15 Thai congregations in the Siam Baptist Group, of which CSLC is also a member.

Joe will be one of the teachers at the next term of the Chiang Mai Baptist Church Bible center. Please pray for wisdom in preparing lessons on the book of Acts for the three hours per week of classes.

This month's cultural factoid is about Songkran, a three-day traditional Thai New Year (April 13-15), which people consider to be an auspicious time for returning to their homes to show respect for ancestors and elders, as well as a time of new beginnings and also a time of welcoming the start of the annual monsoon and rice-growing season. The first day is set aside for cleansing the household, the second for religious merit making, and the third for New Year celebrations.

One aspect of the festival requires that people bless images of Buddha along with their parents, grandparents and elders by pouring small amounts of scented water on them as a mark of respect and blessing. Please pray for many Thais to sense dissatisfaction in vain religious rituals and drunkenness during this important holiday.

Siberian Greetings!

HE Has Risen! HE Has Risen Indeed!

We realize you have had Easter in the U.S. already; however, they go by a different calendar here, and we just had our Easter the last Sunday of April. It's just as exciting here and filled with wonderful traditions as well. They make small cakes the size of large teacups and decorate them with colorful icing. Interestingly enough, they also have "HE has Risen" stamped on the eggs when you buy them in the markets! Remember this is also a Buddhist region, not just Orthodox. The fellowships also celebrate much as we do, remembering the price He paid for each of us *and* that "HE is not dead, He is ALIVE!" What a wonderful gift to receive when we did not deserve it.

Memorial/Veteran's Day is also celebrated here in Russia, but on the 8th of May. There are parades, music in the streets, people selling food, and veterans telling stories of lost friends. Many wear their "ribbons" and medals on their jackets. To this day, it is a very important day for remembering the sacrifice that was made by so many brave men, young and old. They have seen many more conflicts than we Americans and the large *decrease* in the male population is the result of these sacrifices. (There are approximately 5-6 women for every one man.)

As always, things around here have been quite busy. Kevin was able to attend a seminar in another city last month on how to counsel biblically. It was a tremendous blessing and will be extremely helpful for the fellowship leaders here. He also spent a week in Moscow with other workers from across the country to discuss the visa issues and goals for other regions in the country. We have been able to continue traveling out to the village each weekend and look forward to staying longer now that the weather and roads are a bit better.

In between, we continue to "brush up" on language and are encouraged at how well it's going for both of us. We both still feel that this is one of those languages that take a lifetime to learn. We just continue to pray for great memories and the gift to speak Russian.

One last note...Kevin and I were able to help with an AWANA's club for three days. Awana helps churches and parents worldwide to:

- raise children and youth to know, love and serve Christ through fully integrated programs for ages 2 to 18,
- present the best evangelism tools to reach unsaved children, youth and families,
- teach to build enduring biblical faith,
- provide resources that bring churches and parents together to disciple the next generation,
- continue initial and ongoing volunteer training and healthy mentor and peer relationships.

What a lot of fun and a great opportunity to speak into the lives of our younger kids. We had around 35 kids each day ranging from ages 5 to 12 years.

The deaf fellowship has taken the next step in their "growth" and has begun traveling about 30 minutes outside of the city to have a study and discussion group. They are sending a group of about six people to meet with four families twice a month and spend the day studying His word, followed by a discussion/fellowship time afterwards. These families actually invited the deaf to come and share their knowledge of "the word." We're so excited to see the deaf fellowship's eagerness to obey "the word" and take it outside of their "Jerusalem."

Kevin has been asked to meet with these folks before they go out to the village and encourage and teach them some helpful methods of reaching out into a new community. They are also learning the importance of building relationships. We can see a great opportunity for this to grow and become a new fellowship in the years to come.

As promised, there has been great progress made at the buildings out in the village. The drywall is now completed in the larger meeting hall. Some final electrical work and floor repairs were also completed in April. We've also been able to dig another well on the property for watering the garden area and later to be used for the "sauna" or banya as it's called here. You won't find showers or tubs in most village homes; there's no running water. As of this writing, we still have the bigger problem with the heating system to solve. Our hope is to find an honest worker that has experience with the type of system that's been installed. Please keep this in prayer. Winter is only five months away. We are also working on finishing the "first room" or outer room. It's where boots and coats are kept so as not to bring snow and mud into the rest of the "house." We have walls and windows...the door should be on by the time you receive this letter. The ladies have already hung curtains and several of the men will be working on finishing the kitchen area. There is no lack of work to be done; we know it will be finished in His timing.

In closing for this month, I (Laura) love this time of year. The air is fresh and everything is new. It's a time to remember not only the sacrifices so many have made for our country and other countries as well, *but* to also remember the ultimate sacrifice that was made for each one of us, all so that we can have eternal life with our Savior.

We pray this letter finds all of you doing well and walking closely with the Father.
