Each morning I start the day by walking on the tread mill. 30 minutes of a fast paced upward climb that helps me to wake up, tone up and stretch out the muscles.

As you walk along, the one thing that you don't want to do is to close your eyes.

The problem is that when you close your eyes you loose your point of reference.

You can no longer see where "up" is and so you become disorientated and tend to fall down - or at least have to put the other foot down to regain your balance.

I remembered trying this a while back, and it occurred to me later during my devotional time, that this is typical of our spiritual life as well.

We all need a "point of reference" on which to focus if we are to keep our balance in life.

We need something that we can rely on, count on, depend on, and to be there for us, to keep us going in the right direction with our head up and facing forward!



Our Financial Status

A report on the church finances year to date

Many times it is very difficult to talk about the finances of our church. However, it is always advisable to give the congregation an update on how well we are doing in supporting the mission and outreach programs of the church. For we know that everything we have is given to us by the Lord our God and that all he asks is that we give a little back to Him. It is not about how much we give, but that we make an equal sacrifice to God's mission.

This year we have accepted the challenges before us and have adopted a very aggressive operating budget of \$508,000. We know that through faith and the grace of our Lord we can overcome any obstacle with which we are faced. The budget YTD is \$296,000 (through July) with receipts of \$279,000. This shows a budget shortfall (deficit) of \$17,000. However, we have some good news since we have significantly under spent the budget and have been able to meet all of our financial obligations without affecting our reserves. Our operating income to date is \$279,000 with expenses of \$277,000. As you can see from the current income stream we are just meeting our current expenses and there is little room for us to add to our reserves or to expand our outreach mission.

In this final quarter of the year let us reflect on how fortunate many of us are and help by sharing God's gifts. The target is to meet or exceed our budget by year-end. Let's give a cheer for our success.

What Can I Do? By Rev. Richard L. Evans

In the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina that is a question millions of people are asking. Some of the answers are obvious; others may not be so evident. Here are some suggestions.

<u>Pray</u> for the survivors of Hurricane Katrina, for the families of those who died, for the hundreds of thousands of homeless, and for the massive corps of relief workers engaged in rescue, recovery, and relocation efforts.

<u>Contribute</u> to disaster relief agencies like the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) and The Salvation Army. The recovery effort is massive and will take years. Those who have been spared have much to share. Contributions to UMCOR may be made through FUMC. (Every dollar goes directly to disaster assistance).

<u>Donate Blood</u> if you are able. There is a critical need to replenish a depleted blood supply.

Provide emergency housing if you are able. People all over the country are opening their homes to evacuated families. www.hurricanehousing.org is a website where you may list your availability and where those in need may search for assistance. Volunteer if you are able. Volunteers will be needed for months, possibly years, to assist with clean up, home repairs, medical care, childcare, shelters, and food service. Contact: volunteers@gbgm-umc.org for information about UM volunteers in Mission sites and team coordinators. Conserve gasoline. As gasoline prices soar, plan your trips and combine errands with medical appointments, etc. Offer rides to friends and neighbors.

Shop from catalogs or on line. Think

before you drive: "Is this trip necessary?"

Car Pool. Share rides to stores and to church. Look around and find others who will attend the same service of worship or the same church meeting. Fill your car with friends and neighbors—rather than driving alone or with just one passenger. Conserve electricity. As fuel costs increase so will the cost of utilities. Turn your thermostat up to 80 degrees (ours is at 82). As soon as the weather moderates, shut off the AC and open the windows. In the winter turn your thermostat down to 68-70 degrees and wear an extra sweater if needed.

Remember, every little bit helps.

And if everyone helps a little, it adds up to a lot!

The problem is a big hill looms ahead and the little engine has serious doubts that it can get the cargo over the hill.


So rather than disappoint the children, the little engine decides to build a big head of steam and go for it!

Our church is like the little engine only the cargo is the good news of Jesus Christ and we are delivering it to the community and in fact to the world (thru our apportionments and missions).

Like the little engine, we cannot deliver our cargo without fuel and, in this case, fuel is the money you contribute to the operating budget.

The operating budget is God's engine that delivers a cargo spreading God's word through Christian education, a meaningful worship service including a wonderful music ministry that adds to the sacredness of the

worship service and special programs and ministries that reach the youth as well as the adults in our church and community.

The operating budget funds the Trustees who are responsible for the well-being of our buildings and parsonage, keeping the grounds neat and clean, making sure the utilities and insurance premiums are paid and provide office supplies and equipment.

The operating budget pays the salaries of our Pastor and his staff including our wonderful custodian who keeps things spic and span and all the other support people who make sure the church operates smoothly.

The operating budget also pays our apportionments or benevolences.

We can all be thankful that our church has always paid 100% of the benevolences.

It is truly an uphill and demanding task to deliver God's cargo, but each year the operating budget goes from, "I think I can, I think I can" to "I knew I could, I knew I could," thanks to all of you and your generous support of your tithes, gifts and offerings that fuel the engine!





My involvement in the life of the church continues to get more and more exciting! As you know, Gene Lantz has asked that he no longer be responsible for coordinating the visitation of our sick, and Pastor Parish Committee has asked me to do that. I began in mid-July, trying to learn all I could from Gene before he left for his vacation. He has done a wonderful job and is so loved by those whom he visits every week. I know that we all appreciate how well he represents the Lord and the church to these people who can't be with us on Sunday morning. I will never be able to take his place—nor would I want to even try! But I will try to learn how God would have me fit into this important visitation program and to apply myself to do that well.

I have quickly learned one important fact. The visitation group has a strong desire to support Pastor Mark. We thank God that he is so caring and that he goes regularly to hospitals and nursing homes. However, as people begin to improve, we hope our visits will supplement his and encourage those who are ill.

The Visitation Committee meets at the church every Monday morning to plan. My very first meeting with them was extremely heartwarming! I thought of the chorus of one of the hymns that we love to sing:

Here I am, Lord.

It is I, Lord.

I have heard you calling in the night.

I will go, Lord,

If you need me,



I will hold your children in my heart.

And thus, I chose a part of that chorus to entitle my monthly article in Genesis, making you aware of what is going on.

The Visitation committee is extremely well organized. It strives to remember every person whose life has been impacted by illness or death. We pray for all who are hospitalized, in extended care facilities, or recovering at home, and we make plans to personally call on as many as possible during the upcoming week. We send bulletins and cards to let shut-ins and the bereaved know that they are remembered and loved by our church. We call those who may benefit by a telephone visit from a church friend. We keep records so that we can be as sure as possible that we have not overlooked anyone! (Last month the committee and our men's group made approximately 100 visits, and telephoned at least 50!)

Loving and dedicated people are involved in this great ministry. If you think you would like to visit occasionally or to help with the cards and the records, please come and join us. We will always welcome new members to the committee, and as our church grows we'll need more

people to get involved in this ministry.

The most important thing you can do is to help us to keep up with our people. Please tell someone on the committee or me if there's someone we should call, visit, or send a card. We will only be effective if we know who needs to be remembered. Thank you for helping us accomplish this important task.

We are making plans to add to our ministry. Perhaps you saw the lovely prayer blanket that Catherine Wisehart had made for my husband, Wallace. Her church "up north" has these blankets made for their shut-ins. The blanket was then taken to the church, put on the altar, and all who wanted to participate were encouraged to go to the altar and pray for the person who will receive the blanket. The blankets were then given to the shut-ins with a note reminding them that they were being wrapped in both the love and prayers of the church and in the warmth of their very own blanket. Through the Visitation Committee, an ad hoc is making plans for these blankets to be made for our church members who are ill. Next month, I will have all the information about how we will do this and how you can have one of these blankets prepared for a friend or family member.

I hope you will watch for this column in Genesis each month. If you are hearing that little chorus in your head, and your heart is responding, "I will go, Lord, if you need me. I will hold your children in my heart," call me and come join our committee.

Youth Sunday School.


Miss Joyce Ann has been leading the middle schoolers and high schoolers in bible studies that focus on issues that teens face.


All middle schoolers and high schoolers are welcome.

Children's Sacred Dance


The Children's Sacred Dance Choir will begin rehearsals on Sunday, October 16th from 10:40 to 11:30 following Sunday School in Room 102.


CHANGE IN MEETING LOCATION!

Make Money While Giving It Away!

It sounds contradictory, but it's possible—with a Charitable Gift Annuity arranged through the Florida United Methodist Foundation.

Here's how it works.

You donate an amount of at least \$5,000 and create a CGA, naming First United Methodist Church of Homosassa as the beneficiary. (\$5,000 is the minimum but the amount can be as large as you wish).

In return you receive an annual income of 6 to 11.5% on the amount donated, depending upon your age (60-90 plus).

You get a partial tax deduction (usually about 30%) and a guaranteed monthly check for the rest of your life. The church will receive the remaining principal after your death.

It's a gift to your church that pays you a monthly income you cannot outlive—truly a win-win situation!



Returns are slightly lower for a joint annuity that continues to pay a monthly income until the second person dies. And you can designate more than one church or charity as recipients.

If you are 65 or older, it can be a great alternative to other investments.

We have acquired three books written by Stephen R. Lawhead.

Book One: "The Iron Lance"

Book Two: "The Black Rood"

Book Three: "The Mystic Rose"

This is an epic trilogy of a Scottish noble family fighting for its existence and its faith during the age of the Celtic Crusades -- and of a secret society whose ceremonies will shape history for a millennium.

The first book begins in 1095. Murdo Ranulfson has been left to safeguard the family land.

It is confiscated by greedy marauders so that Murdo leaves to find his father and brothers who are part of the Crusades.

His journey leads him to the Mediterranean - the heart of civilization now threatened by barbarian hordes - on to the fabled city of Constantinople and beyond to the Holy Land.

Amidst brutality and ambition, Murdo discovers what he seeks - and obtains a relic that will guide him and his descendants for centuries.

Despite some of the tongue twisting Welsh names, these books are steeped



in heroism, mystery, the lure of lost treasure, action packed adventure, and a sweeping vision of human destiny.

"Help Me -- I'm Worried" Easy to read with larger print.

Worry is a sin that steals your peace, wears you out physically and can even make you sick.

The author shares how to handle unreasonable fear and worry with the power of God's word.

Besides his mission outreach activities, Kevin administers the contacts with the Russian government and assists church people passing through Moscow.





Walking on the Path

"And now may the God of all hope fill you with joy and peace in believing, that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." Romans 15:13

Pastor Mark gave a sermon from Genesis about Joseph and the apparent catastrophe of his being sold into slavery. I was troubled when he said that God did not speak during the time that Joseph was there in Egypt. So I looked up the account—even while he was speaking—and, of course, found that he was absolutely correct. However, prior to the incident of his being sold and to his subsequent slavery, God had spoken so clearly to Joseph that from that point forward, he apparently never had any question about God's presence in his life!

When the wicked wife of Potiphar, Joseph's master, tried to seduce him, Joseph quickly said, "How could I commit so great a sin against God?" When Pharaoh later asked him to interpret his dreams, Joseph replied, "Not by myself; God will give Pharaoh a favorable response." Years later, when his brothers came to buy grain, he didn't hold them accountable for their actions. Instead, he gave God credit for everything, saying "You did not send me here . . . God [did]."

God had spoken to him so clearly in his youth that he never doubted—even through many years of hardship. God didn't have to keep speaking! He had filled Joseph—prior to his slavery—with "joy and peace in believing," so that he "abounded in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Prayer: Father, we love to hear your voice as you speak to us, and we want you to just keep talking on and on. Make of us a people who will be so firm in our believing that we will "abound in hope" as Paul spoke about and as Joseph experienced—even when you appear to be silent. Amen.

Katrina Relief

Most of us have sat in front of our TVs, glued to the screen and news of the horror of what has happened to Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama. We've prayed for those in distress, we have wept in sympathy, and we've longed to be able to do something tangible for people in these devastated areas.

There are now some tangible things that can make a difference to hurting people:

A. Write a check, made out to the church, that will be combined into one check and sent to the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). One hundred percent of what we give goes to relief! Not one cent goes to administrative costs.

B. Prepare a Health Kit to be shipped to the devastated areas. Lyn Romano has a list of the specific items that should be included in each kit. The cost of one kit is about \$12. The items should then be placed in an individual plastic, one-gallon, zip lock bag, and brought to the church, which will assume the responsibility of getting the Kits to the appropriate location.

These are the tangible things for the moment. Perhaps there will be others later. And, of course, don't despair! Remember that Romans tells us that "... in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose." (Romans 8:28, NIV) So continue to pray, believing that somehow He is going to do just that ~ bring good from all this pain!

Our church facilities cannot be used during emergencies because we lie within the evacuation area. However, listen to your radio for instructions from the county as to the appropriate action to take in the event that such an emergency should occur.


