

Avoid A "ONE-OF-THE-CROWD" Christmas

It is so easy to feel overwhelmed this time of year, to become "one-of-thecrowd" in the celebration and noise that accompanies the Christmas season.

No matter how important we may feel individually, we can get lost in the hugeness of holiday expectations. We are easily fooled by the size of expected performances, surrendering to the tyranny of tradition and mind-numbing demands. We become bowled over and rolled up by the juggernaut of the Christmas hype. It's like thinking that the mass of metal we call an ocean liner is more "important" that the little needle that charts its course or the thought-process of the person who controls the liner's responses. To only judge the ship's power by its commanding appearance is to be fooled by equating power with size.

The Christian teaching about humanity and history help us get the equation right. The Christian faith makes it clear that "people matter" and that the individual is of infinite importance to God. In the world's assembly line, one trained worker is replaceable by another, but when a person knows God, he discovers that no one can take his place in God's love.

Christmas is a season when we can be overwhelmed—with shopping, gifts, parties, social obligations, and other have-to-do expectations. We begin to feel as if we have no choice; there are no options open to us—and the season takes control. If we allow that to happen, if we lose sight of our essential worth, our individual value in the eyes of God, then we will come to Christmas Day exhausted, disillusioned and disappointed that "It just doesn't feel like Christmas this year."

Advent is about getting ready for Christmas as we look for the coming of Christ—as a baby and as King. If we are to welcome his birth anew, we need to prepare ourselves, our minds, hearts and souls, to receive him during the worship inspired by Advent events. This welcoming attitude requires a willingness to open ourselves as we take the time needed to hear God speaking and to feel his presence.

As we move through Advent this year, take time to read your Bible, time to pray and time to explore what God is calling you to do and be. Remember the words of the Psalmist, "Be still and know that I am God....(Psalm 46:10a) Advent worship books



are available to help you focus your thoughts and guide you in resisting the pressure to be just a "one-of-the-crowd" Christian.

Jesus Christ came that YOU might receive God's grace and love. This Christmas season, don't let the world take that away from you by making you just one of the crowd caught up in the holiday hustle. Filled with anticipation and excitement, no matter our age, Christmas Eve comes with all its promise and beauty. It is an evening to celebrate and a time to share in the wonder of Emmanuel, God with us.



We will again be having three worship services on Christmas Eve: 5:00, 7:30 and 11:00.

All three will be beautiful and will add a final touch to the anticipation that has been building throughout Advent.

The 5:00 and 7:30 services will feature a Christmas Cantata by our choir concluding with the traditional lighting of the candles. The two services will be identical, the only difference being your choice of the time you want to attend. It will be an exciting time as the choir leads us in the wonder of worship, making Christmas Eve a memorable experience for everyone participating.

The 11:00 service will be one of candlelight and Communion. We will gather together for Word and Table and share in the solemn celebration of the gift of Jesus Christ - God's Son given to die for our sins. Communion will be a reminder of just how much God was willing to give to make salvation available to us.

I hope you will plan to be here at one or more of the services that we might be truly "ready" to celebrate the birthday of the King!





But Jesus Christ was neither a "great man" nor an "achiever." He was God and he came to die, to make available to every person the divine exchange: God made him who had no _____ to be _____ for us, so that in him we might become the _____of God.

(1 Corinthians 5:21)

As those desiring to become disciples of Jesus

- Honor the birth of our Lord by limiting the celebration to one day (or no more than a week), making communion the centerpiece of our day of remembrance.
- Give up our plans for the many parties, gift-givings, concerts, religious and secular gatherings - all done, of course, to honor the birthday of one who doesn't seek this kind of "remembrance." (Did you ever have someone give you a party when you didn't want one? How did it feel?)
- Forget about Christmas trees, the tinsel and the holly all the extensive decorating for the holidays.
- Realize that wearing ourselves to a frazzle, giving a lot of time and energy to doing the "Christmas thing" for Jesus isn't what he desires; realize how our frantic fretting about all that must be done leads to sin.
- Turn away from the "Santa Claus" culture no more lying to our kids, our grandkids, about the jolly, fat man who will bring them gifts if they behave ... "if you're not good Santa won't come." Take Santa Claus completely out of our Christmas remembrance celebration - would it cease to be Christmas without him?
- Give up our *need* to have family around us at Christmas - no longer feeling, "Christmas just isn't Christmas without family." Recognize the only necessary ingredient - Christmas would not be Christmas without Jesus.
- Limit our Christmas music to that which tells the story of Jesus so unbelievers can understand it; making our music more about him and less about singing our holiday favorites. The angels sang only once at Christ's birth, to some shepherds in a field, but they were right on message.
- Become aware of how many of our traditional wrappings give the world and the devil opportunities to distort and exploit the simple but profound arrival of the Son of God - the Word become flesh.

Just imagine what it would be like if we changed all these things. We'd be left with one miraculous performance by an angelic choir, some unsuspecting shepherds, one plain stable, and one holy gift, wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger - God's Son, his gift to us. Would we still enjoy celebrating Christmas?

ALTERNATIVE CHRISTMAS GIFTS DECEMBER 6, 2009

Wouldn't you love to make a difference in someone's life in a positive way? We will have an opportunity on December 6th to do that very thing. By giving families in need a hand-up, not just a hand-out, we can empower them to turn a life of hunger, poverty, and homelessness into one of independence and self-reliance. Many of us have a list of people that we want to remember at Christmas but have no idea what to get them. Why not give a gift card letting them know that, in their names, you've given a gift that will keep on growing. The card explains the mission and how the gift will make a difference to the struggling family.

Habitat For Humanity:

...is a wonderful non-profit ecumenical Christian housing ministry. Habitat builds simple, decent, affordable houses that are sold to families in need. There is no profit added to the sale price, and no interest charged on the mortgage. Partner families invest hundreds of hours of their own labor – sweat equity – into building their homes and the homes of others, and their monthly house payments are returned to a revolving fund for Humanity that is used to build more houses. Wouldn't you like to buy a kitchen sink, a toilet, or a bag of nails?

Did you know there are over 36 million Americans threatened by hunger, yet there is more than enough wasted food to feed every hungry person in the U.S.?

The Society of St. Andrews:

...is a national hunger relief organization that feeds hungry Americans. This is done by salvaging nutritious produce that would otherwise go to waste. Each \$12.00 donation helps provide about 800 servings of nourishing food and also honors a family member or friend

Heifer International:

...provides food for the hungry, income to lift families out of poverty and hope where families have known despair. This is done with gifts of livestock and training. There are heifers that give milk, chickens that produce eggs, sheep that provide wool, llamas that produce wool, beehives that produce honey and beeswax, oxen to pull plows and carts. These animals are referred to as living loans because in exchange for receiving their animal and training in its care, each family agrees to give one of its animal's offspring to another family in need. They are also given vegetable seeds and fruit tree saplings.

There was a minor incident that occurred in the chaos of collecting and toting all the items from my office to the Fellowship Hall, which now we all can chuckle over.

Karen Kline had brought me a pair of shoes - expensive, imported shoes that she thought would help my plantar faciitis. This gift somehow got included in the 140 items that were handed over to a crew involved in the sorting, pricing, and Silent Auction placement.

You cannot imagine how distressed I was on Saturday when I came to my office to pick up my new pair of shoes and found them gone. Then it hit me...her shoes...we sold her shoes! With the help of those little sheets on which we bid for items, I found the purchaser, who was a great sport. We got the shoes back.



St. Lawrence River Cruise September 19-27, 2010 By Richard Evans

The St. Lawrence Seaway is one of the most ambitious engineering feats of the last century. The objectives were to increase the size of the shipping channel and generate hydro-electric power for Ontario, Quebec, and New York State.

Proposals for the seaway began in 1909 but were met with resistance from railway and port lobbyists in the United States. Construction was finally approved in 1954 after Canada declared it was ready to proceed unilaterally.

As construction began, entire villages were relocated to higher ground utilizing the largest earth-moving and construction equipment in the world. When the temporary "coffer dams" were blown on July 1, 1958, people watched with mixed emotions. Slowly rising water covered familiar land forever. It was sad for some to know they could never go home again, but others were excited to think of the new conveniences and services, modern schools, and new friends they would have.

Queen Elizabeth II and President Dwight D. Eisenhower formally opened the seaway in 1959. The total cost was \$470 million with about ³/₄ paid by Canada.

Our church is offering a St. Lawrence River Cruise on the MV Canadian Empress, in September, 2010, that will traverse sections of the St. Lawrence Seaway—including a series of locks providing an overall change in water level of 246 feet. See historic Quebec City and Montreal and enjoy shore excursions to interesting places along the Canadian side. The fall foliage should be spectacular, the food and lodging outstanding, and the company congenial (with over 30 church friends on board).

Included in the pp. price of \$3,575 (double occupancy & in US dollars) are the cruise, round trip airfare, all ground transportation, shore excursions, taxes, fees, and travel insurance.

Uniformity With God's Will by Judith Huffer

As we head into a new year let us resolve to not focus on what is wrong with ourselves or our circumstances..."I'm too fat"..."I need to stop smoking"..."I need to change my job to make more money," etc.. Resolve to make just one resolution. Focus on God, daily, this year.

Get up 30 minutes earlier every day, or plan to set aside a specific time in your day, and make that your daily fellowship time with God. Put God first. He likes that very much.

You do not have to make formal incantations, using words that were written by poets, priests, or ancient sages. "Just have a plain conversation about your life. Ask our Heavenly Father to help you clearly see His glory and blessings in your life every day."(1)

Tell Him, "God, I want to reflect your glory in my life more in 2010 than in 2009. I want to live today in light of the end of my life. Speak to me and empower me to be conformed, gently but surely, more into the image of Christ this year." (2)

One of the blessings of this Third Millennium is the World Wide Web. It was through God's grace that I was led to a letter written by Saint Alphonsus de Ligouri to Sister Giannastasio in 1755. Upon the death of a very close friend, St Alphonsus expressed his sentiments, and these words became a published essay on God's will and was published as "Uniformity With God's Will."

"Who knows? Perhaps if God had given us greater talent, better health, a more personable appearance, we might have lost our souls!

"Great talent and knowledge have caused many to be puffed up with the idea of their own importance and, in their pride, they have despised others.

"How easily those who have these gifts fall into grave danger to their salvation!

"How many on account of physical beauty or robust health have plunged headlong into a life of debauchery!

"How many, on the contrary, who, by reason of poverty, infirmity or physical attractiveness had else lost their souls!

"Let us then be content with what God has given us.

"But, one thing is necessary, and it is not beauty, not health, not talent. It is the salvation of our immortal souls."

"Perfection is founded entirely on the love of God: 'Charity is the bond of perfection;' and perfect love of God means the complete union of our will with God's." (3)

As United Methodist Women standing on the threshold of the Third Millennium, let us refresh our resolve to uphold "The Purpose," living a life fulfilled and purposeful and remembering, "God is unchanging in His love. He loves you. He has a plan for your life. Don't let the newspaper headlines frighten you. God is still sovereign. He's still on the throne." (4)

Walking on the Path Patience Nave

"I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

John 8:12

As I write for the December *Genesis*, I'm thinking about the fact that we are leaving tomorrow for the cruise to the Holy Land. I have been too busy to get excited, trying to get the things done here that need to be finished before I go. Last night I finally finished all that did not pertain to the trip, and I put my things into suitcases and got myself ready! That's when excitement began to course through my body! Soon I would be "walking where Jesus walked."

After thinking about that a bit, I chastised myself. First of all, the ground he walked on is way below any ground we'll walk on, except for a spot here and there on the Mount of Olives or at the home of Caiphas. Years of building and settlement have long since buried the actual paths He took. I know that! But I am still excited to have an opportunity to be in the country He loved, in the city where He was born, and in the places where Paul preached to the early churches.

But my thoughts took me in another direction—not to a new thought but to one I needed as a reminder. I walk every day where Jesus walks; you walk every day where Jesus walks! He said, "If you love me and keep my commandments, I will come and make my home in your heart." (John 14:23, Patience's paraphrase)

Where we walk is where Jesus walks. He lives in us and walks in us and greets others as He goes along our paths in us.

So, the question is this. When we walk away, do the people we have met know they have been greeted by the God of the Universe? Does our countenance and manner convey Him to others as we move about in Homosassa?

Prayer: Father, thank you for walking in us, for talking through us, for touching others with our hands. Never let us forget this incredible miracle. Amen.

MY LIFE WITH TOM by Nancy Pearo

It's been an amazing 21-year journey! Tom and I met at a birthday party, and we officially started dating 3/3/1988, while we were both living in Philadelphia, PA. Since it was Easter time and the flower was a lily, Tom didn't want a plain white one, so he got a tiger lily for Easter (the first flower he gave me). I was going to the Broad Street UMC and Tom to the Snyder Avenue



UMC. The two churches eventually merged and became the Snyder Avenue Church and the combined choirs marched down Broad Street to Snyder Avenue in Philadelphia on Palm Sunday for the new church celebration.

We were married on 10/29/88 in Williamsport, PA, at the church where my father was the minister. Tom had been working on the Philadelphia police force for 23 years. He stayed on another 2 years while we lived in South Philly after we married. There we enjoyed our church, Mummers, and family.

In 1990, we wanted to get out of the city, so we moved to Winston-Salem, NC. We were active in church there, and when the pastor moved, Tom drove one of the trucks loaded with furniture. He was always ready to lend a hand.

A search for work took us to Kingsport, TN, from North Carolina. The church there was small so we became involved in many areas. The most fun was Bible School. Tom also enjoyed his role as Santa while there.

Tom always wanted to go to FL, so we then moved on down the road to Homosassa. Our first church event at 1st UMC was an indoor 4th of July picnic in 1998. The first person we met was Fran Graham who became my ride to the Faith Hope Circle. I became co-leader, then vice president of the unit. The week before we joined the church, Tom typed all the agendas and made programs for the Unit Mission Studies. When Share came along in October 2000, we took on leadership of that ministry, learning to enjoy the fellowship of other volunteers and those we met while serving the community. We appreciated all who stepped up to make Share run smoothly, and I am continuing to work with Vicki Williams, the new Share Coordinator.

The last 2 years have been challenging, but Tom hung in to make preparations for me. We took time to see the sunsets, and spent time just being together. The last few months have been phone calls and hospital visits. When the time came, he was ready, and his last words to me were "Remember me" and "I'll be waiting for you." His son Chris, made the 12 hour drive from Pennsylvania and arrived Monday to say goodbye to his dad. Tom passed away peacefully Saturday, October 30, at 1:25 p.m. in the Hospice Unit at Citrus Memorial Hospital.

As of this writing, his memorial service is planned for November 28, 2009, at 1st UMC, with family, church and community celebrating his life.

"A Final Gift of Love" A Workshop on End-of-Life Issues

On Saturday morning, Jan. 30, our church will sponsor a Workshop dealing with end-of-life issues that are important for every individual and family. Refreshments will be served beginning at 8:45 and the program will begin at 9:00 am. Each participant will receive a workbook with information and suggestions about issues such as funerals and memorial services, burial, cremation, Hospice services, veterans' benefits, Social Security benefits, estate planning, wills and trusts, stewardship of assets, living wills, health care surrogates, durable power of attorney, organ donation, and lots more.

A panel, consisting of a pastor, a financial planner, an attorney, and a funeral director will present helpful information and respond to questions participants may have. The workbook will include a section for your own personal information (also on CD so that it may easily be updated on a computer). Although the workshop is similar in format to a few of the previous ones we have offered, some of the panelists will be different and new information will be available. Even if you have attended a previous workshop, you will find this one especially helpful.

The workshop is sponsored by the Permanent Endowment Committee in cooperation with the Florida United Methodist Foundation and is offered free of charge to members and friends of the church. Using our new Fellowship Hall, we will have space enough for all who are interested. But we need to know how many to plan for, so it is important to register. Call the church office with your name and phone number, and we will be expecting you.

Planning for the end of your life on earth will be your "final gift of love" to your family members. And, of course, the end of our lives on earth will mark the beginning of our eternal life with the Lord.

CHURCH MOUSE MUSINGS

How much is a trillion? Do you know?

- \dots A million (1,000,000) is a thousand thousands.
- ...A billion (1,000,000,000) is a thousand millions.
- \dots A trillion (1,000,000,000,000) is a thousand billions.

Example: We are 93,000,000 (ninety-three million) miles away from the sun. At a dollar a mile, we could buy 10,752 (ten thousand seven hundred fifty-two) trips to the sun for a trillion dollars.

Example: 1 million seconds is 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ days, 1 billion seconds is 32 years, and one trillion seconds is 32,000 years!

Giving at Year End

The end of the year is a time for remembering, taking stock, catching up, and giving. Consider these 8 suggestions, some of which may work for you:

- 1. <u>Give a "Second Mile" Gift</u>. The end of the year is a great time to go the extra mile in recognizing the good work of favorite charities—and especially your church.
- <u>Give a Memorial Gift.</u> A memorial tribute can be a satisfying way to honor those whose memories continue to enrich our lives.
- <u>Give Appreciated Property.</u> Gifts of stock, bonds, mutual funds, and real estate may qualify for an attractive tax benefit. You may take a full fair market value deduction on the day of the gift, and you need not declare any capital gains.
- 4. <u>Give Idle Assets.</u> A year-end inventory may discover underutilized or "idle assets" such as life insurance policies, savings bonds, boats, RVs, and many items that tend to clutter up our lives. Some can be given directly to the church; others are better sold first with the cash contributed.
- 5. <u>Give Through a Life Income Gift.</u> Through a Charitable Gift Annuity or a Charitable Remainder Trust you can continue to receive income from invested funds, often at even greater levels than you currently do. Upon your death, the remainder will go to the church and /or charities you have designated. Unlike a bequest, life income gifts offer significant tax advantages now.
- 6. <u>Give Through Tax-Wise Planning</u>. Making extra gifts in 2009 can enable an itemized income tax deduction or keep you in a lower federal tax bracket for the current year.
- <u>Give Through an IRA Rollover.</u> The Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008 restored the provision enabling IRA owners over age 70 ½ to make tax free charitable gifts from their accounts directly to churches and charities. The extension is effective through December 31, 2009. Talk to your IRA administrator.
- 8. <u>Give a Christmas Present to Your Church.</u> For many of us the church is "family." A satisfying response to God's gift to us in Jesus Christ is our gift for God's work through the church at Christmas time.

But don't delay! To qualify for a 2009 charitable tax deduction, your gift must be made by December 31. Gifts to FUMCH should be received by Sunday, Dec. 27 to be "posted" in 2009.

The Academy For Spiritual Formation by Marilyn Watson

At every session of *The Academy For Spiritual Formation*, much of what we learn is about prayer -- particularly formational prayer. Another major emphasis of The Academy is spiritual disciplines and you've already heard how important those are!

The understanding I have gleaned from the course on the History and Traditions of Christian Spirituality has given me a new understanding of why we worship the way we do, where our traditions came from, and their importance. Some of what I learned was so obvious it's embarrassing. It never occurred to me that the original reason people were told what Scripture said was that people couldn't read! Of particular importance to me was learning what was important to the Apostles and early church leaders – those who walked with Jesus. It has shown me the necessity for us to know why we do various things in worship; otherwise they are a meaningless routine.

Some of what I am learning at The Academy for Spiritual Formation was used in last year's Leadership Retreat. For example, we used the Myers-Briggs information regarding how our MBTI preference types affect how we pray and how we work together specifically as spiritual leaders within the church. This was explored in depth during Session 1 and can be vital to our ministry together.

I'm honored to be among those attending the Academy and very excited about what I am learning and will be bringing back to share with all of you. Sharing the Academy teachings will enhance our yearning to grow as Disciples of Jesus Christ and encourage our quest for a more passionate spirituality.

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When You Are Low on Hope by Max Lucado

Water. All Noah can see is water. The evening sun sinks into it. The clouds are reflected in it. His boat is surrounded by it. Water. Water to the north. Water to the south. Water to the east. Water to the west. Water.

He sent a raven on a scouting mission; it never returned. He sent a dove. It came back shivering and spent, having found no place to roost. Then, just this morning, he tried again. With a prayer he let it go and watched until the bird was no bigger than a speck on a window.

All day he looked for the dove's return. Now the sun is setting, and the sky is darkening, and he has come to look one final time, but all he sees is water. Water to the north. Water to the south. Water to the east. Water to the ...

You know the feeling. You have stood where Noah stood. You've known your share of floods. Flooded by sorrow at the cemetery, stress at the office, anger at the disability in your body or the inability of your spouse. You've seen the floodwater rise, and you've likely seen the sun set on your hopes as well. You've been on Noah's boat.

And you've needed what Noah needed; you've needed some hope. You're not asking for a helicopter rescue, but the sound of one would be nice. Hope doesn't promise an instant solution but rather the possibility of an eventual one. Sometimes all we need is a little hope.

That's all Noah needed. And that's all Noah received.

Here is how the Bible describes the moment: "When the dove returned to him in the evening, there in its beak was a freshly plucked olive leaf!" (Genesis 8:11 NIV).

An olive leaf. Noah would have been happy to have the bird but to have the leaf! This leaf was more than foliage; this was promise. The bird brought more than a piece of a tree; it brought hope. For isn't that what hope is? Hope is an olive leaf-evidence of dry land after a flood. Proof to the dreamer that dreaming is worth the risk.

Don't we love the olive leaves of life?

"It appears the cancer may be in remission."

"I can help you with those finances."

"We'll get through this together."

What's more, don't we love the doves that bring them?

Perhaps that's the reason so many loved Jesus.

To all the Noahs of the world, to all who search the horizon for a fleck of hope, he proclaims, "Yes!" And he comes. He comes as a dove. He comes bearing fruit from a distant land, from our future home. He comes with a leaf of hope.

Have you received yours? Don't think your ark is too isolated. Don't think your flood is too wide. Receive his hope, won't you? Receive it because you need it. Receive it so you can share it.

Love always hopes. "Love...bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things" (1 Corinthians 13:4-7 NKJV, emphasis mine).

✓ Praise God for our excellent three-day visit to a small church last month in *Sisaket*, a city of 135,000 people in northeast Thailand near the border with Cambodia. We had time to get to know the church leaders, the area and the heavy spiritual needs that exist there. The hospitality of our church friends was a tremendous blessing as we ate until we were stuffed and even got to visit the city zoo! The most important opportunities happened during the morning on Sunday when we worshiped at the main Sisaket Siam Baptist Church in town.

Church elder *Wit* and his family hosted us. Then we visited Pastor *Brasit's* village birthplace at night, where he holds a meeting for the one Christian family there every week

The pastor and his wife are on the far left and the five members of the village's one Christian family on the far right. Pray for wisdom as we consider teaming with this small church, which serves in a province of almost 1.5 million people that has just 34 churches and 1,265 believers. (Yes, you read that correctly: close to 0% Christian population, which was a heavy burden on us as we considered the obvious need for missionary help there and how best to serve the Lord as a team in that setting.)

Praise God for a very generous response to our request last month for financial assistance! We have received \$305 in additional monthly support and a little more than half of what we need in one-time gifts. Please continue to pray for the additional \$1,070 in monthly support that is needed to get to 100% and the remaining \$6,500 one-time need that will erase our mission account debt and reimburse us for ministry expenses paid with personal funds. (If you would like to help financially, please send a tax-deductible check filled out to "Pioneers" to PIONEERS, 10123 William Carey Dr., Orlando, FL 32832 and attach a note saying it's for the Henrys, account #110798.)

While God was leading us to visit Sisaket Siam Baptist last month, He was moving in other Thai leaders' hearts as well as we met with an evangelist from western Chiang Mai province and another couple nearby concerning possible HOME Team partnerships. That's **two official partnerships and two prospective partnerships** already lined up, with at least one other possibility brewing. Praise God for all these opportunities to serve His church in Thailand ...now to get teammates to go to these harvest fields!

Prayers

As mentioned, **The HOME Team can really use team members!** We envision 2-3 missionary units serving with Pastor Moses in church, Bible school and orphanage work in *Mae Ai* near the northern border with Burma and 2 more units working with the leaders in the town and village settings of *Sisaket* near Cambodia. There also are several other promising opportunities already in the works that would require another 3-5 missionary units. Please pray for the Lord of the harvest to send humble workers – soon

Cool Shade of Life Church had to deal with a **difficult confrontation with one of its members** last month. Issues of lying, gossip, immorality and marrying an unbeliever had to be addressed. Pastor *Ogaat* and *Dtum* did a good job confronting the problem (not an easy thing for Thais); however, the member has chosen to not accept the church's position and discipline. Please pray for wisdom for the church in continuing to handle this problem, and pray for this member to repent of sinful behavior and return to the Lord.

Please pray for Elaine and Joe as they **renew their U.S. passports** this month. This is usually a simple process, but you never know what unusual complications might arise when living overseas. In addition, the situation is complicated a bit by the fact that we then have to turn around and use those new passports to renew our visas with the Thai government in December.

On Nov. 26, glorifying God with thanksgiving, not an extra turkey leg, should be the longing of all.

One of the recipients is a woman from the fellowship. This woman's kitchen windows were taped together in pieces and only one layer instead of the needed two. (Can you imagine one pane of glass between you and minus-40 degree temperatures?) She's in her 60's and works three jobs to support her family. Her husband is an invalid (from drinking), her oldest son recently died from drinking, and she always has grandchildren who need some type of care! No matter how little she may have, if she hears of a need...she'll find a way to fill it!

She's a wonderful example of His love and caring for others. It's wonderful to see her on the receiving end of such a gift that will last a long time.

Workshop:

Just a quick update on the workshop. We had a gift come in this month which will help us purchase some wood to make workbenches and cabinets. We continue to pray for gifts for this project so we can begin our work with young men in this area by teaching them a useable skill.
