

Living as an Expectant Disciple

True believing is always characterized by a sense of expectancy. We see this exampled through the lives of people involved in the first coming of Jesus.

• Joseph and Mary *believed* the angels' messages and *anticipated* (although they didn't understand) the supernatural birth of the Messiah-baby.

Matthew tells us Joseph's response to his angelic dream: "...he did what the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. But he had no union with her until she gave _____. And

he gave him the name _____.

(Matthew 1:24-25)

• Shepherds, working in the fields, *believed* the angels. They went to Bethlehem, *expecting* to find the described scene - "a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a _____." (Luke 2:12) After finding the babe, they returned to the fields, praising God for all they had seen, which were "just

."(Luke 2:20b)

• The wise men (or Magi, astrologers) believed the new star would lead them to the King of the Jews that they might ______ him. They followed the star *expectantly* and were able to find the ______ lived. (Matthew 29-11)

• Simeon lived in expectancy. He was waiting for the consolation of ______, and the ______ was upon him. Because the Holy Spirit had told him he would not die before seeing the Lord's Christ. Simeon had more of a

before seeing the Lord's Christ, Simeon had more of a definitive time period for his *believing* and *expecting*.

The day came when the Holy Spirit led him to the temple, and Simeon held in his arms the one whom he had *believed* and *expected* would come. (Luke 2:25-32)

Anna lived her daily life *believing* and *expect-ing* because of her continual communion with God. Out of the intimacy of her relationship with God, it was a spiritually natural thing for her to ______ and give thanks to God for the baby Jesus when she saw him. (Luke 2:36-38)

Jesus talked to his disciples about the day when he would come a second time. They asked him what would be the sign of his coming. At the beginning of his answer, he used the word that is part of an expectant disciple's assignment - "*Watch* out that no one deceives you...." (Matthew 24:4)

A disciple is one Satan will attempt to deceive as we believe and live in the expectancy of Jesus' second coming.

Jesus concludes his explanation to the disciples by telling them that no one knows the _____ or the _____ of his return except the Father.

Jesus warns, "Therefore keep _____, because you do not know on what day your Lord will come....so you also must be _____, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him." (Matthew 24:36-44)

A daily, living relationship with Jesus Christ, nourished by the Holy Spirit, will cause the disciple of Christ to be both *watchful* and *expectant*.

Like Anna, whose daily communication with God kept her prepared for each day's happenings, so our communication with the Father will insure our preparation for the time when watching and expecting culminate in fulfillment.

Paul writes of the Lord's coming as like that of a thief in the night. Those who are not watching and waiting will be caught by surprise as were the religious Jews when Jesus came the first time.

He came in a way they did not expect, in a role they had not learned to anticipate, and at a time when many of their hearts had grown cold toward the Lord their God.

Then Paul adds, "But you, brothers, are not in darkness so that this day should surprise you like a thief.

"You are all sons of the light and sons of the day...So then, let us not be like others, who are asleep, but let us be ______and self-controlled." (1 Thess. 5:4-9)

If we are walking with the Lord each day, alert, watchful and anticipating his coming, we will not be taken by surprise. Like Simeon and Anna, we will be waiting and ready to receive his coming with great joy.

THINK ABOUT IT:

• At Jesus' first coming, in God's fullness of time, all the prophecies and promises, even the smallest details, were fulfilled just as the Scriptures said.

At Jesus' second coming, in the fullness of God's time, will he not again fulfill all the prophecies and promises given in the Scriptures about his return?

Are we as excited in the anticipation of his coming again as we are about looking back to celebrate his first coming?


Celebration Day Excitement

New Fellowship Center

Nearing Completion

By the time you read this newsletter, construction of our new fellowship center should be nearly complete. Right now, the place is a bee-hive of activity. Workers representing many different sub-contractors are busy touching up walls, painting the interior and exterior, making final electrical and plumbing connections, making final AC connections and installing grills, installing lights, installing sinks and toilets, installing ceiling tile, floor tile, and carpet, installing sound systems, stage lighting, and projection equipment, laying the stage floor, staining and varnishing woodwork, connecting



and testing sewer lines, installing a wheel-chair lift for the stage, installing a fitting room for the thrift shop, installing and connecting all of the new kitchen equipment, and the list goes on.

One wonders how they stay out of each other's way, and the truth is, they don't always. The photos on page 5 will provide just a glimpse of some of the activity currently underway.

Soon it will be our turn to add some finishing touches. By the end of January and early in February, we will be looking for your help as we move all the furniture and equipment that has been in storage back into the building and unpack and assemble new desks, bookcases, cabinets and seating. We will need to build shelving in the thrift shop and numerous storage rooms, hang bulletin boards and window treatments, and complete numerous other tasks not covered by our contract with the builder. Please watch for announcements of these activities, and plan to lend a hand and enjoy some fellowship as we prepare for occupancy of our new facilities.



"Rooting Compassion in Prayer"

"While Jesus and three of his disciples were on the mountain immersed in transfiguring prayer, the rest of the disciples were in the valley trying unsuccessfully to heal a little boy with epilepsy. (Mark 9) Jesus healed the boy when he rejoined them. They asked Jesus, 'Why were we unable...?' to which Jesus responded (in Mark's version), "This kind can come out only by prayers."

"In Matthew's version Jesus says, 'Because you have so little faith.'

"Eugene Peterson, in *The Message* captures the essence of both in his paraphrase, 'Because you still aren't taking God seriously.'

"The secret of Jesus' fruitfulness in ministry is His at-

tention to God and to the living connection between ministry and prayer. Jesus isn't just doing good things; He is doing what He sees His Father doing, saying what He hears His Father say.

"The deep truth here is that when we set out to live and serve boldly in Jesus' name, we will face God-sized challenges that test and far exceed our human abilities to love and to help. To live and serve as Jesus did requires increasing reliance on God and God's infinite resources.

"That is why Jesus 'took Peter, James, and John, and les them up on a high mountain where they were all alone,' (Mark 9:2, NIV) and could share in Jesus' communion with God. Jesus knew that without a deeper inward assurance of who he was and a more personal experience of God, the disciples wouldn't make it; they would not be able to persevere through the trials that lay ahead.

"At some point, if we would persevere in faith, mature in love, and truly bear fruit as Christ-followers, we must allow Jesus to lead us not only into a more productive active life, but into a deepening prayer life and a sustaining communion with God. It all begins with keeping your appointment with God."

Education and Ministries Patience Nave

As I write these words, my mind is swirling with things to come. Paul says that we should put the past behind us and press on to the future. Last year was full and had, I think, great purpose for this church. However, now it's time to think about what is coming up - and there is *much* coming up.

✤ February 12, twelve people, sponsored by this church, will leave Florida to work on a huge project in Carrenage, Haiti. Six of the 12 are from our church, six are from elsewhere; six are men, and six are women.

Last year at this time, most of us seldom, if ever, thought of Haiti. The team to Haiti in March, led by our own Sharon Smith, awakened us to the needs of people just a few miles from Florida's borders.

Many have sewed, baked, prayed, and given to this ministry. We still have children to feed there and work to be done.

Ted Weiser has taken the training for team leadership, and the next team (how's that for focusing on the future?) will go to Haiti under his leadership to continue the work we have begun. If you would like to contribute further to this project, you may do so by contribution to the church, designated a "VIM" (Volunteers in Missions).

Our work is known in the community, and total strangers have given us money to fulfill our commitment of helping the helpless in Haiti. The team thanks you, and I cannot thank you enough for your incredible support of this project.

Last year at this time we were just beginning our EBADOC Academy for the children. Now our Academy and its program have become a model for the Methodist Church in Crystal River. Our numbers on Sunday morning have grown, but more important is the spiritual growth that we see in our children. I thank Kim Bennett and her team for their faithfulness and great love for the children. She, the team, and I thank *you* for your support.

• Our Celebration as we open our new facility for service is coming together well, and we pray that this will be both a

joyful time of thanking our great God for his generosity and of reaching out to the community to invite others to join. We are grateful for the work being done by Chuck Dixon and his committee to bring this Celebration to fruition, and we are already thanking God for his faithfulness to us and for your faithfulness to him.

✤ Every week dozens of people are involved in ministry to those outside our church, as evidenced by the "Salty Service" cards you continue to place on the altar. The "Intentional Disciplining" cards show that many continue to grow in their discipleship through group Bible study. God is helping us to live out our purpose statement: "Everyone Becoming A Disciple Of Christ."

The response to the Advent Devotional was so positive, and I am working - sometimes steadily, sometimes feverishly
to complete one for the full 40 days of Lent. Thank you for your encouragement and for allowing me to devote this time to study and writing.

The Financial Peace University class went well. To a person, all agreed that the class is excellent and should be offered again to the church.

I should stress that it is not **just for the young** who have much to learn about being financially prudent. The format has much to offer **everyone**.

Dick Evans and I facilitated the class, but the videos by Dave Ramsey were the most significant part of the entire program. He is bright, informed, and funny - a great combination! I think I am a pretty frugal person, but I have changed many things about how I use/ don't use my money, thanks to the class.

Dick and I encourage you to attend the preview of the class if you can. Then sign up and be prepared to have your financial ideas altered and your bank account enhanced.

The cost of the 13-week class is \$100 per person or per couple. (Dave Ramsey encourages couples to take the course together.) It will be \$100 well spent.

This is the greatest church I have ever belonged to. I am so grateful to be here, to be on your staff, to be a part of God's ministry in this place. I praise him for that privilege, and I thank you for letting me do what I *love* to do.

HARDENING OF THE HEART

In the book of Exodus throughout Chapters 7-12, we hear repeatedly how the Pharaoh's heart was hardened by his own will and, on occasion, at God's behest. His anger and spitefulness toward the Israelites cost him dearly in land, water, crops, livestock, citizens, his army, and even his child.

For a number of years, scientists have been studying the role of inflammation in the development of heart disease. We have known for a while that those people who are under a great deal of stress and/or who were chronically anxious had an increased likelihood of developing heart disease – in fact, we attach the label of *Type A Personality* to them.

The word inflammation conjures up images of healing wounds, sore throats, or arthritic joints - not heart disease. However, there is increasing evidence that chronic inflammation of the lining of blood vessels has a great deal of influence on whether or not patients develop atherosclerosis, perhaps better known as "hardening of the arteries."

There is much more that science has yet to learn about the inflammation process. In the mean-time, there are some concrete things you can do to lessen the effects of chronic inflammation on your body, including:

Stop smoking and eliminate second hand smoke.

Maintain an appropriate weight.

Get moving. Exercise!

• Know your numbers – blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar.

Take care of your teeth and gums with regular brushing and regular exams.

Make necessary dietary changes.

And finally, as in the case of Pharaoh – reduce your stress (often selfimposed) and reign in anger and hostility by participating in programs in the church, such as Bible study, prayer groups, support groups and/or Stephen Ministers.

And he even had his eye on the pie for the next trip! Everyone laughed about how a slim second grader could hold so much food. But, he did. No matter how often he went back to the buffet, there was plenty more.

"After everyone polished off the last of the pie, Lola couldn't wait to share some good news with the family. She told them all about a new charitable gift annuity she had signed with her favorite non-profit organization. "Andy, whose shirt and belt had been loosened much earlier in the afternoon, asked her if the gift annuity was like a holiday dinner. 'How?' she asked. 'Well it seems like you get a check every three months when you go to your mailbox; and then you go back three months later and there's another check for you. Your gift annuity never runs out!' Lola laughed. She realized that just like the bountiful meal they had just shared, the benefits of a gift annuity are always there. They never run out."

Walking on the Path Patience Nave

"I will not speak with you much longer, for the prince of this world is coming. He has no hold on me, but the world must learn that I love the Father and that I do exactly what my Father has commanded me."

John 14:30-31

Sometimes the words in Our Book just overwhelm my brain and my heart. I am challenged and awed by the verses above.

It is so easy for us to sing, "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so." That's true, and I'm glad. But is that the reason that Jesus willingly went to the cross? Was it only so that little children and children-grownto-be-old could sing that song with absolute assurance of its truth? I'm not so sure.

In the verse above, Jesus is having one last, intimate conversation with his very own disciples, whom he loved greatly and into whom he had poured himself for three years. He seemed to be cramming these last moments with things he wanted them never to forget. Yet in these verses, he does not tell them that he is going to the cross because he loves **them**. He tells them that he is going to the cross because he loves **his Father**.

Earlier, John has told us that God loved the world and gave Jesus for that world (3:16). Putting this thought with the verses above, we recognize two great truths: God loved the world enough to buy it back - at great cost - from its sin and separation from him, and Jesus loved his Father enough to be willing to complete that purchase. Jesus knew exactly what he was going to allow men to do to him. Only a few minutes later he went into Gethsemane and poured out his heart to his Father - according to one text even sweating blood in his anxiety. (Luke 22:43-44) But his love for his Father was so great that even his fear of what was to come would not prevent him from being obedient - obedient even to subjecting himself to death on the cross.

I remember standing in the great Coliseum in Rome, looking down at the place where Christians had been fed to the lions, and wondering if I could have faced those lions, if I loved God enough to die for him. Jesus did. Yes, he loved us, but he could not bear to see his Father suffer from our separation from him, so he died to end that separation!

Prayer: Father, we say so glibly that we love you. We mouthe words too great for us to comprehend. Teach us to really love you, to really want to please you, to long to bring joy to you by our actions—even if those actions require sacrifice on our part. Amen.

Passionate Spirituality

Lent and the Spiritual Disciplines

Lent can be a time to focus our attention on our Savior and our relationship with Him. Using some of the spiritual disciplines during Lent would be a particularly good way to accomplish this.

Many people think of Lent as a time to give up something, like chocolate or something else we probably shouldn't have or do in the first place. Unless what we do is a personal sacrifice and unless we use it as a way to focus on Jesus, it doesn't produce the appropriate result. Instead we can DO something that will draw us closer to our Savior, like **meditating** on God's Word or spending some time in **silence**.

Often the spiritual disciplines which are the least familiar and therefore the least comfortable are the ones which reap the deepest results (learned from personal experience). If we are familiar with prayer, then spending time in prayer is good, but it probably won't stretch us like spending some time being silent before the Lord would. Yes, it may be uncomfortable at first because it's not as familiar. But as you experience the closeness which happens in your openness to the Lord through a new spiritual discipline, you are likely to become eager to develop formerly unfamiliar spiritual discipline. Like anything else, the practice of a new discipline will become more comfortable with time.

We can ask for **guidance** about which new spiritual discipline the Lord would have us add. We can make this a **sacrifice** and do it in **secrecy** (refraining from drawing attention to ourselves). These three spiritual disciplines were described in the January Genesis.

So let's resolve to take up a *NEW* spiritual discipline during Lent, or, better yet, explore several. We may find a spiritual discipline which we might want to continue practicing after Lent. If I can be of help to you with any of these spiritual disciplines, please let me know.

During Lent, descriptions of the spiritual disciplines and scriptural references will be available in the narthex and on bulletin boards.
