THE TOMB WAS EMPTY

Early Sunday morning, the women came to the tomb. They came with spices and tears to prepare Jesus' body for burial. But when they arrived, the tomb was empty! This increased the emptiness they were already feeling, an emptiness resulting from their loss of the living, guiding presence of God in human flesh—Jesus.

The tomb was empty, but soon the women would realize that emptiness meant good news. Because the tomb was empty, we have the promise of eternal life. We have reason to hope no matter what we see before us.

Matthew tells how the risen Lord appeared to the women, directing them to tell the disciples he would meet them in Galilee. Galilee was also called Galilee of the Gentiles, a place where people lived who knew nothing of the one true God.

The tomb is empty, and Jesus has gone ahead into the world. He is out where needy, hurting people live who do not know the love of God. Jesus calls us to join him, inviting us to become a part of the solution instead of part of the problem. He is out in the world, ready to give us his directions.

When Jesus met the disciples in Galilee, he said, "... go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of

the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you..." (Matthew 28:16-20)

God is calling you out into the world to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ.

The tomb is empty. That's the good news. Now go—Jesus is waiting!

TENEBRAE Thursday, APRIL 21 7:00 p.m.

For over a thousand years the church has celebrated a service called Tenebrae on the Thursday before Easter. The service originally lasted all night and included the chanting of the book Lamentations.

Tenebrae is also called a "Service of Shadows" because it depicts the death of Jesus on the cross. In a graphic way, it recalls the Jesus Christ's sacrifice on the cross. price Christ paid for our salvation.

The service involves the reading of seven scripture lessons and seven brief meditations. After each meditation the reader will remove a symbol of the meaning of our faith from the altar. Then the choir will sing, some of the lights in the sanctuary will go out, and one end of the seven readings, the church altar will be bare, all the lights will be out, and the final candle—the symbol of Jesus as the light of the world—will extinguished.

After 33 tolls of a bell, one for each year of Christ's life, the congregation will be invited to leave in silence.

PRAYER LABYRINTH Good Friday & Holy Saturday

The prayer labyrinth will be available in Fellowship Hall on Good Friday from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m. and on Holy Saturday from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. We hope you will take this opportunity to use this ancient way of worship and prayer which we bring to our church. People travel long distances to walk the labyrinth in Leesburg and thousands travel to Chartres Cathedral in France to walk the labyrinth inlaid in the floor as part of their spiritual journey.

For those of you who have not taken this walk or who are unfamiliar with a prayer labyrinth, I'm including some information here. More details are available on the Spiritual Formation bulletin board and in the narthex. When you come to the labyrinth, there will be a brochure with complete details and tips for your journey.

A labyrinth is a prayer tool like a prayer altar, a cross, candles, or a prayer journal. There is evidence that Christian churches used the labyrinth for prayer and meditation as early as 350 C.E. The oldest known labyrinth still in existence is in Algeria and is inscribed in the center with the words "Sancta Eclesia" meaning holy church. The labyrinth we use is made of canvas and belongs to the



Florida Conference of the UMC and is called an 11 circuit labyrinth; it is modeled after the one in Chartres Cathedral. Although you walk on the labyrinth, it is not a long walk. Since some of us do occasionally have a need for rest, there will be chairs near the edge of the canvas if you wish to sit.

In an effort to provide more spiritually formative experiences we have added this to our Holy Week traditions. Those who have taken part in the experience have indicated they felt blessed and were glad they came. We hope that you will take this opportunity to join them this year.

Colon Rectal Cancer

This is not a subject that most people like to discuss, but being aware of the risks and screenings could save your life. Colon rectal cancer refers to cancer found anywhere in the colon, including the rectum. This cancer usually begins with a clump of tissue in the colon or rectal lining called a polyp. It takes years for polyps to grow and up to 2% of them become cancerous.

Two thousand seven statistics from the CDC indicate that 142,672 were diagnosed with colon cancer and 53,219 died from it. Colon cancer is the 3rd leading cause of cancer in the U.S.

There are certain risk factors for colon cancer. These include: family history, smoking, Chron's disease, ulcerative colitis or being African-American. Your risk can be decreased by regular screenings, increasing activity, eating healthy and smoking cessation

Everyone over the age of 50 is encouraged to be screened regularly. One of the first methods your doctor will use is a simple fecal occult blood test. The American Cancer Society recommends this home test with samples taken over several days. Stool samples are checked for occult or hidden blood. If blood is discovered the doctor will discuss additional screening methods if needed.


The "Gold Standard" of screening methods is considered to be a

colonoscopy. With this method the lining of the large intestine is visualized and polyps, if found can easily be removed and evaluated. Polyps found during most of the other tests will require a colonoscopy as a second procedure. Additional information on colonoscopies is a vailable by going to: www.colonoscopyForDummies.com This informative booklet can be download to your computer.

Other screening methods your doctors may recommend are a Virtual or CT colonography It is the newest method of screening. This is a special form of CAT scan that allows the radiologist to reconstruct images of the lining of the colon.

A Barium enema is another method that allows visualization of the colon through X-ray after a liquid contrast is introduced into the colon through the rectum.

A flexible sigmoidoscopy is similar to a colonoscopy but only visualizes the lower portion of the colon.



While no one likes to read about these tests, they can detect colon cancer early. Regular screening saves lives, and it could save yours!

We want to express our must humble thanks to everyone for their prayers, emails and generosity over the past month as we have struggled through the osteomyelitis (spine infection) that Elaine has had since at least Christmas Eve. We have an update after some disappointing news on the medical front just today (see first prayer item). As always, we covet your prayers for many important matters this month:

Our team partner, Pastor Moses in Mae Ai near the Burmese border, has recently received substantial financial gifts that will allow him to purchase the property for a Bible school, second church and orphanage. Praise God! Now, he needs the final funds to purchase the entryway land and to make repairs to the buildings. A church in Michigan, USA, is expected to decide soon on whether to assist this ministry financially as well. Lastly, a family from New Zealand that visited in October last year (Andrew/Melissa Peterson and four children) are finishing up their Pioneers' application process and hope to join Pastor Moses in ministry via The HOME Team in July. Please pray for all these major developments in this strategic work.

V We have been blessed with some **generous financial gifts** over the past month as people have asked

how to help with the large medical bills for Elaine's illness. We don't know who gave most of these gifts, but God does! These gifts have been a real encouragement at a time of physical, emotional and financial stress for our family. We trust the Lord will bless all of these givers abundantly as a sign of our thanks.

Justin was accepted as an undergrad a t Columbia **International University** alongside Brittany beginning in August. Praise God! He will major in Bible and music, with an emphasis on leading worship songs. Justin also is about to complete a long varsity basketball season at Grace International School. He and the team got to play in tournaments in Bangkok and Manila (see him blocking a shot (below), and they finish the season with a conference tourney later this week.

We mentioned last month about our teammates, Greg and Chris Small, getting the green light to move into a rural community to begin church-planting work ASAP.



The problem was housing. Well, this abscess not only didn't within a few days, they literally stumbled on a perfect house with the help of the only Christian in the village and will be moving in this week. Please pray for this move to be smooth and for them to get settled into the community before mid-May to mid-August.

This month's cultural photo is "schools." Did you know that the major Thai school break is in March-April? The reason is simple: That's hot season here in Thailand between the two monsoons, when an area of low pressure socks in the country. The average highs in March and April in our city of Chiang Mai are 95-105 degrees with little cloud relief. The clouds don't come until the next monsoon in May, when rainfall rises from less than 1 inch per month to 6+ inches through October. So, it's with a long sigh that we bid cool (ha!) season goodbye and welcome back the heat and humidity.

Prayers

After two days and 13 hours (mostly) sitting at the hospital L, we finally learned this afternoon that Elaine still has a spinal infection and now must have a procedure on March 11 to drain and test an abscess that has grown outside the spine in the area of the infection. We were hoping that the infection would be gone, but that isn't the case. The infection itself is decreased but still there, and now

heal but grew. This means Elaine will most likely need to be on IV meds for four more weeks and will have to continue with a lot of bed rest. She also could need more invasive surgery if the next four weeks of antibiotics don't eradicate they go on Home Assignment from the infection. "Win-Win" With a CGA

extremely low interest rates for Savings and Money Market Deposit, many people have turned free. to Charitable Gift Annuities to accomplish both their income and their stewardship goals. The CGA is truly a "win-win" situation for individuals and couples who want to add to their income stream and also church and/or charity.

United Methodists here in Florida. Individuals or couples give a specific amount of money (minimum of \$5,000) to the Florida United Methodist Foundation to create a Charitable Gift Annuity that will pay an annual rate of interest on the deposit for the rest of their lives. The payment rate depends on their age at the time of the gift. At the end of their lives, their church and/ or designated charity will receive the remaining balance.

The donors receive charitable income tax deduction in the year of the gift. And, for a number of years, a portion of their income from the CGA will be tax free. The interest rates are standardized and are actuarially determined. Here is an example.

Harry is 85 years old and creates a Charitable Gift Annuity with a \$20,000 gift in March of

2011. At his age, the annual 11 payment rate will be 8.1% and l he will receive \$1,620 each year for In the present economy, with the rest of his life. He receives a charitable income tax deduction of \$11,143 in 2011. And for 6.8 years, accounts and even on Certificates of \$1,302.48 of his payment will be tax

If Harry were married and his wife were also the same age, their payment rate on a \$20,000 gift would be 7.1% and they (or the survivor) would receive \$1,420 annually for the remainder of their to make a significant gift to their lives. The charitable tax deduction in the year of the gift would be Here's how it works for \$9,362.40 and, for 9.5 vears. \$1,120.38 would be tax free.

12 THE WAYS OF THE KINGDOM

"Do not judge, or you too will be judged. (Matthew 7:1)

There is an "old-time" story about Saturday bath time. After a tub was filled with water. the procession began. First, father bathed. Mother followed. using the same water. Then each of the children washed in the now murky water. Last, the mother bathed baby. Apparently the water had become so dirty that the mother had to keep a firm hold on baby so as not to lose him in the discolored water. Thus we have the saying, "Don't throw the baby out with the bath water."


What does that have to do with judging? The scriptures show God loves the sinner but hates sin. As his children, we are to do the same. But how? Unless we keep a firm hold on the truth of God's love for all people, we judge a "terrible" sinner lost because of his behavior, and we throw the sinner out with his sins. Other times our human love for the sinner is so great that we refuse to deal with his sin. Then we keep the baby and the bath water (the sinner in his sins), refusing to separate the two lest we lose the baby.

Remember Saul (later called Paul) at the stoning of Stephen? Saul stood by, "giving approval to his death." But Stephen knew how to separate the sin from the sinner and prayed, "Father, do not hold this sin against them." (Acts 7:59-8:1) If Paul were judged by his sins, thrown out by God because of his persecution of the early church, think what we would have missed—the truths God revealed through Paul, his outreach to the Gentiles and the letters he wrote.

Nicholas Think about Lindsey, the Afro-American lad who shot the policeman, David Crawford. I reacted with "That kid just ruined his whole life." Then the thought came: "Don't condemn Nicholas. forgiveness for him. Ask that he be drawn to Jesus." What looked to me like a life-ruining act could be the beginning of real life for Nicholas—a life that lasts for eternity. My part is not to judge Nicholas but to separate the sinner from the sin and pray for his salvation. Will you join me?

Father, help us to see sinners separate from their sins and to pray for their redemption as someone prayed for ours.





Search Me, O God, and Know My Heart

When I think of Lent, what comes to mind is "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me, and know my thoughts." Psalm 139:23 (Reading all of Psalm 139 will provide a more complete context.)

One way to describe Lent is a time of preparation for Christ to rule in our hearts. Just what does that take? How does Christ break through and grow in us so there is less of us and more of Him. He doesn't! He stands at the door and knocks. He woos us. God has been called the "Hound of Heaven" since He pursues us because of His great love for each of us. But He does not "break through" that shell which some of us tend to have around our heart or hiding parts of us we just don't want to look at. We need to invite Him in. Once we invite Him in, He continues to work in us through His sanctifying grace as we become more and more like Jesus. Even in this we have our part to play. If we have a thick exterior (like thinking we are fine the way we are or this is just the way we are), it's like having a stop sign posted at the door of our heart. If we truly want to be open to Christ and all He wants to do in and through

us, then we need to remove the stop sign and invite Him into those places where we have tried to keep Him away. Remember -- there is nothing He doesn't already know!

The stop sign at the door of our heart or the hard exterior remind me of something I learned about plant seeds. I expected some magnolia trees to sprout in my yard since there are so many of those pretty red seeds. I even tried to help them along by planting some, but I got no results. A presentation by an expert gardener, revealed what I didn't know. While I know God in his infinite wisdom creates everything with a purpose – the purpose of the colorful seeds was lost on me! The reason the seeds are that beautiful red color is to attract the birds that eat the seeds thus cracking their hard exterior. eventually they end up on the ground and begin to grow. We can force similar results by filing away the exterior shell, but one way or another that seed has to be broken open and fall to the ground before it can grow. And like the parable of the sower, it does make a difference what kind of soil that seed falls on. Soil that is consistently tilled or stirred up by prayer, worship, silence, Christian fellowship, Bible study or fasting is receptive for that seed to grow and mature.

Whether it's during prayer or silence, at a retreat, or during a traumatic event, something happens to break that shell. For some of us it

may be all of these – it has been for me. I probably had a very thick or multilayered shell. I've learned to invite the Holy Spirit to do His sanctifying work of changing me rather than waiting for something to happen for Him to break in to my world. I wish I would spend more time listening, praying, studying Scripture, and practicing the other spiritual disciplines. But I know I'm | The Decorating Committee will be a work in progress and He is growing me and I am His beloved child no matter how much or how little time I spend with Him.

Sometimes we don't closer to Christ. Mary didn't recognize Jesus when she went to the tomb -- she thought He was the gardener! The men on the road to Emmaus didn't recognize Jesus when He walked with them and explained the Scriptures until He revealed Himself in the breaking of the bread. Jesus was encountered and not recognized in ordinary places – a garden, a dusty road, seashore, an upper room – yet they did not recognize Him. Let's spend Lent looking for Christ not just in the extraordinary but in the ordinary.

I pray you will stir up the soil of your heart so it will be receptive and crack open any shell which you may have remaining so you will receive all Christ has for you and so He will rule in your heart. Let us together prepare for the resurrection of our Lord.





HISTORY OF THE STAINED GLASS

One of the most beautiful features of our present day church building is the lovely stained glass window which graces one wall of the sanctuary. The window is made of antiqued, painted and fired glass and depicts Jesus holding a lamb in His arms. Jesus is wearing a brilliant red robe. At the bottom of the window, in old world script, are the words from a version of Ecclesiastes 11:1-"Cast thy bread upon the waters for it shall return to you in as many ways."

How the window came to our church from Italy, where it was crafted about 200 or more years ago, is an interesting story. The window was brought to this country and placed in the Episcopal church in Cherry Valley, Massachusetts. Unfortunately, we do not know the name of the donor nor the date the window arrived in America. We do know that during the early 1920s the scheduled church was demolition to make way for a new building. The man who owned the property was of the Jewish faith. Again, we do not know his name. He recognized the beauty and the value of the window and saved it. How grateful we are to him!

The window next appeared in the St Thomas Episcopal Church in Auburn, Massachusetts about 1920. Sometime in the 1970s that church was demolished and the

window was rescued by an unknown person who brought it to New Port Richey, Florida. Dr. Max Rittgers, who was pastor of our local church in 1982, heard about the window and arranged it's purchase on April 5th of that year.

Donors who made the purchase of the window possible were: Dr Jesse and Jane Richardson; Alvah and Marion Belcher; Margaret Belcher; Arlend Everett; J.P. and Sandra Garner; Paul and Betty Huffstutler; Nelson and Ruby MacBroom; Donald and Carol Morris; Paul and Dorothy Wilkinson; Mrs. Peg Smith; Keith and Eleanora Smith; and Dr. Max B. and Rita Rittgers.

The window was dedicated Sunday, November 7th, 1982 when it graced one wall of the Sanctuary in our Church's second building, now known as Shively/Roberts Hall. Dr. Max B. Rittgers, Pastor stated the dedication service was "A covenant with the past, a commitment to the present, and a challenge to the future."

Can it really be April???!!!

We are truly enjoying our time here, even though we visit 3-4 home groups a week, have lunch and or dinner out 4-5 times a week, and try to keep up with letters and the everyday stuff! March will have found us on the road again. Laura hadn't seen her family and it was definitely time for the drive to PA. Since we were already 'up north', we will have driven a few more hours into MA and visited good friends from FL that had begun a church there a few years ago. They have also encouraged, prayed and supported the work over years....a *small* but important part of the *big picture* in Siberia!

"It's New Years...just one toast (drink) for the coming year. We cannot stop this tradition – we're Russians!"

Alcoholism — it's a constant challenge we face in Russia. Drinking in Russia is such a huge part of the culture that even though many know it's a major health

problem, removing that from the culture is quite another matter!

Sam & Julie (not their real names) have one son, Kostya. They're a young couple in their 30's who will do what it takes to have food on the table, wood for the stove, and clothes on their backs. There's nothing unusual about this couple...in Russian thinking. However, this past New Year's Eve, Sam & Julie didn't celebrate with folks from the fellowship. They had decided to stay home and Sam insisted Julie have a drink with him...it would become the scariest January of their lives.

Sam and Julie had been down this road before....they would buy a bottle of beer or vodka and 'that was going to be it!" It just never worked out that way...one bottle would turn into two...one day would turn into two or three weeks! There seemed to be no possible way to control the urge to drink. After a two week binge. Julie became very sick from withdrawals. She made it to a friend's house and fell to the floor. Her kidneys had begun to shut down and it did not look good! The ambulance came and took her to the hospital where they immediately gave her IV's. We give Him all the glory because she recovered and is doing much better!

We are so grateful that our fellow workers were there to

intervene and help get Julie to the PRAISE: hospital. We're even more grateful that Sam has begun counseling with our teammates and searching through the Word for answers of hope and freedom from drinking! Please remember this couple often....this is **not** unusual and REQUESTS: something we face often as we 'press on' in Siberia.

Official statistics in Russia show more than 23,000 people die of alcohol poisoning annually, while another 75,000 die of alcoholrelated diseases. Russia's Public Chamber put the death toll taken by diseases, crimes and accidents due to alcohol at some 500,000 people last year. (Recent television commercials put this number at 700,000 annually!)

Men in Russia have an average life expectancy of just 60 years; for women approx. 72 years. This is well below that of Western European countries where the lifespan is 77 years. PLEASE... keep this country, our little village, in your thoughts and prayers...only hope in the Lord will change lives enough for this problem to disappear.

EARTH DAY

Now observed on **April 22** each year by more than 500 million people and several national governments in 175 countries.

Senator Nelson, an environmental activist, took a leading role in organizing the celebration, hoping to demonstrate popular political support for an environmental agenda. He modeled it on the highly effective Vietnam War teach-ins of the time. The proposal for Earth Day was first proposed in a prospectus to JFK written by Fred Dutton. However, Nelson decided against much of Dutton's top-down approach, favoring a decentralized, grassroots effort in which each community shaped their action around local concerns.

Nelson had conceived the idea for Earth Day following a trip he took to Santa Barbara right after the horrific oil spill off the coast in 1969. Outraged by the devastation and Washington political inertia, Nelson proposed a national teach-in on the environment to be observed by every university campus in the U.S. I am convinced that all we need to do to bring an overwhelming insistence of the new generation that we stem the tide of environmental disaster is to present the facts clearly and dramatically. To marshal such an effort, I am proposing a national teach-in on the crisis of the environment to be held next spring on every university campus across the Nation. The crisis is so imminent, in my opinion, that every university should set aside 1 day in the school year-the same day across the Nation -for the teach-in.

One of the organizers of the event said: "We're going to be focusing an enormous amount of public interest on a whole, wide range of environmental events, hopefully in such a manner that it's going to be drawing the interrelationships between

them and, getting people to look at the whole thing as one consistent kind of picture, a picture of a society that's rapidly going in the wrong direction that has to be stopped and turned around.

It's going to be an enormous affair, I think. We have groups operating now in about 12,000 high schools, 2,000 colleges and universities and a couple of thousand other community groups. It's safe to say I think that the number of people who will be participating in one way or another is going to be ranging in the millions."

Nelson announced his idea for a nationwide teach-in day on the environment in a speech to a fledgling conservation group in Seattle on September 20, 1969, and then again six days later in Atlantic City to a meeting of the United Auto Workers. Senator Nelson hoped that a grassroots outcry about environmental issues might prove to Washington, D.C. just how distressed Americans were in every constituency. Senator Nelson invited Republican Representative Paul N "Pete" McCloskey to serve as his co-chair and they incorporated a new non-profit organization, environmental Teach-In, Inc., to stimulate participation across the country. Both continued to give speeches plugging the event.

On September 29, 1969, in a long, front-page <u>New York Times</u> article, <u>Gladwin Hill</u> wrote: "Rising concern about the "environmental crisis" is sweeping the nation's campuses with an intensity that may be on its way to eclipsing student discontent over the <u>war in Vietnam</u>...a national day of observance of environmental problems, analogous to the mass demonstrations on Vietnam, is being planned for next spring, when a nationwide environmental 'teach-in'...coordinated from the office of Senator Gaylord Nelson is planned...."

Denis Hayes, a Harvard graduate student, read the NYT article and traveled to Washington to get involved. He had been student body president and a campus

activist at Stanford University in McCloskey's district and where Teach-In board member Paul Ehrlich was a professor. He thought he might be asked to organize Boston. Instead, Nelson eventually asked Hayes to drop out of Harvard, assemble a staff, and direct the effort to organize the United States. Hayes would go on to become a widely recognized environmental advocate.

Hayes recruited a handful of young college graduates to come to Washington, D.C. and began to plan what would become the first Earth Day.

Nelson's suggestion was difficult to implement, as the Earth Day movement proved to be autonomous with no central governing body. As Senator Nelson attests, it simply grew on its own:

Earth Day worked because of the spontaneous response at the grassroots level. We had neither the time nor resources to organize 20 million demonstrators and the thousands of schools and local communities that participated. That was the remarkable thing about Earth Day. It organized itself.

On April 22, 1970, Earth Day marked the beginning of the modern environmental movement. Approximately 20 million Americans participated. Thousands of colleges and universities organized protests against the deterioration of the environment. Groups that had been fighting against oil spills, polluting factories and power plants, raw sewage, toxic dumps, pesticides, Freeway and expressway revolts, the loss of wilderness, and air pollution suddenly realized they shared common values.

Media coverage of the first Earth Day included a One-Hour Prime-time <u>CBS</u> <u>News</u> Special Report called "Earth Day: A Question of Survival," with correspondents reporting from a dozen major cities across the country, and narrated by <u>Walter Cronkite</u> (whose backdrop was the Earth Week Committee of Philadelphia's logo.)

The Green Committee was formed in January 7, 2010. The purpose of the committee is to study and recommend ways to make the FUMC's energy/water usage and waste management more environmentally friendly.

To date we have had Withlacoochee Electric and Tom Slagle from Metropolitan Ministries do an energy audit to find out our usage and ways to bring down the consumption. We are also looking into doing a study on installing solar panels on the roof of the sanctuary. If this is done the electric company would give us a credit for energy that we have generated.

We are looking into putting in programmable thermostats throughout the complex to get a handle on the high energy costs.

We have also started a recycling program, which consists of the following items: glass, plastic, corrugated cardboard, tin cans, aluminum cans and mixed paper. Someone from the Monday morning work crew takes the recycling to the recycling center every week.

Since we have started this program we have realized that instead of having a full dumpster of garbage every week, it has been reduced to half or less than half weekly.

Sometime in March we are working on getting someone from FDS Recycling center to come on a Wonderful Wednesday and give us a presentation of why we recycle and what the need for it is. We meet on the first Thursday of the month at 2 p.m. in Room 106.
