

Living as a Disciple in the Mundane



"It was a great weekend. But now it's back to Monday morning...."

"We had a marvelous vacation, but now it's back to the daily grind."

"Such an uplifting, inspirational retreat. To bad we have to come back down to the mundane."

Most of us have said something like the above, sharing a "mountain-top experience," a great get-away, and our reluctance to return to the drab routine of our everyday existence. In the world we see an ever-increasing thirst for the beyond-ordinary thrill, the super trophies of success, the challenges of a riskier risk. If these can't be experienced personally, they can be shared by watching others achieve in the high-excitement arenas of moves, television or the internet. But as disciples of Christ, what are we called to seek?

Jesus spent much time teaching the disciples to live as he lived - an extra-ordinary person among ordinary people and everyday situations. Jesus would deal with their sin nature on the cross, provide a way for forgiveness of their sins and fill them with the Holy Spirit. Then they could live as a light in the darkest of situations, among the meanest of circumstances.

Jesus took Peter, James and John with him to
high mountain. As he was transfigured before them, the
saw his glory and were amazed to see Elijah and Mose
talking with him. Peter suggested, "It isfor u
to be here. Let us put up three one for you
one for Moses and one for Elijah."
Then they heard a voice say, "This is my

whom I love. _____ to him!"
Suddenly, all was normal again, and Jesus led them back down the mountain straight into a large, arguing crowd. A man had brought his possessed son, and the disciples who had not gone up on the mountain couldn't cast the spirit out. Jesus said, "O ____ generation, how long shall I _____ with you? How long

generation, how long shall I _____ with you? How long shall I put up with your? Bring the boy to me?" (from Mark 9:2-29)

Back from a mountain-top experience right into the ugliness of an arguing, unbelieving crowd, Jesus showed his disciples what their lives as his disciples were to be like. Following Jesus would be no constant mountain-top high. Momentary revelations would be followed by days and weeks of serving common people in the everyday arenas of life. They would be led by the Holy Spirit into the drudgery of the mundane, and there they would serve as their Master had served - as extra-ordinary men in the ordinary scenes of life.

Jesus and his disciples were meeting for his last Passover meal. All the arrangements had been made, and the men gathered eagerly around the table. But no one had thought to seek a servant to do the customary washing of dusty, tired feet when the group arrived.

John writes, "Jesus knew that the _____ had put all things under his power, and that he had come from ____ and was returning to him." So he got up from the meal, took off his outer garments, wrapped a towel around his waist and began to wash his disciples' feet.

Then he told them, "Now that I, your ____ and ___, have washed your feet, you also should ___ one another's feet. I have set you an ____ that you should do as I have done for you...no servant is greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him."

The foot washing had a practical, necessary purpose - to cleanse and refresh tired, dusty feet. It was a dirty job for a servant, differing greatly from the symbolic foot washing we do today and call it "a humbling spiritual experience." For the disciples, they saw their Lord become their servant. As for Jesus, because he knew where he had come from and where he was going, the washing of the disciples' road-dusty feet could not take away from the dignity of his person. He knew who he was. (from John 13:1-17)

THINK ABOUT IT:

- When we taste God's glory in some spiritual experience, the purpose is to prepare us for service among ordinary people, in the mundane situations of life.
- When we're always seeking spiritual thrills, we miss the touch of God's grace in the commonplace.
- We so often look for "big things" to do for God, for success in a Christian ministry. Where is Jesus going to find the "foot washers" in our grubby, sordid, weary world? Jesus told his disciples, after washing their feet, "Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them." (Jn. 13:17)
- When we know who we are in Christ, understand where we came from and where we are going, no task God calls us to do will diminish our person or lessen our dignity. Drudgery in the mundane becomes a place of high calling in the Lord's service.

THE 12 DISCIPLE WALL TAPESTRIES

The walls of the fellowship hall have been enlivened and the pilgrimage given sparkle by the fabric hangings. The warm tones and the flexibility in design are a contrast to the rather austere strength of stone and glass.

Each of the twelve columns along the way normally carry a long 9'x1' apostle hanging. All were <u>donated by Dr. Max</u> & <u>Rita Rittgers and constructed by Mr. & Mrs. Norwood (Clara) Speary</u> from the originals at First United Methodist Church, Orlando, Florida.

Below are the descriptions of each hanging:

- ♦ ANDREW: X-shaped cross on which he died; basket of five loaves and two fishes Jesus used to feed the multitude; and a gold Creek cross indicating Andrew's bringing Greeks to Jesus.
- ♦ BARTHOLOMEW: Tradition said that he died by being skinned alive, thus the flaying knives; fig leaves of the tree he was sitting under reading Scripture; the scroll, when Jesus called him; and the fish of the breakfast Jesus cooked on the beach.
- ♦ MATTHEW: Roman tax collector (SPOR) by Jesus; three money bags; his money on the counting table; lion of Judah, signifying Ethiopia, to which he traveled with the Gospel.
- ♦ PETER: Christ said that Peter was the rock on which the church would be founded (bottom) and He was giving him the keys of the Kingdom (top); Peter holds the inverted cross on which, according to tradition, he died, feeling he was not worthy to die in the same position as his Master.
- ♦ JAMES: The staff, his many missionary pilgrim journeys and the scallop shell a sign of his sailor's vocation; and the nickname "Son of Thunder" was given to James by Jesus when James suggested that a bolt of lightning be hurled upon a village which refused entrance to Jesus.
- ◆ JAMES THE MINOR: According the tradition, first Apostle martyred; thrown from the pinnacle of the Temple and sawed in half, thus the saw and the martyr's palm; and the anchor cross (church emblem) shows his part in the church's formation.
- ♦ JOHN: "The Beloved Disciple," thus the red heart; credited as the author of the Book of Revelation, which speaks of the Hand of God holding seven stars, representing seven letters written to seven churches; and the serpent and cup suggest the legendary attempt to kill John with a poisoned chalice.
- ◆ JUDE: Holds bunches of grapes, for he was a vine dresser when Jesus called him; the ship as the church which Jude carried to many sites as a missionary; and the dove represents the promise of Jesus to send the Holy Spirit to the Apostles.
- PHILIP: Apostle-missionary carrying staff cross with tripart ends indicting the trinity; he died, according to some traditions, on a tau cross (bottom); was a fisherman by trade.
- SIMON: Another fisherman, and teacher (book); holds the broken sword of his change from militant zealot believing in violent force to a Christian embracing the way of love; and according to tradition, took the Gospel to India, as suggested by towers (bottom.)
- ◆ THOMAS: The "Doubter"; five red drops of blood in the white (Trinity) triangle signifying the wounds of Christ; the Thomistic Church of South India dates it's existence from his efforts there, where he built a church with his own hands, noted by the rafter he clutches; and is said to have died of a spear wound.
- ♦ JUDAS: The black of night when Judas planned the betrayal in the Garden with the "High" Priest; hanging himself; red is the blood of Christ; and coins, the money for betrayal.

We, the family and members of the Homosassa FUMC, say <u>THANK YOU</u> to the Rittgers and Spearys for these gorgeous and unique wall hangings. They certainly brighten the walls and will make us more aware of our Bible as time goes on.

Walking on the Path

"Bear one another's burdens, and thus fulfill the law of Christ."

Galatians 6:2

As I walked one morning this week, I noticed a huge red ant colony. I know they are mean little creatures, but I was intrigued by the size of the great concave circle they were constructing around the hole, so I moved close to see them better. I must have stood there for ten minutes, and it was fascinating.

The hole in the middle was not very large, but big enough for at least two or three ants to go and come at the same time. An ant would go into the hole, come out carrying a grain of sand, carefully take it way out to the edge of the circle, put it down, and hurry back to the hole, passing others along the way who were also carrying grains of sand. This went on without interruption the entire time I watched. Down to the hole, back with the grain of sand.

Then I noticed something out of the ordinary. An ant came out struggling with a huge piece - at least huge for him - of sand. Over and over he balanced it and then dropped it. Suddenly one ant on his way back to the hole "noticed" the dilemma of his fellow ant and went to his aid. Together they picked up the "boulder" and moved it to the rim of the circle, deposited their load, and quickly returned to their original pattern of going and coming.

These little red beasts of burden began to preach to me. How often do I see someone going about some mundane task, even as I am going about my own mundane tasks, and not notice that they struggle under the weight of the load? I ignore their plight because I'm busy.

We may not need to carry loads of sand, but we can encourage one another by our words, our smiles, our approval of jobs well done, our assistance when we recognize another who is struggling under any load too great for him/her to carry. Paul's admonition above falls right in the middle of his reminder that all of us struggle, but we should not be so focused on our own work that we overlook the needs of others.

Prayer: Father, remind us as we go about the business of new ministries in our wonderful new facility, to bear another's burdens by both words and actions, no matter how busy we are with our own work. Amen.

Good Friday Observance Prayer Labyrinth



The primary role of the Residential Child Care Specialists/Houseparents (RCCS) is to oversee the day to day care and supervision of the children assigned to their cottage. The residential Child Care Specialists/Houseparents are responsible for monitoring all the aspects of daily cottage life and is, in essence, the primary caring person for the child/youth during his/her stay at the Florida United Methodist Children's Home. The Houseparents will be a couple bound in the traditional legal relationship of marriage. They are looking for couples with moral character who are strongly committed to making a significant contribution to young people."

A Predictable Future in Uncertain Times

Brad and Louise were tired of all the wild swings in the stock market and decided to do something about it. They wanted to create predictability in an unpredictable world. After one night at a hotel in Athens, you will only unpack one more time—in your cabin aboard the mv Cristal.

I have traveled with Educational Opportunities Tours of Lakeland, FL, many times since 1986 and, in my opinion, they do Bible Lands Tours as well as any and better than most. EOT has chartered a 1200 passenger ship to offer a fabulous cruise through the lands of the Bible which will feature key sites pertinent to both the Old and New Testaments.

Here are some details:

Nov. 11-Fly from Tampa to NYC and on to Athens, Greece.

Nov. 12-Tour Athens, including the Acropolis, the Parthenon, Mars Hill, and more.

Nov. 13–Tour Corinth before boarding the cruise ship.

Nov. 14-A day at sea, enjoying the ship's amenities.

Nov. 15-Tour Cairo, the Egypt Museum, and the Pyramids of Giza.

Nov. 16–Tour Jerusalem, including the Upper Room, the House of Caiaphas, the Mount of Olives, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Pool of Bethsaida, the Via Dolorosa, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the Western Wall, and more.

Nov. 17–Tour Bethlehem, including the Shepherds' Field, the Church of the Nativity, and more.

Nov. 18–Travel to the Galilee and visit the Mount of Beatitudes, Capernaum, and many other sites around the lake that were important in Jesus' ministry.

Nov. 19-A day at sea.



News From Siberia

Meeting the neighbors...One would think after living in a neighborhood or community you would soon meet and get to know the folks around you or at least invited for tea...one would think.

You may also think that since everybody knows there are foreigners "in town" that people would be "stopping by" to meet "them" or even borrow money (it's often one of the most frequent things we get asked for)...one would think.

You would also believe that after being in the area for quite some time, knowing that some folks from the village have had their lives changed in such dramatic ways, there would be an interest as to why there was such a change...one would think.

BUT...this in not the case! We continually lift this area, this village specifically, to the One who changes lives...and still we wait.

It has been a humbling year...we often think there should be huge numbers of people racing to hear The Truth and live free of fear; but our Father allows us "free will," and so we choose. There is still time although we feel a sense of urgency to share as often as possible and wait on Him.

Village Life...We have shared what it's like to live in a village but thought we should share a more personal story of a wonderful lady from the fellowship there.

We'll call her G...she is about 60 years old, has three grown children and 5 or more grandchildren. G works three part-time jobs to put food on her table. Her husband is an invalid and can't work at all. She also has a 40 yr. old son who drinks constantly and lazes around the house all day...he also doesn't work. Along with work, G must also do the "daily" things we take for granted. (There's no running water.) She gets water from the well, heats & cooks on a wood stove. (She must get the wood.) In the summer, there is a huge garden...which helps feed her family...she will spend most waking hours working in the garden for the next 3-4 months. We're certain there's no retirement fund, no extra "fun" money for something special...BUT....you will never hear her complain. She loves the Lord and pulls ALL her strength from the One who gives freely and lovingly. She has been such an incredible encouragement to us...again, it's quite humbling.



Summer in Siberia...summer is an exciting time here. The days are much longer (about 18 hrs. of daylight) so everything gets done during this time. Repairs, remodeling, and, of course, gardens.

Gardens are life here...without them, many would starve during the long winter months. The village is always busy with something. Many folks have cows, pigs, chickens, goats, horses, even a few with turkeys...perhaps many of you can relate to the amount of work needed in making a living this way.

We're also growing a garden and have been spreading manure the last couple of weekends. (A great way to get to meet new people.)

We'll be building two porches this summer and working on our small apartment. We have to figure out why our floor was cold enough to freeze water in a bucket this past winter. We'll also be repairing the fence around the fellowship property and building a new gate...presently, there isn't one and the neighbor's cows like to "wander" around the property.

There will also be the two projects we've mentioned in the past - Windows of Warmth & the Workshop. Work will continue with windows for the needy and at least the floor for the woodshop. We're certain there will be lots more added to the "plate" as the months progress...there's never a loss of work.
