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

# Pastor Mark's Dos

#### "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth."

Easter begins with "Vivit, vivit!"
"He lives, He lives!"

We stand transfixed at the mystery of the resurrection; he who was once dead is alive - walking, speaking, eating with his disciples.

And we celebrate what it all means -death no longer has the last word, hope
has a future bigger than three score
years and ten - or twenty - or thirty.

We shout and sing and breath, "He lives," but it doesn't really impact our lives.

Reichel, the famous conductor, was rehearsing the great Berlin Symphonic Orchestra and Choir, performing Handel's "Messiah."

The lady soloist had just finished the aria, "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth."

Her tones were clear, the enunciation distinct. Technically she was flawless.

But the conductor was dissatisfied. Something was lacking.

He asked, "My dear, do you really know that your redeemer lives?"

"Why, yes," she stammered, "I think I do."

"You think you do? Don't you know it? If you do, sing it as though you were sure of it, and so that eve-

ryone who hears you will know it."

So she sang it again with her whole soul, in an ecstasy of heavenly bliss.

The people around you - do they know that your redeemer lives?

Beautiful beyond the singing of birds, lovelier than the spring time was the soloist's song as her heart and voice were lifted in sheer joy.

Hushed were the vast choir and orchestra, and Reichel, with tears in his eyes, said, "My dear, thank you. You do know that your redeemer lives."

Christ lives. We tell the world that he lives in us as we live out the day-to-day grind, as we allow him to make an impact, to change our lives so what we do shows that we know - "He lives!"



#### ~ History's darkest day and brightest day ~

A professor once asked a young man studying for the ministry what the cross of Christ meant to him. The student said, "Well, the cruel death of God's Son, Jesus, was the most soul-shocking event imaginable. What could have been more heartless and evil than the crucifixion of Christ, the most holy person who ever lived? That had to be the darkest day in human history.

"On the other hand, one has to consider what happened on the Sunday after his death on Friday. It is quite clear from eye-witness accounts that he arose from the dead and was recognized by his friends as the one they had called Lord. The Resurrection was such a soul-stirring and momentous event that the first Easter Sunday had to be the brightest and most joyous day in the history of the world."

When he had finished, the professor said to him, "That is an excellent interpretation of the meaning of the cross. It was indeed a dark and hideous day when Christ was crucified. Yet that cross took on the symbol of salvation and hope when God raised Christ from the dead. Yes, Christians could say it was the brightest day in history."

# Fifth Annual Holy Hilarity Sunday By Pastor Mark Whittaker

It is not very nice to crow about your victory. It is not very sportsmanlike to stand over your opponents and taunt them - in fact, you'll get a penalty in football if you do it.

But it's Christians - saved! The devil has lost! I think we have a right to celebrate!

The Sunday after Easter Sunday - the Sunday after we celebrate the resurrection - is going to be Holy Hilarity Sunday again this year, and we are going to have some fun at the devil's expense.

Holy Hilarity Sunday is a day when we can celebrate with jokes and laughter and joy as we shout to the world that Jesus Christ has won our salvation for us.

It will be a service of jokes, music and a message about the joy of the Lord. We hope that you will come prepared with (clean) jokes or stories that you can share with the rest of the congregation. It is also a great time to invite some of your friends to join you for church so they can see for themselves that Christians are not a bunch of sourpusses.

"Make a Joyful Noise Unto the Lord."

(Holy Hilarity Sunday seems to have a lot of controversy about it's 'appropriateness' in the church. The following is an article that I think should be considered....Editor)

John 1: 43-51

"Let's try reading the story of Jesus' encounter with Nathaniel as though Jesus is laughing. Initially it isn't hard to do, because the story starts with a joke, or a jibe from Nathaniel: 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' We're not sure what the joke is, but perhaps Nazareth was the butt of humor in Jesus' day.

"So there is already some humor in the story of Jesus and Nathaniel, in Nathaniel's quip about Nazareth. Possibly Jesus was responding in kind when he said: 'Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!' – a bit of irony on Jesus' part. After



all, it simply can't be true that there is no deceit in Nathaniel, for none of us are that perfect, and anyway Nathaniel has just made a snide joke at Jesus' expense that he'd probably prefer to keep hidden.

"No one knows the origin of this picture, but it is thought to come from Latin America, and is popular amongst poor communities there. They see in it the laughter of hope. After all, Jesus brought hope to poor and outcast people, and he was mischievous in the ways he did this: eating with sinners, feasting when others were fasting, enjoying life in ways that upset the religious authorities. But despite all this it's unusual to see Jesus depicted as jovial (unless you count some paintings of him as a playful infant).

"Laughter is extremely important to us as human beings, and yet when we emphasize Jesus' humanity we tend to talk about His vulnerable and sad aspects rather than his happy ones.

"This is all the more strange given that laughter is so important to us and has the power to connect us to one another and to transform us. If I take Ben (who is 16 months old) on a train and he starts laughing, the whole carriage laughs – even when people are tired and irritable because the train is running 50 minutes late. Laughter is infectious. I've seen young children burst out laughing when shown this picture of the laughing Jesus, simply because it is a picture of laughter.

"And so we know that Jesus got tired and hungry and thirsty and weepy. But when have you ever heard someone say, 'Jesus was truly human; he knew how to laugh'? Despite the importance of laughter, we hear almost nothing about it in Christian teaching, and sometimes it is forbidden or discouraged."

#### Columbarium to Become Reality

In January 2005 the Church Council named a committee to explore the possibility of establishing a Columbarium—for the permanent storage of cremated remains of church members and families.

After looking at several locations and numerous suppliers, the committee recommended an Eickhof Columbarium to be installed on the east exterior wall of the Worship Center and to be surrounded with a small, fenced Memorial Garden.

The wall-mounted unit will be expandable to eventually hold 216 companion niches, each holding one or two urns, for a maximum of 432 urns. A beautiful bronze cross will be mounted on the wall above the Columbarium. Benches in the Memorial Garden will provide a place for surviving family members and friends to sit, remember, and pray.

Since the proposal was adopted in December, church members have been purchasing niches for future use. In a few instances, families have in their possession the cremated remains of loved ones and are waiting for the Columbarium so that the cremains may be inurned

there. A minimum number of niches have now been sold and the committee will place the order during April. Delivery and installation is expected by late summer, with landscaping to follow.

Dedication of the completed Columbarium (first phase) is expected sometime in mid-fall. So, by the end of this year, the Columbarium will be a reality—our modern counterpart to the ancient tradition of a church burial ground or cemetery.

Niches are still being sold at the pre-construction price of \$1,000. The price includes one or two urns, engraved memorial plates, opening and closing, and perpetual care. The price will increase on June 1, however, due to increases in our costs. The new price will be \$1,200 (\$500 of which will be considered a charitable contribution for federal tax purposes).

A display in the narthex of the Worship Center describes the Columbarium and shows the location. More information and application packets are available at the church office.

#### Charitable Gift Annuities Are Popular

Charitable Gift Annuities seem to be growing in popularity among our church members and friends. Recently several new CGAs have been arranged through the Florida United Methodist Foundation, naming First United Methodist Church Homosassa as beneficiary.

These gifts will provide the donors with very attractive rates of income during the rest of their lives. Then, after their deaths, the remainder of the gifts will be turned over to the church to be used as specified by the donors. Donors also receive a substantial charitable deduction on their federal income tax.

More and more United Methodists are discovering CGAs and realizing that they are an easy way to maximize their income during their lifetimes and a wonderful way to continue their Christian stewardship after their deaths.


Panama is "the canal" for many US tourists and we are going all the way through it—east to west—in 2007. We'll sail from Port Everglades in Ft. Lauderdale on Sunday, April 22, and we'll fly back to Tampa from San Diego on Wednesday, May 9. Inbetween we'll enjoy 15 days on Holland America's ms Volendam, with stops in Colombia, Costa Rica, and Mexico (including Acapulco). Our full-day transit of the canal will be on April 26 (6 am-7 pm).

We will disembark in San Diego and spend two days enjoying the sights in that Southern California city. We'll spend two nights at the Holliday Inn on the Bay before returning home. Myrna and I will be leading this cruise/tour, and we invite you to join us. I'm working through Tally-Ho Vacations in Inverness, who will handle arrangements and registrations for us. Others are welcome, too, so invite your friends to join you.


Because this is a "repositioning" cruise (moving the ship from Florida to Vancouver in preparation for summer cruises to Alaska), the rates are good. And our San Diego "add-on" is quite reasonable. Here are prices for the whole cruise/tour package (including bus to Ft. Lauderdale, the flight from San Diego to Tampa, and the two days in San Diego):

Inside cabin (Cat. K)-\$2,843; Several Ocean view categories (E, DD, DA, D, C)-\$3,363 through \$3,603; Verandah cabin (Cat. B)-\$4743. Prices are double occupancy; single available at extra cost. Additional expenses will include trip insurance, gratuities, 4 lunches, 1 dinner, plus whatever shore excursions you may select.

Flyers are available at the church office. Register early for the best selection of cabins and the best prices. A deposit of \$950 with Tally-Ho will secure your reservation, the balance payable by February 1, 2007.

Every teen also receives his/her own copy of the best selling Bible in the country: The Revolve Bible.

Do you remember when you were in school and you HAD to read the classics in order to get a good mark?

Now is the time for you to read one of those "classics" found in your church library at your leisure and really ENJOY the story.

Two favorite novels in one beautifully bound book entitled "Bronte Sisters" are "Wuthering Heights" by Emily Bronte - the haunting love story of Heathcliff and Cathy, and "Jane Eyre" by Charlotte Bronte.

Also two favorite novels in one book by A. J. Cronin are "The Citadel" and "Keys of the Kingdom".

Another book in this category is a collection of Charles Dickens' novels.

Dickens is considered by many to be the greatest of all English novelists.

Four of his best and successful books are as follow:

1. "Oliver Twist", set in London's Victorian underworld where we meet the orphan Oliver, Viper Fagan, Bill Sykes and the Artful Dodger, some of the most memorable characters in all literature.

- 2. "A Tale of Two Cities" is a great novel of the French Revolution, a time of terror and treason when a starving people rose up in fury at a corrupt and decaying regime. Charles Darnay and Sidney Carton tell the human story within the Revolution.
- 3. "Great Expectations" the story of Pip and the mysterious fortune that falls in his lap. It is filled with memories of childhood fairytales with a twist both comic and tragic.
- 4. "A Christmas Carol," the most beloved story with characters of Ebenezer Scrooge, Tiny Tim, Bob Cratchit and the Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present and Future.

Some other titles that may stir memories are "Lorna Doone," a romance of Exmoor, by R. D. Blackmore; "Dragon Seed" by Pearl Buck; "Pride and Prejudice" by Jane Austin, and the following by Mark Twain: "Adventures of Tom Sawyer'" "Life on the Mississippi," "Prince and the Pauper" and "Celebrated Jumpin' Frogs and other Stories."

We can remember Jesus easily when reading Max Lucado's books such as "When Christ Comes," "Next Door Savior" and "The Final Week of Jesus." We have at least ten books by this prolific writer.

And for the here and now, we have some new offerings.

"Peace Like a River" by Leif Enger is a story of 11year old Reuben Land, an asthmatic boy in the Midwest who has reason to believe in miracles. He finds himself, along with his sister and father, on a crosscountry search for his outlaw older brother who has been controversially charged with murder. The end of their journey shows how family, love and faith can stand up to the most terrifying of enemies, the most tragic of fates.

"Love's Haven" by **Catherine Palmer tells of** romance and inner struggles of the heart. Brock Burnett had been her husband's best friend. Now Mara blamed the reformed playboy for her husband's death. Brock asked her to marry him, an opportunity to give her baby a life of privilege instead of the abject poverty Mara remembered from her childhood. But at what cost? Though Mara feared forsaking her late husband's memory, she knew that for her baby, the future was everything.



# HENRYS' MINISTRY HAS MANY BLESSINGS AND STRUGGLES

The Joe Henry family we help support in Chiang Mai, Thailand, is kept very busy by its missionary outreach according to the family's March prayer bulletin.

For the first time, Joe taught a Bible lesson in the Thai language. He said it took about six hours of preparation to present 20 minutes of material and the group "was very gracious with tips and encouragement."

They reported that Elaine was invited by the cell group leader's wife to do visitations with people from the church. This is an exciting ministry and will give Elaine an opportunity to increase her language skills.

Elaine also has been invited to attend a teachers' workshop in Korea during June. They pointed out that many Korean families are "pouring into the mission field and this will be a unique opportunity for missionary educators throughout Asia to more fully understand how best to minister to Korean families and children."

The Henrys are very thankful that Elaine has received the assistance of a full time aide who "can assist with the mountains of paperwork."

Their youngest son, Jamie, is "thriving at the Thai-English Kindergarten he is attending."

They write that the teachers and their friends "rave" about his skills with the Thai language. He also is enjoying English and math and, in August, will attend Grace International School with the rest of the family.

In their prayer requests they ask that we:

Continue to pray for Joe's "rapid language development" as he leads the cell's Bible study and will also begin in April teaching three-hour sessions in their church's Bible school.

Pray for Elaine's second grade class where almost two-thirds of the students are studying English as the second language. Also there are several students whose behavior is poor to the point of being disrespectful.

Pray for Brittany, Judith and Caleb as they seek to balance their social life with academics. The parents wrote that having so many friends in such a big school is a new experience for them.

Thailand's political situation is uncertain. The prime minister, who is from the Chiang Mai province, is under pressure to quit. He dissolved parliament and called for "snap" elections in early April. The opposition is getting more frustrated. They ask that we pray for a peaceful solution to the problem.

# GROUP ASKS: IF JESUS WERE TO RETURN TODAY WOULD PEOPLE ACCEPT HIM?

The Kevin Woosters, the missionary family our church helps support in Moscow, Russia, were asked in their Bible-study class recently, "If Jesus were to return today would the people accept him?"

The Woosters wrote, "Of course we gave the answer that Jesus is going to return, but it does make you think. We should all have a sense of urgency as we go about our lives that Jesus is returning. What are we sharing with those around us who do not know about his imminent return?"

The family received the good news that their oldest son, Joshua, has been accepted at Messiah College in Grantham, PA. He has been successful academically and has been developing a video presentation of his basketball skills in hopes of obtaining a scholarship.

Their youngest son, Corey, has been fighting the flu. A couple of relapses set him back, but he is on the mend. They do ask for our prayers that

he stays healthy and has no more problems.

Kevin has been working with church leaders in the field to determine if a new area should be opened in Siberia. He wrote the process begins with a survey trip to the area to access the needs of the community. Continuing he said, "We look at what programs are in the area and how they are operating. If there is a group there are they reaching out to the area? Is the group grace oriented in its teaching? Are the people being discipled?

"We also are beginning to evaluate which languages are spoken in the region to determine if Russian can be used or will there be a need to learn the local language to better reach the people."

Kevin added that once the decision is made to go into a new area a strategy is developed in conjunction with the interested families and individual missionaries who will be involved in the program. Presently they are assessing under what visas they will operate.

Previously they used Community Development visas, but with new laws coming out they may attempt to obtain Temporary Residency permits which would let them stay in the country for three years.

Kevin stated that the process for developing a strategy to reach an area is one in which demographics, language, giftings of team members, and many other things are considered before the initial work can proceed.

Kevin and Laura will attend an International Leadership Conference in Chiang Mai, Thailand, in April from the 23<sup>rd</sup> through the 28<sup>th</sup>.

The Pioneer organization noted, "Due to our varied works and geographic distance between us, we need to regularly and purposely develop our sense of unity.

"The 2006 ILC will be the 5<sup>th</sup> gathering of this nature, a unique event for PI's leaders and key partners to connect personally, grow spiritually, develop professionally, and engage in key issues."

#### <u>UMW READING PROGRAM</u> UNDERWAY


The new selections for the 2006 United Methodist Women reading program have been processed and are located in the shelves in the Library office to the right of the gray file cabinet.


