
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Lepers Amongst Us

Who are the "lepers" among us today?

In a gospel reading for February from the book of Mark, Jesus heals a man with leprosy.

At the time, leprosy was almost any kind of skin disease, like psoriasis or ringworm, as well as Hansen's disease that eats away at your fingers and toes until it kills you.

Lepers in the time of Jesus were considered unclean. They were excluded from society because they might infect people.

Unclean also meant that they were cut off from worship and making sacrifice. They were avoided, feared, disenfranchised and ignored.

So who ARE the "lepers" today? Whom do we avoid because we are afraid of what they have? Who frightens us so we cut

them off from society? Whom do we ignore?

The number of people and groups is staggering. Among them are the people sick with A.I.D.S. or herpes or S.T.D's, the groups who are "different", the people who are foolish enough to be poor, the one who "got caught" doing what the rest of us get away with doing.

We ignore the "lepers" who live in the woods and cars and under bridges.

We avoid those who are dying from diseases like lung cancer and liver failure and hardening of the arteries because we are afraid we might get infected somehow.

But then Jesus steps in. He doesn't lecture or moralize or reprimand. He doesn't say "I told you so" or ignore the problem and hope that it will go away.

No, Jesus touched it. He reached out and touched the untouchable. The clean caressed the unclean, the holy lifting up the unholy and making it whole again.

And isn't that what we also have been called to do - to follow our Lord's example?

Have we not been called to reach out to the "lepers" of our world and love them and forgive them and heal them?

Are we not called to reach out to the worst of our world and bring them into a place of belonging?

How do we do this? We do it the same way Jesus did, with a will and a word and a touch.

Let's be the people we say we are and bring healing to a "leper" in our lives.

Let's touch a life and make a difference so that the world will see - not just hear - that we are followers of the God of all people, even lepers.

MAKE TIME TO READ!

"Make time to read" is a resolution that you won't want to break, especially with the fine assortment of subjects you'll find in the books in your Church Library. Consider the following:

1. "The Grace Awakening Devotional" by Charles R. Swindoll.

He also wrote the classic book, "The Grace Awakening" in 1990. Now, in a monthlong spiritual journey, you'll explore the newfound freedom of God's grace in your life. By committing to this 30-day wallk, you'll experience a liberating breath of the sweet air of God's grace. A small book with a giant message.

2. "Christ Among Other Gods" by Edwin W. Lutzer - a defense of Christ in an Age of Tolerance.

It is recommended for every concerned Christian who desires to know how to defend his/her faith in an increasisngly pluralistic and tolerant culture and also recommended for non-Christians who wish to understand WHY the Christian faith is different.

3. "Every Storm", a stunning World War II romance by popular author Lori Wick.

The story tells of Lorri who is stranded alone on a South Pacific island after a plane crash until a PT boat, captained by Lt. Donovan Riggs, lands for repairs. But their encounter is just the beginning of something much more.

4. A.D. Chronicles by Bodie & Brock Thoene (pronounced Tay-nee) continue.

Book Three is "Third Watch" where you'll meet Jesus' first followers and join them on their journey to Yeshua. Book Four is "Fourth Dawn". As Herod plunges deeper into madness, where is the liberator who will set the world right? Travel back in time to first century A.D. for one of the most thrilling and significant stories you'll ever read as young Mary of Nazareth receives an unusual visitor who gives her a message that will impact Judea and change the world for eternity.

5. "The Maker's Diet" by Jordan S. Rubin.
He writes of the 40-day health experience that will change your life forever. Biblically based and scientifically proven, the Maker's Diet uses a truly holistic approach to health.

6. "The List" by Robert Whitlow.

Somewhere between the style of Frank Peretti and John Grisham lies the style of lawyer-turned-novelist Robert Whitlow. Renny Jacobson, fresh out of law school and stunned by his father's sudden death, is left only the contents of a deposit box and interest in an unknown company, the Covenant List of South Carolina, Ltd.

When he meets the members of "The List" and discovers the staggering value of his father's mysterious bequest, he starts to feel the supernatural powers of the 140-year-old covenant. When his life starts to unravel, he's forced to face the truth about "The List" and nothing short of a miracle will save him from its grasp.

7. In a different vein, Robert Whitlow wrote "Jimmy".

Jimmy Mitchell knows he's different from the other teen-agers in the little town of Piney Grove, Georgia. He's what people call "slow." But Jimmy sees and hears a lot, even the occasional "Watcher" (his mama calls them angels), and he can remember what he sees and hears with uncanny accuracy. This is why his lawyer/father asks him to testify as a defense witness in a criminal trial. Whitlow employs the limited viewpoint of an innocent child to illuminate complex human motives and often overlooked spiritual realities.

8. "Redeeming Love" by Francine Rivers is a powerful retelling of the book of Hosea.

This is a life-changing story of God's all-powerful love. The characters are Michael Hosea and Angel, the girl God calls him to marry. It's set in California gold country in the 1850's. Angel fights Michael's tenderness tooth and nail. Will she let God heal her shattered heart?

9. "A Reason for Hope" by Michael S. Barry, Chaplain of Cancer Treatment Centers of America.

This is a book about taking control of your cancer rather than being controlled by it. The author has an insider's understanding of the cancer patient's need for a reason to hope.

10. "The Regime" by Tim LaHaye and Jerry B. Jenkins.

This is the latest book in the Left Behind series. For readers who are following this story, there are many questions to be answered concerning Rayford Steele and his family, Cameron Williams and Nicolae Carpathia.

The Columbarium—A New Service for Church Members

The Church Council has approved the establishment of a Columbarium as a repository for cremated remains of church members and their families. The cabinet of 108 sealed niches with granite fronts will be erected against the east exterior wall of the Worship Center—facing the new parking area. Each niche will accommodate up to two urns. Future expansion will bring the total to 216 niches (and up to 432 urns).

The Columbarium will be surrounded by a landscaped and fenced garden area—an ideal setting for meditation and prayer. A large bronze cross will be placed on the wall of the church, above the wall cabinet. The Columbarium will be a modern counterpart to the old church burial ground and is an appropriate final "resting place" for faithful followers of Christ and members of His Church.

Members of FUMCH may purchase niche spaces and reserve them until their time of need. The pre-construction price for each

niche is \$1,000—inclusive of either one or two bronze urns (made specifically for these niches) and one or two engraved bronze nameplates that will be attached to the granite front of the niche. There will be no additional charges beyond the original purchase price.

We need to sell at least 35 niches, at the preconstruction price, before we have sufficient funds to place our order. As of early January, we have sold slightly less than half that number. The committee is anxious to proceed so that we may complete the installation of the Columbarium and the Memorial Garden during 2006. If you've been thinking about it and have not yet decided, now is the time! Pick up an Application Packet from the church office and take advantage of the pre-construction price (which will increase once the Columbarium unit is installed).

Your IRAs—A Tax Timebomb?

Traditional IRA plans have been around for over 20 years, and many people who created them are now facing the consequences. Some people who had the foresight to invest in IRAs for retirement were also successful in other areas of financial planning and, now that they are retired, they may not need the money.

However, Internal Revenue rules state that, whether the money is needed or not, owners must begin taking minimum annual distributions by age 70 ½. Since every dollar contributed to IRAs was tax-free, every dollar that comes out is fully taxed. So, for some, unneeded income results in unwanted taxes.

In order to minimize the problem, many people choose to take the smallest distribution possible from their IRAs. But this strategy often results in the IRA becoming part of the owner's estate and with a significant tax burden being passed to his/her heirs.

So here's an idea! During your lifetime, why not plan ahead to avoid unwanted taxes by designating your church as the beneficiary of the remainder of your IRA? You will want to check with your financial advisor, but you may find that the resulting charitable deduction will equal the income from the IRA distribution.

As a result of this plan, there will be no tax "shrinkage" on your IRA and 100 cents on each dollar will help extend the ministry and mission of First United Methodist Church, Homosassa. You can designate how you would like your gift to be used, if you wish. And your gift will qualify you for membership in our 5th Dimensions Society, along with others who have arranged planned and deferred gifts to the church. God often teaches me things through our granddaughter Elizabeth. While she was here recently, she complained about a sore finger. Though I looked closely, I couldn't find a thing. She kept coming back, and finally her eyes filled with tears as she asked me to *please* do something about her aching finger.

I looked again—this time with the advantage of glasses, magnifying glass, and the bright morning sunshine. The good light and two sets of magnification revealed the tiniest of black spots right at the edge of her nail. A very small splinter! We knelt in the sunlight at the window, and, with the help of a sterilized needle, began the painful process of removing the splinter. God not only helped me remove the source of her pain but talked to me about what I had found.

In Romans 12, Paul tells us that we, as believers, are the visible "body of Christ." This means, of course, that what impacts one of us impacts the whole body. I understand that concept when it comes to sharing someone else's grief or feeling the joy of others when they hear good news. But, God reminded me, do I realize that if sin has entered my life—even the tiniest little splinter of sin— it can cause great pain in the whole body? Do I remember my life must be placed in the bright sunlight of His Word, with the magnification of the Holy Spirit's insight to find where and what the sin is so I can confess it and He can remove it? Is the whole body of Christ at Homosassa United Methodist Church rendered less effective than it could be because of a "splinter of sin" in my life?

Prayer: Father, I don't want—we don't want—anything in life to hinder Your good work through our church—Your Church. Shine Your bright light of revelation on each of us, and if You find any splinters—large or small—cause us to come to You to remove them through our confession and Your forgiveness. Make us a pure church so that You can minister to the dying world around us through a church unencumbered by our sin. Amen.

Thank you so much for sharing your good holiday cheer with all of us.



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HENRYS HAVE BUSY CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY

The Joe Henry missionary family we help in Chiang Mai, Thailand, wrote they expected to have a quiet Christmas week, but found that "God had different plans."

In the monthly prayer bulletin they said:

DEC. 24 – Attended their Thai cell group's Christmas party, which included several non-believing neighbors; saw the generosity of leaders, Ogot and Di who "made the difficult decision" to buy small gifts for their friends' children and the orphans who they would be visiting on Christmas day instead of buying gifts for their own children.



DEC.25 – After a "great morning of fellowship and worship" visited an orphanage with members of the Chiang Mai Baptist Church.

At the orphanage they sang songs, played games and shared the children's Christmas play.



They returned home at 4 p.m. to open the family's gifts.



DEC. 26 & 27 – Met on two occasions with Ogot and Di and their families including once for Joe's birthday.

The two couples feel the Lord may be guiding them to work together on a new church birthed out of the Chiang Mai Church where they attend. The pastor, who has been mentoring Ogot for two years, recommended the two couples pray about this.

DEC. 28 – Joe and Elaine were asked to have lunch with Pastor Tawaat and his wife. The Henrys did not realize the main purpose was to determine their language skills. After they did well, he asked Joe to work at CMBC's Bible school this summer when another missionary goes on furlough. Joe views it as a wonderful opportunity to study the Thai Scriptures and to learn to share the Gospel in a culturally relevant way.

DEC. 29 – Joe, Pastor Tawaat, Ogot, and two other men visited a small church connected to CMBC. It was located in a tribal area two hours north of Chiang Mai. Joe wrote it was a great opportunity to see God working in a small Thai village and to observe a rural church-planting ministry.

The couple wrote, "Please pray with us that we will allow these opportunities to correctly shape our future service for the Lord. We are excited that He is opening so many doors for us to serve here in Chiang Mai."

They also noted that after a few lean months their mission financial account "is in the red for about \$1300."

Also later in the month they are scheduled to attend a week-long conference cosing \$1000, but probably will not attend because their account is already negative. They ask that we join them in praying about their finances.

WOOSTERS FIND MOSCOW COLD AND SNOWY


The Kevin Wooster missionaries we help in Moscow, Russia, report that winter weather has arrived with 15 degree weather, plenty of snow and few sunny days.



They slept on cots with foam mattresses and noted that the devastation was beyond belief. (*Photos by Pastor Mark*)




