

# A Hand Reaching Out to Mississippi

The area of Hancock County in Mississippi was devastated by hurricane Katrina on August 29, 2005, and they are nowhere near recovered from the blow.

It has been a terrible fall and winter with nothing but destruction and ruin all around. It is almost numbing to have to live among the debris. It is hard to get up each day and go back into the fight, yet there are bright spots of hope.

People from all over the country have been coming in almost overwhelming numbers to help with the relief and recovery efforts in Mississippi, Louisiana, and Alabama.

They are there to share the love of God with the people who have been badly hurt by the forces of nature. One of the biggest problem the communities affected have is how to take care of all the people who want to come and help.

Working with three other United Methodist churches in Citrus County we will be going to Bay Saint Louis in Hancock County January 9-14 of this year.

We are going to be working out of Main Street U.M.C. and will be engaged in reconstruction and repair of the houses that are still standing in that city.

Over half of the houses were destroyed but the church is still there, and they have an active and ongoing ministry to the people who are struggling to bring their community back to life after the storm.

Part of your support to the Hurricane Fund will be used to meet the needs of the people where they are right now. We don't want to send them clean up supplies when what they need are dry wall and shingles.

We are going to be in communication with them so we can provide the support and help that they need the most when we get there.

This will be a very long recovery process, but with your prayers and continued support we will be a part of the solution.

Thank you for your support and your prayers.

If you are interested in going on a future trip to help with the recovery process, please let the pastor know and we will begin planning for the next trip.

# Panama Canal Cruise April, 2007

In early March 2006, twenty-two members and friends of FUMCH will depart for an informative and inspirational cruise/tour from Greece to Italy ending in Nice, on the French Riviera.

Rev. Ernie Dorrell and I are tour hosts for this exciting trip. When I retired for the second time (two years ago), I agreed to plan and lead one major international trip for church members and friends each year.

I have been in touch with the Holland America Cruise Line about a Panama Trans-Canal Cruise during April 2007.

Each spring the major cruise lines reposition some of their ships from the Caribbean to Seattle or Vancouver in preparation for summer cruises to Alaska. The pricing on many of these "repositioning" cruises is quite competitive.

I am proposing a cruise from Florida (probably departing from Ft. Lauderdale)

through the Panama Canal, with ports-of-call along the coast of western Mexico and California and ending either in Seattle WA or Vancouver BC.

Although brochures and pricing will not be ready for several more months, I think we can expect that cabins will start between \$2,500 and \$3,000 (between 18 and 21 days, depending on the itinerary.)

Those who are interested should to be ready to register as soon as HAL begins taking reservations— sometime in the spring of 2006.

Imagine—2 ½ to 3 weeks of relaxing vacationing to such interesting places, and only unpacking once!

I'm really looking forward to it. I hope you will too! And I'll keep you posted as our plans continue.

# Fifth Dimension Society Honors Church Members By Rev. Richard Evans

The 5th Dimension Society continues to honor the members and friends who have made "planned gifts" to First United Methodist Church, Homosassa.

Since planned gifts are so vital to the future of FUMCH, the society symbolizes the importance the church places on this kind of commitment.

The 5<sup>th</sup> Dimension Society is one way the church can say "thank you" to such foresighted and generous people.

As I consider Christian stewardship, I think of five dimensions.

The 1<sup>st</sup> Dimension consists of the contributions made in response to a variety of appeals from both within and beyond the church. Many Christians give generously to such appeals.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Dimension is goal-driven giving in response to a stated goal, such as the amount needed to operate the church in a given year and the amount needed to build new buildings over several years. Many Christians "stretch" their giving in response to such goals.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Dimension is proportional giving—setting a goal to give a certain percentage of our income. Many Christians have worked their way up to the Biblical tithe (10%) or beyond.

The 4<sup>th</sup> Dimension moves us beyond our annual income to our accumulated assets as a source of our giving. Some members have given real estate, stocks, and bonds (often highly appreciated and with significant tax advantages).

The 5<sup>th</sup> Dimension goes one step further and consists of using accumulated assets to fund planned or deferred gifts—gifts that make it possible for our Christian stewardship to continue for years to come.

Membership in the 5<sup>th</sup> Dimension Society is open to all members and friends of FUMCH, and the following kinds of gifts qualify for membership:

- 1. A Will directing a portion of your estate to FUMCH.
- 2. A Trust arrangement naming FUMCH as a beneficiary.
- 3. A Life Insurance Policy naming FUMCH as a beneficiary.
- 4. A Charitable Gift Annuity naming FUMCH as a beneficiary.
- 5. A Gift of Property, with retained life interest, to FUMCH.
- 6. A portion of an *IRA* or other *Retirement Plan*, naming FUMCH as a beneficiary.

#### It's a New Year and we are featuring new books but - the best books are those that never grow old. By Helen Lefave

Featured this month is author Karen Kingsbury, one of America's favorite inspirational storytellers, best known for her life-changing fiction.

She has written more than 30 gripping novels. Her books have helped readers with their own lives and problems.

"A Kingsbury Collection" encompasses three pageturning novels in one "Where Yesterday Lives",
"When Joy Came to Stay"
and "On Every Side".

A separate novel is "Fame" . The subject is that sometimes living a dream costs everything.

"The Unseen Essential" by James P. Gills, M.D. is a story for our troubled times.

Michael Nostasis is handsome, brilliant, successful. He "has it all" until the night that marks the pinnacle of his career. Life sets him on a course that will change him forever.

This is a contemporary novel about one man's poignant, face-to-face encounter with himself and ultimately with God.

On the National Best Seller List is another great storyteller, Adriana Trigiani. The first of three books that we've acquired is "Big Stone Gap", a Southern novel that is chock full of engaging oddball characters and unexpected plot twists.

The tiny town of Big Stone Gap is nestled in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia and is home to some of the most charming eccentrics in the state.

This is followed by Book two, "Big Cherry Holler", eight years later and covers unexpected events that are funny and yet deeply poignant.

The main character in all the books is Ave Maria Mulligan, and and Book Three, "Milk Glass Moon" continues to follow her life.

"Balzac and the Little Chinese Seamstress" by Dai Sijie, is a funny, touching, sly and delightful novel about the magic of reading.

Two city boys are exiled to a remote mountain village for re-education during China's infamous Cultural Revolution. There they meet the daughter of the local tailor and discover a hidden stash of Western classics in Chinese translation.

Between flirting with the seamstress and secretly devouring these banned works, they find outside their grim surroundings worlds they never imagined.

"Off the Mangrove Coast" is a collection of classic adventure tales by Louis L'Amour who is an American legend and master storyteller.

The hallmark of his fiction is relentless suspense, breath-taking danger and riveting characters.

These nine stories take you from the jungles of Borneo to hidden canyons of the American West, from a Parisian cafe at the end of World War II to the South China Sea.

These books will be on the display shelves to the right of the door when entering the Library.

The Library is closed on Saturday and Sunday afternoon.

Besides our books of fiction, there are biographies, devotional books, magazines that you can take home and return, humor and reference material.

Last week, I forgot the light and opened the door to let him out. He paused on the stoop, unsure of the darkness. I realized what I had done but waited to see if he would go to the yard. The reflection of the room was apparent in the door's glass, but I couldn't see the yard. That's when I heard in my head, "Now we see through a glass darkly."

I turned on the light, his familiar back yard became clear to both of us, and he was free to go. As I stood there, I thought how much people are like our little Cisco. If we cannot see where we are going, we are hesitant to take a step toward what is "out there."

I believe that Paul is talking in the above verse about the eternal unknowns, but couldn't it also apply to the New Year? We're unsure about many things, but we should take great comfort in knowing that as we step into the future—eternal or 2006—God will be there and will turn the light on so we can see.

Prayer: Father, how foolish we are to want to understand what tomorrow holds. Keep us from fear of the unknown. Remind us that you will take care of tomorrow. We trust you to turn on the light as we step into the unknowns and to be there to walk through them with us. Amen


#### **Patience Nave**





#### HENRYS REPORT BLESSINGS FLOW AT MOUNTAINTOP CAMP RETREAT

The Joe Henry missionary family we help support in Chiang Mai, Thailand, reports in their latest newsletter that it was a "privilege" to join a three-day camp retreat sponsored by the Chiang Mai Baptist Church last October. The campsite was located on Doi Inthanon, Thailand's tallest mountain about two hours south of the Henry's home.

They wrote, "The event, titled "One Spirit," brought together almost 50 adults and children for worship, fellowship and Bible study. The most exciting event was a river baptism that included our first language teacher and her husband along with two of Brittany's good friends, the daughter and niece of one of Elaine's other language teachers. What a joy it was to see these new brothers and sisters publicly proclaim their love for our Lord!"

Other highlights reported by the Henrys included: two sessions of games that had everyone rolling in laughter; a bonfire gathering rich in fellowship; Bible study times that were edifying, especially when we could understand what was being said; special times of worship where we praised God in song and prayer as a group; a farewell trip to the top of the mountain, about 8,465 feet above sea level. Even though it was fogged in and raining, it was nice to be in 55-degree weather for a few minutes. Caleb and Jamie enjoyed playing with their new friends and being able to run around like maniacs for several days! All of us made friends for life on this retreat.

The Henrys plan to do more speaking in the Thai language in their home setting and ask for our prayers for this to help their "speaking and comprehensive skills."

They also asked prayers for more regular financial donors as their support is at 90% and their account has "slipped back into negative territory."

#### WOOSTERS EXPRESS THANKS FOR OUR CHURCH'S SUPPORT

In a recent E-Mail the Kevin Wooster missionary family writes, "A new year brings new beginnings and projects.
2006 will be no exception. However, we could not have been able to continue the work here in Moscow if it wasn't for such faithful 'co-workers' as First United Methodist Church of Homosassa."

They stated, "As we look back over our partnership together, we are in awe. Our oldest son Joshua was in 1<sup>st</sup> grade when we shared a vision of where we were heading. This year he is in the 12<sup>th</sup> grade and we are still following the vision placed in our lives so many years ago. Over the years we have gone from being a part of one work in one city (Ulan Ude, Siberia) to now being part of works throughout Russia and Siberia."

Continuing, they said they have seen their "works grow in both number and depth of knowledge. The latest work has been started here in Moscow where we have been able to have an outreach with a local high school. Even though this is a new program we are already seeing fruit."

They noted the first snow has arrived making "everything pretty and white" and "it is not cold unless the wind is blowing."

They ask that we pray for Joshua as he decides on what college to attend and "all the other changes that await him during his final year in high school."




