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

"The DaVinci Code"

This month the movie based on the novel "The DaVinci Code" is in the theaters. It will cause a great excitement and generate a lot of money because of what it is about – and what it isn't!

It is important to remember when you read the book or if you go to see the movie that it is a work of fiction.

The book begins by saying that what is in the book is based on fact. It isn't – it's all a work of fiction. Yes there are facts. But using facts anyway you want does not make them accurate. If you use facts out of context and interpret them to say what you want, you have facts but they are not factual.

Unfortunately a lot of people are reading the book and assuming that because there are a number of scholarly references, it must be true and they question the church and what they thought they believed.

Those who are

not Christians are pointing to the book as proof that the church was founded on lies. The book would have you believe that the Catholic Church has for centuries been hiding different "gospels" because they didn't want you to know the truth.

There are books that are called the "Lost Gospels" but there is nothing lost about them. They have been know and read for thousands of years. They were not included in the Bible by the early church leaders long before the Catholic Church became "the church."

One of the "Lost Gospels" that was not included in the Bible is the Gospel of Thomas. It tells the story of what Jesus was like when he was a child. In one part he makes birds out of mud and then touches them and they come alive and fly off. In another part he is reprimanded by his parents for getting mad at his friends and killing them with a bolt of power.

Another major

assumption in the book is that Jesus lived through the crucifixion, escaped with Mary Magdalene to France where they raised a family and died of old age. But when you realize that Mary Magdalene was not the daughter of Bill and Sue Magdalene but from the city of Magdala, that Magdalene was her identifying characteristic, then you realize that if she were married to Jesus she would be Mary, wife of Jesus, not Magdalene.

Problems abound in the book with Historians, Leonardo DiVinci students, Art Historians and Biblical Scholars all agreeing that what is said is wrong and misleading.

So it is important that when you discuss this book or the movie with friends that you understand that it is a work of fiction designed to sell books, not educate people to a hidden truth.

The Good News remains the same, God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son that whosoever believed in him would not perish but have everlasting life.

First United Methodist Church Begins New Ministry

FUMC would like to welcome a new ministry known as Parish Nursing.

Heading up this new ministry is a new part-time staff member, Sharon Smith.



Sharon, who is a registered nurse, will oversee the Parish Nursing and Visitation ministries.

She comes to us with an impressive resume and many years of varied experienced in the field of nursing.

You may be wondering what Parish Nursing is all about.

It is a health promotion, disease prevention ministry based on the care of the whole person and encompassing care of the body, mind, and spirit.

Some functions of this ministry include: (1) integrator of faith and health, (2) personal health counselor, (3) health educator, (4) referral agent, (5) trainer of volunteers, (6) developer of support groups, (7) health advocate.

This nursing role does not embrace the medical model of care or invasive practices such as blood drawing, medical treatments, maintenance of intravenous products, or administration of medication. It is a professional model of health ministry using a

registered professional nurse.

The focus of the Parish Nurse Practice is the faith community and its ministry. This ministry is intended to be integrated into the life of the congregation, revitalizing the mission of health an healing of the congregation, with the Parish Nurse being a regular member of the ministerial staff.

The Parish Nurse, in collaboration with the pastoral staff and congregants, participates in the ongoing transformation of the faith community into a source of health and healing. Through partnership with other community health resources, Parish Nursing fosters new and creative responses to health and wellness concerns.

Sharon already has many ideas and plans for this new ministry to become an integral part of our church ministry, particularly in the areas of health education and visitation.

She will be looking for individuals from the congregation with or without medical background, and/or experience to assist her in many ways.

If you feel "called" to this ministry, please leave Sharon a message through the church office.

The Staff Parish Relations Committee is very excited to welcome Sharon and this new ministry to our congregation and the community we serve.

FIFTH SUNDAY OFFERING



Thank you for your gracious gift on April 30, 2006. You give this ministry a vote of confidence each time you support our efforts to help troubled children, youth, and families.

I was recently reminded that our church has many new members who may not know about this Florida Methodist Ministry. This beautiful 100-acre campus is located on Lake Monroe, in Enterprise, Florida, near Deltona.

The campus is a beautiful spot with huge oak trees, lovely brick buildings, and eleven cottages for the children to be housed. Each cottage has about eight residents and their cottage parents. No more than two residents share a room. Meals are prepared by members of the cottage as a "family" group. Menus are supervised by a dietician to ensure that a wholesome balanced diet is available. Residents share chores in the cottages and are responsible for their own rooms.

The children come because of sexual abuse, other physical abuse, abandonment, or

drug abuse, illness, or death of a parent. There may be neglect, or conflicts that have made impossible a normal family life. A majority of referrals now come from family, schools, courts, or other agencies. Each child is evaluated to see if the program of the Home can be of help.

The resident's ages range from 5 to 18, and are enrolled in local public schools from kindergarten through high school or junior college. A highly trained educator, who is a staff member, evaluates each incoming resident to make the proper placement in school. Tutoring is available to help each student. Cottage study time is a regular part of each day.

Each year, on average, about 85% of their total funding comes from private sources. Strong church support through our Fifth Sunday Giving enables the program of the Home to maintain its ministry as a Christian outreach of our commitment to children.

With the Enterprise campus as a focal point of activity, the Home assists children living in other facilities, in independent living and those in vocational programs and institutions of higher learning.

Now you can see why I am so proud of this ministry!

ANNUAL CONFERENCE OFFERING

Bishop Tim Whitaker has announced the Annual Conference Offering to be received during the "Witness With Power" 2006 Florida Annual Conference, June 1-3.

The offering highlights the global connection of The United Methodist Church, particularly Florida's connection with Angola and Latin America.

Sixty percent of this offering will strengthen the ministries of the East Angola Conference and the partnership between our two conferences. The Angola Conference continues to recover after 28 years of civil war. We have already helped to rebuild former missionary buildings in the country including the "Mother" church of Angola.

Thirty percent will be given to the "Encounter with Christ in Latin America and the Caribbean." This fund was established in 1992 to help the church in the Caribbean and Latin America deal with political turmoil. It will supply financial support for the mission outreach of the evangelical Methodist churches in the region.

Ten percent will be invested in Florida's children through the Council of Bishop's Initiative on Children and Poverty and the Florida Conference Children's Harvest. This ministry touches over 5,000 atrisk children who receive support for school supplies.

We will be receiving this offering in May just before Annual Conference. Please keep the work alive with your gift to the Annual Conference.

Four Stages of Planned Giving by Richard L. Evans

"Planned Giving" (sometimes called "Deferred Giving") consists of the charitable gifts we arrange from our accumulated assets—to be distributed after our deaths.

Our "planned" gifts to our church (and possibly to some favorite charities) are created while we are in the prime of our lives and are "deferred" until we have been reborn into eternal life.

Any age or any stage of life can be a good time to consider a "planned gift" to your church.

30s and 40s: Wills and estate plans usually are drafted when Christians are in this age range. Some decide to express their gratitude to God by naming their church in a will or living trust for a portion of their estate.

50s and 60s: People looking toward retirement often find that a Charitable Gift Annuity, with payments deferred until retirement, is an attractive complement to their savings. And those who have achieved success in their careers, businesses, or investments often are at an age when Charitable Remainder Trusts are attractive as a way to minimize taxes, maintain a good income for life, and make a substantial gift to their church and some favorite charities.

65 to 75: Retirement years may bring a desire for gift arrangements that provide tax deductions and a steady income that is also partially tax-free. A Charitable Gift Annuity can be just the answer. Those who own real estate or other investments may decide to transfer those assets and create Charitable Remainder Trusts, enabling them to enjoy a good income, tax benefits, and the satisfaction of continuing to be good Christian stewards—long after their deaths.

75 and older: Charitable Gift Annuity payout rates are highest at these ages. Many Christians review their estate plans with thoughts about the next generation and the role of the church in helping to make the world a better place for all God's people. Life insurance policies no longer needed and IRAs and 401Ks may also be assigned to the church.

<u>Columbarium Update</u> by Richard L. Evans

By the time you read this article, we will have placed an order with the Eickhof Company of Crookston MN for our new Columbarium, with installation anticipated for late August or early September.

It will consist of 108 companion niches, each accommodating either one or two urns.

As soon as the wall unit is installed, the Memorial Garden will be landscaped and fenced, creating a beautiful setting for the cremated remains of some of God's faithful.

Recently I stood in St. John's Cathedral in Valetta, on the island of Malta, and looked at the hundreds of crypts under the floor of the church where bodies of the faithful are buried.

I was reminded again of the significance of our Columbarium project and how appropriate it is to create such a place as part of our church.

The Columbarium will be a beautiful place of remembrance and an appropriate burial place for church members and families.

The Columbarium Committee has authorized a price increase, beginning June 1, based on our increasing costs.

The new price will be \$1,200 per niche and will include one or two brass urns, memorial nameplates, opening and closing, and perpetual care of the Columbarium and Memorial Garden.

Niches still may be purchased during the month of May at the preconstruction price of \$1,000.



Does reading these words encourage you to want to teach these children the truths of our faith that will change their lives?

We have classes for middle/high school students, for pre-K through 5.

Would you be willing to substitute in any one of these classes when one of our faithful teachers must be away?

This is a great way to "get your feet wet" and determine if teaching children is the place of ministry God has in mind for you.

If you missed your Holiday Ham, you missed a great deal. Our four pound boneless, Honey Smoked Ham was a big hit.





Evonne Rogers presided as leader of this group for many years before her death in 2005. While she was leader, the following were members: Eleanor Bennett, Betty Bennett, Helen Le-Fave, Ray Short, June Oltendorf & mother.

This group is just one little piece of the fabric of the quilt of FUMC Homosassa. These disciples can be found in the Library every Wednesday morning, 9 am to 10 am.

"HOT" NEWS FROM JOE HENRYS IN CHIANG MAI, THAILAND

The Joe Henry missionary family we assist in Thailand wrote, "Greetings from Chiang Mai where the temperature tops 100 every day because our hearts are on fire for the Lord. We continue to be excited by how the Holy Spirit is shaping our services for Him here and cherish your prayers as we seek to follow His plans for our lives."

They stated that Joe has begun weekly meetings with Ogaat, the Thai man with whom they hope to start a new church early next year.

Elaine's weekly visitation with the women of their "Thai cell group" was said to be a "tremendous encouragement to both sides. She is greatly enjoying being a listening ear and sharing the love of Christ with these precious believers."

Their bulletin reported that because the pastor of the Chiang Mai Baptist Church will be going to the U.S. next month Joe will not be teaching at the church's Bible center until June, for which he is thankful because it will give him more time for language study.

Joe is leading the Bible study at the Thai cell group which numbers about 20 persons. They ask for our prayers for Joe's "clear use of Thai and that the Lord would use this opportunity to reveal more of Himself to the group."

Elaine and Brittany, Justin and Caleb, the three children attending the school where she teaches, will have two weeks off for Songkran, the Thai New Year's celebration. It is the year 2649 in Thailand. They wrote, "It's a blast for the kids because it's basically a city wide, week long, water gun fight, but it has a sad side in that there is a lot of spiritworship activity."

It was pointed out that despite the fact the opposition parties are going to boycott the vote they are going to hold a "snap election." They ask that we continue to pray for an equitable Lord-led solution to the "political woes" there. Some of the superstitions they noted: The prime minister left his home at 9:30 in the morning because it would bring him good luck. He also rode an elephant at a nearby campground "to rid the political process of bad luck."

PLANS BEING MADE FOR CHURCH IN SIBERIA

Kevin Wooster, the missionary we help support in Russia, is meeting with representatives to register a new church in Ulan Ude, Siberia. Kevin and other field leaders are discussing with the men they are training "how to catch a larger vision for Russia and the world."

The Woosters wrote, "In the long run we as foreigners cannot make all the decisions that need to be made for the future of the work....The long term goal is to see them grasp the advantage of having a group of churches that work together and are connected through meetings, seminars, retreats, etc...This will keep them accountable one to another..."

"With Russia being a matriarchal society," they said, "it has taken many years for men, young and old, to step up and take positions in the church. Years of patience and prayers have been realized and it's exciting to see these men learning to become leaders and planning for years into the future while still realizing that they need to continue to feed the 'sheep."

Keeping abreast of the ever changing laws for non-governmental agencies continues to take large amounts of time. They report it always is a challenge to register their organizations. Presently they work as an international organization, however, many officials in the outer regions do not understand how to interpret the laws for non-Russian groups. They ask that we pray that all will go well with their organizations and that they will not have problems with the governmental agencies.

In an update on their oldest son they wrote, "Yes, Joshua is accepting the offer to study at Messiah College. In fact he hopes to play basketball there and will be sending out a video to the coach to see Joshua in action. Please continue to pray for Joshua as he is filing for scholarships. He has about 65% of the funds needed for his first year of college and is trusting God to bring in the rest."

The Woosters expect to meet the Joe Henry family when they travel to Chiang Mai, Thailand for a church conference later this month.



Cancer Survivors Form Support Group By Steven Skelley

Albert Einstein said, "In the middle of difficulty, lies opportunity." Two local residents have faced the extreme difficulty called cancer and are now creating opportunities to encourage others. Anna Cooley and Earl Cadaret have recently launched the Cancer Survivors Support Group in Homosassa. "We are both cancer survivors and we feel we have something to share with people who are going through similar circumstances. This support group is for anyone in the community," Anna said.

Earl continues, "People who have cancer begin to wonder if anyone cares at all. You often feel alone. You feel like you are in no man's land. We're here to help them and support them through this battle in every way we can."

"People think the diagnosis of cancer is the kiss of death. That's not always the case anymore. We've been there. We want to let people know we are here for them. We understand their fears and concerns. I'm a lung cancer survivor of 15 years," Earl shares.

"Some people may be afraid they have cancer but be afraid to go to a doctor to find out for certain. Cancer is scary. There is a fear of the disease itself. Then, being diagnosed with cancer elevates the fear. When my oncologist told me I had lung cancer, I lost the next 45 minutes. Once he told me I had lung cancer, that was the last thing I heard. I don't like to think I am a fearful man, but fear absolutely took hold of me when I heard those words. If I had had a group like this one to support me, it would have made a big difference."

Anna, also a cancer survivor, had a breast removed five years ago. "When I first heard I had cancer, my knees buckled. Just before that, I had been to a Billy Graham crusade and I had gotten a book called *Peace With God* and that book got me through that first week. It's funny how the Lord got me that book just before I found out about the cancer because I really needed it then."

Earl believes faith made a difference in his battle as well. "I believe that faith also makes a huge difference. My wife actually prayed with my surgeon before he operated on me. I believe God spared me for a reason and now I want to do something to help someone else and that's why I'm doing this."

"There are things that every person with cancer deals with on a daily basis. It's possible with God's grace to make it through all this. It's possible with the support and help of people who care about you to face these choices and challenges. That's our goal: to help you through this."

Anna continues, "Our group is also confidential. What we share with each other stays in the group. We trust each other. It's like that saying, 'What happens on the cruise, stays on the cruise!' With us, it's 'What we share with each other in our group, stays in our group.'"

Earl adds, "At our first meeting, we found that there was no hesitation for all of us to talk about this stuff with each other at all. I think the reason is that we're all fighting this battle. We all face the same fears. It's all the same. It doesn't matter if it's lung cancer or liver cancer or breast cancer. The fears are all the same."

"Our group is not all doom and gloom! We have fun too," Anna explains.

Earl continues, "Anna and I were friends before our cancers. Our friendship is even deeper now. That's what happens to cancer survivors and what we will see in this support group."

"Basically, the bottom line is that this group is for family, for friends, for people who have anything to do at all with someone who may have cancer. You may know somebody and be worried about someone with cancer. We're here for you,"


"That's right," Anna says, "We're here for you. We're here to help reinforce your physical, mental and spiritual health."
