

Come To The Table

Do you live to eat or eat to live? Either way, bread is probably an important part of your diet.

Bread has been used for centuries as the symbol of good and a metaphor for life, good living and survival.

We would be lost without bread; after all, what is an egg McMuffin without the muffin? Who eats hot dogs without the bun if they can help it – other than Adkin's dieters?

For many people, the reason they go to Olive Garden is to enjoy the bread sticks.

Bread represents a lifetime of memories, meanings and relationships. Bread is important, critical to life as we know it. For some people bread is their only survival food.

But the Bible tells us we don't live by bread alone, "but on every word that comes from the mouth of God." (Deut. 8:3b)

If we had only physical food – bread, meat, vegetables – we

would still be hungry and searching. There is a greater hunger, a larger need than just feeding our stomachs. There is the need to feed our souls.

In John 6, Jesus talks about being the "bread of life." He says, "If anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever. This bread is mv flesh which I will give for the life of the world." (John 6:51b) Jesus himself is the basic, must-have item if we are to experience spiritual life. He is God's Word made flesh. the one on whom we need to feed to live life eternally.

This was a difficult teaching for the disciples and other followers of Jesus, and many turned away from him because of it.

To speak of eating someone's flesh was just as upsetting to them as it is to us. But, today as back then, people misunderstood the metaphor and miss what Jesus is trying to say.

In this passage, Jesus' "flesh" refers to spirit and truth. This is the real bread; this is what counts if we are to know everlasting life.

The physical body of this world will pass away. Physical bread is temporary and cannot provide us with a life that is eternal.

It takes the words of the Holy Spirit, words that come from the mouth of God, to give us what we need to experience everlasting life.

Without bread, one cannot physically live, and without feeding on Jesus Christ as the "bread of life," living becomes a narrow, deadend existence with no meaning and purpose other than immediate self-gratification.

In John 6:66, Jesus watches sadly as a number of people turn and walk away because he has asked too much of them. He then turns to his disciples and asks, "Will you also go away?"

This is the question we too must answer if we are to receive eternal life.

Will we turn away and try to exist on the bread of this world or will we come to the table and feast at the banquet where Jesus offers himself as the bread of eternal life, embodying the spirit and truth which will enable us to live forever with him?

Our "Youth Singers" will be taking their summer break until August, and then will be resuming after school begins.


Our youth and adult Sacred Dance groups will be performing in June for Pentecost, and then will be breaking for the summer as well. They will resume rehearsals in the

Hurricane Information

With Hurricane season upon us, the Disaster Response Team of the church held a Hurricane Preparedness meeting to help the members of the church get the information they needed in order to be ready for whatever might happen this year.

Mr. Frank Roberts, the Emergency Management Coordinator from the Sheriff's Office, spoke for over an hour sharing some of the reality of the 2004 and 2005 hurricane season and the lessons learned in the county's response to what happened in other areas.

Mr. Roberts also emphasized the need to have at least a week's worth of food and water if you intend to stay with your house during a storm.

You should not count on the government to come to your rescue right away.

Other issues discussed:

- The need for flood insurance if you are in a flood zone.
- The importance of safety when dealing with generators - both for you and for those who are working on your lines.
- The "Code Red" program that calls everyone in the affected area with warnings or advisories.



Most people are already on the system but some people who have the no-call program will need to call the Sheriff's Office at 726-4488 and ask to be placed on the Code Red system so that they will be called when there is an emergency.

The committee also passed out our "Hurricane Information Sheet" that requests information from all of our members concerning whether or not they are in an evacuation zone, and if they want a place, or have a place, to go if there is a mandatory evacuation called in their area.

If you haven't already, please fill out the following form and drop it off at the church office, or in Sunday's offering plate.

It was a sobering meeting and one that enabled people to get a better grasp on what they need to do to get ready.

A bulletin board of information is in the office so you can see the material and check which class of hurricane will flood your home. Please come and check it out.

Making Connections

What makes for a great worship service?

Inspiring special music? Good sermons? Hymns that you can sing? Pomp and Circumstance? "Be still and know that I am God?"

All of these are important to many people. They are critical, especially to those who understand the reference to 'pomp and circumstance' and 'be still.'

The older members would connect immediately with "Pomp and Circumstance" and long- time Christians would know what I am talking about when I write "Be still..."

But what about the rest of the world? What about those who don't know that the song so many people hear when they graduate is called "Pomp and Circumstance" and that it brings up images of marching in order and correct behavior.

What about those who do not know the Bible and so would not understand the reference to "Be still...." Besides, who wants to be still? Shouldn't we sing and celebrate God's love?

How do we get worship to speak to people who have never learned the language of worship?

How can we learn to speak their language so that they can learn to speak God's language – the language of love?

In our creative worship workshop at the end of April we talked about ways to make connections between our worship and our world, ways that we can help people to experience worship as something more than a play you watch for an hour on Sunday morning.

Worship should help us to connect with God so that we can hear and see and feel and touch and even taste and know that He is good.

It can be worship that does not destroy the mood and feeling, but enhances them.

We are working to put together a team of people who are interested in helping all of us – in the church and out – to get connected to God and one another through worship.

We would like to invite you to join us and contribute your creative juices and talents of music or drama or pageantry or technical skill with audio or video to put together the worship services each week.

This will enable us to touch people with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

FUMC has recently purchased a 22 passenger bus.

The cost of the license will be reimbursed by the church.





More than 20 people have signed up for our 15-day cruise from Ft. Lauderdale through the Panama Canal to San Diego from April 22-May 9, 2007—a total of 17 days.

Many more have expressed interest, but have not yet registered. FUMCH members and friends have had first opportunity but, after June 15, registration will be opened to anyone in Citrus County. So don't be disappointed. Pick up a flyer at the church office. And call Dick Evans (563-5833) if you have questions about the trip.

We will sail on Holland America's ms Volendam and visit ports-of-call in Colombia, Costa Rica, and Mexico (including Acapulco) before disembarking in San Diego and enjoying a two-day extension there. Then we'll fly back to Tampa.

Prices include motor coach transportation from FUMCH to Ft. Lauderdale and from Tampa back to Homosassa, the 15-day full transit cruise, the two-day post tour in San Diego, baggage handling and current applicable taxes.

The following prices are based on double occupancy; single available at extra cost: Inside cabins-\$2843.13. Outside cabins-\$3,363.13 to \$3,603.13. Veranda cabins-\$4,743.13. Deposits of \$850 (Holland America) and \$100 (San Diego extension) are due at the time of registration.

Perpetuate Your Annual Gift to the Church

Many of us give generously to the ministry and mission of Jesus Christ through First UMC Homosassa. And we assume our giving will continue as long as we live.

But have you ever considered perpetuating your annual gift beyond your lifetime? You can do that very simply through a bequest.

By naming the church as a beneficiary in your will, for a specific amount to be invested in the Permanent Endowment Fund, you can arrange to generate enough annual income to equal or exceed the amount of your present gift.

A 5% annual return would ensure that your annual gift to the church will continue—forever!

For example, if you give \$2,500 a year to the church, a bequest of \$50,000 will fund your annual gift forever. If you give \$1,000 annually, a \$20,000 bequest will guarantee your annual gift forever. Simply multiply the amount of your annual gift by 20 (or more). Then consider a bequest of that amount in your will.

By naming the church in your *will* you can continue your support of our ministry and mission in future generations as FUMCH continues its goal of "everyone becoming a disciple of Christ."

The Columbarium at FUMCH

Our new Columbarium has been ordered and is now under construction at the Eickhof factory in Crookston MN. We expect delivery and installation in early September. The attractive wall unit with a polished granite front will contain 108 niches and space for up to 216 urns containing the cremains of church members and their families. The Columbarium will be our modern counterpart to the ancient church burial ground.

Meanwhile the Committee is finalizing plans for a beautifully landscaped and fenced Memorial Garden surrounding the Columbarium. The garden will be a peaceful place, shaded from the afternoon sun, where family members and friends may sit to meditate, pray, and remember those whom they have lost.

Nearly thirty niches were purchased at \$1,000 each during the pre-construction phase. The price increased to \$1,200 on June 1 due to increases in our costs. \$500 of that amount may be deducted as a charitable contribution for federal income tax purposes. The price is quite reasonable compared to other columbariums and cemeteries. And the price includes one or two urns, brass nameplates, opening and closing, and perpetual care of the Columbarium and garden. About 58 cents of every dollar the church received in 2005 supported the personnel who serve our church and bought the supplies needed for their tasks.


Paul reminds us in 1 Corinthians 12:27, " ... you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it."

Your stewardship enables the men and women who minister to us to fulfill their roles in the body of Christ. In turn, they guide, encourage, and challenge us on our discipleship journey.

Another 24 cents covered the cost of operating church facilities. Your stewardship equips us with a place to encounter Jesus as we gather and, equally as important, a place where seekers may find Him.

Eleven cents went to conference apportionments, helping to start new churches, fund ministerial education, and finance numerous benevolences worldwide.

An additional 2 cents went toward our own evangelism, membership, nurture, and outreach efforts.

SUMMERTIME READING



The lazy days of Summer will soon be upon us and we'll have plenty of time to get lost in a good book, be it romance, action or historical. The Library offers the following titles:

- 1. "The Messenger of Magnolia Street" by River Jordan. The author's name is enough to intrigue you, but this is a haunting story, as told by "the Recorder of all that ever was, is now or is yet to come," of 3 childhood friends who reunite to fight the unnamed presence that is slowly draining their beloved town of goodness and light. The author creates an eerily sinister land-scape in which the age-old struggle of Good versus Evil is played out within the subtle context of family, faith and friendship. This is beautifully written prose but edgy and shows God has his hand in overseeing His creation. You'll be glad that you read it!
- 2. "On This Day", a novel by Melody Carlson. If this were a movie, it would be a successful "chick flick" and that's not a criticism. The story just flows from each character's situation. As one marriage begins, five others are put to the test. Gathering at Lakeside Inn to attend a wedding, five women reach a point of reckoning in their own most intimate relationships. They are the bride's aunt, family friend, bridesmaid, grandmother of the bride and sister of the groom. As their stories unfold, they turn to one another and they find the healing power of love, perseverance and friendship.
- 3. With the documentary of Flight 93 showing in theaters, you may want to read "Let's Roll" by Lisa Beamer, widow of Todd Beamer who participated in thwarting the terrorists' attempt to destroy the Capitol in September 2001. A story of ordinary people with extraordinary courage.
- 4. Karen Kingsbury gives us a modern Mary Magdaleneand breaks the Code. "Divine" is a drama with teeth. It's the story of Mary Madison, a child of unspeakable horrors and a young woman society wanted to forget. A divine power has set Mary free to bring life-changing hope and love to battered and abused women living in the shadow of the nation's capital. Although Mary is educated and redeemed and a powerful voice in Washington, D.C., she had to overcome a past of fear, faithlessness, addiction and promiscuity. Her grandmother spent her life praying for Mary and clings to the belief that God has a special plan for her. NOT RECOMMENDED FOR YOUNG READERS

- 5. Lori Copeland has written four books in the series, "Men of the Saddle". They take you back to an era when cowboys were heroes and the rules of the Wild West prevailed. Book One is "The Peacemaker." It starts out with Wynne Elliott getting ready to shoot no-good Cass Claxton for leaving her at the altar and running off with her money, and the plot thickens from that point on. Book Two is "The Drifter;" Book Three is "The Maverick" and Book Four is "The Plainsman."
- 6. Dee Henderson's latest thriller is "The Witness." Amanda Griffin has been in hiding for eight years after witnessing a horrible crime, and now she must come out of hiding to save her two sisters. Police officers have been assigned to the case and all have feelings for the Griffin women. It is no longer professional it's personal. But chances are that at least one of them will fail, and it's going to take a faith deeper than any of them currently have to stand and confront the danger still to come.
- 7. "Summer of the Midnight Sun", a novel by Tracie Peterson, is Book One of the Alaskan Quest series. With a broken heart in search of healing, Leah Barringer's world is turned upside down when her brother brings home Jayce Kincaid, the man who rejected her 10 years before. Set in the rugged Alaskan Territory, this is a story of Christian romance at its best, along with a complicated museum robbery case.
- 8. A story for ALL AGES is "A Long Way From Chicago" by Richard Peck. What happens when Joey and his sister, Mary Alice two city slickers from Chicago make their annual summer visits to Grandma Dowdel's seemingly sleepy Illinois town? Each of their seven summer trips is funnier and more surprising than the last.
- 9. Lori Wick has written many novels and we have upgraded two of them with hardback books. They are both of the Rocky Mountain Memories series. Book One is "Where the Wild Rose Blooms" and Book Two is "Whispers of Moonlight".
- 10. We are also offering "Even Now" and "Oceans Apart," two new sure-to-please books by Karen Kingsbury.

After the environmental events of the past couple years, all of us are probably more alert to the need for physical preparation for the Hurricane Season of 2006.

We make plans for evacuating or safely staying at home.

We gather all the "things" we think we need to sustain us for at least a week, in case a hurricane decides to come our way.

These actions are preventative measures to protect ourselves and those around us.

In terms of health care, we also need to focus on PREVENTION.

- 1. Do you have an annual physical exam?
- 2. Do you have tests done that are recommended by your physician?
- 3. Do you follow up to get the results of those tests?
- 4. Do you abide by the recommendations of your physician?
- 5. Do you obtain flu and pneumonia vaccines as recommended?
- 6. Are you compliant with taking medications that are ordered for you?
- 7. Do you attempt to eat moderate amounts of a "balanced" diet?
- 8. Do you do some kind of exercise on a regular basis? (Hand to mouth exercise does not count!)
- 9. Do you get in touch with your physician when your health status changes?
- 10. Do you enrich your spiritual health through personal study, meditation and participation in your "faith community," in order to be prepared to "reach out" in your local community?

If your answer to all of these questions is "yes," you are a "perfect 10."

Prevention of illness and promotion of health through education is just one aspect of the new Parish Nurse Ministry, while the overall goal of the ministry is to define our church as a place of "holistic health." Encompassed in this ministry is the physical, psychological, social, emotional and spiritual well-being of our "church family."

Be looking for another aspect of the Parish Nurse role in the next Genesis.

They wrote, "We thank God for a bit of downtime after a very hectic start to the year."

Good Friday and Easter Sunday provided them a "tremendous opportunity" to worship with their "Thai brothers and sisters." During their "two weeks off," the family enjoyed day trips around Chiang Mai "including outings to the zoo, a snake farm and a monkey farm."

They pointed out the children "greatly enjoyed Songkran again. It is supposed to be a time when Thais bless their elders by pouring water on their hands, but it also has become a giant water war, complete with water guns and tanks full of ice-cold water that are tossed on others. Our four children also spent a lot of time drenching the cars and motorcycles that dared to pass by our driveway."

Under prayer needs the Henrys pointed out that Joe will serve as interim team leader this month as the regular team leader is leaving for a nine-month furlough. They ask we pray for Joe as he serves in that position. They also ask for prayers for Elaine as she finishes her first year of teaching second grade at Grace International School.

The Henrys ask for our continuing prayers for their learning the Thai language. Joe will begin teaching a Bible school next month "along with other language opportunities, while Elaine's work with Thai women is growing daily. As a result, we would like to be able to move further along in our speaking abilities."

In conclusion they asked for prayers for Elaine's father, Roger Grant, who will have "serious neck surgery" on May 1.

WOOSTERS WRITE FROM CHIANG MAI. THAILAND!!

The Kevin Woosters, missionaries we help in Moscow, Russia, wrote they are in Chiang Mai, Thailand attending a leadership conference. "We are taking in a lot of information about our organization and gaining much wisdom from those working in different areas around the world," they reported.

They also asked for our prayers for the village of Horinsk, in Siberia, where a new outreach group whose project is called New Hope has been set up.

This was the very poor village to which 500 pounds of clothes were sent. Our Missions Committee provided \$200 to help fund the shipment.

Another new group called "Morning Star" is also set to begin its activities in Siberia and is presently being registered and should receive its approval this month.

The Woosters point out they will be returning to the U.S. this June for "a time of home assignment."

They write: "Once again we find our family getting ready to make a major move. Our boys have grown into young men and are about to take their first steps onto their own path.

"With this in mind, we as a family feel the need to be close enough to go through the challenges that come with returning to 'our' culture after almost 10 years in another.

"As parents, this brings not only many emotions, but fears and worries. Have we prepared our sons for the world that lies before them.

"We share this because today we heard a reminder from scripture of how little our faith can become when we take our eyes off of "The One" who takes care of every detail in our lives."






We will miss seeing Peggy and Fran everyday, but they are looking forward to new projects.


