






# "Everyone Becoming a Disciple of Christ"

This mission statement of the First United Methodist Church of Homosassa was adopted on January 27, 2005.







# But...

Have you ever been talking with someone and heard that coming?

From the way the person is talking, you know there is going to be a "but" following whatever statement is being made.

You know you are about to make a sudden change in direction. "The left-handed widgets that you have are of better quality than the ones we've been buying, but...."The team worked hard and played with exceptional skill, but...." You don't even have to hear the rest of the sentence to believe that somehow you are going to come up losing.

In the scripture from Acts 10:34-43, Peter talks about all the things Jesus had done in his ministry - "...he went around doing good and healing all who were under the power of the devil, because God was with him."

In spite of all the good Jesus did, he was nailed to a cross and executed as a common criminal at the hands of the Romans, BUT.... (In case you don't know what comes after this "but," Peter says, "BUT God raised him from the dead on the third day.)

And that is the Easter story.

This is a time when those who hear what comes after the "but" move from a sense of total loss to the wondrous news of victory. This "but" is the difference between Good Friday and Easter Sunday. It is the difference between life and death, heaven and hell, hope and despair.

That one little word, one small conjunction, signals a happening which turned the world upside down, and nothing will ever be the same again.

The good news for us today is how that one little "but" can turn our lives around, too.

Because God raised Jesus from the dead, we don't have to be afraid.

We have reason to hope and reason to look forward to the future.

Because of what happened after the "but," we can have meaning and purpose in our lives.

We can have a sense of assurance that cannot be destroyed by the events that make up our day-today life.

Jesus was dead—really dead, not pretend dead. Jesus did die, BUT.... What comes after that little word makes all the difference in the world!





#### Holy Week and Easter Celebration by Lia Icaza-Willetts

During Holy Week, we reflect on the suffering, crucifixion, and death of Jesus Christ. Holy week begins on Palm Sunday, when we celebrate the triumphant entry of Jesus to Jerusalem -- leading to the crucifixion of Christ on Good Friday. This is a time to share our faith with our families and friends by observing Holy Week.

<u>Preparing for Holy Week</u>: Get the family together (include children and youth) for a family meeting and ask members of the family to covenant to observe Holy Week. As a Christian family, observe Holy Week by having prayer and devotions together to remember the suffering, crucifixion, and death of Christ.

• Designate a member of the family to make or find a symbol that relates to the Scripture of the day (for example, a palm branch, wooden cross, crown of thorns).

• Get a cassette of hymns or contemporary Christian music to play during devotions.

• Ask each member of the family to abstain from something during Holy Week (give up meat, dessert, candy, chocolate, or other treat).

• Prepare a family altar on a table. Every day, place a symbol on the altar. You can set up the altar every day during Holy Week and continue to use it once a week after Easter.

• Prepare by reading the Scriptures for the day ahead of time. Find a symbol that relates to the Scripture reading, and add it to the table. At the end of the week, you should end up with eight symbols (such as a wooden cross, a palm branch, a rock, and so on. these could be an object, a drawing, or a picture).

<u>Single People</u>:We encourage single people to take time to be close to God during Holy Week with special acts of devotion. You might want to invite a neighbor, friend, or prayer partner to observe Holy Week with you. You could have your Holy Week devotional together on the phone, during lunch, or at another time.

#### Suggestions for Observing Family Devotions During Holy Week:

• Gather with your family. Single people might want to gather with a small group of friends.

• Begin by listening to music (Christian music, gospel songs, or hymns).

• Pray an opening prayer together:

"Loving God, we come to celebrate Holy Week.

We come to listen to you.

We come to ask for forgiveness.

We come to learn from one another.

Clean our hearts and our minds by the power of your Holy Spirit. Bless our family in this petition. And help us to walk with Jesus all the days of our lives. We thank you, and we praise you in Jesus' name. Amen"

• Add a symbol of Holy Week to the altar or table every day and offer an act of service.

• Have children and youth read the Scriptures.

• Talk about the Scripture reading. Some possible discussion questions include: What is the Scripture saying about Jesus? What is this Scripture saying about me?

Suggested Readings, Symbols for the Altar Table, and	l
Actions to Take During Holy Week;	

• First Day — Palm Sunday

Symbol: Palm tree

Scripture Reading: Luke 19: 29-40

Action: Visit older people in nursing homes or in hospitals.

• Second Day — Holy Monday

Symbol: The Bible, placed on the altar table

Scripture Reading: Luke 19:41-48

Action: Read together Psalm 51. Family members write notes asking forgiveness of God and one another for wrong doing.

• Third Day — Holy Tuesday

Symbol: Bowl with water and towel

Scripture Reading: Luke 22: 1-22

Action: Family members wash one another's feet and pray for one another.

• Fourth Day — Holy Wednesday

Symbol: An offering placed on the altar table for the poor and needy

Scripture reading: Luke 22:39-62

Action: Family members offer love and kindness to all the people they meet during the day.

• Fifth Day — Maundy Thursday

Symbol: Bread and grape juice

Scripture Reading: Luke 23:1-25

Action: Make this a day of fasting and prayer. Fast during breakfast and lunch; drink water only. Pray a few minutes every hour. Family shares bread and juice at the evening meal. Bring to the church food or money for the poor.

• Sixth Day — Good Friday

Symbol: A wooden cross

Scripture Reading: Luke 23: 50-56

Action: Go to a worship service together as a family. Observe a day and night of silent prayers.

• Seventh Day — Holy Saturday

Symbol: Picture of a person or family in need

Scripture Reading: Luke 24:1-12

Action: Organize an Easter egg hunt for the children in the neighborhood. Begin by reading the Resurrection story.

• Eighth Day — Easter Sunday


Symbol: Fresh flowers

Scripture Reading: Luke 24:1-12

Action: Attend Easter Sunrise Services. Bring a friend ( a college student, a single person, an older person) to Easter Sunday worship services. Also invite the friend to have Easter dinner with your family.


It is a beautifully moving service, and we invite you to come and bring your friends and neighbors to share in this experience. ~ Pastor Mark ~

#### SIX NATURAL QUALITIES OF A DISCIPLE

- A disciple knows her/his priorities sets the course for life.
- A disciple has discipline.
- A disciple has a sense of reality.
- A disciple shows empathy.
- A disciple takes the initiative.
- A disciple is generous.

#### FOUR SPIRITUAL QUALITIES OF A DISCIPLE:

I woke this morning singing the chorus to a hymn I love.

"For the darkness shall turn to dawning, and the dawning to noonday bright; And Christ's great kingdom shall come on earth, the kingdom of love and light."

I realized that I know the chorus but not the words to the verses, so I went to the church and looked them up. It is a glorious hymn.

> "We've a story to tell to the nations, that shall turn their hearts to the right, A story of truth and mercy, a story of peace and light."

"We've a message to give to the nations, that the Lord who reigneth above, Hath sent us his Son to save us, and show us that God is love."

"We've a Savior to show to the nations, who the path of sorrow hath trod, That all of the world's great people, might come to the truth of God."

I've thought about those words all morning. I can't get the tune and its message out of my head. Jesus told us that we are to go and teach - not just in China or Africa or Russia or Thailand but even right here in Homosassa! All around me are people who do not know God loves them and has a plan for their lives. I believe every word of the hymn, so why do I do so little to see that they hear the message? Why do I sit so comfortably in my pew every Sunday? What am I doing from Sunday to Sunday to get the message out? If I am going to sing this hymn, my actions need to show I believe what I'm singing. We have a wonderful message to tell! Jesus says we should tell it. I feel very convicted that I have not and am not obeying Him.

Prayer: Father, Jesus did so much for us, and He asked so little of us - just that we go and tell others. Forgive us forgive me - for being so careless about doing as he asked. Bring people to us who need to hear. Open the doors for us to speak, and then give us the boldness to walk through those doors with the best news the world has ever heard! Amen.

Recently, the Dr. Phillips Foundation of Orlando graciously provided the funding to expand the Ropes Course.

Five new high elements have been added, which greatly increases the variety and challenge the residents face as they attempt the Ropes Course.

This is a series of low and high elements. Each one has a specific task to be accomplished by the group or individual.

In order to complete the elements, the young people must

work together to find a solution. The residents encourage and cheer each other on as they work through the course.

The Ropes Course teaches the young people to trust each other and their leaders, to rely on cottage mates, to work as a team to solve problems and to develop greater self-confidence.

It is the Home's hope that by facing and overcoming the challenges of the Ropes Course each resident will find courage and confidence to confront the many other challenges they are facing in life.

The recreational coordinators have been trained and certified to lead people through the various elements of the course. Only the middle and high school residents attempt the high elements.

#### SO MANY BOOKS ---- SO LITTLE TIME

Why not take advantage of the extra hour of daylight to read one of the following selections found in the Church Library:

1. "The Journey" by Billy Graham "You will only make this journey once. What kind of journey will it be?" Wherever you are in your journey - just beginning, the middle or near the end - you've already learned that there are a variety of paths you can take. Each fork and crossroad requires a decision. With characteristic clarity and passion, Billy Graham offers wisdom, encouragement, hope, and inspiration for anyone wanting to make the most of the journey.

2. "Ever After" by Karen Kingsbury, the sequel to "Even Now". This is the next captivating chapter in the lives of an American family struggling to live their faith on today's world. Twenty-year-old Emily is deeply in love with a young Army medic who is about to be sent to Iraq. Lauren and Shane struggle to move past their opposing beliefs about war and faith as their wedding date fast approaches.

3. "Whispers of Winter" by Tracie Peterson is Book 3 of the Alaskan Quest series. The unforgiving descent of Alaska winter has Jayce Kincaid and Jacob Berringer struggling for survival after their ship is trapped in the ice floes of the Arctic. Back at Last Chance Creek, Leah and Helaina endure the long separation. Leah wonders if her children will ever know their father and Helaina longs for the chance to express her love to Jacob. Helaina has unfaltering faith. Leah in the midst of her greatest trial will confront her understanding of God, His will, and a love that won't let go.

4. "Mountain Top" by Robert Whitlow, best selling author of legal thrillers set in the South. The novel has a former attorney turned minister, Mike Andrews, asked to represent an eccentric man, Sam Miller, who gets information from strange dreams, but his information lands him in jail as a suspect. The question for Mike and the jury is just how far should one follow guidance they receive from dreams and visions.

5. "Saving Graces" by Elizabeth Edwards. She writes about her early years traveling around the world with a military family and about her husband's campaign for Senate, President and Vice-President, and of the tragic death of her 16 year old son. She shares her experiences of fighting advanced breast cancer after being diagnosed only days before the 2004 election. She believes strongly in the power of community to make our lives better and richer.

6. "John's Story", Book I of the Jesus Chronicles by Tim LaHaye and Jerry B. Jenkins. John is the last witness. The year is A.D. 95 and John, the one whom Jesus called "beloved" is the last of the 12 apostles still alive and nearing ninety. He's still committed to spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ. John is called by God to write a Gospel to show that Jesus was in fact the Son of God, so John recalls his time with Jesus. His words continue to bring followers to Jesus every day. 7. "Teacher Man" by Frank McCourt, an autobiography. He was born in Brooklyn, NY to Irish immigrant parents, grew up in Limerick, Ireland, and returned to America in 1949 and taught for 30 years in public schools in New York City. His teaching methods were anything but conventional. He asked some students to write "An Excuse Note from Adam or Eve to God." At age 66, he burst onto the literary scene with "Angela's Ashes," the Pulitzer Prize winning memoir of his childhood in Ireland. This book shows how his teaching career shaped his second career as a writer.

8."Goodbye is not Forever" is a true story by Amy George. Amy's father was arrested by the Soviet Secret Police when she was a baby. He was sent to the frigid wastelands of Siberia. When she was 7 years old, Amy and her mother were taken by cattle car to a slave labor camp and witnessed firsthand the horrors of Hitler's Germany. As the war ends, they make a daring escape. They would have been executed if captured. Over the years Amy wondered if her father was still alive and if she'd ever see him again. This is a true story that serves as a vivid confirmation of God's neverending grace in the lives of His children.

9. "Leaves of Hope" by Catherine Palmer. A novel involving Beth Lowell, a risk taker who travels the globe for her job. Beth wonders how her newly-widowed mother, Jan, can endure her staid, predictable life. Then a note hidden inside a tea set reveals that Jan has kept a shocking secret from Beth. This starts Beth's search for the birth father she's never known. As her search takes her to an enchanting tea estate in the Himalayan foothills accompanied by a handsome British businessman.

10."That Camden Summer" by LaVyrle Spencer. At the beginning of the 20th century, a freethinking Boston divorcee, Roberta Jewett, returns with her three daughters to Camden, Maine, the seaside village where she was born and raised. Modern times for Camden is the motorcar but a divorced woman is still considered little better than a prostitute by the townsfolk. She gets a job as a country nurse, learns to drive and buys herself a Model T. Roberta perseveres in her struggle to forge a good life for her girls. In the ultimate test of will and devotion, Roberta must summon the courage to stand up to an entire town.

**11.** There are 4 Craft books available that give instructions on making Chrismons for every day of the year.

12. Two Family DVDs - "Miracle in the Woods" is a powerful drama of three generations of women united by the precious gift of love. "Helena, First Pilgrim to the Holy Land," is about Helena, the mother of Emperor Constantine the Great of Rome. She goes to the Holy Land in 326 A.D. to fulfill her solemn vow to find the holy places influenced by the life of Jesus and to build churches to honor Him.

We ask ourselves: who am I to be brilliant, gorgeous, talented, fabulous? Actually, who are you not to be? You are a child of God.


Your playing small does not serve the world. There is nothing enlightened about shrinking so that other people won't feel insecure around you.



One of the complaints I have heard is that there is just too much food in an order. Please note that all meats are frozen, and anything you buy can be kept frozen until you use it. You don't have to buy every month. Also, you can join together with other families, friends and neighbors to buy only what you need. We are a "select site" so you don't have to buy a Basic Package. If you have questions, call us at 382-1034. We will be glad to talk with you about SHARE.

By the way, if you missed ordering for March, you missed the best Spiral Cut Ham for about half of what you would pay at the local supermarket. Please, check for the next sign-up days; then come in and see what you can get for your money. Bring a friend or neighbor along. Become a regular at SHARE. You will be helping yourself to good food at a reduced price.

### March 14, 2007 Dear praying friends,

We wanted to send a mid-month report in order to ask for prayer for Chiang Mai, which is suffering through unprecedented pollution levels right now. The main cause is fires being lit in rural areas by farmers and residents along with forest fires near the Burmese border and the usual streams of vehicle exhaust.



For those who like numbers, the Pollution Control Department said that the level of pollution parti-

cles in the air Tuesday was 284 micrograms per cubic meter in Chiang Mai. The level considered high is 120 micrograms. The carcinogens in the air trigger attacks in asthmatics and heart/ lung disease patients. Thankfully, we have AC units throughout our house, which helps immensely, however our lungs hurt whenever we are outside traveling to school and elsewhere.



The children's school has cancelled PE and all outside activities.

A cold front is stuck here from China, meaning no rain and nowhere for the bad air to go.

The beautiful mountains of Chiang Mai, are invisible through the haze.

That's not always possible for many people in the outer regions where unemployment is 40-60%.

So the radio station donated funds to the locals in Siberia so they could buy some much needed staples and something special for the kids in a particular village.



There are times when it seems as if God watches to see if we will give Him the abandoned tokens of how genuinely we do love Him.

Abandon to God is of more value than personal holiness. Personal holiness focuses the eye on our own whiteness; we are greatly concerned about the way we walk and talk and look, fearful lest we offend Him.

Perfect love casts out all that when once we are abandoned to God.

We have to get rid of this notion "Am I of any use?" and make up our minds that we are not, and we maybe near the truth.

It is never a question of being of use, but of being of value to God Himself.

When we are abandoned to God, He works through us all the time.


