

Early in November it is sometimes cold outside, but for the most part there is little feeling of Christmas in the air. Living in Florida we don't have snow or ice or heavy winter coats to help create the anticipation of the Christmas season.

Some of the stores have Christmas displays, but they haven't yet cranked them up to full "greed" mode, and, so far, I haven't heard a single rendition of "Jingle Bells."

So you can understand why it is hard to feel "in the mood" when writing an article in November about the Christmas season.

If we focus on giving and getting, on the "tinsel" of the season, then working ourselves into the Christmas mood will be a little hard and a lot frustrating. But if we see Christmas as a time to share Jesus, we'll know that Christmas joy isn't a mood to be gotten into but a lifestyle to be lived all year long.

# THE CHRISMON TREE by Donna Rayne

Back in the 1940's, Frances Spencer of Danville, VA, began using leftover scraps of materials and other items to create Christmas tree decorations for her church.

Instead of creating traditional secular ornaments, she thought it would be more appropriate to create ornaments that reflected traditional Christian symbols.

She chose to use only white and gold, as those are the liturgical colors of Christmas.

In 1957 she coined the work "Chrismon" as a combination of the words "Christ" and "monogram." So a Chrismon is a symbol of "Christ's monogram."

Many of the symbols are

Greek letters
(like Chi-Rho –
the first two letters of the Greek
word christos;
Chi is the X portion of the ornament while the



Rho is represented by the P).

Others are symbols associated with Christ – like various kinds of stars, fish, butterflies, crosses, lambs, crowns, doves, and even parable balls which tell a special story.

Each one of these symbols has a special meaning, some of which we'll try to describe in the remainder of this article.

Our Chrismon tree, located in the Narthex, has been decorated with Chrismons made by several women of First United Methodist Church.

All of us who have worked on making the Chrismons (Kim Bennett, Myrna Evans, Edy Shaffer, Lorraine Tollefson, Deb Metcalfe, Rosalie Haynes, Marguerite McClain, Linda Gordy, Ann Fasnacht, Iris Whittaker and Donna Rayne) have had a great time!

We have used several styles of Chrismons – beaded, painted, stitched, and crafted.

All, however, reflect the white and gold colors of the Christmas season.

The white symbolizes the innocence, purity, and perfection of our Savior. White is also the color of iov.

The gold color is a reflection of the glory and majesty of God.

Some Chrismons may also have a touch of red on them – a reminder of the blood of Christ by which we are saved.

Following are more detailed explanations of some of the symbols we have made for our Chrismon tree.

We hope that when you see our fully decorated tree, you, too, will be reminded of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.




Latin Cross: this is the most widely used form today (like the cross on our altar in the sanctuary); this cross is a reminder of our Lord's saving work of redeeming mankind through His sacrifice for our sins, by which we receive forgiveness and salvation. The cross member is shorter than the vertical member.

Greek Cross: the meaning is the same as the Latin Cross; the arms of this cross are all equal.

Celtic Cross: the round circle in the cross suggests eternity through Jesus Christ.

Cross Triumphant: this is a

cross sitting atop a round ball (the earth) showing the triumph and victory of the Gospel throughout the world.



Cross Potent: this cross represents the Savior's spiritual and physical healing powers.

5 Pointed Star: also called the Epiphany Star – the star of our Savior.

6 Pointed Star: also called the Creator's Star – symbolizes the six days of creation.

8 Pointed Star: also called the Star of Holy Baptism – symbolizes regeneration through Jesus Christ.

Fish: during ancient times the fish pointed the way to secret Christian worshipping places. The Greek letters are

#### IXOYC

which are the first letters of Greek words: Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior. It is a reminder to us that Jesus died for our sins, and that many of our brothers and sisters around the world today are dying or being persecuted for their faith, and some must even keep their faith secret. When we see the fish, let's pray for them.

Butterflies: symbolize our Lord's resurrection and transformation.

Scallop shells: symbolize baptism in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost; may also have 3 drops of water on them to symbolize baptism.



Crown of Thorns: remind us of the suffering of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Wheat: the body of our Savior; the bread of life.

Grapes: the blood of our Savior; the cup of salvation.

Lambs: Scriptural symbols for Christ.

Crowns: symbolize the Kingship of our Lord; His victory over sin and death.

Cornerstones: Christ is the cornerstone of our lives.

Monograms: XP or Chi-Rho is the most common based upon Greek words. Sometimes each word is used alone, or it may even be turned to a different position to give it a different shape.

The Chi (X) may be turned on its side to form a manger; the Rho (P) can become a shepherd's crook/staff.



Letters & Words: Alpha and Omega (first and last letters of the Greek alphabet) used to describe our Lord (He is the beginning and the end); INRI found on the crucifixion cross means "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews."



Descending
Dove: An ancient symbol of
Scriptural origin suggesting
the Holy Spirit

(descending to reside within us).

Some of our ornaments depict a combination of several symbols.

A circle (eternity) in which an X (Chi) is inserted along with a Greek cross (resurrection) brings together several Christian concepts.

Our painted balls are also called parable balls – they tell a parable or story, just as Jesus preached in parables. Each ball will carry its own special story.

We hope you enjoy this year's Chrismon tree. It is our gift of love to you to celebrate our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

"[Jesus] said to His disciples, "You know that after two days the Passover is coming, and the Son of Man is to be delivered up for crucifixion." (Matthew 26:2)

He spoke to them so clearly. I know they were hearing these hard words before his horrible death, but surely they heard Him speak them. In the margin of my Bible, I have written, "He even told them how he would die! Did they just not hear?" What was the matter with these men? How could they be so insensitive? Why didn't they understand?

As I sat quietly in my comfortable chair in the early morning thinking critically about their failure, a voice inside my head—or maybe inside my heart—said quietly, "And what about you? Do you understand?"

So I begin to ask myself questions about His question? Do I understand? Do I understand how grieved He was as He approached this death so degrading that it was considered unfit for a Roman citizen? Do I understand that only His atonement would make access to God possible for me? Do I understand He had to die so I could be set free from the power of death? Humbled, I felt much less critical of these men, and I mumbled, "Father, I too have not understood."

Prayer: Father, as the time approaches for us to celebrate Christmas, reveal to us afresh the wonderful mystery of Your coming. Help us to better understand the enormity of this miraculous birth 2000 years ago, so we may understand more clearly the price this tiny baby would someday pay, opening the door for us to have fellowship with You. Amen.

# HOLIDAY CHEER THROUGH READING

The Church Library offers the following books with the subject of Christmas to help capture the season's spirit of love and blessing:

A special feature is Hannah's Hope" written by Karen Kingsbury.

Fifteen-year-old Hannah Roberts lives a lonely life with her grandmother. Her father, a U.S. Ambassador to Sweden, is cold and distant and too busy for her. Her mother has political and social ambitions of her own. However, as Christmas nears, Hannah learns a shocking truth that the man she believed to be her father is not her real parent after all. Thus begins Hannah's search for Air Force chopper pilot Mike Conner, her real father. When a local politician and the press catch wind of the story, everyone is caught up in Hannah's hope - that she'll find her father before the holidays.

"Manger and Mystery" by Marilyn Brown Oden brings a fresh and challenging perspective on the Advent adventure. It allows you to reclaim your understanding of the reason for the season and encourages you to make time for yourself during the holidays.

Max Lucado has written "The Christmas Child" which was formerly titled "The Christmas Cross." We have both books. A Chicago journalist finds himself in a small Texas town on Christmas Eve. He had received a small picture of a church in the mail and thought he'd find it. He does



and the story unfolds from there, bringing a big change to his life.

Lucado also wrote "Cosmic Christmas," a different slant on the birth of Jesus and events leading up to it. Taken from the book of Revelation, the story is the result of wondering about the "war in heaven," Michael and his angels fighting the dragon - Satan - who is fighting to retain his evil grip on the world. God loves the world so much that he sends Jesus to us.

Max Lucado brings us "The Christmas Candle," the story of a simple man living in a small English village who spends his days providing light to others through the candles he crafts. When a mysterious angel visits the humble man's shop, the holy and the human come together to release a blessing that could only be conceived by a grace-filled, loving Lord.

"The Christmas Bus" by Melody Carlson . It's nearly Jesus' birthday and Christmas Valley is in an uproar because the pastor's wife, Edith, has offered shelter to a bankrupt couple with a baby on the way - and they've parked their hippie bus right in front of the lovely Victorian parsonage. Edith's family isn't coming for Christmas this year so she invited strangers to fill the rooms reserved for family. But when the guest list shapes up to include some less than desirable characters, at least on the surface, Edith wonders if

she made the right choice. Will her idea blow up in her face or could she be entertaining angels unaware? You'll love the answer.

Donna Van Liere has brought us "The Christmas Shoes," a story that tells us that, if we're open to it, God can use even the smallest thing to change our life and us. Read this book and believe. She also wrote the sequel, "The Christmas Blessing," an inspiring story about hope existing in the darkest places and how love is always the greatest gift of all. Her latest novel is "The Christmas Hope." It's been five years since Patricia and Mark's son died, and they've given up hope of ever having a joyous Christmas. But when Patricia brings home a 5year-old who's just lost her mother, God begins his healing through this very special little girl.

"Christmas Every Morning" by Lisa Tawn Bergeron. Ten vears have passed since Krista Mueller admitted her mother to a care facility due to Alzheimer's disease. Krista stopped caring about her mother because of a painful childhood and desperate attempts to gain her mother's love. So Krista is unprepared for the transformation that takes hold of her heart as she struggles to seize her final opportunity for forgiveness and love. She knows it is no longer forgiveness for her mother that's needed but forgiveness for herself.

As we look forward to Christmas, we also think of what a wonderful gift our physical bodies are. All the integral parts function so miraculously for so long, and yet when one little part "malfunctions," we often get terribly upset. Rather, let us "accentuate the positive," and be truly thankful for what we have, what we are, and whose we are!


#### **CANCER SUPPORT GROUP**







Trust us, in Thai it has a lot more meaning. (It's คริสตจักร ร่มเย็ for those who can read Thai.)

For instance, in one hymn that says "in the shadow of the cross" in English, the Thai says "in the cool shade of the cross."

It evokes ideas of salvation, joy, rest and protection, among other things, for Thais (or so we're told!).

With a week off from school, the Grace International School (GIS) contingent (that would be everyone except Joe!) had a good break.

Joe and Pastor *Ogaat* have to make some final purchases and plans for the new church. Pray for wisdom, for a good opening, and for the Nov. 30<sup>th</sup> open house

for about 12 Thai pastors, missionaries and others from around Chiang Mai to be a blessing.

Continue to pray for Elaine's teaching work at GIS. November is a big month in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade. The students study economics and put on a "country fair." Please pray for energy for the teachers. Also, pray for Fer, who is one of Elaine's students. She is Buddhist and has begun to show interest in the stories of Jesus. Pray for her heart to be open.

The new church still needs about \$4,000 in startup funds. We can do without the items for awhile, but eventually we would like to have these things on hand (Bibles, songbooks, kitchen items, sound system, etc.). Please pray for the Lord to provide in His timing.

Our personal finances continue to struggle. Praise God that we have received almost \$200 a month in new/added support, however we remain about \$1,400 short of 100% support each month. Also, the dollar is slumping badly in Asia. It has lost 12% off its peak of a year ago and is expected to fall at least another 5% by year's end. In addition, our mission account remains about \$2,000 in deficit. Please continue to pray for the Lord's provision.

#### The New Columbarium

Our new church Columbarium is located against the exterior east wall of the Worship Center. The cabinet contains 108 niches with polished granite fronts. Future expansion will bring the total to 216 niches. (A columbarium is a permanent cabinet-vault containing niches to provide for the storage of the cremated remains of deceased persons).

Each niche accommodates up to two urns and each granite niche front will have a bronze plate containing the name(s) of the deceased, along with the year(s) of birth and the year(s) of death.

Our Columbarium is surrounded by a landscaped and fenced Memorial Garden—an ideal setting for meditation and prayer. The Garden and Columbarium are a modern counter-part to the ancient church burial ground—an appropriate resting place for faithful members of Christ's Church.

Members of First United Methodist Church, and members of their families, may purchase niche spaces and reserve them until their time of need. The current price is \$1,200. Niches may be purchased by individuals for single inurnment or by couples for double inurnment. The price is inclusive of either one or two bronze urns and one or two engraved bronze nameplates. There will be no additional charges beyond the original purchase price.

Over half of the purchase price covers our actual costs at this time. \$500 of each purchase (considered a tax deductible charitable contribution) is held in reserve for future expansion to create an endowment fund for perpetual care.

Persons interested in purchasing a niche may obtain an application packet from the church office. Upon completion and full payment, purchasers will receive a Certificate of the Right to Inurnment of their cremains.

If you have not seen the new Columbarium and Garden, stop by soon and spend a few minutes in this quiet setting.

#### The Charitable IRA

A New Way to Give

Last August Congress passed the Pension Protection Act of 2006. One feature of this new law provides a two-year "window of opportunity" for tax-free giving from IRAs for persons who are 70 ½ or older. For the 2006 & 2007 tax years, persons may make tax-free gift transfers directly to qualified charities of their choice—including United Methodist Churches and agencies. Donors may make gifts of up to \$100,000 per year from Traditional or Roth IRAs.

Why is this a tremendous opportunity? Because it addresses the financial concerns of many seniors. Individuals who are 70 ½ must make Required Mandatory Distributions annually from their IRA accounts. Failure to do so results in a 50% penalty of the RMD amount. These traditional IRA distributions are taxable and, in many cases, will push the retiree into a higher tax bracket.

Often donors want to take their required IRA distributions and make major charitable gifts during November and December. Under the new tax law, they may make a gift of <u>all</u> or <u>a portion</u> of their required distribution, thereby fulfilling both the requirements of the IRS and their charitable intentions—and excluding the gift amount completely from their income.

For many individuals and families, the largest non-real estate assets are their IRA accounts. The new law presents an opportunity to be generous with IRA assets by:


- Making a gift to a capital campaign.
- Creating a "matching gift" to challenge others to help meet a campaign goal.

#### Establishing an endowment.

Caution! Donors must make the transfer directly from their IRA accounts to the charity! If the IRA distribution is made to an individual it will be reported as income on a 1099 form, and it will be subject to tax. And the new law applies to IRAs only, not to 401(k)s and 403(b)s. To be in compliance you must complete the gift transfer prior to December 31 of the calendar year in which you make the gift (2006 or 2007).
