One of the Christmas traditions we have at the Whittaker house is the reading of the Christmas story from the Book of Luke.

Before we open any presents, before we see what "Santa" left us in our stocking, we read the story of Mary and Joseph and the baby Jesus. Christmas is a celebration of the gift of Jesus Christ. It is a time to share our thanks to God for his gift of salvation, forgiveness, assurance and peace, for his presence among us to share in the pains and sorrows, joys and pleasures of what it means to be human. Christmas is a reminder that as God gave us his gift in the person of his Son, so we are called to share that gift with the world.

The world has taken hold of Christmas and turned it into a holiday for economic advantage; we do 50% of our business during the last six weeks of the year. The Christmas season has become, for many, a time of gift comparing - you can tell if the giver loves you more than someone else. Unhappily, it may be a time of family fighting because it's the first time everyone has been together in a year and unresolved issues surface. So Christmas can become a time of tension and greed.

As Christians, we can't do much about the way the world sees and celebrates Christmas. Because they don't know the Christ of Christmas, they also don't know what it means to belong to the family of God and so they abuse and misuse our "family celebration."

But we can focus our own lives, our own traditions, our own celebration on Christ and the gift that keeps on giving every day for all eternity. "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be upon his shoulders." (Isaiah 9:6)



May the joy and peace of this Christmas season fill your days - now and for all eternity.

Mise Discipleship By Jan Mise

Living Life As A Disciple, Searching for Truth

A disciple searches for truth, with the intent to live out discovered truth in daily life. Jesus said, "If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." (John 8:31-32)

In this December study, we will look at Bible truths concerning the birth of Jesus. What can we discover about what occurred? Where have we failed to "hold " to the truth in our desire to enhance the story?

The place of Christ's birth:

•Micah prophesies the place of Jesus' birth - "Out of *Bethlehem* will come one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from old, from ancient times."

(Micah 5:2)

•Matthew begins his account of the Magi with the words, "After Jesus was born in *Bethlehem...*

(Matt. 2:1)

•Luke writes of Joseph going up to *Bethlehem*, the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. While they were there Mary gave birth to her first-born son.

(Luke 2:4-7)

Mary and Joseph went to Bethlehem because the _____ government ordered a _____ to be taken, each person having to return to his hometown to register. The resulting journey to Bethlehem (a 3-day trip from Nazareth) came because of an order from a pagan Roman emperor. God used a Gentile ruler to bring the family to the town of _____ where Micah prophesized the Christ would be born.

The virgin-born child:

•Isaiah prophesized, "The *virgin* will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him _____."

(Isaiah 7:14b)

•Matthew tells how Mary, who was pledged to Joseph, "was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit."

(Matthew 1:18)

•Luke writes of the angel telling Mary how she would bear a son to be named Jesus. Mary asks, "How will this be...since I am a virgin?" She is told that the Holy Spirit will come upon her and the power of the Most High will overshadow her. The holy one to be born will be called the

(Luke 1:31-35)

In order to be the perfect sacrifice for man's sin, Jesus had to begin his life in the flesh free from the sinful contamination of Adam's seed. So Jesus, born of the Holy Spirit and of Mary's flesh, was both Son of Man and Son of God.

Why is the virgin birth an essential part of Jesus' heritage?

Other details of the birth: (from Luke 2)

•Only Luke, who writes after "careful investigation," describes the birth as occurring in a stable. He makes no reference to other family members or even the animals.

•Luke describes how the baby was wrapped in cloths, placed in a manger, "because there was no _____ for them in the ."

•Luke tells of the angels' visit to the shepherds, the personal invitation to be a part of the wonder: "...a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord." How would they recognize him? Luke makes no mention of a star, but only that they would "find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a ."

•In Luke's account, the shepherds found the baby and went out to tell others what they had been told about this child. Luke doesn't mention any other visitors to the stable or any gifts. He concludes with, "But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her . (Luke 2)

God, through Luke's telling, seems to have purposely kept the scene of his Son's birth simple, unadorned and meaningful only to those he chose to participate. It's not about gifts, family, celebrations—it's about Jesus as *the gift*; God's love wrapped in the flesh of a baby's skin, God's heart offered in a manger.

The Magi: As Matthew tells it, about two years later the Magi (Gentile wise men or astrologers) followed a star to the house where they found the child Jesus and his mother. Matthew records how Herod ordered the killing of all boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old or under, "in accordance with the time he had learned from the Magi." An angel warned Joseph in a dream and the family fled to Egypt. The gifts of the Magi may have provided the financial aid they needed for such a flight.

(Matthew 2:1-18)

THINK ABOUT IT: Ann, who would have preferred a small, intimate celebration, found herself surrounded by the many guests her friends had invited to celebrate her birthday. An acquaintance greeted her happily, "I'm glad you're having a birthday. It gives us an excuse for a party." Has Christmas become our "excuse" for multiple celebrations? Have we, in our enthusiasm, given the "church acquaintances" of the world an excuse to party?

Jesus never commanded (or asked) us to remember his birth. Instead he spoke of the intimate breaking of the bread and sharing of the cup - "do this in remembrance of me." "For whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

(1 Cor. 11:23-26)

Could it be that our Christmas communion service is the most meaningful celebration of Jesus, the truest expression of remembering?

Sometimes I feel intimidated. I try to prepare for whatever task is before me, but as the time draws near - especially if I am about to tread on unfamiliar ground - I feel like Moses. Remember when God asked him to go back to Egypt and lead the children of Israel out of bondage? Moses replies, "Surely there is someone else, Lord. I don't speak very well." But the Lord told him to go, and he reluctantly said, "Okay." (my paraphrase)

Right now the job I have before me is not nearly as great as that to which God called Moses, but I am wondering if there isn't someone else who would be more comfortable in this job, who could do it more efficiently. I leave tomorrow bright and early for Haiti to make all the arrangements for the team going in February. There are a lot of details to work out, and I must be wise and thorough and persuasive and, most of all, sensitive to God's leading. I really do not want to "mess up."

As I prayed about this and confessed to our great God my inadequacy, He reminded me of the words of Isaiah 45:3."I will give you the treasures of darkness, riches stored in secret places, so that you may know that I am the LORD, the God of Israel, who summons you by name." He has already been there and has ironed out the wrinkles. How like God to not only make such a promise, but to remind me of it.

This is one of those times I thank Him for having hidden his word in my heart so that He can bring it to my mind when I need it. He is already in Petit Goave, working in the hearts of the Haitians, working out the rough places in our planning, preparing the minds of those in need to tell us clearly what we can do to help them. He knows how we can work together to accomplish good for the Haitians and for His glory. Now all we - I - have to do is listen and agree on who does what.

I thank Him for what He has done and is doing, even though I haven't seen it yet with my own eyes. Maybe that is good. It's easy to say thank you for something I have already received. Faith grows when I can thank God for what I haven't yet received but believe I will!

Prayer: Father, thank you for always being out in front, removing impediments and hindrances in life. Thank you for giving us things to do and for helping us do them well. Amen.

Travel with Us

Dear Friends,

Twenty five years ago I had the opportunity to travel to Athens, Greece, and to experience firsthand the mystery that is Israel. It was a awe-inspiring trip that continues to inspire me, and, in the years since, I have looked forward to returning. I'm going to do that next November, and I want to invite you to join me.

Iris and I are registered for a "Lands of the Bible Cruise" through the eastern Mediterranean, departing November 11, 2009, and returning on November 22 - just in time for Thanksgiving. Our home-away-from-home for most of the time will be the mv Cristal - a 1,200 passenger cruise ship chartered by Educational Opportunities Tour of Lakeland FL.

We will leave from the church on a motor coach to Tampa International Airport and then fly to NYC. Our overseas flight will take us to Athens where we will see the highlights of that ancient city. After walking through the ruins of ancient Corinth, we will board our ship and sail to Port Said, Egypt. A visit to the Pyramids, the Sphinx, and the Egypt Museum in Cairo will remind us of where the Israelites lived before the great Exodus led by Moses.

After sailing to Israel, we will visit Bethlehem and the old city of Jerusalem where Jesus came on Palm Sunday, was crucified and then rose again. Jerusalem is full of many sacred sites for both Christians and Jews. In Galilee we will visit several places along the lake where Jesus lived, taught, and healed.

Then we'll sail to the beautiful Greek island of Rhodes. Paul brought Christianity there in the first century. Rhodes also is rich in medieval history. The Knights of Rhodes occupied the island for several centuries.

Our final port will be Kusadasi, Turkey. There we will visit the magnificent city of Ephesus, where Paul lived for three years. Finally we will return to the port of Pireaus at Athens and fly back to the USA.

Our tour will include times of prayer and reflection at some of the most significant Christian sites. On board ship there will be opportunities for Bible study and for a lecture series on *St. Paul's Life and Teaching*. Christian entertainment will add to our enjoyment in addition to all the usual shipboard amenities.

You will meet new Christian friends from all over the USA. However, our own travel group from FUMCH will be together at meals and on the shore excursions. Take a look at the display board in the narthex of the Worship Center or in the hallway of the Administrative Center. Pick up a brochure at the church office. If you have questions, call me or Dick Evans. Iris and I look forward to traveling with some of you on this journey of faith, as we watch many of the places named in the Bible come alive right before our eyes.

Giving at Year-End

The end of the year is a time for remembering, taking stock, catching up, and giving. Consider these 8 suggestions, several of which may work for you.

- Give a "Second Mile" Gift. The end of the year is a great time to go the extra mile in recognizing the good work of favorite charities and especially your church.
- Give a Memorial Gift. A memorial tribute can be a satisfying way to honor those whose memories continue to enrich our lives.
- Give Appreciated Property. Gifts of stock, bonds, mutual funds and real estate may qualify for an attractive tax benefit. You may take a full fair market value deduction on the day of the gift, and you need not declare the capital gain.
- Give Idle Assets. A year-end inventory may discover under-utilized or "idle assets" such as life insurance policies, Savings Bonds, boats, RVs, and many items that tend to clutter up our lives. Some can be given directly to the church or charity; others are better sold first with the cash contributed.
- Give Through a Life Income Gift. Through a Charitable Gift Annuity or a Charitable Remainder Trust you can continue to receive income from invested funds, often at even greater levels than you currently do. Upon your death, the remainder will go to the church and/or charities you have designated. Unlike a bequest, life income gifts offer significant tax advantages now.
- Give as Tax-Wise Planning. Making extra gifts in 2008 can enable an itemized income tax deduction or keep you in a lower federal tax bracket for the current year. Consult your tax advisor or accountant.
- Give Through an IRA Rollover. The Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008 (signed into law on Oct. 3) restored the provision enabling IRA owners over age 70 ½ to make tax free charitable gifts from their accounts directly to churches and charities. The extension is effective through Dec. 31, 2009 and is retroactive to the beginning of 2008. Talk to your IRA administrator.
- Give a Christmas Present to Your Church. For many of us the church is "family." A satisfying response to God's gift to us in Jesus Christ is our gift for God's work through the church at Christmas time.

But don't delay! To qualify for a 2008 charitable tax deduction, your gift must be made by December 31.

Gifts to FUMCH should be received by Sunday, Dec. 28 to be "posted" in 2008. If you plan a year-end gift to your church, consider our Building for Tomorrow Fund or our Permanent Endowment Fund. For more information, call the church office or Rev. Evans.

INTERPERSONAL RELATIONSHIPS

Did you know that the more friends you have, the less likely you are to catch a cold? Conversely, social isolation is devastating to good health. FRIENDS increase your capacity for pleasure and enhance ability to HEAL. Dr. David Speigel reported his findings in "Lancit Medical Journal" that women with breast cancer who participated in psychosocial support groups lived significantly longer than those who did not participate. These findings parallel those reported at UCLA, where it was discovered that structured group interventions reduced both mortality and recurrence.

Here is an example of staying healthy through social interaction:

A small town, Rasetta, PA., was found to be one of the healthiest communities in the country. Government investigations made some interesting discoveries.

The people were very close knit. The community gave help to anyone having a problem. They knew one another. They frequently had dinners together. Their mutual support was above the norm.

"And this commandment we have from Him, That he who loveth God love his brother also." (I John 4:21 KJV)

The power of love has greater impact on our quality of life, incidence of illness, and premature death than other risk factors, such as diet, smoking, lack of exercise, stress, genetics, drugs, or surgery.

Dr. Dean Ornish also states that loneliness and isolation increase the likelihood of engaging in harmful behaviors, such as smoking and overeating.

Relationships must be nurtured with time. The quality of our life may be determined by the quality of our relationships. A sense of belonging makes people feel cared for, loved, and valued.

"As the Father hath loved me, so have I loved you; continue ye in my love." (John 15:9 KJV)

In this day of easy-purchase at the market, it is hardly worthwhile to crank up the oven and assemble from scratch anymore. To all the "worker bees" who toted boxes and bags, lugged bulky items, priced and handled sticky price tags until their fingers tips were numb, broke down Sunday School classrooms, set up bazaar venues, then turned around and broke down and packed away everything before Sunday services...thank you, thank you, thank you!

The bazaar was the usual production happening under Pat Blake's chairmanship. After five years of being President of FUMCH's United Methodist Women, and being a United Methodist woman for 56 years, Pat will be stepping down as UMW President. But Pat still has plans chairing next year's bazaar. So, ladies, look for the notices of Bazaar Workshops starting in January 2009.

Passionate Spirituality ~ Spiritual Disciplines ~

Rather than writing about another spiritual discipline I'll expand a little more on the spiritual discipline of prayer. This time we'll take a look at some "prayer tools." Many people don't see the need for a prayer tool and may think this a strange idea. Actually this is not some "new" concept; most of these tools have been used since early Christianity.

Since prayer is a two-way communication, those of us who aren't used to being still, need some help getting quiet enough to listen to what God is communicating to us.

A prayer tool is any thing which helps us focus our attention on God. For many music or singing may be what quiets us and seems to usher us into the very presence of God. Personally I find it is praise music which does this best. God's Word says He inhabits the praises of His people.

"He restoreth my soul; He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake." (Psalm 22:3 KJV)

A prayer labyrinth can be a powerful tool if you walk prayerfully, silently, and expectantly. As you walk the labyrinth, your whole body is involved through constant motion. One minute you seem to be close to the center then suddenly you seem to be far away – a lot like our Christian journey. On the way toward the center of the labyrinth, we seem to pray about what is heavy on our hearts and to let go of things. After spending some time at the center, we wind our way back out and into the world.

Another prayer tool might be something visual like a stained glass window. There is one which has a significant meaning to me. Looking at the expression on Jesus' face, I can be quickly lost in thought about his love for me, or begin to "hear" whatever I need to hear. Truthfully I can merely "see" that window in my memory and it's as though I am with Him. The Chrismons on the tree in the Sanctuary or the nativities on a Christmas tree might be another visual prayer tool. And, of course, the Word of God. Reading and meditating on His Word is the best way I know to hear His still small voice.

If you have any questions about prayer tools, please get in touch. I would truly love to talk with you about them. Let's practice His presence often, especially during the Christmas season.

Education and Ministries

Education

The Sunday classes in our EBADOC Discipleship Academy are growing, both in the children's and adults' areas! Instead of the children's game of "moving chairs," we are playing moving classrooms, moving from one room to another as we wait for the new building to be completed. It's a great problem to have, and we are not complaining, but we will be glad to have the new building with its wonderful space.

If you are not in a Sunday morning class, I urge you to check them out.

We have a spot for you, no matter what your age!

- We are beginning a class for middle-school students, since several of our elementary students have now moved into that category. They will follow a modified rotation program that we are using with the younger children, and we hope they will learn as much and have as much fun.
- Small groups that took a break for the summer have begun again, and new ones have formed. They are helping us realize our mission statement, "Everyone becoming a disciple of Christ," by learning more and more about discipleship from the Lord's textbook. People in the groups are developing new friendships as they study together.
- A small group of young women met for lunch in November, had fun, and enthusiastically decided to "do this again." If you missed that luncheon, we'll call you for the next one. The mail tricked us, and invitations that were mailed a week in advance weren't delivered for days.

Ministries

- The HUGS group continues to remember our service men and women with gifts as our troops return to the U.S from war zones. Call Pam DuBose if you want to help.
- The Haiti exploratory team went to Carrenage in October, and the report was good. The people there were excited to have us back, and they pledged to work hard with us to make a difference in the school. We may also have the time and money to do a few things at Olivier, a United Methodist Church that sustained some damage to its protective wall during the storms. The hurricanes did huge damage to roads, but the team going in February should still be able to do the work there. The team is getting shots, collecting supplies, and meeting every month to get to know each other well and decide who will be the most effective in what job.
- We would like to have several volunteers to join Linda's Loaves. The teams work hard to get bread to the first-time visitors at the church, but sometimes we have a lot of visitors. We have bread machines to lend to those who bake, and I encourage you to join this group. The work is divided well so that no one has to bake every week, and the ministry is very rewarding.
- Financial Peace University has been a real success. We have had fourteen people involved in this thirteen-week class, and all say the same thing: "Why didn't someone teach me this when I was 20?" We are considering offering another class in the spring. It meets once a week for 13 weeks, in two-hour classes. Even the facilitators say that the class has changed their approach as to how they use their money! Age makes no difference. Financial status makes no difference. Dave Ramsey says that this is a class to learn to control your money rather than to allowing your money to control you. Call me if you are interested in the spring class. The cost for the materials is \$100, and you'll find that you can save more than that as you apply what you learn.

Construction Update on New Fellowship Center

Work inside the new Fellowship Center has continued during October and early November, although at a reduced rate. Inadequate space for several large air conditioning ducts in the truss area made it necessary to re-design duct and fire wall locations and alter the upper level storage room, all of which required a supplemental building permit. Work on air conditioning rough-ins and sheet rock installation was delayed for nearly a month waiting for permit approval.

Not all inside work was affected. Electrical and plumbing installations have continued, local AC duct work has been nearly completed, preparations for installing audio visual equipment have been made, and some inside finishing work has continued. The supplemental building permit was received during the first week of November, and all inside work is now moving ahead rapidly.

Much outside work has been underway during the lull inside. Paving has been cut and removed around the sides of the new building and its covered entrance to provide landscaping beds to beautify the structure. Concrete curbing now surrounds these beds, and the lime rock base under the asphalt is being removed and replaced with topsoil. Two other large areas of asphalt were removed at the extreme west end of the west parking lot. This was necessary to bring the ratio of pervious/impervious surface into conformance with county codes. Sod has now replaced the asphalt for those parking spaces. Landscaping plans have been completed, and efforts to install irrigation and prepare shrub beds for planting are in progress.

Several sections of new driveway plus several areas disturbed by construction have been re-paved with asphalt. Concrete walkways and entrance pads have been completed at a half dozen locations. Roof gutters and down spouts are in place, and a large drain pipe and sump have been installed to carry rain water away from the narrow area between the new building and the administration building.

Sewer lines have been installed to connect the new facilities to the county forced main sewer line on the north side of Yulee Drive. This required directional drilling to bring the sewer under Yulee Drive, under the east entrance to the church, and under the parking lot. Sewer lines from the sanctuary, education and administrative buildings have been re-routed and connected to the new sewer line as well. Within a few weeks, our old septic field will be retired and all of our facilities will be converted to the county sewer system.

Although the delay waiting for the supplemental permit to be approved has been frustrating for all concerned, and although the changes will result in some increase in cost, the project remains in good shape. We still expect construction to be completed ahead of schedule, and below cost.

On October 26^{th} the Building Committee lead guided tours for everyone who wanted to see the new facilities. We were even shown samples of color schemes, tile, etc.

A poster highlighting anticipated ministries was in each room. We also had the opportunity to write God's promises on the floor in any room. Some of the promises were written in rooms which have special meaning to the promise writer. Since the promises are written on the floor, we will be standing on the promises of God whenever we use the new facilities.

Of course they will be covered with flooring, but we will know they are there. This is one tangible way of acknowledging both Whose building this is and Who has enabled it to be built.

One day when a carpet square is replaced or work is done on the floor, those who benefit from what the Lord has built will see the promises they have been standing on!

So even if you did not write a promise on the floor yourself, remember whenever you are in the new facilities you are *standing on the promises of God*!

A GPS device is used to determine the location of the drill bit below ground, and direct it to the proper spot on the other side (top right). Once the drill bit and sleeve pipe is under the road, sewer pipe is pulled through the sleeve (above).

At the Bradshaw entrance to the west parking lot, asphalt is laid down by the paving machine, edges touched up by several workers, and then rolled to compress it to the same level as the surrounding pavement.

LANDSCAPE BEDS





Landscape beds have been cut out of the asphalt of the west parking lot near the covered entrance to the fellowship hall. Concrete curbs were then laid to outline each bed.



Lime rock that was the foundation for the former blacktop is being removed to make way for topsoil (above left). A small bed that will be planted with shrubs has been nearly outlined by the concrete curbing (above right).

To bring our impervious area down to code, several sections of asphalt parking have been removed and replaced with sod (right).





RAIN WATER SUMP AND BUBBLER






Rain water from the roofs of both the new Youth Center and the Administration Bld. funnel into the narrow space between these two buildings. The volume of water there could be very high during heavy rains, so all of the down spouts are being connected to a large drain pipe that will move the water away from the buildings and avoid problems of the water seeping inside. The three photos above show the ditch for the drain pipe, and the various down spout connections to it.

In the two photos below, a concrete box that will serve as the sump is being placed in a hole in the parking lot, and it will be connected to the drain pipe. Any water that cannot drain out the bottom of the sump will bubble up out of a grate into the parking lot and off into the drainage along Bradshaw.

Sign-up, this morning, for November's orders was overwhelming. Last year we sold a little over \$2,500. That included the fifty holiday food parcels that FUMCH gave out. Right now, we have orders for about \$2,600.

Saturday's sign-up is usually busier and we expect to receive over \$700. That will bring us up to at least \$3,000. Top this with FUMC of Crystal River ordering another fifty-two holiday food parcels to give away. That's another \$1,500. (Crystal River closed their SHARE program some time ago.) That puts us in the high \$4,000s.


Seems there are a lot of people needing help in these hard times. Almost every day, someone will call us to ask about the SHARE program. We have a lot of new people every month.

December's menu is not available yet but if you come by the office after November 22nd, we will have SHARE newspapers. Last year's Christmas package was well received. If you're planning a Christmas dinner at home, you can't go wrong with ordering one. We won't tell your family you only paid about half price for everything.

Last month, the king and queen of Thailand presided over a Brahmin ritual to raise a seven-tiered white umbrella over the newly completed funeral pyre of the late Princess Galyani, the king's sister, who died in January. The umbrella signifies her position in the monarchy, with the only larger umbrella being a nine-tiered one for kings.

The ceremony was part of a Hindu ritual meant to help the princess on her way to heaven.

The royal funeral pyre itself is a many layered creation that is said to represent different levels of heaven. The cremation ceremony will be held Nov. 14-19 in Bangkok and will include six processions of royal chariots



to carry the royal urn and decorations. There will also be three stages hosting dramas, music and puppet shows dating back to the 1800s as well as many Buddhist and Hindu religious rituals.

News from the Wooster's



Greetings from frozen Siberia!

"Shout to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs!"

Psalm 100:1-2

We are quite joyful and filled with gladness; not only because we know Him as our Lord but also because He has allowed us to be here another year among the people we love.

The holiday season is quickly approaching and everyone will soon be busy with the preparations for their New Year's celebration. (Christmas is not celebrated with gifts and a huge meal; the Russians do this for the New Year. Christmas is recognized by the Orthodox Church as a religious holiday but is celebrated on the 7th of January, not December 25th.) Although the commercialism that goes with the holiday is very evident, the 'real reason for the season' has been lost for now.

As we sit and write this update, there is very little snow on the ground. It's very windy and cold and we know it's only a matter of days, maybe weeks, before everything will be frozen solid for the next four or more months.

We wish we could write and say the hearts of the people in the village have "melted" just a little, but it's not the case; the hearts remain "frozen." Those we've met in the stores and on the street are friendly; however, they all believe us to be part of a sect and not to be trusted.

We ask for open hearts and doors so we can build true friendships and relationships. Fellowship is discouraged, but there is our refusal to give up, and we have seen incredible personal growth because of the "trials" in which we are learning to "persevere." We are living out James 1 and learning how to do so in JOY.

A few quick updates on the building and window project in the village:

Thatter a few attempts at building a brick furnace and chimney for the heating system; we now have a wood or coal burning furnace to heat the two buildings for the winter months. There are still a few small glitches we're working out, but believe it will keep us quite warm when those

-30 and -40 C. temperatures arrive.

The picture isn't very good, but there's a small metal furnace in front, which is designed to carry the heat to pipes with water, (the same as old homes heated with radiators in the US) and behind is a brick chimney which helps heat the workshop area and carry the smoke out through the roof.

The window project moves forward slowly, but forward. We thought for sure we'd have photos for you before this newsletter but sadly do not. Kevin has found the place to order the windows and will have installed the windows in the first apartment by the time you are reading this update. His next step will be meeting the local officials and asking them who is in greatest need of windows. Although the weather is colder, we can still install them in the same day and not cause a family to have to leave their apartment for any amount of time. We ask for wisdom and favor in the eyes of the local government.

The ladies of the fellowship have begun a study/ course on "Wisdom for Mothers" by Denise Glenn. We have many young Moms and most are without husbands. They're eager to learn new skills from His Word and change old habits that just aren't working. Again, we ask for wisdom and clarity in language as Laura is leading this study entirely in Russian.

In October, the fellowship in the city celebrated their 10-year anniversary. We can't believe it's been ten years already. It was incredible to be a part of their celebra-

tion and to see so many new families and young people. Those who were once in the youth group are now the leaders of the fellowship or are leading other smaller study groups. Many other local fellowships stopped by to give words of encouragement, adding something special to the day. It was a wonderful picture of how the "body" gathers for one reason only...to worship the Creator of the heavens and earth.




