In "A Faith to Proclaim," James Stewart tells about an artist who painted a picture of the confrontation between Faust and the devil.

Faust had gambled with the devil, and the soul of Faust was to be the prize.

In the artist's rendition, the confrontation is pictured as a chess match. Looking at the picture, things seem pretty bleak. The game is almost over, and Faust has only a few pieces left - a king, a knight and one or two pawns. On his face is a look of blank despair.

On the other side of the chessboard, the devil leers in anticipation. The situation is hopeless - Faust is checkmated.

One day in the art gallery, a chess master viewing the picture became fascinated by the

look of despair on the face of Faust. He turned his attention to the chess pieces, studying them intently. Other people came and went, but the chess master continued to concentrate on the chessboard.

Suddenly the gallery's quiet was shattered by a shout from the chess master. "It's a lie! The king and the knight have another move!"

Sin's seeming checkmate is a lie! The God of all creation had another move.

The birth of Jesus exposes the lie that sin and death have control over our lives. It is through the birth of a baby born in a stable that God shows us a spectacular move just when many believed there were no moves left.

With the arrival of the Christ child in Bethlehem, we are given the opportunity to dis-

cover that the game is not over, that sin and the devil can still be defeated in our lives.

Christmas is a celebration of God's gift of his Son, a "move" promising salvation and forgiveness to all mankind. This gift was made available to everyone who would receive Him, even to those who feel they have sold their souls and identify with the deep despair of Faust. The move to receive Jesus Christ as God's salvation is available to all, even to those who feel they are already defeated by life's challenges.

Wise Discipleship

Did you ever notice the importance of the words following the little word "if"?

- If you want to go with me tomorrow, call me tonight.
- If you love me, you will.....
- If I figure out the answer, I'll let you know.

Jesus based the reality of discipleship on certain "if" clauses. Just as in choosing to receive Jesus Christ is based on our willingness to respond in a certain way - *if you confess with your mouth*, "Jesus is Lord," and *(if you) believe in your heart* that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved (Romans 10:9, bracketed words added) - so becoming a disciple is another step of saying yes to "if" challenges. Jesus said to those Jews who had believed him up to a certain point, "*If you hold to my teachings*, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." (John 8:31-33)

What is the challenge of the "if" clause?

The Jews listening to Jesus found this "if" too much to accept and began defending themselves on the basis of their traditional faith, claiming God as their Father through their ancestral relationship to Abraham and their obedience to Old Testament laws.

How did Jesus respond as recorded in John 8:42?

Why do you think Jesus would tell them that *if* God were really their Father, they would love him?

How are his words here related to his words in John 14:15, "*If you love me*, you will obey what I command"?

And again, in John 14:23a, Jesus says, "*If anyone loves me*, he will obey my teaching..." Why is loving Jesus so important in our seeking to hold to the teachings of Jesus?

We laugh at the truth of the oft-repeated illustration - you can sit in a garage for as long as you want, but sitting in a garage won't make you a car. In the same way, we can sit in church Sunday after Sunday, attend Sunday School and Bible studies faithfully, work hard on committees but none of these things will make us disciples. We can only become disciples if we are willing to go beyond just the hearing to "holding to" or obeying the "ifs" Jesus gives us.

To the large crowds who were following him because they were delighted with his way of teaching and his miracles, he gave this "if" clause: "*If anyone comes to me and does not hate* his father and mother, his wife and children, his brothers and sisters - yes, even his own life - he cannot be my disciple. And anyone who does not carry his cross and follow me cannot be my disciple. (Luke 14:25-27) From last month's study, we know Jesus did not want us to literally hate others, but to love him how in comparison? _____

Why is this "if" a hard one for us to accept?

We know a disciple can only have one master. Why is it necessary for Jesus to have more influence over us than family or even our traditional way of life? (Remember the Jews in the first "if" situation.)

Identify some things (or people) that might challenge the Lordship of Jesus in your life.

One of the most challenging "ifs" in the family of God is this command: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, *if you love one another.*" (John 13:34-35) The one marker to witness to others that we are disciples is:

What happened to "*if* you are in church every Sunday, *if* you give your tithe, *if* you work hard for God..." Why do you think Jesus didn't use these as ways to identify His Disciples?

THINK ABOUT IT:

As Christians, we assign great importance to "The Great Commission." Have you noticed what it doesn't say? There's nothing there about many of the things we think of as important reasons for "going out." Jesus said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore *go and make disciples of all nations*, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and *teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you*. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

- Are we intent on making others disciples of Christ or converts to our way of thinking?

- Are we eager to teach others to obey ("hold to") Christ's teachings or do we find that we ourselves are not particularly excited about being the kind of Christian who actively obeys Christ's commands?

What is your personal response to the "ifs" of discipleship?

ALL-CHURCH CLEAN-UP DAY

The Building For Tomorrow Committee and the Trustees have scheduled an "All-Church Clean-Up Day" on Monday, December 10, from 9 a.m. to noon (or longer if needed) to prepare our buildings for the construction scheduled to begin in January. As you know, the existing Fellowship Hall, Kitchen, Youth Room, and adjacent restrooms will be demolished to make room for the new Phase III facilities. We must remove all furniture, equipment, and supplies in those areas before the contractors start their work.

On clean-up day, we'll have a large storage container on site, along with trash bags, and several pick-up trucks waiting to haul our discards to the dump. But we need your help to make this day a success! We need:



- You or your committee to organize and dispose of any unused items stored in areas not scheduled for demolition. This will open up space to store materials and supplies from areas affected by our construction. If it hasn't been used for 3 or more years, it's a good candidate for disposal! So...if you are on a committee or in a group that has anything at all to be stored, you will want to be there to determine where the material goes. If no one from that committee shows up, out the stuff goes, because the Building Committee personnel are ruthless and take no prisoners.
- You or your committee to sort through and dispose of unused items in areas to be demolished.
- People to pack, tape, and label boxes with storage items.
- People to move items designated for storage from sections to be demolished to other climate-controlled storage areas in the church.
- People to label newly reorganized storage areas.
- People to carry furniture, equipment, and boxed supplies into the on-site storage container.
- People with pick-up trucks willing to take our discards to the landfill.
- People willing to clean up the messes this process will create.

There's a task for virtually everyone, regardless of age or physical stamina. The last time something like this was done, more than 100 people showed up and everyone had a good time helping the church accomplish an important task.



Building constructions will be starting in January 2008, so our Church members can sign out books until the end of December.

If you are avid readers, you are encouraged to take out as many books as you may want to read for a few months as long as you leave the sign-out cards in the yellow box.

However, these books cannot be returned until construction is completed. Listed below are some of the new selections.

1. **“THE SOUND OF MY VOICE”** by Jo Kadlecck . This tells the story of Jordan Riddle, aspiring playwright and part-time waitress. She lives in New York City, waiting for her big break. Peter Riddle, her father, is Assistant Pastor of a church in Jackson, Mississippi. They haven’t talked in five years due to a misunderstanding. As a shared grief emerges from the past, neither is prepared for the cost required to heal the painful disappointment that separates them when art and faith collide.

2. **“THE BACHELOR’S BARGAIN”** by Catherine Palmer. Housemaid Anne Webster accepts the proposal of roguish Ruel Chouteau in order to save her family from their dire circumstances. Both have their own agenda - she to use his riches, and he to use her lace-making skills. Can they put their differences aside to fend off an unexpected foe? And, as always, Miss Pickworth, the society tattler, has a thing or two to say about the scandalous union.

3. **“THE MEASURE OF A LADY”** by Deeanne Gist. There are Five Rules for Proper 19th Century Ladies in San Francisco:

1) Speak politely - even when you’re the only respectable woman around protesting the city’s decadent surrender to gold fever.

2) Dress modestly - wear your sunbonnet at all times and make sure nobody sees the men’s boots that you’re wearing muddied by city streets.

3) Remain devoted to family - protect your siblings from temptation, even against their wishes.

4) Stand above reproach - most difficult when a captivating man turns out to be a saloon owner.

5) Rise above temptation. No accepting gifts or bestowing favors. No impeachable behavior except maybe a little kiss.

These rules become increasingly difficult to uphold. Can Rachel Van Buren remain a beacon of virtue in a city of vice?

4. **“THE HOPE WITHIN”** by Tracie Peterson.

Part of the Heirs of Montana series, this story follows Dianne Selby and her family as they leave their Montana home to visit her husband Cole’s dying father in Kansas. Dianne receives a cold reception and she faces a dramatic decision that could determine the fate of the people and land she loves.

5. **“THE BELIEVER”** from storyteller, Nicholas Sparks. Jeremy Marsh is the ultimate young New Yorker and an expert on debunking the supernatural. When he gets information about ghostly lights that appear in a legend-shrouded cemetery in the tiny town of Boone Creek, North Carolina, he sets out to investigate. While there, he meets the librarian, beautiful Lexie Darnell. If they are to be together, Jeremy must make a difficult choice

6. **“A CHRISTMAS TO REMEMBER”** by Thomas Kinkade.

Return to Cape Light for the touching story of bedridden Lillian Warwick, who shares special memories with her daughters.

7. **“A SISTER’S SECRET”** by Wanda E. Brunstetter.

Book One of Sisters of Holmes County.

Grace, the oldest sister in the Hostettler family puts her “rumschpringe,” (her running around years) behind her and returns to the Amish community in Holes County, Ohio, where she wants to live the rest of her life. She settles into her new life and is engaged to Cleon Schrock, an upright and loving Amish man. Suddenly, out of the blue, she runs into Gary Walker, an ‘Englischer’ who knows more than enough about her life when she was out in the world to destroy her future.. Will love and faith triumph over shame and deception? You won’t want to miss this thrilling read!

8. **“THE CHRISTMAS LETTERS”** by Bret Nicholaus. Four generations of Grandpa’s family convene for Christmas Eve dinner to celebrate the holiday. In the midst of the usual conversations, Grandpa calls for their attention. Each family member receives a personal letter from Grandpa - along with a life-changing lesson that will stay with them forever. It’s the little things in life that often mean the most.

9. **“THE CHALICE OF ISRAEL”** by Marilou Flinkman et al. Four stories by four different authors. God uses a chalice to draw His children home. The stories follow the Chalice from A.D. 49 to 12th century Jerusalem to a 1948 refugee camp to 2000 in modern Jerusalem. Each woman’s story is one of romance and spiritual growth.

10. "A NEW FRONTIER - SAGA OF THE SIERRAS" by Brock & Bodie Thoene.

(Four bestselling novels complete in one volume). They include "The Man from Shadow Ridge," "Riders of the Silver Rim," "Gold Rush Prodigal," and "Sequoia Scout."

11. "DREAM THIEF" by Stephen R. Lawhead.

Dr. Spencer Reston, dream research scientist on space station Gotham, discovers that he has become a vital link in a cosmic coup masterminded by a mysterious creature known as the Dream Thief - and all civilization hangs in the balance. Here is science fiction that is fast-paced adventure, alien settings, cliff-hanging suspense, and compelling spiritual underpinnings.

12. "OPAL" by Lauraine Snelling.

Book 3 of Dakotah Treasures. This follows "Ruby" and "Pearl." Opal can outshoot, outride and outwork any cowboy on the ranch, but when she makes a foolish, though innocent, decision, her dear friend Atticus is taken from her and she is consumed with feelings of guilt and self-recrimination. A new arrival among the people of Dakotah Territory is Jacob Chandler, a young minister hiding secrets from his past. He wants to begin a new life with his son and soon finds himself falling in love with the enchanting Opal. Will the tragedy that broke Opal's heart keep her from love forever?

13. "AMETHYST" by Lauraine Snelling.

Book 4 of Dakotah Treasures. It's 1886 and Major Jeremiah McHenry is retiring from the Army and returning to Medora in the Dakotah Territory. He wants a new, quieter life - and he wants to find a wife. Feisty newcomer, Amethyst Colleen O'Shaunasy, is trying to recover from her mother's death and to escape her abusive father back in Pennsylvania. Amethyst is drawn to the retired Major. Can he convince her he's just the kind of man she needs to heal her broken heart?

We also have the following:

DVD - "ONE NIGHT WITH THE KING"

It runs 124 minutes and the cast includes Peter O'Toole, Omar Sharif, and John Rhys-Davis. This is the sweeping epic about Hadassah, the young Jewish orphan girl who becomes the biblical Esther, Queen of Persia, after marrying the powerful King Xerxes. An inspiring story about courage, faith, and destiny.

VCR - "JESUS"

By Warner Brothers, and runs 83 minutes. This is an epic story of the tragedy and triumph of the most controversial life in human history.

From Ireland to America

Did you know that some of the first Methodists to set foot on American soil were immigrants from Ireland? In 1760 Philip Embury and his wife, along with cousin Barbara Heck, came from County Limerick to New York City. They were catalysts in the founding of a Methodist Society in lower Manhattan - on the site where John Street UMC stands today.

In the little village of Ballingrane in County Limerick, there is a small chapel erected to the memory of Philip Embury and Barbara Heck. That is one of the out-of-the-way places we will visit on our Tour to Ireland from May 24-June 7, 2008. And the itinerary includes most of the famous sites you have read about in both the Republic and in Northern Ireland.

As United Methodists, however, we will see a few other places where John Wesley lived and preached on some of his 42 pilgrimages from England to Ireland. During his first visit, in 1747, Wesley wrote from Dublin, "For natural sweetness of temper, for courtesy and hospitality, I have never seen a people like the Irish."

We expect to experience that same hospitality as we visit the Emerald Isle. More than 25 people are now registered and we are ready to open the tour to others beyond our congregation. We expect the trip to "sell out," so don't be disappointed. Pick up an information packet at the church office. Call me (563-5833) with any questions. As I have been studying David's life for the past few months, I realized that David also carried a AAA card. His card, however, is a spiritual one, and I found it in the pattern of David's life.

When David recognizes that something is wrong, that he needs help, he asks God. God diagnoses the problem and tells him what to do. Then David acts.

Ask, Answer, Act...AAA.

As I looked carefully at David's life - and we all know that he did some pretty bad things - I found that the only time he got in trouble was when he failed to use his Spiritual AAA Card. When he acted on impulse, when he acted on emotion, when he acted on desire, he was in trouble. He needed an expert, but he tried to fix things himself. For some of those actions, the consequences were far-reaching. Years of grief ensued.

I won't have to pay an annual fee for my spiritual AAA card because Jesus has paid for my life membership. But I want to learn from David and never leave home - or stay home - without it. I'll ask, He'll answer, I'll act.

I'm going to put my spiritual AAA card right next to my automotive AAA card, as a reminder that I'll stay out of trouble if I always ask God for His help with this life that I often don't know how to handle.

Prayer: Father, You know so much better than I how to diagnose the signs of trouble in my life. I would never try to fix my own car. Yet I often try to fix my life. Forgive me. Help me to remember to ask You - the ultimate expert - to help me diagnose and correct the trouble spots in my life. Help me learn to always ask, wait for Your answer, and then act. Amen.

We hope you get this on time to order the Christmas Holiday Package. It is a 6 lb. Boneless Honey Smoked Ham with broccoli, peas, corn, rolls and other fruits and an Apple Pie, all for \$25.00. The price is up but it is still the best bargain in town.

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

We have a little more than a month before we make that journey back to Siberia. At times, it is quite overwhelming, but we have seen the Lord pour out his grace and peace just when it's needed the most. The actual packing will begin soon and the decisions as to what can actually go and what will have to stay behind...is the item a need or a want...is it worth another bag? As always, we pray for discernment; even with packing, it's easy to start packing things that really aren't necessary and forget items that could be useful in the ministry.

We have a huge prayer request at this time and wanted to share this with our prayer partners and church family. We recently received word of law changes for foreigners seeking visas to live in Russia. This isn't unusual except for the fact that the law went into affect immediately and is being enforced across the country.

The government has decided to allow one year visas; however, you can only stay 90 days then must leave the country for 90 days before you can return. Again, you can only stay another 90 days; then you must leave the country for another 90 days. Bottom line - you can be in the country 180 days a year but not all at one time.

Of course our first response is...what? How can we ever minister to anyone with regulations like this? However, we know this is not a surprise to God and that if He wants us to be there, he has worked out those details already, and we just have to trust the outcome. We will stand on His promises and 'press on' towards the goal. There are people waiting to hear of the hope and love that only come with a knowledge of Jesus.




