Easter is the celebration of Jesus walking out of the tomb where he had been placed in death just two days before.


It is new life in the face of death and hope in the face of disappointment.



Get Lent....Protestants do the sober season.

If you grew up, as I did, thinking of Lent as the Time of the Frozen Fish Sticks, you can't help but be surprised by the expanding enthusiasm for the pre-Easter season of penitence and fasting.

Lent, it seems, isn't just for Catholics anymore. Over the last few years, more Protestant churches have begun daubing ashes on the foreheads of the faithful on Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent in Western Christianity (February 21st this year).

Fasting, long familiar to Catholics as a Lenten fact of life, is increasingly popular with evangelical Christians striving for spiritual awakening. A few mainline Protestant churches even conduct foot-washing services on Maundy Thursday - the traditional commemoration of Jesus' washing the feet of his disciples—that takes place on the Thursday before Easter. Which seems like a sign that Protestants may be starting to beat Catholics at their own game.

The showy practices typical of Lent—fasting and vigils, ashes and incense—once helped define the split of the Reformation. When they broke away in the 16th and 17th centuries, most Protestant churches left behind anything that smacked of Catholic practice. (Though a few "high-church" denominations—Episcopalians, for example—remained partial to ashes and other staples of Catholic ritual.) So, what's at work when Protestants and Catholics find common cause in fasting and foot-washing? While no one's ready to declare an end to 500 years of ecumenical disagreement, the widening appeal of Lent reflects the interest among believers of all kinds in traditional ways of worship.

The fast and the ritual wearing of ashes predate Christianity - Job repents "in dust and ashes" in the Hebrew Bible. In the early church, it was a common to prepare for the celebration of Easter with a two- or three-day period of penitence and fasting. Originally, the fast was for new Christians preparing for baptism. But it became a way for all church faithful to commemorate Jesus' suffering and by the fourth century had expanded to 40 days. In the Middle Ages, believers limited themselves during Lent to no meat and just one meal a day. Some fasts were more extreme. According to the Catholic Encyclopedia, some church members abstained not just from meat, but from eggs, milk, cheese, and any "fruit covered by a hard shell." The ritual of putting ashes on the forehead grew out of a public confession ceremony for Christian sinners that preceded Easter. It became a prescribed practice throughout the church by the 11th century.

Though the rules for fasting and abstinence have relaxed over the centuries, Catholics still see Lent as a sacred time of self-denial, prayerful contemplation, and, yes, breaded cod. Adult Catholics are expected to fast (usually defined as eating one meal a day) on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Catholic-school kids see their lunchroom hot dogs replaced with meat-free fare. Many Catholics still "give up something for Lent" - chocolate or alcohol, for example. But the emphasis is as likely to be on almsgiving or acts of charity, in hopes of making the world or one's self better rather than simply abstaining from pleasure.

The Swiss Protestant reformer Ulrich Zwingli mounted one of the first protests against Lenten traditions in 1522. Zwingli defended Zurich printers who insisted they needed their daily meat to have the strength to do their work properly. He complained that the rules of Lent had more to do with obeying Rome than with obeying the Gospel, which, after all, said nothing about whether or not to eat sausages in the weeks preceding Easter. Martin Luther cautioned against fasting "with a view to meriting something by it as by a good work," arguing that Catholic teachings gave believers the false idea that fasting could cancel out sin and win points toward salvation. In his Institutes of the Christian Religion, John Calvin criticized Lent as a "superstitious observance."

Protestants remained conflicted about Lent into the 20th century. Ashes and fish sticks were the stuff of Catholic life, and Catholics were very much the other team. Evangelical Christians in particular skirted Lent because it smacked of high-church liturgical rule-making. In 1960, *Christianity Today* ran an editorial describing Protestant believers torn between the obligation to "do something" about observing the most sacred season in the Christian calendar" and the "sense of indignation that stirs within the Protestant breast, even to the pitch of revolt, at what the Church has done with Lent in the past." These Protestants could not separate Lenten traditions from their disdain for Rome and its elevation of "manifold regulations" over scripture.



So, how did Catholic Lenten traditions spread across the border? For one thing, the boundaries between traditions are not what they used to be. Crossing them is a steady traffic of believers and seekers. Want to meet someone who was raised Catholic? Try an evangelical megachurch, or the local United Church of Christ. About one-third of believers change churches at least once, according to commonly cited studies. Inevitably, all this changing of churches ends up changing the churches, as people bring bits of their worship traditions with them. Catholic liturgy has appropriated pop music and hand-holding in evangelical style. So, maybe it's not that surprising that more Protestants are now dipping into the well of Catholic ritual and devotions. In that sense, Lent may be part of a trend: Check out the Ecumenical Miracle Rosary, which recasts Catholic devotional beads for Protestant use by eliminating those troublesome Hail Marys.

Observing Lent is also part of a Protestant move in the last generation toward more classical forms of spiritual discipline. The hugely influential 1978 book *Celebration of Discipline*, by Quaker theologian Richard J. Foster, encouraged churchgoers to rediscover fasting and meditation in "answer to a hollow world" and as a way to turn toward God. Some questing Protestants started making like monks, practicing silence and solitude. All this was made more palatable by the improved relations between Catholics and Protestants that followed the Second Vatican Council reforms of the 1960s.

CHURCH COUNCIL PRESENTATION - December 2006

On June 29, 2006 we held a church wide meeting to discuss what missions/ministries/programs/dreams that FUMC of Homosassa should be involved in for the next five years.

During the meeting more than thirty ideas were generated and we were able to consolidate the top five in order to lay the groundwork for our mission statement "Everyone becoming a disciple of Christ".



Passionate Spirituality - Group Leaders- Jan Wise and Walt Dilling

PASSIONATE SPIRITUALITY for a Christian is an intense desire to know God—not just to experience his blessings or do his work, not just to know about him, but to know God himself in a deeply personal way. If this becomes a priority in this church, all the other things will fall into place. God promised, “You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart.” (Jeremiah 29:13) Our goal is to encourage at least 50% of our church to be involved in this seeking.

- At least 50 % of congregation engaged in seeking to know God
- More small groups with a Biblical emphasis (We have 15 now—6 Sunday School, 9 “small groups”)
- More involvement in prayer groups (similar to the men’s prayer group that meets Wednesdays)
- More involvement in foundational study groups (Disciple, Christianity 101, periodic 4-week studies)
- Leadership involved in at least one Bible refresher course a year
- Discovering ways to draw our Sunday church attendees into more of the spiritual life of the church

Financial Needs: Minimal unless no classroom space available – then building costs.

Community Involvement - Group Leaders- Jack Schrock and Shelby Weingarten

The initial focus of the Community Outreach committee has been to encourage greater participation by our congregation in our on-going outreach efforts. In addition, we have started, in conjunction with Wonderful Wednesdays, delivery of meals to shut-ins. Hosting flu shots and arranging for life-line screenings is a focus for 2007. Future projects will look toward providing scholarships to students for church camps and/or college. We will explore funding through some existing district programs.

- 2007 Meals on Wheels, Flu shots for the Church membership, and Life Lines
- 2008 summer camp scholarships (Bible summer camps), College Scholarships.
- 2009 Children’s Scholarships
- 2010 Soup kitchen

Financial Needs: Minimal

Worship Types and Times- Group Leaders- Bill Gilbert and Jim Potts

The focus of this committee is develop a blended worship of different types and times as requested by the church body. In order to develop these different types of worship there are initial equipment needs including visual sound screens, projectors, mikes, software and other equipment.

Financial Needs:

- 2007- \$39,000- Projectors and Screens, part time Technician
- 2008- \$11,600- Solo mike
- 2009-\$11,200- Choir mike
- 2010- \$65,000- Assistant Pastor and more audio equipment

Covenant with Foreign Church - Group Leaders-Marcia Bader and Pat Layman

2007 - Marcia Bader and Mark Whittaker had spoken with the Mission Committee about the group sending at least one person on a Mission this year with a Church Conference Mission. Depending on the Faith Pledge, that the Mission group asks the Congregation for in January, the group might need up to \$1000.00 to accomplish this goal.

- 2008 Support Conference Mission Programs – could maybe be done with Faith pledges.
- 2009 Teams going on Mission trips
- 2010 Help a Covenant Church

Under 18 Programs - Group Leaders-Steve Skelly and Chuck Dixon

Our Goal is to build upon the current programs and continue the growth of Sunday School programs, VBS, Youth Fellowship, Sacred Dance, and Youth Singers. We will continue to seek ways to become more relevant to children and youth in out local community by continuing to work with the school system, offering aid to teachers and coaches, providing academic and tutoring support at the church, and working with the computer committee to provide computers to low income students. We will continue our local community service mission at Bluebird Springs through the county Adopt a Park program. As the fellowship hall and youth are completed, we will launch additional programs and outreaches to expand our ability to relate to and reach children and youth.

- 2007 & 2008 - Continue current programs while adding youth mission-trip and Methodist camp opportunities
- 2009 & 2010 - Continue current programming while launching outreach oriented youth events and programs in the new youth center.

Month of March

The entire month of March falls during the liturgical season known as Lent and is represented by the liturgical color purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart.

What is Ordinary Time?

The rhythm of the liturgical seasons reflects the rhythm of life — with its celebrations of anniversaries and its seasons of quiet growth and maturing.

Ordinary Time, meaning ordered or numbered time, is celebrated in two segments: from the Monday following the Baptism of Our Lord up to Ash Wednesday; and from Pentecost Monday to the First Sunday of Advent.

This makes it the largest season of the Liturgical Year.

In vestments usually green, the color of hope and growth, the Church counts the thirty-three or thirty-four Sundays of Ordinary Time, inviting her children to meditate upon the whole mystery of Christ – his life, miracles and teachings – in the light of his Resurrection.

If the faithful are to mature in the spiritual life and increase in faith, they must descend the great mountain peaks of Easter and Christmas in order to "pasture" in the vast verdant meadows of tempus per annum, or Ordinary Time.

Sunday by Sunday, the Pilgrim Church marks her journey through the tempus per annum as she processes through time toward eternity.



**March 11:
Decision Time for our
Building Program**

Our church building program is at a critical cross-roads.

We have been anxious to begin construction on the third and final phase of this program

for several years, but have been waiting to accumulate additional cash to keep the mortgage we will need to a prudent level.

It has now become clear that this approach is not working.

The problem is quite simple. Construction costs are escalating so fast that the amount of cash we need for a down payment keeps moving out of reach.

We estimate that the cost of Phase 3 is increasing at the rate of \$115,000 to \$120,000 each year.

Our building income from the current 3-year pledge campaign is only slightly more than that, so we are gaining very little on our goal.

Building materials are in great demand throughout the world, especially in developing countries like China, India, and Brazil.

Steel, concrete, lumber and other materials represent about 40% of total building costs, and have been increasing at rates between 5% and 15% annually.

We expect these costs to continue to escalate as these countries continue to develop. These rapidly increasing costs offset the money we are accumulating for construction.

But we have an opportunity right now to break out of this vicious circle.

We recently retired our Phase 2 mortgage and we are now debt-free.

If we can raise \$200,000 in cash by the end of March, we will add that to the nearly \$570,000 we expect to have accumulated for construction by the end of this year.

That would provide a down payment of about 1/3 of the total cost of Phase 3 and monthly payments we can afford, based on a 20-year mortgage.

We then plan to make future mortgage payments from 3-year pledge campaigns until our church membership grows to where the mortgage payments can be come a line item in the Operating Budget.

That's why your Building Committee decided to launch a campaign to raise \$200,000 in one-time, cash-only gifts.

If successful, we could begin construction within a year, giving us the use of these new facilities four or more years sooner than if we just continue to wait, and we'll save over a half million dollars in inflated construction costs in the process.

You've been hearing about this campaign for the past month.

Now the time has come to decide whether we move ahead with Phase 3 construction soon, or place Phase 3 on hold for an indefinite period of time.

At Sunday worship on March 11, you will be asked to bring your gifts for this campaign to the altar.

We will need a substantial number of gifts in the \$500 to \$5,000 range, along with those of both smaller and larger amounts.

We hope you will embrace this challenge, and respond enthusiastically with a personally-significant gift.

Remember that we are not asking for pledges, but for one-time, cash donations.

Cash may be any form of payment that we can utilize immediately – cash, check, money order, electronic fund transfer, transfer of stocks/bonds/mutual fund shares, withdrawal of IRA or 401K funds, etc.

Please call the church office if you'd like information on any of these options.

So, March 11 is decision time.

If we are successful in this campaign, we will move ahead immediately with architect's drawings and engineering specifications for phase 3.

We'd expect to solicit bids by the end of this year, and if satisfactory, call a church conference shortly after bid opening for membership approval.

Actual construction could begin early in 2008.

Our dream is within reach.

With your help, we can begin immediately!



Walking on the Path

(Note: This month's devotional was written by guest author, Richard Stanard, and prayer by Robin Van Cleef.)

"The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and said, 'Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world.' "
John 1:29



Most of us have little or no direct experience with a real lamb. Pictures show a lamb precious in appearance: snow white fur, pink skin, floppy ears, the pink nose, a sweet little face.

I have a photograph of a lamb resting comfortably in the arms of a little girl. This photograph gives me new insight of Jesus as the Lamb of God. As I study my photograph, I ask myself: "Who could possibly want to hurt such a precious, helpless, defenseless creature as is this lamb? What would it take for the lamb's master to allow harm to befall this innocent, trusting creature?"

Though Israel two thousand years ago could not see this, we know from Scripture that Jesus is God's lamb (I Cor 5:7), more precious by far than the animal in my picture!

Yet God allowed His Lamb to be harmed unmercifully over an unimaginably protracted period of time till death claimed him. But death could not hold Him, and this empirically shows us that, with God's loving omnipotence, death's power, though strong, is not to be feared.

So how do I find this loving omnipotence? The formula is almost too simple: it is my heavenly father God's unconditional gift to me, and all I need do to feel its power is to by faith embrace it and carry it with me in my heart (Eph 2:8).

Prayer: Lord, in this Lenten season, I sense my need of You. Yet I'm not quite sure how to reach You.

I heard somebody say, "Read your Bible," but too often the words are like bullets that ricochet off my brain.

I heard somebody say, "Pray," but my prayers, hurled heavenward, fall back to earth like lifeless stones.

I heard somebody say, "Meditate," but my wandering mind was lost in a desert of random thoughts.

Lord, speak to me through Your Word, and let it penetrate my mind, my heart. Lord, speak to me through my prayers, and turn the lifeless stones to bread. Lord, speak to me in the midst of meditation, that I may see, amid life's seeming wilderness, the way, the truth, the life.

THE MARCH WIND DOTH BLOW

A cold snap gives us a good reason to curl up with a good book -- and it's a way to open our minds and renew our spirits as the Lenten season approaches:

1. "Runaway Lives" by Tom Smiley is a book that gives logical reasons why lives spin out of control and practical steps to restore order and sanity to life.
2. "Great Stories Remembered" compiled by Joe L. Wheeler. This is a collection in easy-to-read print of many short stories.
3. "90 Minutes in Heaven" by Don Piper, a true story of death and life. Don Piper's car was crushed by a semi-truck. Medical personnel said he died instantly. Ninety minutes after the wreck, while a minister prayed for him, Piper miraculously returned to life on earth with only the memory of inexpressible heavenly bliss. The experience dramatically changed his life.
4. "A Wild Ride Up The Cupboards" by Ann Bauer, a novel about a child who at 4 years of age starts to withdraw from the world as he drifts into autism, and follows his parents' struggle to sustain their marriage. This drama poses provocative real-life questions. How much should a mother sacrifice for her children? Is it ever worth sacrificing a marriage for a child? How much intervention is too much?
5. "The Dream Lives On!" by Rose Sims. In the tradition of Catherine Marshall, this is the inspiring story of one woman's far-reaching vision for her nation and for the church. She had worked tirelessly with her husband for 27 years

to reopen and renew small rural churches. When he was dying, he challenged Rose to carry on his vision for the country church. Rose persisted through single parenthood, with a son in trouble with the law, the terminal illness of a second spouse, and professional setbacks. Her story is filled with insights and wisdom for those with the courage to live their dreams.

6. "A Life On the Road" by Charles Kuralt. This is a blast from the past for those who remember this popular TV program. Mr. Kuralt takes us with him down those roads with humor, warmth, affection and an eloquent insight into America and the people who enriched his life during his travels.
7. "A Listening Ear - Reflections on Christian Caring" by Paul Tournier, a well-known Swiss physician and counselor. It's most important to learn to listen - to really take time to listen to people and to God. It helps people to talk honestly about their distress, frustrations and rejections. You'll find a renewed spirit for your own life when you listen and care.
8. "Duty to Die" by Janice Thompson, a gripping novel that examines the question, When does the "right-to-die" become your legal duty? In this story, the Hippocratic Oath is replaced with the Oath of Duty. The government has more than enough power to ignore the rights guaranteed in the Fourteenth Amendment. Armed only with moral courage and a gift for subterfuge, medical student Aaron Landers puts his life on the line to rescue "Defectives" from the ruthless Duty Police. The growing underground rescue movement could be exposed and Aaron could be facing his own "humane" execution.

9. "The Kite Runner" by Khaled Hosseini is a story of two young boys who are friends in Afghanistan and an incredible story of the culture. Written by an Afghan-American, it is brilliantly and sensitively written. There is some raw cruelty and some parts are hard to read. It shows how childhood choices affect our adult lives. It's not so much a story of Mideast politics as a story of life in a beautiful country torn asunder. An intimate account of family and friendships, betrayal and salvation.

10. "Aging, Ailments, and Attitudes" by Cathy Lee Phillips. This book takes a humorous and poignant look at the process of aging. If you are lucky, you will experience progressive lenses, night sweats, fine lines and new ailments. The author says aging is a gift that is denied to some so why not allow a good dose of faith and laughter to ease some anxieties of growing older? We have the love of an eternal God that will see us safely to the end of this life....and beyond.

**Another Story of Stewardship
In the 5th Dimension**

Giving Appreciated Stock is a great way to make a significant contribution to the church and also gain a double tax benefit. First, you receive a charitable income tax deduction for the fair market value of the gift. And the deduction can be carried forward for up to five years if needed. Second, you avoid paying capital gain tax on the long-term appreciation.

Gene and Gerry Generous are faithful and enthusiastic members of their church and want to support it with a special gift of \$25,000. Rather than withdraw that amount in cash from their savings, they began to look at other alternatives. Their stock portfolio was one. After talking with their tax advisor, they realized that they could substantially reduce their income tax that year if they gave the gift in shares of stock rather than cash.

A company that had done very well over many years was XYZ Enterprises. Gene and Gerry had more than enough shares so that they could make their gift and still have some left in their portfolio. So they contacted their broker and arranged to have \$25,000 worth of stock shares transferred directly to their church. The church issued them a letter of acknowledgment and thanks and promptly sold the stock at the market value.

Since Mr. and Mrs. Generous are in the 25% tax bracket, they will receive a charitable deduction in the amount of \$6,250. And since the shares of stock cost them only \$5,000 many years before, they also avoid paying tax on the \$20,000 capital gain, resulting in another deduction.

Gene and Gerry Generous certainly lived up to their name. And they are pleased to have made a significant gift in such a "win-win" way. The church benefited from their generosity and they benefited from a large tax deduction.



We have lost \$300 of buying power because of the dollar's slide here.)

This was a Prayer given in Kansas at the opening session of their Senate. It seems prayer still upsets some people. When Minister Joe Wright was asked to open the new session of the Kansas Senate, everyone was expecting the usual generalities, but this is what they heard:

"Heavenly Father, we come before you today to ask your forgiveness and to seek your direction and guidance. We know Your Word says, 'Woe to those who call evil good,' but that is exactly what we have done.

- We have lost our spiritual equilibrium and reversed our values.
- We have exploited the poor and called it the lottery.
- We have rewarded laziness and called it welfare.
- We have killed our unborn and called it choice.
- We have shot abortionists and called it justifiable.
- We have neglected to discipline our children and called it building self -esteem.
- We have abused power and called it politics.
- We have coveted our neighbor's possessions and called it ambition.
- We have polluted the air with profanity and pornography and called it freedom of expression.
- We have ridiculed the time-honored values of our forefathers and called it enlightenment.

Search us, Oh, God, and know our hearts today; cleanse us from every sin and set us free. Amen!"

The response was immediate. A number of legislators walked out during the prayer in protest. In 6 short weeks, Central Christian Church, where Rev. Wright is pastor, logged more than 5,000 phone calls with only 47 of those calls responding negatively. The church is now receiving international requests for copies of this prayer from India, Africa and Korea.

Commentator Paul Harvey aired this prayer on his radio program, "The Rest of the Story," and received a larger response to this program than any other he has ever aired.

With the Lord's help, may this prayer sweep over our nation and wholeheartedly become our desire so that we again can be called "one nation Under God."





