Take time this month to notice the small things and appreciate them.




Take some time this month to look at your accumulation of things and make a conscious decision to get rid of what you don't need, so things will not have the power to rule your life.

It is our opportunity to reach out into our community and share the Good News of Jesus Christ with those who are hurting and searching for something more.


This is our opportunity to show we mean what we say when we say "I Love you as Christ loves you."

Columbarium Installed; Garden Constructed By Rev. Richard Evans

Our new church Columbarium was delivered and installed by the Eickhof Company during the week of September 18. The vaultcabinet, containing 108 niches to hold the cremated remains (cremains) of up to 216 people, was set in place and assembled over several days. The polished brown granite fronts with brass name-plates are surrounded by beautiful limestone end panels and cap.

Then a new Memorial Garden was constructed around the wall-mounted Columbarium during the week of October 2. It consists of a walkway and patio of paving stones, surrounded by a low block wall. The patio has two free-form planting areas, complete with azaleas and boxwoods, along with two urns containing more plants.

Finally, a fence and gate were installed on the wall around the perimeter of the garden during the week of October 9. And a beautiful bronze cross was installed on the church wall above the Columbarium. Two benches inside the fence provide places for family members and friends to "sit for a moment and remember" when they visit the garden area.

Minor but important additions were added throughout the rest of October in preparation for a Service of Dedication at noon on Sunday, October 29. Dedication of the Columbarium and Memorial Garden will be held right after the 11:00 am Service of Worship. The 10-15 minute service will also include the inurnment of the cremains of several deceased church members whose ashes have been awaiting the completion of the Columbarium.

The Columbarium and Memorial Garden began with an idea back in 1998 but was put "on hold" until the completion of the next phase of our Building for Tomorrow program. Then it was revived almost two years ago and a temporary Columbarium Committee was elected by the Church Council. After many months of exploration and planning, the committee brought a proposal to the Council that was accepted. Late last spring, after the sale of 36 niches, we had sufficient money to place the order.

The committee also planned for the future. The concrete base, on which the Columbarium rests, was built to accommodate the expansion of 108 more niches with a total of up to 432 urns containing the cremains of God's faithful here in our own modern counterpart to the ancient church burial ground.

The Memorial Garden was made possible through the generous gift of Lorraine Tollefson, along with other memorial gifts in memory of Jerry Tollefson. And the wall cross was a gift from Marilyn McKown, along with other gifts from family and friends in memory of Jerry McKown.

The temporary Columbarium Committee completes its work with the Service of Dedication on October 29. A new permanent Columbarium Committee, elected at the Charge Conference on October 27, will take over and manage its care and maintenance, along with administrative oversight and the future sale of niches.


Space in the Columbarium is available to church members and families of church members for \$1,200 per niche. Each niche accommodates either one or two urns (included in the price).

There are no further charges for opening, closing, and perpetual care. More information and application forms are available in the church office.

Another Story of Stewardship In the 5th Dimension

Phil Anthropist and his wife became frustrated over some stock in their portfolio that had yielded only 2% annual income—and sometimes less. These stocks, now valued at \$100,000, originally cost them \$35,000. They were reluctant to sell the stock due to the tax bite on the \$65,000 capital gain. Now retired, they wanted more annual income than the \$1,500-\$2,000 that this portion of their portfolio had been providing.

After consulting their tax accountant and a staff member of the Florida United Methodist Foundation, Phil and his wife placed the stock in a Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust with a pay out of 6%.

Now their annual income from the \$100,000 is \$6,000, paid to them quarterly. They avoided any tax on the capital gain and they also received a substantial charitable income tax deduction, which they can carry forward for up to five years.

Mr. and Mrs. Phil Anthropist have designated that, at their deaths, the remainder of the annuity trust will be divided as follows:

- 40% to their United Methodist Church in Florida where they have lived in retirement,
- 40% to their United Methodist Church in Michigan where they lived for many years,
- 10% to the Tampa United Methodist Centers for their fine ministry among the urban poor, and
- 10% to the Florida United Methodist Children's Home.

Phil and his wife now enjoy the additional income and are pleased to know that their charitable gift will continue long after they are gone.

Their story is a fine example of Stewardship in the 5th Dimension.

Walking on the Path by Patience Nave

"Come unto me all you who are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart; and you shall find rest for your souls." Matthew 11:28-29a ASV

This verse is probably very familiar to those of us who have known what it is to be really tired! We often talk about "laying our burdens on the Lord," or allowing Him to "carry our burdens." Certainly that is a legitimate position to take. Peter clearly tells us that we not only can but should do this, directing us to "Cast all our anxiety upon Him, because He cares for you." (I Peter 5:7) It is a wonderful promise of relief.

Jesus is quoting from Jeremiah, a passage in which the Lord instructs his people to walk in His way that they may find "rest for their souls." Sadly, that verse is followed by these words, "But they said, we will not walk in it."

We haven't changed much, have we? He gives us the perfect way to walk, and we presumptuously think we know better!

But the middle of the Matthew verse gives us the best reason for doing as we are told. It is not just to be relieved of our burden, to feel better! Jesus wants us to come to Him, let Him take our burdens, so we may *learn* exactly what He is like! It is great to be burden free, but it is even greater to know more and more about the One who is the lifter of our burdens.

Prayer: Father, we are so thankful that You walked here as a man and that You, even though You are God, understand what it is to be weary. We thank You that You allow us to give You the heavy load, including our anxieties. Help us never to refuse to walk Your way. And we pray earnestly that we would not only know the relief of being burden free but that, as we walk with You, we would also experience the joy of knowing You better. Amen.

Just as our altar is just a piece of furniture dedicated to God's use, each of these things became consecrated, dedicated to God and used to reach people with His love and light in a way




they can best comprehend.





The following selections are samples of some fine authors and subjects that we have on our Library shelves:

MYSTERY:

The first volume in the Mysteries of Sparrow Island is: "Whispers Through the Trees" by Susan Plunkett and Krysteen Seelen.

When her sister Marv is nearly killed in a car accident, Abby rushes "home" to Sparrow Island to lend her help -- and to reconnect with her aging parents. Abby tries to understand the distance that has grown between her sister and herself. Then strange things begin to happen and as Abby is drawn into a spiraling mystery, she realizes that God's plans for her involve more than the reunion with her beloved family.

The 2nd book is "Flight of the Raven" by Ellen Harris.

It continues with Abby's life who is now working at the Sparrow Island Nature Conservatory. She sees a small plane swerving overhead and later that night learns that the plane is missing. Abby helps in a search that requires her to use her considerable wilderness skills, quick thinking and her trust in the Lord's guidance.

"Night Light" by Terri Blackstock is the second book in the Restoration series.

This sequel to "Last Light" finds civilization entering a new Dark Age. Survival has become a lifestyle. The Brannings struggle to bring their neighborhood together with everyone trying to make their homes ready for winter and fight the crime that's running rampant. Global catastrophe reveals the darkness in human hearts -- and lights the way to restoration for a selfcentered world.

"Phoebe", a Novella by Diane Noble.

Faith Green discovers a wooden doll at a secondhand store in 1935 California. She loves the doll and names it "Phoebe". The doll has been cherished by others through seven decades. Phoebe moves through the hands of different owners and as each story unfolds, the mystery of her origin begins to unravel, revealing God's ever-present grace.

BIOGRAPHY:

"George Washington's Sacred Fire" by Peter A. Lillback.

This book was written to answer the question, "Was George Washington a Christian?" Dr. Lillback spent 15 years researching Washington's own writings, journals, letters, manuscripts and those of his closest family and confidantes. Dr. Lillback reveals a man who faced unprecedented challenges and circumstances with honesty, justice, equity, piety, forgiveness, humility and servant leadership to become one of the most revered figures in world history.

GRIEF:

"The Year of Magical Thinking" by Joan Didion.

The author writes about the year she spent trying to come to terms with her husband's death and daughter's illness. "Life changes fast," she writes. "Life changes in the instant. You sit down to dinner and life as you know it ends." The magical thinking of denial became her companion. Her book tells us how people try to make sense of the senseless and somehow go on.

FICTION:

"Found" by Karen Kingsbury, the latest in the Firstborn series.

To fulfill his wife's dying wish that they find the firstborn son they had given up for adoption as young marrieds years ago, John Baxter hires a private investigator. There's never a dull moment in this story.

"The Englisher" by Beverly Lewis follows Annie Zook's life.

She has promised her



preacher father that she will abandon her beloved art for six months. She's not sure she can keep her promise. She truly wants to honor her father's wishes and become a member of the Amish community. She's further tempted by the new arrival of a dashing Englisher, Ben Martin. Is it God's plan that she leave the Amish world?

"A Perfect Day" by Richard Paul Evans.

This is a novel of love and awakening. Robert Harlan is unexpectedly laid off from his job and his wife encourages him to pursue his dream of writing. When he writes a hugely successful book, Robert is swept into a new world, far from his wife and home, and slowly loses track of the things he loves most. A turn of events makes Robert think he only has months to live and he begins to discover the truth about himself, who he has become, what he has lost and what it will take to find love again.

"Levi's Will" by W. Dale Cramer is a haunting story of a fallen man seeking to reconcile the best of the old world with the lessons of the new and in the process building a bridge across three generations.

When Will returns to the Amish farm in Ohio after being away eight years, his father, Levi Mullet, says flatly, "I thought you were dead." No hug. No party. Where's the fatted calf?

"A Quiet Place in a Crazy World" by Joni Eareckson Tada.

Drawing near to God through prayer and praise, God can meet you wherever you are. You CAN find a quiet place in your crazy world -- a life-changing refuge.



Things have settled down here following last month's coup. Thanks so much for your prayers for our safety and for your kind emails. We look forward to what the Lord has for us in the coming month during this unusual time in Thailand!

Praises

We received substantial gifts for the new church, putting us at almost 40% of our total startup budget. Praise God!

Pastor Ogaat and I feel strongly that we can now move forward to open in a rented townhouse and will trust the Lord to provide the remaining funds. Thank you so much to those who have contributed and to those considering a contribution.

We received a surprise financial gift from our home church, Northside Baptist Church in St. Petersburg, Fla., for Joe and Pastor *Ogaat* to attend the church's missions conference in late February 2007. The church would like to assist us in making contacts so we can increase our family's monthly financial support. They feel visiting the States would be beneficial since Joe and Pastor *Ogaat* could explain in person what the Lord is doing here in Chiang Mai.

Praise God for Caleb and Jamie, who turned 8 and 6 at the end of last month. We had good family times of celebration with them, and we look forward to how God will continue to shape them into the men He desires for them to be.

Prayers

Joe has begun teaching "Old Testament Survey" at the Bible school of Chiang Mai Baptist Church and will continue through November. Please pray for his time writing lessons to be fruitful and for the eight students to more deeply understand the Word of God.

Please pray about plans for the new church. We have tentatively set Nov. 19th as "opening day" and have a lot of work to do before then. Also, please pray for God to use His people to provide the remaining startup funds for the new church (about \$4,400) as well as the monthly costs (about \$500 per month).

During Elaine's time of teaching the children of our cell group, she has come to realize that a flannelgraph (felt) OT/NT Bible story set or some other visual illustration system would be a tremendous help. The children here know nothing about the Bible and would be greatly aided by seeing the stories rather than just hearing them. Christian resources are very limited here. Please pray that the Lord would provide this tool for Elaine's ministry to Thai children.

Psalm 98 is full of worship. It is true, the Lord has done marvelous things as we have partnered together to take the gospel to the people of Siberia. Let us never stop praising him for the work he has started!

Kevin and Laura are making progress with the Biblical Counseling course they are taking; it took a little time to get used to doing homework again. We have already learned many valuable things that will benefit the ministry in Siberia.

We are also getting involved with a course called Focus. This is a pre-marital course designed to help couples enter into marriage with a better understanding of Biblical marriage. We are hoping that we can learn the material and be able to take it back to Russia to be used in our Church planting ministry in the future.

This month there is a conference going on in Ulan-Ude Siberia; the conference focus will be Church planting. As you recall this is the city we first moved to almost 10 years ago. It is exciting to see that the young churches are catching the vision for the world and are already starting new churches on their own. One of the members of the church in Ulan-Ude who is in Bible College in another country wrote the leadership of the church in Ulan-Ude and asked "What are the most pressing needs you have for teachers, disciplining new believers?" In 2000, our first month, we only sold \$763.90, but the following month we had the highest sale ever, \$2,676.65. Since then, we have had our ups and downs but by September 2006, we sold a total of \$83,844.30. That's a lot of food for a lot of families. The saving in money is immeasurable to say the least. Being able to pick up enough food for a month at one location at a reduced price has made it possible for families to eat well and still be able to meet other obligations. None of this would be possible without the volunteers who come every month to distribute the food - people that use their own trucks to pick up

These volunteers have our thanks and appreciation.

Come and share the fun, the singing and the games, and, of course, some of the best food that will be served anywhere this Thanksgiving.


