Then I'm thankful for Mrs. Parrish, who was the director of Christian Education in Winter Park when I was in the 10th grade. She put on the youth retreat where I heard God's call to the ministry.

We can also be thankful for all we have of the good things of this earth.

We are blessed with food and clothing and things that would have made a ruling king of Jesus' time envious.

We have enough and more, and we need to acknowledge our thanks for what God enables us to receive.

We can also be thankful for the opportunity to serve,

to reach out and touch another life with the love and grace of God. We are given the privilege of making a difference in the lives of others for no other reason than that God loves them.

Thanksgiving is only one of the foundation stones needed to build our faith, but without it our foundation will not hold up.

Let's make this Thanksgiving a time of shoring up our foundations with thanksgiving memories from the past, appreciation for the present and praise for the eternal future our God has provided for us.

Give thanks to the Lord for he is good; he love endures forever. (Psalm 107:1)









#### "Everyone Becoming a Disciple of Christ"

#### **Stewardship Spirit**



### Wise Discipleship By Jan Wise

#### LOVING AS A DISCIPLE

Have you ever said, "I never will ......" and then found yourself doing exactly what you were never going to do? When Tom and I visited Florida briefly over twenty years ago, we said, "We will never live in Florida - too hot, too humid." Now we are in our ninth year as northern transplants.

1) The disciple Peter had a "never will" experience. In Mark 14:27-31, Jesus tells the disciples they will all "fall away" or leave him. Peter declares, "Even if all fall away, I will not." But Jesus, knowing the limitations of human love, responds, "I tell you the truth...today - yes, tonight before the rooster crows twice you yourself will disown me three times."

Peter, sure of his love and loyalty to Jesus, insists emphatically, "Even if I have to die with you, I will never disown you."

The next sentence in that passage receives little attention because we focus on Peter. But following Peter's declaration, we read, "And all the others said the same."

Do you think Peter really meant what he said to Jesus?

Did he fully intend, with all his heart, to stick with Jesus n matter what might come?	0
How about the rest of the disciples?	

2) Read Mark 14:50. How many deserted Jesus and fled?

Now read Mark 14:66-72 to see what happened to Peter. Did Jesus know the limitations of his followers better than they knew their own limitations? \_\_\_\_\_

Room, he makes	a statement he	has learned is	truth:
"Lord, you know _		''s heart."	

3) Jesus taught much about being a disciple. One of his teachings that seems hard and even unreasonable to us is found in Luke 14:25-27. "If anyone comes to me and does not hate his father and mother, his wife and children, his brothers and sisters - yes, even his own life - he cannot be my disciple. And anyone who does not carry his cross and follow me cannot be my disciple."

He is not telling us not to love those dear to us nor for us to

hate the very life God has given us. But as disciples we are called to love Jesus far more than we love these, and he uses the love/hate exaggeration to make his point.

disciple is a God-given love, available only through an in	ti-

5) Read John	21:15-22 to	see how Jes	sus brings t	this realiza-
tion to Peter.	How many	times does	Jesus ask	Peter if he

Peter answers with all his heart, but still out of his human love for Jesus. It seems Jesus is asking Peter if he is willing to love with the kind of love necessary to be a true disciple, to be one who has both the God-love and the God-willingness to care for those who will become followers of Christ. In Verses18-29, Jesus tells Peter what it will cost him to answer the call to discipleship. How does this relate to Jesus' teaching about loving him enough to "hate" one's own life?

6) In Acts 2:40-41, we see Peter, having received the Holy Spirit, preaching to a large crowd, many of whom participated in events leading to Jesus' death on the cross. As he warns and pleads with these "sheep," how has he changed?

What happens?		

7) The Bible teaches that everyone who receives Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, receives his Holy Spirit. In Galatians 5:22, what is the first fruit of the Spirit listed?

The Lord does not ask us to love with the sacrificial love of Christ without planting the seed of that love within us. It is a love which operates far beyond the limitations of human love.

What Jesus requires for his disciples, he provides for his disciples.

#### THINK ABOUT IT:

If you have invited Jesus Christ into your heart and life, his Holy Spirit now lives in you, bringing with him the fruit of the God-love Jesus requires of his disciples.

- •So are you are equipped to say "yes" to Jesus' call to discipleship? You are enabled to love him beyond any love you have for the dearest people in your life, beyond the selfish desire to preserve your own life. Yet your love for others will not be diminished but will be enlarged as it grows beyond the selfish limitations of human love.
- •How will you choose to respond to the invitation of Jesus from Luke 14, "If anyone comes to me....."?

### GIVE THANKS FOR OUR CHURCH LIBRARY

The books listed each month are just a sample of the many that are on the shelves of the Church Library. You are invited to come in and browse. When you take a book, simply date and sign the pocket card and leave it in the yellow box on the office desk. Library hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and also on Sunday morning.

- 1. "True Light," by a #1 best selling suspense author: This is the third book in the Christian suspense Restoration series. "Night Light" and "Last Light" are the first two books. Darkness deepens in a civilization now eight months without power. The residents of Oak Hollow grapple with the crippling blackout, the frigid winter nights without heat, and the struggle to survive. The Branning family are the only ones defending a young outcast, Mark Green, suspected in a shooting. The family is faced with a choice to hoard their possessions to survive or trust God to provide as they offer their resources to others while helping Mark find the person who really pulled the trigger.
- 2. "A State of Grace," one of the Mystery and the Minister's Wife series by Traci Depree: Pastor Paul Hanlon and his wife settle into their new life in Copper Mill, a place of tradition and tranquility. Soon they find that small town life is anything but boring. The mysteries that Kate uncovers are puzzling. As she seeks God's wisdom, Kate begins to see that grace is all around us.
- 3. "Through the Fire," another Mystery and the Minister's Wife story by Diane Noble: After Kate and her husband arrive in Copper Mill to see the last smoldering embers of their new parish, Faith Briar Church, Kate uncovers some clues that suggest this fire was more than an accident. While she works to solve this mystery, she and her husband also rally the congregation to rebuild their church. Through all this, will Kate and Paul find the strength to stick with their commitment?
- 4. "Saving Levi," by Lisa Misraje Bentley: Left to die destined to live, a true story about a tiny baby boy covered with 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> degree burns over 70% of his body. He shricked in agony in a cold village field on the outskirts of Lanfang, China. Horrified villagers gathered around, then walked away, but one older man stayed behind, gathered up the child and went for help. His compassion and courage sparked a momentous chain of events. The author says, "Some saw nothing but problems for this child. I saw nothing but hope." People from different countries,

faiths, and social backgrounds, participated in the successful battle to save his life and secure his future. A wonderful, uplifting story!

- 5. "Sophie's Dilemma," Book #2 of "Daughters of Blessing" by Lauraine Snelling: Sophie Knutsen is certain she can't live without Hamre Bjorklund and rejects her father's request to postpone her marriage until after graduation. She and Hamre elope and she finds life as a fisherman's wife in Ballard, Washington, is not so great. Pregnant and lonely while Hamre is at sea, she is alone when tragedy strikes. Sophie can think only of returning home to Blessing but wonders if her family will welcome her after the way she hurt them by her defiant behavior. That is Sophie's dilemma.
- 6. Three novels in one volume of the Women of Faith fiction collection are below:

"Sandpebbles," a story of hope by Patricia Hickman: Recently widowed March Longfellow efficiently commandeers the lives of her son, her pastor father, and the staff of the small town newspaper she owns. When a new pastor comes to town, March finds her life thrust into a new direction – one she cannot control.

"Stranded in Paradise," a story of letting go by Lori Copeland: Tess Nelson feels she can juggle all areas of her life. Then when the rug is pulled out from under her and she loses her boyfriend and a job promotion, she is sent on a trip to get herself together. When a tropical storm hits her island-paradise, Tess meets a fellow traveler who may hold the secret to the peace, inner strength, and courage her soul aches for.

"The Pearl," a story of the heart, by Angela Hunt: Talkshow radio host Dr. Diana Sheldon has suffered a great loss, but a research foundation has contacted her, offering an answer to her family's anguish. Determined to let nothing stand between her and healing for her broken heart, Diana proceeds along a dangerous course where the healing process may prove more destructive than the hurt.

- 7. "No Eye Can See," by Jane Kirkpatrick, Book Two of the Kinship & Courage Series: A novel of kinship, courage and faith. Widowed during a westward trek with their husbands, twelve women must now press on alone over the Sierra Nevadas and into California. When they settle in Shasta City, California, their lives become even further entwined with each other. Each one has a problem and they band together, caring for each other and shielding one another from harm. They discover that no eye can see all the good God has in store for them. This is a sequel to "All Together in One Place."
- 8. "A Woman's Place," a novel by Lynn Austin: Under the storm clouds of destruction that threaten America during the early 1940's, this unlikely gathering of women will experience life in sometimes startling new ways as their beliefs are challenged and they struggle toward a

new understanding of what love and sacrifice truly mean. Virginia longs to find a purpose beyond others' expectations; Helen is driven by a loneliness money cannot fulfill; Rosa is desperate to flee her in-laws' rules, and Jean hopes to prove herself in a man's world.

- 9. "A Tale of Three Kings," by Gene Edwards: A study in brokenness, submission, and authority. All over the world Christians have taken to heart this simple, powerful, and beautiful story of David, Saul, and Absalom.
- 10. "Eat Cake," a novel by Jeanne Roy: Ruth loves to bake cakes for all occasions, especially to nurture her family. Problems arise when her mother moves in after robbers kick in her front door. Then her father shatters both his wrists and moves in too. Her mother and father hate each other. Add to the mix two teen-agers and a husband who is suddenly without a job. What a delightful and amusing concoction! This is funny, believable, and full of surprises.
- 11. "Honeymoon with My Brother," a memoir by Franz Wisner: A funny thing happened to the author on the way to the altar. His fiancée dropped him just days before the wedding. With the festivities prepaid and guests on the way, he decided to have his wedding anyway just without a bride. He then chose to take his brother on his scheduled Costa Rican honeymoon. During the trip, realizing that turning his life upside down wasn't such a bad thing after all, he and his brother quit their jobs, sold their homes, and continued the "honeymoon" for 2 years and 53 countries. This is an inspiring story of escape, discovery, strengthening relationships, and grasping opportunity.

## Divorce Rate A Myth!

In a article published in the New York Times September 29, 2007, called "Divorced From Reality," professors Betsey Stevenson and Justin Wolfers contradict the prevailing belief that over half of all marriages end in divorce. One paragraph in the article says:

"The story of ever-increasing divorce is a powerful narrative. It is also wrong. In fact, the divorce rate has been falling continuously over the past quarter-century, and is now at its lowest level since 1970. While marriage rates are also declining, those marriages that do occur are increasingly more stable. For instance, marriages that began in the 1990s were more likely to celebrate a 10th anniversary than those that started in the 1980s, which, in turn, were also more likely to last than marriages that began back in the 1970s."

This should not be news to you. Look around. We have people in this church who are celebrating their 50<sup>th</sup> almost every month. We have people who are celebrating 60 and 65 years together every year.

There may be fewer marriages in this moment in time but marriage is not on the rocks, it is not failing, it is and will remain the bed rock of our society.

# Walking on the Path by Patience Nave

Open my eyes that I may see wonderful things in your law." Psalm 119:18 NIV

This psalm intrigues me. The psalmist speaks over and over about the law and always with words of high praise. He surely considers law in a totally different framework than we do! We never - or seldom ever - speak of law positively. We complain about laws that restrict us, make unfair demands on us, or take from our bank accounts. They tax us unfairly, won't let us drive as we please, prevent us from "self expression." Why is the psalmist's opinion of law so different from ours?

Psalm 119 is long - the longest chapter in the Bible - and there's room to talk about lots of things, but the writer stays focused on what he considers to be the incredible attributes of God's law and its benefits to God's people. He says that law keepers don't make mistakes (verse 3), have upright hearts (verse 7), and are as happy as those who have great wealth (verse 14). They view the law as more precious than thousands of pieces of silver and gold (verse 72); they have great delight in just thinking about the law (verse 24). He begins the thirteenth stanza of his poem, "Oh, how I love your law! I meditate on it all day long." (verse 97)

The words challenge me. Can I learn to contemplate as the psalmist does on this law of God, this great plan for how we should live? Can I learn to find joy in just thinking about it? Can I learn to recognize that the law is not there to make me miserable, to restrict me, impoverish me, but there to bring me joy, enrich me, free me to live to the fullest? Can I learn that remembering and enjoying and obeying this carefully prepared law can bring pleasure and purpose to my life? Can I learn that, as I contemplate God's awesome law, I gain insight into the person of my awesome God? Can I ever reach the place I can say with the psalmist of this law that "was established forever" (verse 152), "My heart is set on keeping your decrees to the very end, . . . [for] I love your law" (verse 112, 113b).

How grateful I feel to be reminded of the law as one of God's most generous gifts to His creation.

Prayer: Thank you, Father, that You have revealed something of Your very nature in the law that You have given us, to guide us into a full and meaningful life and into relationship with You. Teach us to love the law and to receive it as Your gift. Amen

### Giving at Year End

Here are some reminders and suggestions for tax-wise Christians who may want to maximize their stewardship dollars before the end of 2007.

IRA Accounts. If you are over the age of 70 ½, you may make a tax free gift to FUMCH directly from your IRA and completely exempt from your income. This 2-year provision is set to expire at the end of 2007 and, so far, congress has not acted to extend it. When you give from an IRA account, under this provision, these funds will never be subject to income or estate taxes. Check with your IRA administrator to arrange for a direct transfer.

If you itemize on your income tax, it may be to your advantage to pay ahead on your pledge to the church Operating Budget or to the Building Fund, increasing your charitable deduction for 2007. As we approach the end of the year and get ready to begin our new Phase 3 construction, it is also a great time to make a special gift to the Building for Tomorrow Fund.

Review/ update your will. If it has been several years since you reviewed your will, now is a good time to do it. You may find that you want to make some changes. And, by naming your church in your will, you can continue your Christian stewardship even after your death.

Consider a Planned/ Deferred Gift. Charitable Gift Annuities and Charitable Remainder Trusts are great ways to give to FUMCH in the future while enjoying a regular income stream during the remainder of your lifetime. Both have some significant tax incentives.

So why not use these last two months of the year to make a gift to FUMCH that will make a difference in our ministry - and also save you some tax dollars?


#### **Building Fund Income**

We are still ecstatic about the wonderful response of this congregation to our "Time to Build Challenge" this past March. We not only reached, but exceeded, our goal of raising \$200,000. That provided enough cash for the down-payment on a mortgage for phase 3 construction when the time comes later this year.

In the meantime, we continue to monitor the income from our current 3-year building fund pledge campaign. Our financial officers tell us that income has fallen a little below expectations this year. While some of this may be due to the usual summer-time low, it is important that we maintain a steady income level there as well. As we explained during the campaign, the \$200,000 campaign boosted our down payment up above the minimum required; the regular building fund pledge income will cover the monthly payments once we obtain a mortgage. Both are very important. We estimated the size of mortgage we could support from past income received, but if that income drops, the size of mortgage we can afford will have to be adjusted down.

So, if you have dropped behind in the amount you estimated you could give to the building fund on a regular basis, please pray about this, and do what you can to catch up. If you are not contributing to the building fund on a regular basis, please consider doing so now. The current 3-year campaign runs through the end of 2008; pledge cards and envelopes for this purpose are available at the church office. We thank you for your generous support of this important project to enhance our facilities and extend our ministries in this congregation and the community.



### **Building Committee Selects Builder for Phase 3 Project**

On Monday, Sept 24, the Building For Tomorrow Committee voted to hire Bollenback Builders Inc. of Oldsmar, FL, under a construction management arrangement. Under this agreement, Bollenback will provide some preconstruction services - in particular an early estimate of construction costs, plus some early-value engineering in consultation with the architect. Once the plans and specification are complete, Bollenback will solicit bids for all of the subcontracts and put together a Guaranteed Maximum Price. Bollenback will then serve as general contractor for the construction project. They will work under a fixed fee, and their books will be open to us so that we will know exactly where our money is being spent. Throughout the process, they will be looking for value engineering possibilities - ways to reduce costs without lowering quality or space. It was felt that this arrangement had significant advantages over the usual practice of waiting for the plans and specifications to be completed, then going out for a lump sum bid from general contractors.

Bollenback has built four Methodist churches in our District of Florida alone. Some of you may be familiar with the Nativity Lutheran Church on US 19 in Weeki Wachee – another of theirs. We have checked with all of these churches and find that they have an excellent reputation for quality work at a reasonable price, and we are looking forward to working with them on our Phase 3 construction.

The architect's drawings and engineering specifications for Phase 3 are nearing completion, and we are now making plans for approval of our Phase 3 construction and financing plans. We have scheduled a meeting with the District Building and Location Committee of the Florida Conference of the Methodist Church for November 8, at which time we expect to get their approval of our plans, along with the approval of our Pastor. Once we have a firm price on the construction cost, we will be scheduling a Church Charge Conference to get the approval of the congregation. We hope to schedule that in early December, providing us time to submit our loan application to the Methodist Foundation before the end of the year.





### MILITARY VETERANS' CORNER SALUTE

Featuring Church Member Staff Sergeant Ted R. Archambault, U.S. Marine Corps Serving in Cuba, Pearl Harbor, Guadacanal and other South Pacific battles 1940-46.

In October 1940, at the age of 21, Ted Archambault, number 9 in a family of 11 children, joined the USMC and trained in Parris Island, S.C.

After training in defense tactics while earning \$ 21.00 per month, Ted was shipped to Cuba to help fortify Guantanamo Bay. A year later, he was

shipped to Pearl Harbor just 6 days before the Japanese attacked the city by air.

Ted was a combat veteran of Pearl Harbor, working at the Navy yard where 1,200 lives were lost on the USS Arizona during the December 7<sup>th</sup> attack.

In the Solomon Islands, Ted survived many ground fire attacks, bombing from the air, insects, extreme heat and wet conditions, and living in foxholes. Ted and his battalion were hit with 14 air raids over a two-day period. He did not escape malaria (twice), jaundice and acute tonsillitis. Ted was treated at make-shift field hospitals. In Ted's battalion, 600 of the 900 men contracted malaria at once. During one two-week stretch, the men survived on peanut butter and hard tack bread. Instead of pastors, the veterans called their chaplains "Sky Pilots" or "Holy Joes." This was a time everyone felt the need of spiritual encouragement.

Seeing President Roosevelt being driven through Parris Island, S.C. grounds was uplifting to the troops, but Ted's most heartfelt memory of the War is the compassion of grateful civilians who helped him handle supplies and equipment in the Solomon Islands and Hawaii.

After the War and missing 5 Christmases at home, Ted returned to Detroit, Michigan, where he went to school and entered the professional world. His career included banking, manufacturing, railroading and information systems. Ted met his lovely wife, Marie Cook, in Michigan. They married in 1950, and recently celebrated their 57<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Ted retired to Florida in 1982, where he continues to volunteer with the Marine Corps League, Republican Club, Toys For Tots, our church, Oak Village Association and other civic groups. Ted is Chairman of the 2007 Military Ball.

During Christmas Eve 2006 and Easter 2007 worship services, Ester demonstrated her own talent and spirituality as a lovely sacred dancer. In all she undertook, Ester performed countless labors of love with a smile, boundless energy, and a kind word for everyone.

The Lord gave Ester her Angel Wings at age 64 on September 7, 2007. Beautiful Ester, thank you for touching my life and the lives of so many other lucky recipients of your love; we are better people for having known and loved you.

#### **Generosity of God**

Has God ever used giving to draw you closer to Him? Do you know what God's Word says about money? It says a lot, you know. Giving is the one area where God says to test Him. No, this is not another message trying to get you to give. My "thing" is our spiritual growth personally and as a congregation, so my interest in our giving is in how our giving connects us to God and how it helps us grow spiritually. I can tell you this is true, not because someone told me, but because I've lived it. I've had more than one lesson! It is one of the ways God has used to teach me to trust Him.

I became a single mom in the mid70's; struggling financially was my normal. Every time I learned a new truth about giving, I would be abundantly blessed when I responded in the way God's Word instructs. I had learned bringing my tithe to the storehouse was bringing my ten percent before taxes to the church. I worked in an accounting firm before I began working for a church, so I thought of income as earned income on which you pay taxes. It never occurred to me that my widow's indemnity from the Veteran's Administration was "income" and to be counted when figuring out what my tithe would be. Then the Holy Spirit gently reminded me that HE was the one who provided that monthly "income," and without His provision I would not be able to pay the bills and raise a child. As I struggled with whether this was right, I asked my pastor and he said it was between God and me. God, however, made it perfectly clear, so my tithe almost doubled. That was the same year I'd gone from the outside world to working for the church, and my income had decreased drastically. After making those changes, amazingly there were no bills which could not be paid. My faith and trust in God greatly increased as a result of my obedience in the area of giving.

The more we show our trust in God by giving, the more we experience God's provision in our lives. God doesn't just want our money (although it pays for programs and electricity); what He really wants is our hearts. I encourage you to look up some of the Scriptures about money. One thing you'll discover (or affirm) is that it is all His anyway.

I pray our Lord will richly bless you and you will be drawn closer to Him as you experience His wonderworking power in your lives.

Our customized CIE Tour of Ireland, from May 24 to June 7, 2008, will include many of the famous sites you have heard about, along with a few out-of-the-way places. CIE Tours are experts on Ireland and they have provided us with a 15-day trip at a pace that should be just right for our group of mature travelers.

We'll begin with a deluxe motor coach ride from Homosassa to Orlando International Airport and a direct overnight flight "across the pond." Our first two nights in Dublin will be at the Grand Canal Hotel. After resting from our long journey, we'll enjoy a tour of Dublin and will visit Powerscourt Gardens south of the city.

Then it's on to Limerick where we'll stay 3 nights at the Jury's Inn. On the way, we'll visit Clonmacnoice, a 6<sup>th</sup> century monastic settlement. We'll see Blarney Castle and the port city of Cobh. Shopping opportunities include beautiful woolens and the famous Waterford crystal.

A trip around the Dingle Penninsula in County Kerry will offer spectacular views of the Atlantic coast and grand vistas of heather-covered hills. We'll stop in the town of Dingle and at Adare Village, with its picturesque thatched cottages and colorful gardens.

The city of Galway will be our next "home base" with 3 nights at Hotel Meyrick. Along the way we'll view the impressive Cliffs of Moher. We'll tour Galway and will enjoy the downtown location of our hotel.

A day tour to the Aran Islands will give us a glimpse of life among the farms and fishing villages on these isolated islands. Another day tour to the village of Cong will bring to life some of the scenes in the 1952 movie, *The Quiet Man*, starring John Wayne and Maureen O'Hara.

Then we'll go on to Northern Ireland where we will stay 4 nights at the Armagh City Hotel. Armagh has been the spiritual capital of Ireland for over 1,500 years. We'll see both the Catholic and the Protestant cathedrals during our city tour. And we'll tour the city of Belfast, not far from Armagh.

The famous Giant's Causeway, along with the legends that have arisen from these huge rock formations, is on our agenda for another day. We'll also visit the walled city of Derry before returning to Armagh. A visit to the St. Patrick Centre at Downpatrick will review the history of Christianity in Ireland and the establishment of early monasteries following St. Patrick's life and ministry.

And, finally, we will return to Dublin, with a stop at Monaster-boice and its famous collection of 5<sup>th</sup> century Celtic high crosses. We'll stay overnight at the Montrose Hotel, before transferring to the Dublin Airport the next morning for our direct flight to Orlando. On arrival we will be met by our motor coach, and we'll return to Homosassa full of memories of the Emerald Isle.

The tour is a very good value for the money, and the more people we have the less it will cost per person. (\$3,315 if we have 24; \$2,880 if we have 45). Single room supplement: \$485. Breakfast and dinner daily are included in the price. Pick up the information at the church office. Call me (563-5833) if you have questions. Invite friends and family members to join you. Then register with *J and L Travel*. A \$900 deposit holds your place and special airfare. The balance will be due by March 7, 2008.

#### Heading back to Siberia.....

Yes it's true; the Wooster's are finally heading back to the cold and ice of Siberia. After 15 months in the U.S., the preparations have begun to return to our first home in Russia. We received the "OK" to return to Siberia and work with another family that has been in a village alone for about four years.

We're very excited this door has been opened for us to return and get involved in a new area and new work. At this time, it looks as if we'll be working with a local birthing hospital to supply pre-natal vitamins and education for the mothers-to-be as well as working withan orphanage to help meet their nutritional needs.

We will also be looking at opening a small business to help boost the economy of the village. Unemployment is about 60% in most villages in the area. There are other opportunities; we just don't have the details at this point in time. Our prayer is that we use discernment and remain in His will in each circumstance.

Kevin and Laura recently had the opportunity to attend a one-day training session with Awana (approved workmen are not ashamed). For those of you who may not be familiar with the program, they reach children from age seven to eighteen through games, bible-verse memorization, and practical life lessons using biblical examples. We see this as a tool to help strengthen the work already taking place in Eastern Siberia. Please pray for this to be used effectively.

#### Praises:

There were a couple joyful moments at the church recently that we wanted to share. The first was on Mother's Day, which in Thailand is on August 12, the Queen's birthday. (Father's Day is December 5, the King's birthday.) The children sang a beautiful song about love that had many tears flowing that morning Also, the church had its first communion service on Sept. 2





It was humbling and encouraging to remember the Lord's sacrifice for us and His soon return as we worshipped with our Thai brothers and sisters.

The Lord has answered your prayers concerning Elaine's health in so many ways that it's hard to know where to begin. We'll be brief: (1) After much prayer, we felt led to consult with a missionary doctor from the States, who has been a tremendous help and has done copious research on Elaine's condition. (2) Blood tests showed that Elaine's iron level is far higher than it could possibly be after just one iron infusion in the U.S. - it is easily in the normal range. The numbers from a fistful of other tests were mostly normal as well. Praise God! (3) Almost all of Elaine's problems lead back to extensive inflammation caused by her autoimmune disease, and there is a very promising medicine that she will begin taking this week. Please pray for improvement; Elaine feels a little better already just seeing that there is hope after a long downward cycle of illness.

Elaine and the children had a good first quarter at Grace International School. Brittany, Justin and Caleb have had to shoulder a heavier workload this school year, while Jamie is starting to settle in after our trip back to the U.S., which left him feeling unsettled.

Caleb and Jamie also had fun celebrating their 9<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> birthdays when we invited their classmates over

for parties.

One of the things we enjoy most in Thailand are the creative attempts at English. It is usually good for a laugh... the same kind of innocent laugh we often get when we speak Thai.

#### **Prayers:**

Joe's weekly English Bible class at the church has started out very well. There are nine Thai teenagers in attendance, and they are enjoying the curriculum, which is heavy on fun and action. They also have paid good attention to the Bible stories, which Joe explains more thoroughly in Thai. So far, they've heard about sin (Adam and Eve) and sacrifice (Abraham and Isaac). Please pray for the teens to grow in their English skills and in their understanding of Christian truths.

Now that we have returned from the U.S. and  $Dt\hat{u}m$  and  $B\hat{u}$  have joined the church as interns, the church will begin having a monthly leadership meeting. Please pray that these times would be led by God and that we would make wise decisions, particularly in the areas of discipleship and outreach.

Speaking of discipleship, the year-long Sunday School discipleship process that Joe has put together for the church continues to go well.  $Dt\hat{u}m$  will be wrapping up the first section on "foundations of the faith" this month, followed by Joe and  $Dt\hat{u}m$  teaching on such topics as the purpose of the church, spiritual gifts, areas of service, etc. Please pray for these teaching times to help church members to grow in their walk with the Lord.

Several families at the church, including Pastor *Ogaat* and  $Dt\hat{u}m$  and  $B\hat{u}$ , are struggling financially at this time. Please pray for the Lord to provide for their needs.

We are moving again this month. We were not planning to ever move again; however a four-bedroom house that is only \$50 more a month became available in our same neighborhood, and we couldn't pass it up. The house is on a very quiet side street and is the last in a row, followed by an empty street and fields, which will allow our very active young men to play frequently, easily and safely. Justin will have his own small bedroom, Caleb and Jamie will have their toys in their bedroom instead of scattered everywhere, and Joe will be able to work in an upstairs office area separate from our living space. The house is also less than 2 years old, and the landlord wants to rent it for a long time, as do we, so it's a perfect fit. Please pray for things to go smoothly as Joe moves things over slowly until our big moving day, Saturday the 13<sup>th</sup>.

If you would like to help with the set-up, clean-up, cooking a turkey, or decorations, please call Mark or Iris Whittaker.


