Greetings and Happy New Year!

Resolve to Kick a Bad Habit

It is time to start planning for those New Year Resolutions. Are you a smoker, or do you know a smoker who would like to stop?

If you are thinking about stopping and need to review reasons to stop, the CDC (Center for Disease Control and Preventions) has a great article on <u>Health Effects of Cigarette Smoking</u>. The general overview of the article stresses the fact that smoking harms almost every organ of the body!

Tobacco use causes more deaths each year than the HIV virus, illegal drug use, alcohol use, motor vehicle accidents, suicides and murders combined! Smoking causes an estimated 90% of all lung cancers in men and 80% in women, as well as a long list of other types of cancer, respiratory and cardiovascular diseases..

Many smokers may 5 understand the health risks but do not take them seriously if they are not feeling any of the effects. Unfortunately, by the time the effects are felt it may be too late to reverse them. Because smoking provides a certain amount of pleasure, the smoker needs to be led to embrace the idea of how much better life can be without smoking.

Making the decision to quit smoking is the best news you can give yourself and your family; but it is not an easy task and you may need help. Wendy Hall from Robert Boissoneault Oncology Institute (RBOI) will be conducting a FREE six week tobacco dependence class at our church beginning January 14th from 5:30 PM to 6:30 PM. This program is funded by the Florida Department of Health. Participants will be provided with optional supplies of nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) including patches, gum or lozenges. THE WAYS OF THE KINGDOM

Now Lord, consider their threats and enable our servants to speak your word with great boldness. Stretch out your hand to heal and perform miraculous signs and wonders through the name of your holy servant Jesus. (Acts 4:29-30)

I wonder how often Christians remember that we are first citizens of the Kingdom of God and second citizens of the United States. We are not called to be politically correct but spiritually honest.

Many citizens of the Kingdom are alarmed by our changing nation. Being told that we are in a post-Christian era threatens us. How can this be? We still send missionaries around the world, spend millions to help the poor and feed the hungry, and make a point of attending a place of worship at least once a week. But as Christians could we have lost our single focus—that of rightly relating to our Lord Jesus Christ?

In his letter to the church at Ephesus, Jesus praised their hard work, perseverance and endurance. Then he said, "Yet I hold this against you: You have forsaken your first love. Remember the height from which you have fallen! Repent and do the things you did at first. If you do not repent, I will come and remove your lampstand from its place." (Revelation 2:1-7)

Is it possible the church in America has left its first love? Have we become spiritually lazy? We do all the commendable things, just like the Ephesian church. But how often do we hear of a move of God bringing a revived faith, resulting in people being

saved, healed and discipled? As 7 Christians our commission isn't to save our "nation," but to go and make disciples wherever God has placed us, teaching them everything Jesus commanded. If the church in the United States carries out this calling, we will bring blessing to our land.

Billy Graham once said that the United States is not at a crossroad. Instead, we are past the crossroad and far down the wrong road. Mr. Graham said our only hope is to turn around, go back to the crossroad and make the right turn. Could our post-Christian label be the result of God's removing the "lampstand" of the church in America so that we are no longer a bright light of God in this land?

In the Old Testament, the Lord promised his people that when they strayed away from him, if they would humble themselves, pray and seek his face, he would hear and heal their land. Today, if we humble ourselves, pray and seek his face, he will revive our faith, enabling us to fulfill our commission to reach people who don't know him. Such a revival would bring healing within our land.

A non-Christian wrote: "If the Christians don't do something, we are going to lose our country." (Before you are critical of what he's not doing, consider that he recognizes where the spiritual power rests.)

If you are comfortable with the state of the church in our nation, then this challenge isn't for you. But if you sense our spiritual apathy, our serving well but not loving enough, I challenge you to pray:

"Lord, send a revival and let it begin in me."

If not us, who? If not now, when?



A Trip to Georgia—March 19-22


Dick and Myrna Evans will be back in town for three months, and Dick has planned a 4-day, 3-night trip to LaGrange and Pine Mountain GA March 19-22, 2013. The motor coach tour will include 3 nights at the Best Western Inn in LaGrange with full breakfast each morning.

Participants will visit the Explorations in Antiquities Center in LaGrange—an interactive living museum of daily life in biblical times featuring full scale archeological replicas created by Dr. James Fleming. It is the next best thing to an actual visit to the Holy Land to gain a better understanding of the Bible. The full day there, just before Holy Week, will include guided tours and an authentic 15 dish Last Supper meal. Dick says, "I have studied with Jim Fleming in Israel and no one knows the Holy Land any better than he does. His archeological re-creations here in the USA are among the best in the world!"

The trip will also include a full day at Callaway Gardens at Pine Mountain—just a half hour ride from LaGrange. The azalea gardens should be in full bloom. The tour there will also include the Callaway Discovery Center, the Day Butterfly Center, the Sibley Horticultural Center, and the Callaway Memorial Chapel. We will enjoy a full buffet lunch. Myrna says, "The Callaway Gardens are so beautiful! We are looking forward to being there again—this time in the spring."

The cost for the trip is \$299 per person, double occupancy. (Single supplement is \$105). The price includes motor coach from FUMCH, 3 nights at the Best Western, 3 breakfasts, meals at the Antiquities Museum and Callaway Gardens, and trip insurance. Not included: 2 lunches at Cracker Barrel on travel days and 2 suppers at I-Hop on tour days.

Yes, we need your help in our recording of two of the five Vital Signs of a Healthy Congregation. The two areas we need are Intentional Discipleship and Salty Service. Here is how you can help.

Intentional Discipleship: If you lead a small group of any type – Sunday School class, bible study, prayer group – any small group of any type of discipleship, please contact Kay in our office by phone or email, and inform her of the number of persons attending your group session, on a weekly basis. We need to record all the numbers of persons attending any small group session.

Salty Service: We are required to record the number of PERSONS who are involved in any community ministry or outreach of any type. We are not recording the number of hours invested, just the number of persons investing their personal time in community service of any type. So, if you serve for at least one hour, in a single event, turn in one Salty Service card. If you have served in more than one service or ministry during a week, turn in a card for each event. Again, we are measuring the number of persons involved in community service events each week. There will be "Salty Service" cards located in the pews to use for this recording. Simply remove the needed number of cards, and place them into the offering plates. Thank you so much for your help in this area. The measuring of these areas of ministry are critical for our church.

A NEW YEAR CALLS FOR NEW BOOKS

Our Church Library offers the following titles for your reading enjoyment:

"Winner Take All" by T. Davis Bunn – A top-notch legal drama, the book graphically depicts what can be accomplished when God-inspired individuals, without the fear of consequence, take a strong stand for the truth. It tells the story of Marcus Glenwood who is trying to rebuild his legal practice and tend to a deepening relationship with Kirsten Stansted. Marcus gets an unexpected plea for help from Dale Steadman, the new CEO of New Horizons. Steadman's one -year old daughter has been kidnapped by his ex-wife, a renowned opera diva, and he fears his wife will hurt her. Marcus agrees to take the case, ignoring his instincts against getting involved with this man who once tried to have him killed. Marcus and Kirsten are soon drawn into a much darker side of this seemingly straightforward case and they are unsure whether they can trust their own client. Someone is trying to prevent them from following the kidnapper's trail. A trail of multilayered suspense leads to its gripping conclusion.

Jane Peart is a prolific writer and our library has many of her books. The first is one of the Edgewater Manor Mysteries, titled "Thread of Suspicion". Set in late-nineteenth-century England, this story once again offers Peart's trademark blend of captivating characters and enticing storytelling. Nell Winston is offered a position as companion to Allegra Selkirk, a young woman who has been paralyzed in a carriage accident. Nell

considers this unexpected opportunity a welcome change from her job as dining room hostess at a seaside resort. But upon her arrival at the Selkirk's isolated country estate, she discovers a situation far different from what she imagined. Behind the black iron gate stands the fortress-like mansion called Hope's End, a fitting name for a place that seems both impregnable and inescapable. There is something here that chills the soul, and there is danger. As Nell's friendship with Allegra deepens, she determines to discover the secrets that keep Allegra a helpless invalid. When Nell follows the thread of suspicion that leads to unexpected sources, she finds not only Allegra but also herself in deadly danger. Will Nell have the courage to save them both from the threat at hand?

The second Edgecliffe Manor Mysteries novel is "A Perilous Bargain", set by the misty cliffs of Ireland for an unforgettable tale of love and intrigue. Oriel Banning is desperately seeking employment after her previous employer cheats her and leaves her stranded in England. So when Morgan Drummond, a shipboard acquaintance, makes a highly unorthodox proposal, Oriel is compelled to agree to his strange bargain. Together they travel to a castle in Ireland, where the terms of the agreement will be carried out. Despite Morgan's remoteness toward her, Oriel decides to make the best of things, pursuing friendships with a handsome poet, Bryan Moore, and the Wicklows next door. She loves the verdant Irish countryside, but when a series of frightening events occur, Oriel becomes convinced that she is not welcome at Drummond Castle. Was agreeing to this

The following books are all written by Jane Peart and are not in any special order, but they are all "a westward dreams novel". She writes about women who must find a new life for themselves in a difficult, sometimes hostile environment, but with persistence, principle and a steadfast faith, they not only survive, but thrive.

"Undaunted Spirit" follows free-spirited journalist, Independence McClaren, to a Colorado silver town as she tries to carve her mark in a man's world. Mindy, her nickname, becomes a reporter for the Roaring River Gazette and has a passion for the truth. She will be tested – whether to follow her heart or to retain her integrity. Mindy will have to choose.

"Runaway Heart" tells the story of Holly Lambeth who has taken the stagecoach to Riverbend, Oregon to escape the humiliation of being jilted. She had come to find a welcome new life, but her cousin's chilly reception tells her she made a terrible mistake. Riverbend is a town barely more than a mining camp. Holly knows that she is unwelcome and unwanted and knows that only she can change her situation. The editor of the local newspaper and the town's doctor are both attracted to the pretty newcomer but Holly makes a decision that will not only change her, but alter her own vision of the future.

"Promise of the Valley" Adelaide Pride, 26 years old, follows her Yankee employer to Napa Valley, California to be a companion to a Yankee spinster. Southern-born, Adelaide is from a family of six generations of Prides who had lived and entertained under warm Southern skies.





evening about 5, stuck in traffic on choke and splutter and die - I barely managed to coast, cursing, into a gas station, glad only that I would not be blocking traffic and would have a tow truck. It wouldn't even turn over. Before I could make the call. I saw a woman walking out of the quickie mart building, and it looked like she slipped on some ice and fell into a gas pump, so I got out to see if she was okay.

When I got there, it looked more like she had been overcome by sobs than that she had fallen; she was a young woman who looked really haggard with dark circles under her eyes. She dropped something as I helped her up, and I picked it up to give it to her. It was a nickel.

At that moment, everything came into focus for me: the crying woman, the ancient Suburban crammed full of stuff with 3 kids in the back (1 in a car seat), and the gas pump reading hug and said a quick prayer with her for \$4.95.

I asked her if she was okay and if she needed help, and she just kept saying 'I don't want my kids to see me crying!,' so we stood on the other side of the pump from her car. She said she was driving to California and that things were very hard for her right now. So I asked, 'And you were praying?' That made her back away from me a little, but I assured her I was not a crazy person and said, 'He heard you, and He sent me.'

I was driving home from a meeting this so she could fill up her car completely. and while it was fueling, walked to the Colorado Blvd., and the car started to next door McDonald's and bought 2 big bags of food, some gift certificates for more, and a big cup of coffee. She gave the food to the kids in the car, who attacked it like wolves, and we stood by somewhat warm spot to wait for the the pump eating fries and talking a little.

> She told me her name, and that she lived in Kansas City. Her boyfriend left 2 months ago and she had not been able to make ends meet. She knew she wouldn't have money to pay rent Jan. 1, and finally, in desperation, had called her parents, with whom she had not spoken in about 5 years. They lived in California and said she could come live with them and try to get on her feet there.

> So she packed up everything she owned in the car. She told the kids they were going to California for Christmas, but not that they were going to live there.

> I gave her my gloves, a little safety on the road. As I was walking over to my car, she said, 'So, are you like an angel or something?'

> This definitely made me cry. I said, 'Sweetie, at this time of year angels are really busy, so sometimes God uses regular people.'

It was so incredible to be a part of someone else's miracle. And of course, you guessed it, when I got in my car it started right away and got me home with no problem. Plumb says, "I kept wondering what he might have looked like in a Navy uniform: a white hat, a bib in the back, and bell-bottom trousers. I wonder how many times I might have seen him and not even said Good morning, how are you?' or

Plumb thought of the man hours the sailor had spent on a long wooden table in the bowels of the ship, carefully weaving the shrouds and folding the silks of each chute, holding in his hands each time the fate of someone he didn't know.

Now, Plumb asks his audience, "Who's packing your parachute?" Everyone has someone who provides what they need to make it through the day. Plumb also points out that he needed many kinds of parachutes when his plane was shot down over enemy territoryhe needed his physical parachute, his mental parachute, his emotional parachute, and his spiritual parachute. He called on all these supports before reaching safety.

Sometimes in the daily challenges that life gives us, we miss what is really important. We may fail to say hello, please, or thank you, congratulate someone on something wonderful that has happened to them, give compliment, or just do something nice for no reason.

PRAYING THE PSALMS

Do you pray the Psalms?

The Psalms are beautiful, but sometimes we avoid them because they seem a little harsh – you know, calling down the wrath of God upon enemies asking for them to be smitten and all that! Although there are instructions for how they are to be sung, most of us don't sing the Psalms except when they are part of a hymn; even then we may not recognize them as part of a Psalm.

I have a wonderful book, Psalms The Prayer Book of the Bible, by Dietrich Bonhoeffer. The title itself forces me to think differently about the Psalms and to ask, "What does praying the Psalms look like?" Having studied Jewish Spirituality I knew the Psalms were an integral part of the Jewish Liturgy. The Psalms (sometimes called the Psalter) were also central in the worship of the early Christian Church. The Psalms were so familiar they could be heard being sung or recited in the fields. In his book Bonhoeffer says, "...whoever has begun to pray the Psalter seriously and regularly will soon give a vacation to other little devotional prayers and say: 'Ah, there is not the juice, the strength,

the passion, the fire which I find in the Psalter. It tastes too cold and too hard.' (Luther)." pg. 25. In Bonhoeffer's instructions for praying the Psalter, he says we need to pray it in our daily morning and evening prayers, reading and praying together at least several Psalms in order every day, not picking and choosing which ones to pray and getting into them deeper and deeper.

The Psalter does give us a wonderful way of expressing ourselves in prayer to our Heavenly Father in the same way in which generations before us have done. For those of us who for whatever reason may find ourselves at a loss for words, the Psalms give us words. Praying back to God words which were Divinely inspired is honoring to Him to whom we pray so not only do we get to know Him better as we commune with Him in prayer, but we honor Him as well.

Even if we do pick and chose a Psalm to pray, why not give it a try!! We might find there's something to this Psalm praying. After all if Bonhoeffer, Luther, and the leaders of the early church thought it worth their time, perhaps it might be worth a little of ours. Maybe they knew something we have yet to discover.


