What was important was not whether or not Gods will was being done, but whether or not they were keeping the exact rule of the Law.

Someone (and I am sorry I don't have the name to go with the quote) said, the main thing is to keep the main thing the main thing. It is most important that we keep before us what we are all about. We are not a business to be run in a business like fashion, we are not a court that has to be run by rule of law, we are a church. We operate out of love and with a desire to see to the needs and dreams of others before self. Our main thing is to proclaim Jesus Christ. Our main thing is to share the love of God in Christ Jesus with the entire world. We cannot do that if all we are worried about is keeping the rules. There are lots of ways we can keep the main thing the main thing, but unless we are doing them we are letting the nits get picked and we no longer are about the

work of our heavenly Father.

When we submit our annual report to the Annual Conference they are not going to be interested in how the committees were run or bulletin board or types of music, they are going to ask us how we are doing in bringing new people to Christ.

That is keeping the main thing, the main thing.


In September a new 8 week Disciple class titled Invitation to Romans began. There are several

There is a lot of publicity noting the month of October as Breast Cancer Awareness month, and with it come reminders for annual screening. Have you had your mammogram yet? For the past few years, a frequently heard response to that question would be: "I'm having a digital exam instead." This exam has been hailed as the latest and greatest with much less discomfort than the standard mammography. The official term for this exam is Breast Thermography or DITI (Digital Infrared Thermal Imaging).

In June of this year the FDA (Federal Food and Drug and Administration) published findings that mammography (X-ray of the breast) is still the most effective way of detecting breast cancer in its earliest and most treatable stages. This agency has sent warning letters to health care providers and thermography manufacturers who claim that thermal imaging can take the place of mammography.

however, have a place in the diagnosis of breast cancer. It is to be used as an additional tool for detecting cancer. The FDA, the Susan B. Komen for the Cure, and the American Cancer Association all share the same opinion regarding thermogram verses mammogram.

See your doctor, get a CBE (Clinical Breast Exam), continue monthly personal breast exams and get mammogram а as often as recommended by your health care provider. Follow their instructions for

any additional exams that may be 5 recommended such as DITI, ultrasound, MRI or biopsy and you'll be doing all you can to ensure good health.



the time before his return-nation rising against nation, famines, earthquakes in various places and persecutions. In spite of the uncertain times that are on the increase today, God and his The kingdom will stand firm. warnings of scripture urge us to make certain we belong to "the kingdom that cannot be shaken." (Hebrews 12:28)

What makes you afraid in our shaky world today? What tempts you into the worry-world of sleepless nights and complaint-filled days? Is it the unusual weather...or the erratic stock market...or the accelerating violence? What threatens the false sense of your ability to be in control?

Jesus said, "Do not worry about vour life.... But seek first his [God's] kingdom and righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." 2011 UMC FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE EVENT June 01 to 04, 2011 - Tampa, Florida

Attendees: Rev. Mark A.Whittaker & Bernhard E. Diedrich, Lay Member. First United Methodist Church of Homosassa, Gulf Central District

LAY MEMBER REPORT

Pastor Mark and I attended the 169th UMC Florida Annual Conference (6/1 to 6/4/11)

THE THEME: "Transforming the World by Living as Peacemakers"

This is the third of four themes set by Florida Conference Bishop Timothy W. Whitaker in 2009. Each year the theme begins with "Transforming the World by..." and is supported by many national and sometimes international guest speakers to determine the best ways to succeed in each of these important endeavors.

The Conference attendance was approximately 2000 clergy, laity, guests and youth, all excited about doing the Lords work and enjoying the camaraderie and inspiring music. Our focus was and is about this years theme on how we should all be "Living as Peacemakers", both home and abroad, along with all of the other important duties of Annual Conference.

June 1st (9:00 am): I attended the Annual Conference Laity Session conducted by Conference Lay Leader, Sharon Luther, who is serving her third term. This was an informative session that prepares us (lay delegates) for this conference. Conference Treasurer, Mickey Wilson, presented his current report and projections for the future, which despite the current economic conditions are very positive for the Florida Conference. Peacemaker Workshops I & II followed.

June 1st (2:00 pm): We began with the Plenary Session; with Ballots 1-3, Opening/ Organizing the Conference and with keynote speaker Dr. Daniel Bell (who teaches at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, SC). Dr. Bell spoke on "Our call to be Peacemakers" and suggested we think about two dimensions of Christ's peace: Peace through Christ, reconciling with God, and reconciling peace between us and all God's creation.

June 1st (7:00 pm): The Annual "Service of Licensing, Commissioning and Ordination" of 39 Individuals (10/Elder in Full Connection, 10/Provisional Elder's, 2/Deacon's in Full Connection, 2/Provisional Deacon's & 15/Licensed as Local Pastor's) was held. This is an extraordinary event that includes a powerful sermon by Bishop Timothy W. Whitaker and welcoming of these individuals into the Ministry of Serving our Lord and his People.

June 2^{nd} (8:30 am): We began with the Plenary Session, with Ballots 4-5, and an address by Dr. David Hindman (an Elder & lead pastor at Duncan Memorial Methodist Church in Ashland, VA). Dr. Hindman spoke about the declining church, the difficulty raising children in our culture, and that we should return to the Wesleyan tradition and a quote "Don't be in a rush to develop young Christians". Also, Bishop's Capital Campaign, New DS's & Appointments, along with a worship service by Rev. James McWhinnie: "Service of Remembrance".

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June 2nd (2:00 pm): We began with Ballot 6-8 and guest speaker Beth Fogle-Miller, who delivered an update on Bishop Whitaker's Strategic Leadership Team (Purpose/Core Values/Vision/Mission Accountability/Connection/Change) and their goal to complete the Strategic Plan by 2012. The Vision Statement: *Being changed in Christ—Making a change in the world.*

June 2nd (7:30 pm): We had a powerful and emotional sermon by Bishop Ricardo Pereira from Cuba, followed by the Celebration of Holy Communion by Bishop Timothy Whitaker and the Annual Conference Offering.

June 3rd (8:30 am): Ballots 9-12 and Rev. Geraldine McClellan, DS speaking at the Plenary Session beginning with Reaching Out: Partnerships in the World, Reaching Within: Being Inclusive in Church. Finance & Administration: Property Worship: Peace Flowing as a River.

June 3rd (2:00 pm): Ballots 13-15 with Plenary Session covering the following: Anniversary/Retirement Celebration, Pension/Health and Ministry. Then Conference Treasurer, Mickey Wilson addressed the General Conference regarding Statistics/ Finances and Finance & Administration. Resolutions: We had some very controversial issues with some of the Resolutions and due to a lack of time, the majority (371-out-of-639) voted to Table these until Annual Conference 2012.

June 3rd (7:00 pm): Ballots 16-17. Covered subject: Living in Peace in the Church, an Old-Fashion Hymn Sing, and Bishop Timothy Whitaker's sermon informally shares his thoughts.

June 4th Saturday (8:30 am): Ballots 18-19. This balloting was required for the 2012 (Worldwide) General Convention (April 23 to May 4th) in Tampa, Florida. The purpose was to Elect: 11/Lay & 11/Clergy Members for General Conference, 11/Lay and 11/Clergy Members to Jurisdictional Conference, and 7/Lay and 7/Clergy members to the reserve pool. This procedure took many hours for Mark and I to read all of the (164) Bio's (prior to the convention) and then select and vote many times over several days to achieve the above goal. Fortunately, we were supplied with a new efficient, electronic, hand-held voting device.

There were the usual exhibitors at the Ministry Expo, including a Health and Wellness Fair, where we elected to have blood work screening. This included cholesterol evaluation, our blood pressure, and followed-up by a meeting with a health consultant.

This is my fourth Annual Conference and again a wonderful event to be part of and as always a pleasure to share this time with Pastor Mark. Also, FUMC met it's 100% Apportionments.

That statement basically doomed the dollar to low overseas exchange rates for a long time to come. So, we give up! We're officially changing our family's financial support to be based on 30 Thai baht to \$1, a 25% decline from more historic norms and from what our support was based on seven years ago when we first came to

Thailand. That means we are at **19** almost 89% support now, which is miraculously solid given the Great Recession but still low. Please pray for the Lord to move in the hearts of His people to provide the additional 11% (\$700 a month) that would allow us to be fully supported for the first time since the dollar began its long decline in January 2006.

Following are new books that will village frowns upon artistic pursuits of make good Fall reading:

"A Slender Thread", a novel by Tracie Peterson, a timeless story of family tragedies and triumphs. Abandoned by a mother who chose to follow the lure of fame, the five Mitchell sisters were raised under the loving hand of their grandmother in the ead quaint farming community of Council real Grove, Kansas. The desire to create a future apart from the shadow of their mother caused them to go their separate ways. Their relationship suffers and the five sisters search for a way to salvage the bonds of sisterhood that is bound only by a slender thread.

> "The Seat Beside Me" by Nancy Moser. You're a passenger on a plane seated next to a stranger sharing small talk and pretzels. Yet this time there's a connection, - a bond forms. The plane crashes. The person beside you is dead and you are alive. Your mind screams, "Why? Why me? Why them?". Five passengers and the people in the seats beside them. None will ever be the same. How do you deal with the guilt of living when others have died? How can you possibly understand God's choice? A powerful story!

> "More Than Words" by Judith Miller follows a similar storyline as the previous book. Book 2 of Daughters of Amana is a journey to the charming villages of the Amana Colonies in 1885. Gretchen Kohler can't help but dream of a life beyond tending her father's general store and keeping an eye on her younger brother and senile grandmother. She enjoys creative writing but her traditional Amana

"Lady in the Mist", Book One of The Midwives, by Laurie Alice Eakes. By virtue of her profession as a midwife, Tabitha Eckles is the keeper of many secrets. A man with his own secret is Dominick Cherrett, a British aristocrat working on American soil as an indentured servant. This is a time, 1809, when relations between America

and England rest on the edge of a knife. Tabitha and Dominick cross paths, leading them on a journey of intrigue, threats, public disgrace and....love. But can she trust Dominick? Finding true love seems impossible in a world set against them. A novel of secrets and suspense!

"The Spirit of Sweetgrass", a novel by Nicole Seitz. This is a story of the rich culture of the Low Country of South Carolina with bits of Gullah culture and history interspersed in the story. Essie Mae Jenkins, the narrator, is a basket weaver and she weaves the story as well of her family and friends with the traditions of the South and narrates with a real Southern voice. The sweetgrass basket weavers ply their ancient craft from Beaufort all the way up to Georgetown. It's the story of one Gullah woman's plight to protect her rich and endangered life.

"A Stranger's Wish", Book One of the Amish Farm Trilogy by Gayle Roper. Englischer Kristie Matthews' move to an Amish family farm in Lancaster County, Pennsyslvania couldn't have started on a worse note. The young schoolteacher is bitten by the farm dog and on her trip to the ER she has a strange encounter with a man who has just had a heart attack. The man asked if she would do him a favor. When she said yes, he gave her a key and said to tell no one that she has it. When her life is endangered, Kristie suspects a connection to the mysterious key. While solving the mystery (and trying to stay alive) she must decide whether her lawyer boyfriend if right for her - or if Jon Clarke Griffin, the local man she's met, is all he seems to be. A novel of mystery, romance and a beautiful Amish setting.

"A Distant Melody", Book 23 One in the Wings of Glory series, by Sarah Sundin, an exciting and tender story of love, courage and sacrifice during World War II. Never pretty enough to please her gorgeous mother, Allie will do anything to gain her approval – even marry a man she doesn't love. However, Allie meets Lt. Walter Novak, a fearless pilot but hopeless with women, before he is shipped overseas. Thus begins a correspondence that will change their lives. The letters fly between Walt's muddy bomber base in England and Allie's mansion in California. Their friendship binds them together but there are secrets, commitments and expectations that keep them apart.

"Blaze of Glory" by Major Jeff Struecker and Alton Gansky, a great military thriller. Six men, Two assassination plots. One chance to save the world. A sudden and suspicious rise in female suicide bombers sends Sgt. Eric Moyer and his team on a desperate mission to put an end to the bombings, a task that will require them to save over a dozen heads-of-state - if they can. When they learn the identity of the real leader behind the attacks someone much closer to home - the team again travels across the ocean to stop a man whose wealth and ambition is matched only by his madness.

DISASTER RELIEF/PLANNING 24

Florida dodged a bullet with --Public shelter (shelter site locations hurricane Irene. I'm sure that most everyone has seen some of the massive media coverage of this huge storm and the resulting damage, including massive power outages, storm surges, property damage and flooding. The general theme that was mentioned repeatedly was: Prepare, stay safe, and evacuate if mandated.

As I mentioned in last months article, advanced planning for emergency situations is critical.

Determine if you live in an evacuation area. Citrus County has developed a new evacuation map which correlates color coded evacuation zones to hurricane categories. The colored areas on the map are vulnerable to storm surge. This is a more detailed approach than the previously stated guideline namely all properties west of U.S.19 and 1.5 miles east of 19. The map is available on line at the Emergency Management web page.

To view the map, go to the sheriff's website: www.sheriffcitrus.org and click on Emergency Management at the top. From the Emergency Management page select Evacuation Zones. Determine whether you live in an evacuation area and if so what level (color).

If you are in an evacuation area or a mobile/manufactured home or RV, decide where you will go if ordered to evacuate. Your choices include:

--Home of a relative, friend, or church member (if indicated on survey) outside the evacuation area.

--Hotel/motel outside the evacuation area (make arrangements early),

are listed on the EOC webpage) but verify that the shelter is open before you go, or

--Leave the area entirely.

NOTE that all persons living in mobile/manufactured homes or RV's MUST evacuate for ALL mandatory evacuation orders regardless of where you are located in the county.

Re-entry passes will be used when an area in the county has been evacuated. Once the area has been declared safe for re-entry, law enforcement will establish check points and require a pass that identifies the holder as living in the area. If you don't have a re-entry pass you will be required to show photo-identification with a listed address in the affected area. Re-entry passes are available at:

- --Sheriff's Operations in Inverness and all resource offices,
- --Department of Development Services in Lecanto.
- -- Tax Collectors Office in Crystal River and Inverness.

Keep the pass in your glove compartment until needed, and then hang it on the rearview mirror of your vehicle during re-entry.

Remember our goal is to protect our people and property Before, During and After a disaster.

Please keep informed of possible threats throughout the season. Review your personal/family preparedness plan and put your plan into action when the time comes.

Virginia also celebrates two legal holidays on the day, Columbus Day and Yorktown Victory Day, which honors the final victory at the Siege of Yorktown in the Revolutionary War.
