2 Thanksgiving Message from Pastor Kip

"Let your gentle spirit be known to all men. The Lord is near. Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." Phil. 4:5-7

Her name was Marlene. She was always filled with laughter and joy. She had the ability to handle difficult situations with great peace and confidence. Her spirit was gentle and generous.

Where did this passionate, Christlike character come from? Her prayer life was part of the answer. She once told me a story of a prayer experience she had. Marlene liked to walk and pray. When she took her prayer walks she would always pray out loud, real loud. This was so she could be sure God would hear her and know that it was indeed her.

Marlene believed that prayers should consist mostly of expressing her thankfulness for what God had done in her life and for what God was about to do, things she was not aware of just yet. So down the street she would go; arms waving in the air, prayers of thanksgiving being shouted towards heaven and singing to down the road.

intermixed with songs of praise and adoration to her God. I'm sure this was a sight to behold; she was truly a very free spirit.

One day, on a long and desolate street near their home, Marlene was out for a prayer walk. She had walked quite a distance and had prayed very joyfully and very loudly. She suddenly had the feeling she was not alone. She knew God was always with her; yet on this day she felt the presence of another person. She felt the person was near to her, but this did not silence her song and prayer fest.

After few minutes she nonchalantly looked her over shoulder. She was surprised to see that the other person was a small boy on a bike, following her at a safe distance. She stopped and spoke to the boy while he kept his distance. He was polite enough at first, but when he sensed the time was right he darted ahead of her and quickly rode away. He never looked back; he just peddled away from her as fast as he could.

After giving this strange happening some thought, Marlene remembered the terrified look on the boy's face. She suddenly realized that what she experienced as a joy-filled prayerful experience, the young boy experienced as a terrifying encounter with a crazy lady yelling and singing to herself as she walked down the road.

experienced was Marlene bringing Paul's words from Philippians 4 to faith into the text. As she did this, the scripture impacted her life. The Holy Spirit had the ability and the opportunity to touch her life and turn it from one of anxiousness and fretting to one of God-guarded divine peace. The free spirit others saw in Marlene was really the release of the Holy Spirit within her.

This month we will all celebrate Thanksgiving. Will we celebrate it in a manner in which we offer our thanks to God and then continue to fret and worry? Will we thank God for the blessings in our lives and then begin to be anxious about the unknowns of tomorrow? Paul's teaching explains that such a habit is not really being thankful in the way God desires.

Paul might well say we are only going part way. We are willing to say thanks for what we know God has done, and yet we are wary of really trusting our tomorrows to him. It's as if we can only give thanks after the fact, because God cannot be trusted for our future trials and concerns.

Paul says to let our requests be known to God although God already knows our requests. The reason Paul says to let them be known is so we can offer them to God in phrases of thankfulness for what he has done

In reality, what the young boy had and what he will do. Paul then 3 tells us that God's resulting peace is beyond our comprehension, life. She was simply pouring her a God-given peace that will guard our hearts. It's the part about being beyond our comprehension that causes a problem. If we could comprehend the vastness of his peace, we might be more willing to trust God with our concerns of today and tomorrow. But comprehending in this way would remove the element of faith.

> Faith is what our relationship with God is all about. His gift of faith in our lives allows us to experience the peace that surpasses comprehension. I like the idea of God's peace guarding my heart and directing my life. I may not walk down the road shouting and singing out loud with great thanksgiving but praise and thanksgiving are active in my heart.

> I hope the thanksgiving that brings God's peace is in your heart as well. Wrap the things that concern you in thanksgiving to God, expressing your faith as you trust beyond your understanding. Let God's past workings in your life be the evidence of his promised future workings. Let your requests known by God, wrapped in thanksgiving, and discover the wonder of God's peace.

Tattoos, Permanent Make-up and Temporary Tattoos How safe are they?

Permanent tattoos are those where needles are used to inject colored ink into the skin. Permanent make-up is considered a permanent tattoo that resembles the look of eyebrow pencil, lip liner, eyeliner or blush. They are even used in breast reconstruction following mastectomies.

The FDA does not traditionally regulate the inks and pigments used for tattoos and permanent make-up. They are generally considered as cosmetics and covered under the FDA Cosmetic Act. The actual practice of tattooing is overseen by state and local authorities.

Anyone considering a tattoo or permanent make-up should consider the risks involved.

Infection: Unsterilized or poorly sterilized tattooing equipment and needles can transmit diseases such as: HIV, hepatitis as well as skin infections caused by staphylococcus aureus ("staph") and other bacteria.

Allergies: There have been various allergic reactions to the ink and pigments used in both permanent and temporary tattoos. These can occur up to several weeks after getting the tattoo.

Scarring: This may occur during the process of either getting or removing a tattoo.

Granulomas: These are the nodules or small lumps or knots that may develop around the particles of

pigment which the body perceives 5 as foreign material.

Keloid formation: These are scars that grow beyond the normal boundaries.

MRI complications: There have been complaints of temporary burning and swelling in the tattoo area after an MRI due to the iron oxide in some inks.

One of the biggest problems with tattoos is future dissatisfaction with them. This comes from time, body changes with aging, and styles of the time. Sometimes tattoos become "blurred" when the pigments are injected too deep and they travel beyond the intended area. Removal is most commonly done by laser and is time consuming, expensive and does not always work. The removal should only be considered after talking to a health care provider and never at a tattoo parlor.

Temporary tattoos are those that last from several days to several weeks. They are applied to the skin with moistened cotton. The coloring used is marketed as "henna". It has been used historically to color hair, silk, and wool as well a means to decorate the body for cultural celebrations. The problem is that "black henna" being used in some of the temporary tattoos contains PPD (p-phenylenadiamine). This ingredient may cause skin reactions resulting in blisters, redness, red weeping lesions, loss of skin pigmentation, and/or permanent scarring.

The FDA has coined the slogan:

"Think before you ink"

THE WAYS OF THE KINGDOM

I read an interesting thought in Dr. Jeremiah's book, *I Never Thought I'd See the Day*. He explains three types of thinking—rational, irrational, and transrational.

Rational thinking is about the way I think—and the way others ought to think in relation to what I think. This is like the "why don't you get your head on straight" question we looked at in last month's column. "Getting my head on straight" means I need to think the same as the one questioning my thinking!

Irrational thinking (to me) is the way the person who doesn't agree with me is thinking. Haven't you ever wondered about another's opinion, "How can he/she believe that; it's totally irrational"?

Rational and irrational thinking is in the realm of human reasoning. As we look at the politicians' arguments these days, we are quick to decide who is rational and irrational—according to *our* idea of the way things should be.

Dr. Jeremiah suggests there is another way of thinking he calls "transrational." This thought process is above human reasoning; it is the way God thinks about things. We often hear the question, "What does God think about that," answered by man's rational reasoning—"Nobody can know what God thinks; he gave us a brain to figure it out for ourselves."

But Paul tells us differently: As it is written (from Isaiah 64:4) "No eye

has seen, no ear has heard, no mind has conceived what God has prepared for those who love him."

But God has revealed it to us by his Spirit. The Spirit searches all things, even the deep things of God. We have not received the spirit of the world but the Spirit who is from God, that we may understand what God has freely given us. (1 Corinthians 2:9-10, 12)

Paul writes that Spirit-indwelt Christians can know what God thinks about many things. His indwelling Spirit will reveal it to us through the Word, prayer, fellowship with believers and sometimes just through the thought processes of our minds.

Paul wrote to the Romans (12:2), "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve of what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will." God's Word tells us to praise him even in difficult circumstances, to bless and do good for our enemies—transrational thinking leading to transactional behavior. We are called to think and act differently than the world.

God has made it possible for those who have his Spirit to think above the rational/irrational approach to things.

As a believer, have you studied the Word, willing to give up *your* way of thinking to learn how God thinks? God invites us to rise above our opinionated rational/irrational level of understanding and see what he sees, learning to think as he thinks.

Are we willing to make his way of thinking our way of thinking?

GIVE THANKS FOR OUR WONDERFUL CHURCH LIBRARY

The following selections are samples of some fine authors and books that we have on our Library shelves:

"Elsewhere" by Gabrielle Zevin, a funny, fast-paced and fascinating novel. Welcome to Elsewhere. It is usually warm with a breeze; the sun and the stars shine brightly and it's quiet and peaceful here. And you can't get sick or any older. It's where fifteen-year-old Liz Hall ends up after she has died. It is a place so like Earth, yet completely different from it. Here Liz will age backward from the day of her death until she becomes a baby again and returns to Earth. But Liz wants to turn sixteen, not fourteen (again). She wants to get her driver's license, go to college, fall in love. Instead, she is being forced to live a life she doesn't want with a grandmother she has only just met, and it is not going well. Is it possible that a life lived in reverse is no different from a life lived forward?

"Letters in the Attic" by DeAnna Julie Dodson, one of Annie's Attic Mysteries. Annie Dawson and the members of the Hook and Needle Club of Stony Point, Maine track down mysteries connected with the contents found in the attic of Annie's ancestral home, Grey Gables. There will be danger, adventures and heartwarming discoveries in the secrets Annie unearths – secrets about her own family as well as the citizens of this charming seacoast town in central Maine.

"Sweet Sanctuary", a novel by Sheila Walsh and Cindy Martinusen Coloma. Sheila Walsh is a featured speaker with Women of Faith. In tiny Cottage Cove on the coast of Maine,

Wren Evans, a single Mom, is raising her gifted son, Charlie. She wants to give him a stable, secure home life but when a prestigious music academy in Boston expresses interest in Charlie's talent, Wren is willing to move again to make his dreams come true. But Wren doesn't know that Charlie has been praying for her, and the answer to his prayers will change both of their lives. Wren's grandmother, Ruth, arrives unexpectedly and wants the family gathered together one last time at the summer home where long ago an accident shattered Wren's peaceful childhood. She is about to find sanctuary in the last place she ever expected.

"Gold of Kings", a Storm Syrrell adventure, by author Davis Bunn. Investigating the murder of her grandfather, Storm Syrrell discovers that his arts and antiques business served as a front for secret international dealings. Not only did her grandfather know of his impending death but he also left her the responsibility for his lifetime quest. With the help of Harry Bennett, a professional treasure hunter just released from jail, and Emma Webb, a U.S. Treasury agent with links to Interpol, their trail leads ever deeper into danger. A vital clue is discovered within the Copper Scroll of Qumran that can lead to a fortune in gold. These treasures represent a vital connection to an ancient faith. Will her quest include a personal transformation as well?

"Sommerfeld Trilogy" by Kim Vogel Sawyer includes three bestselling Mennonite novels in one volume. They include "Bygones", "Beginnings" and "Blessings". Three contemporary women seek a home and acceptance among a Kansas Mennonite

community. Each book has its own story and is a touching family saga. who always puts the needs of others ahead of her own. Adam

"Tempest in a Teapot", a tale from Grace Chapel Inn, written by Judy Baer. Sisters Jane, Louise and Alice run the Grace Chapel Inn, a gracious Victorian house that is now a bed-andbreakfast. The town of Acorn Hill is divided because an out-of-state developer wants to drain Fairy Pond and build a gas station over the site. There is a storm of protest over destroying such an idyllic spot while some businesspeople would like the added commerce a gas station would bring. With the Mayor indisposed, who will champion the cause of saving this natural wonder? Could a recluse who lives near the pond have the answer? And is it true that Louise was once in love with this hermit of Fairy Pond?

"Who's That Girl?" by Carol Cox is a Mystery and the Minister's Wife book. Kate Hanlon and her husband Paul move to the charming town of Copper Mill, Tennessee, nestled in the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains. They soon discover that small-town life is anything but boring. For instance, when Kate gets a call from the local hospital requesting that she identify a young woman who asked for her by name, she discovers that she's never laid eyes on the comatose patient before. She tries to find out how the woman ended up in the hospital in the first place. Kate uses her quick mind and the help of her dear friends to figure out the answers and realizes that spreading a little faith might be all that she needs to do to crack the case wide open.

"Treasuring Emma" a Middlefield Family novel, written by Kathleen Fuller, is a story of Emma

who always puts the needs of others ahead of her own. Adam was her first love and best friend. And when he left to experience the freedom of living in the English world, Emma was heartbroken. Now Adam is back in Middlefield and Emma is determined to guard her heart. When a newcomer arrives in town and shows an interest in Emma, she dismisses Adam's insistence that she be cautious. Emma doesn't quite know to accept this attention. Emma knows her Heavenly Father treasures her, but will her new beau?

"Sarah's Garden", A Patch of Heaven novel, by Kelly Long. The author writes that in researching this novel, she discovered that Amish communities differ from one another in simple to larger-life activities. Though the Amish may appear to live "the simple life", their differences provide a rich culture for both fact and fiction. There is a glossary of Pennsylvania Dutch words and phrases in the beginning of the book. The story is about Sarah King who has been nurturing a garden for years. She lives in the Pennsylvania Allegheny Mountains. .Duty calls her away from her garden and she meets Grant Williams, a handsome young veterinarian. As their feelings grow for one another, Sarah insists they can never be together because she would be uprooted from her home, her family and her community. Sarah wonders if anything lasting can blossom from a love that's forbidden?

- A tour of St. Simons Island including Ft. Frederica, Christ


Church, and the museum at Epworth by the Sea—learning more about the Wesley brothers in Georgia.

"Spiritual"

There are a lot of things being called "spiritual" which have nothing to do with Christian spiritual formation or our Christian faith, and which on the surface may seem enticing.

Many people seem to be searching for some kind of experience and many of the places they search lead them further and further away from our Lord. "Spiritual" may sound good, but most things with this label do not have anything to do with our Christian beliefs. One of the hopes of those involved in spiritual formation is that by embracing the spiritual part of our faith, people will not feel a need to look for something elsewhere.

What people are really seeking is an experience with the living Christ. This will not be found in something labeled "spiritual" which is apart from the body of Christ and contrary to what is said in the Bible. It can be found through a personal experiential relationship with Jesus Christ which is nurtured through spiritual practices like worship, prayer, personal Bible study, and Christian fellowship.

The Apostle Paul warned against being led astray by anyone preaching something other than the

gospel which he preached 17 (Galatians 1:6-9). In 1John 4:1 -2 we are told to test the spirits to see if they are from God. The only guidance we as Christians are to seek is from our Lord Jesus Christ. So if you see something labeled "spiritual" or offering to tell you the future, please test the spirits. Ask our Lord if it is of Him If you are unsure or have questions, please talk with someone here at the church whom you know to be a mature Christian. I am sure Pastor Kip, Kay, or a trusted Sunday school teacher would be glad to talk with you.

One of the wonderful things about Christian fellowship especially in a small group is the ability to share openly the joys of our personal experiential relationship with Christ. It can be a place where we feel free to talk about our relationship with Christ and the difference He is making in our lives. We can also encourage one another as we mature in our faith and learn to share that faith with others.



Her neighbor asks, "What is it supposed to be when it's finished?"


The little silver haired lady says, "According to the picture on the box, it's a rooster."
