

This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about! His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. ¹⁹ Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. ²⁰ But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. ²¹ She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:18-21

We all realize that there are many different aspects to the birth story of our Lord. There is the story of Mary and her dedication to God in her service to give birth to God's Son. There is the image of the Son of God being born in a manger. Then following the birth there are the stories of the Magi and the Shepherds. And obviously there is also the story of Joseph.

I always liked the story of Joseph and his role in the birth of Jesus. I like it because it reveals the true depth of Joseph's character. Joseph was a Jew who not only followed the law, but appeared to understand not only the need for the law, but also understood the impact the law could have on people's lives. He knew that he could divorce himself of Mary for obvious reasons and remain well in his rights as per the law. Yet he also knew what this could do to Mary. His decision was to follow the principles of the law, only to do so quietly, thus saving Mary from any harm.

He was also a man of God. This too is revealed in his obedience to the religious aspects of the law. He was engaged to Mary but did not take any actions towards her that would have violated the religious aspect of the law. These things would wait for after the marriage.

I think the greatest sign of his character was his obedience to the Word of God as spoken by the Angel Gabriel. Joseph received clear instructions as to what he was to do concerning the child Mary was carrying. He was told

that the child she carried was conceived through the Holy Spirit. 3 Gabriel also told Joseph what to name the child and why. His name was to be Jesus, for He was sent to save the people from their sins.

Following the instructions of the angel changed Joseph's and Mary's lives. Following the instructions of the angel allowed God's plan to come to fruition. Following the instructions of the angel allowed God to enter into our world as God had never entered before. It changed not only Joseph and Mary's lives, it changed ours as well.

This Christmas season, it stands to reason that not many of us will hear from the Angel Gabriel. However, we do know that hearing from God through the Holy Spirit is very likely and very probable. In fact we not only hope to hear from God in this manner, we expect it. What we do with what we hear will reflect the depth of our character, just as it did with Joseph.

National Safe Toys & Gift Month 2012

December has been designated as safe toy and gift month. This is a project led by Prevent Blindness America. The group hopes to educate not only parents but also those buying gifts for children as to their safety and suitability. This affects all of us as we prepare to buy for our children, grandchildren and also a family choice from the EBADOC tree. Hundreds of children have been injured or poisoned by poorly made items or the misuse of these items.

Toys are meant to be used as developmental tools as well as for recreational activities, and not cause harm. Since 1995 the U.S. Product Safety Commission (CPSC) closely monitors and regulates toys made in or imported into the United States. The CPSC has a toll free number: 1-800-638-2772 ext. 650 or website: www.cpsc.gov/ where you can check for toy recalls or report an unsafe item.

Buying steps for safe purchases:

Step One:

Buy age appropriate toys. We seem to think that buying toys that are meant for older children indicates somehow that we think the child is already smarter than their

age group or "will grow in to it". Toys are graded for not only safety but to prevent frustration.

Step Two:

Read the warning and safety precautions accompanying the toy. Toys for small children may be inappropriate due to small pieces which could be a chocking hazard. Some toys may be fire hazards, especially if there are open fires or radiator heaters. Fabric items should be labeled non-flammable or flame resistant... Evaluate toys for sharp edges. Art supplies should be labeled non toxic. Crayons and paints should say ASTM D-4236 on the package which means they have been evaluated by the American Society for Testing and Materials. Be aware that "fake food" could also present problems for children who might mistake it for real.

Step Three:

Avoid buying anything that has excess string, or cords. Be aware that BB guns or toys that shoot or send off small pieces, fireworks, sharp scissors, and even un-inflated balloons can be a danger.

THE WAYS OF THE KINGDOM

I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. (John 14:6)

The prophets spoke the truth: The Messiah would be born of a virgin. of the line of David, in Bethlehem, with no beauty nor majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him, a man of sorrows.

The people of Jesus' time argued their facts:

When Jesus preached in his hometown, the townspeople "Where did this man get this wisdom and these miraculous powers....Isn't this the carpenter's son? Isn't his mother's name Mary, and aren't his brothers James, Joseph, Simon and Judas? Aren't all his sisters with us?" (Matthew 13:54-57) In the certainity of their facts, they missed the truth. Jesus, Son of God and Son of Man, had grown up in their village and was offering them the opportunity to receive him as their Messiah.

After Jesus spoke at the Feast, some said "Surely this man is the Prophet," others, "He is the Christ." Then came their facts: "How can the Christ come from Galilee. Does not the Scriptures say that the Christ will come from David's family and from Bethlehem, the town where David lived." Jesus did come from Galilee at that time because he had moved there from Nazareth. BUT Jesus was born of the virgin Mary in Bethlehem, living there briefly with his parents.

has made to be facts, that we miss 7 spiritual truth. I read this week: There are facts and there are facts; but then there is truth.

When we gather around the baby in the manger, do we think about the truth that Jesus, now King of Kings, is coming again? Although Jesus never asked us to celebrate his birth, we have created a celebration of our own design. There was no star over the stable, no wise men there either and only one gift graced the birth place—God's gift of his only Son. In our zeal commemorate the birth of Jesus, the manger has become a "mecca" for the unbelieving world—a money-making, Santa-touting, excuse-for-a-party time of year.

Does the fulfillment of the prophetic truth of Jesus' first coming remind us of the truth of his second coming? We are told we live in a post-Christian era where Christianity is a crutch for those who can't face reality, and we must face new truth in our changing world.

Jesus said, "Watch out that no one deceives you....You will hear of wars and rumors of wars, but see to it that you are not alarmed. Such things must happen, for the end is still to come. Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are the beginning of birth pangs. (Matthew 24:4-8)

PRAYER

What Opportunities Do You Have To Pray?

There are always opportunities to pray, but sometimes they are missed in the busyness of life - even in the good things.

What do you think of when you read about an opportunity to pray? When we think of prayer, many of us think of it as needing to be done in the way we were taught. Most of us were taught that we "should" have a quiet time to start our day, so when we think of praying that is when we pray; and if we don't pray then the opportunity in our day is lost. We also think of it as "quiet time" so we naturally expect quiet and probably also make it reverent and just naturally close our eyes. When our pastor leads us in prayer during worship, we may consider that an opportunity to pray. Those who receive requests on the prayer chain probably think of it as an opportunity to pray each time a request is received.

for prayer we have at church:

Sacred Hour, Mondays from 10 to 11 a.m. in the Sanctuary -- a time for silent prayer;

Men's Prayer Group, Wednesdays at 7 a.m. in the Chapel;

Prayer Group on Wednesdays at 4 p.m. in the Parlor -a time to pray with others;

Sunday in the Sanctuary when you arrive for the worship service (especially after the bells chime);

At the prayer rail or in your pew after you have received Communion;

At the prayer rail or in your pew at the end of the worship service;

At the end of the worship service someone is available to pray with you at the left end of the prayer rail (open hands with palms up indicates this desire);

In the Chapel anytime (unless it's being used).

Now that I've mentioned some of the opportunities to pray at our church, I'll bet you've thought of more. If you can think of prayer in other settings and postures than those mentioned above, the opportunities are endless. You can pray as you walk, as you gaze at God's beautiful creation, or when you see someone you think needs prayer or a blessing. Anything, anytime, and anywhere gives us an opportunity, a reason, a motivation to pray.

Remember our loving God is ever more ready to listen than we are to pray and does not care what form our prayer takes or if it has a form at all.


\$1,755.80 to help mend hurting **11** hearts. For the Florida United Methodist Children's Home, let me sav "Thank You."


ALTAR CLOTH COLORS

What do the colors mean?

"The Christian year contains two cycles: the Christmas Cycle (Advent -Christmas-Epiphany) and the Easter Cycle (Lent-Easter-Pentecost). Within each cycle are a preparatory season symbolized by the color purple and a festival season symbolized by the color white. After each cycle there is an ordinary time of growth symbolized by the color green. Thus, there is a sequence of seasons using purple, white, and green in that order twice each year."

(*United Methodist Book of Worship*, Copyright © 1992 The United Methodist Publishing House, page 226)

- Purple, traditionally represents both royalty and penitence, is used during Advent and Lent.
- •Blue symbolizes hope and may also be used during Advent.
- •White and gold are used at Christmas and Easter to symbolize joy and festivities.
- •Red symbolizes the color of fire to represent the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost and times when the work of the Holy Spirit is emphasized. During Holy Week it represents the blood of Christ. Red is also used for ordinations, church anniversaries and civil observances such as Memorial Day and Thanksgiving.
- Green represents growth and is used during Ordinary Time (the season after Epiphany and the season after Pentecost.)

Yes, we need your help in our recording of two of the five Vital Signs of a Healthy Congregation. The two areas we need are Intentional Discipleship and Salty Service. Here is how you can help.

Intentional Discipleship: If you lead a small group of any type – Sunday School class, bible study, prayer group – any small group of any type of discipleship, please contact Kay in our office by phone or email, and inform her of the number of persons attending your group session, on a weekly basis. We need to record all the numbers of persons attending any small group session.

Salty Service: We are required to record the number of PERSONS who are involved in any community ministry or outreach of any type. We are not recording the number of hours invested, just the number of persons investing their personal time in community service of any type. So, if you serve for at least one hour, in a single event, turn in one Salty Service card. If you have served in more than one service or ministry during a week, turn in a card for each event. Again, we are measuring the number of persons involved in community service events each week. There will be "Salty Service" cards located in the pews to use for this recording. Simply remove the needed number of cards, and place them into the offering plates. Thank you so much for your help in this area. The measuring of these areas of ministry are critical for our church.

Greetings Dear Friends!

update, we'll be in Florida or on our way north to visit Laura's family. We pray your Thanksgiving holiday was filled with His blessings and time with family and friends! We now look forward to the true blessing and miracle of Christmas – remembering the real "reason for the season"!

After waiting a month, Kevin received a call from a local government office with project ideas through our organization. This office handles social services for the region, so we are very excited that they called back and are more than interested in our help. They aid 340 children of extreme poverty, 90 handicapped children under the age of 18, and 380 elderly people that live alone; some of these have no living relatives or family that live in other parts of Russia. When this agency learned we are a 501C3 organization, they about jumped out of their seats! There are thousands of dollars in grant money available in Russia; however, as a government agency they can't access those funds. We will partner with the agency as they help us apply for grants so we can better help this group of people! Having control of the funds will better insure that they go where there are 'true' needs.

There has also been a project 'in the works' for a school in the next village. The entire student body only numbers about 40 students but they have a chemistry 'lab' that is in dire need of a ventilation system and a safe cabinet in which to store their chemicals. Our pastor's wife began

such a project. The school's budget is By the time you read this minimal at best and their idea of a great donation was \$100 from a local farmer. This is actually an exciting opportunity for us as we would never have seen nor known of the needs of this school had Tanya not begun teaching there. Of course we're hoping for an opportunity to build a relationship with the school's



director and perhaps even some of the teachers well. We ask that you remember the pastor's wife....so

that she would be a Godly example to those around her. That there will be chances to show His love not only to her students but the parents as well!

Little Aleena (she's five) has always been a joy and we've been close to her and her mother for quite some time. Over the past two months that relationship has changed in a dramatic way because of a very trying time in her mom's life. Sveta is a young single mom whose husband was killed by her brother several years ago. She has worked off and on over the years but mostly lives on a pension she receives for her daughter. Like most young girls, she wants a family - a husband to care for her. Not getting into details, Sveta fell into a very deep depression a few months ago and considered suicide. We've been slowly working through the problems and seeking His will and as well as reading through the Word for strength. So teaching this year at the school and where does our little 'joy' come in? immediately thought of us to help with Aleena has become quite bold in

sharing her love for the Lord! Not only has she been a huge encouragement for her mom, but also for her grandparents as well!! (They both are alcoholics but

Aleena sees past their with faults child-like eyes.) She has quite openly asked both them where they will be spending



eternity. (How often we adults seem to think we should wait for the perfect time??!!) As we prepare to leave, we see anxiety building in their eyes – so please keep them both in prayer. Our fellowship will and has stepped in but counseling is often a long process and requires not only time but lots of patience. This little family has become what Paul says in 1Thes. 2:20 "Indeed, you are our glory and joy." We place it ALL in His hands!

While we are in the states, please remember our partners that we work with. We are so blessed to have such great people working with us in the middle of Siberia! If you have followed our blog you will remember the picture of us together at a local

café. They will be doing all the 21 projects as well as all the teaching in small groups. There is also the Sunday program while we are One of the families is the Agnor's. Doug is from the US, he grew up in Oregon; his wife Margarita is Russian. They have five children, four are still at home. The other family is a national; his name is Valeri and his wife is Tanya. They have three daughters with one still living at home. Please lift them up in prayer – so that they would continue to seek Him in all they do as they work together in this village. The winters can be very long and VERY COLD. By mid Dec. the temperatures will probably be around – 35 C...with the really cold weather coming!

As we close this update and for the year 2012, I (Laura) try to see what is the one thing that ties all of these stories and projects and trips across the globe together.... Of course there is only ONE golden strand that binds all things in pure joy and LOVE....Jesus! The ONE who left his glorious place in heaven, to be born a man, and then died for us ALL on a cross so that we might LIVE!!
