IN YOUR FACE

Ash Wednesday is a kind of "in your face" worship service. It comes right out and says you are a sinner! It doesn't soft soap it or pussy foot around it. The message is very clear whether we want to hear it or not – we have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23). As the communion service says, we have "not loved you (God) with our whole heart, not done your will, not loved our neighbors and have not heard the cry of the needy." We are greedy, we put ourselves first for everything, and we don't really trust God, turning instead to gods of our own making.

When Jesus was led into the wilderness, the devil tempted him to believe he had all the answers--that he could feed the people, rule the world and command even the angels. Of course, it is easy to be tempted; the question is how do you respond?

We are tempted to believe that we are not really sinners--we have not murdered anyone or stolen lots of money. We are not Burnie Madoff or Pol Pot or even the balloon boy's father and mother. If we made a MISTAKE, it was a little one, not worthy of attention from others or ourselves or God.

Ash Wednesday with all its doom and gloom is at the same time a day we can celebrate. For although we are sinners, as the tradition so pointedly reminds us, we are also reminded that we are forgiven sinners. If we are willing to turn and repent, if we are willing to call on the name of Jesus, then we can know the assurance of our salvation and our release from the sins that dominate our lives.

Michelangelo's painting in the Sistine Chapel in Italy has the picture of God reaching out, stretching out, and extending himself as far as he can toward Adam. Adam, on the other hand, has both his elbow and his wrist bent. All Adam has to do to be in touch with God again is to straighten out his arm and, by his choice, he can bridge the gap between man and God. God has done all the work; all we have to do is decide to accept what God has already made possible.

Ash Wednesday is a day for confession but also a day to lift our hands and hearts in praise and thanksgiving that God demonstrated his love for us in this: "While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Rom. 5:8)) We do that partly by an anointing of our foreheads

with ashes to symbolize our sorrow for what we have done and what we have failed to do. This is one way for us to witness to the world that in spite of our failures our God never fails. He is always extending his grace and forgiveness to us.

Our Ash Wednesday service will be on Wednesday, Feb 17, at noon in the sanctuary. Come and share this service of awareness and forgiveness.

WORSHIP & LENT

I hope many of you have begun to "Study and meditate on God's Word in preparation for next week's worship," and that those of you who have not will begin this practice soon. For many of you, this is an addition to your regular Bible study or devotional time. I'm not suggesting you give up something that works for you, but I think you will find this addition of weekly Scripture reading and study in preparation for Sunday worship a vital part of your Spiritual Journey. Remember—our individual preparation for worship affects the worship of the whole congregation.

Ash Wednesday is February 17, so you may be thinking about what you will do during Lent. Rather than giving up something, why not consider taking up something new this year - something like a new spiritual discipline? In the Narthex and on the Spiritual Formation bulletin board, you can pick up a list of spiritual disciplines that includes a description of each. Lent is a great time to get acquainted with a new spiritual discipline. Trying an unfamiliar spiritual exercise is no more difficult than giving up something for Lent. Then, of course, giving up something could be considered fasting which is a spiritual discipline. **Silence** is a really good one to try practicing during Lent. It will give you the guiet you need in order to listen for the "still small voice" which will guide you through the days leading toward Easter. Prayer is another good one for Lent for the same reason. You probably already pray, but being intentional and consistent in prayer is something many of us struggle to do. Being consistent and intentional in prayer throughout Lent could begin a really important new habit! Actually, any spiritual discipline is appropriate for Lent. I would love to help you get started, so please let me know if you want to talk about a spiritual exercise you may be considering for the Lenten period.

Again this year we will have the prayer labyrinth available in the fellowship hall on Good Friday and Holy Saturday. Many of you told us how meaningful the experience was for you last year. We were thrilled to have such a wonderful response from our church and from the community.



The Disciple Looks at the Work of Believing



Believing shouldn't be work - should it? We eat our breakfast cereal, believing it won't poison or make us sick. That's easy!

We see a chair and sit down, believing it will hold us. What's hard about that? We go to visit a friend, believing we will be welcome. That's not work either.

A group following Jesus asked him, "What must we do to do the works God requires?" Jesus answered, "The work of God is this: to believe in the one he has sent."

(John 6:28-39)

So Jesus pointed out that believing in who he was, that he was fully God and fully man, sent from the Father as his exact representative, was then and is today a work of faith.

Remember the shepherds in the field who heard the angels' song? They heard the heavenly message and then they made a decision to believe what they had heard. The work of believing began as they left their flocks, saying, "Let's go to _____ and see this thing that has happened, which the _____ has told us about."

(Luke 2:15)

The scripture tells us that they hurried off and found Mary, Joseph and the baby. Later, when the shepherds returned to their flocks, they were glorifying and praising God for all the things they had seen and heard, "which were just as they had been _____."

(Luke 2:20)

In the Scriptures, the Lord calls us many times to step out of our normal routine, make an effort to seek him in a new way, and then, if we do, we will, like the shepherds, eventually find ourselves glorifying and praising God for the things we discover that are just as his word said they would be.

What about the wise men? They saw a different star in the sky and believed it heralded the birth of a new King of the Jews. Think about the work of believing for them. First, they were Gentiles - what moved their hearts to seek this newborn King of the Jews? Then it took them a two-years' journey, far from their familiar comfort zone. Think of the planning and provisions they needed to make and how far they would travel as they exercised the "work" of believing - somewhere out there was the one God had sent. In God's time, the star led them to a house where they found Mary and the child Jesus. These wise men who made the effort to seek, bowed down and wor-

shiped the Christ. They had found him - just as they had believed.

| In Matthew 13:53-58, we read of Jesus returning to his hometown of Nazareth after he had been teaching and healing in nearby areas. In Nazareth, "he began teaching the people in their, and they were 'Where did this man get this and these miraculous powers?' they asked. 'Isn't this the 's son? Isn't his mother's name Mary, and aren't his brothers James, Joseph, Simon and Judas? Aren't all his with us? Where did this man get all these things?' And they took offense at him." Jesus said to them, "Only in his home town and in his own house is a prophet without honor." The passage ends with this: "And he did not do many miracles there because of their of faith." |

THINK ABOUT IT: (from thoughts of Joseph Prince, Author of *Destined to Reign*)

- "Jesus knew no sin, did no sin and in Him was no sin. But at the cross, He received our sin and became sin for us." Do you believe Jesus took <u>all</u> your sins - past, present, future - into himself on the cross? Why is this a "work" of believing? How does it (or does it) affect your life?
- "We, who were sinners, knew no righteousness, did no righteousness and in us was no righteousness. But at the cross, we received His righteousness," becoming the righteousness of God in Christ Jesus. Do you believe you are righteous before God in Christ Jesus? Why does this require the "work" of believing? Does your believing fluctuate with your mood? Your behavior?
- The divine exchange: "He (Jesus) did not deserve to made sin, but He was made sin in our place. We did not deserve to be made righteous, but we were made righteous because we received His righteousness." Have you practiced this "work" of believing until it is a reality in your life?

God made Him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God.
(2 Corinthians 5:21)

TAKE TIME TO READ! Following is a review of books for your reading enjoyment:

- 1. "Wagered Heart" by Robin Lee Hatcher, a novel about Bethany Silverton who moved from the genteel world in Philadelphia to the raw frontier town of Sweetwater, Montana. As a conservative preacher's daughter, she can't resist the challenge of charming the most attractive cowboy in town into attending her father's church, only to find that he has charmed her also. Bethany's quiet life is thrown into turmoil when ruthlessly ambitious Vince Richards thinks Bethany would make a perfect wife as well as a help in his ambition to become governor, and he is determined to get what he wants at any cost.
- 2. "Women of the Bible" by Ann Spangler, a one-year devotional study of women in scripture. It focuses on the lives of 52 prominent and not-so-prominent women to help you approach the story of salvation with fresh eyes. The cast of characters is long and colorful, including women, young and old, married and single. Even though our culture is different from theirs, we share many of the same emotional responses and struggles; women today are still agonizing over infertility, worrying about children, longing for real affection and struggling to find faith in times of darkness.
- 3. "The Virtues of Aging" by Jimmy Carter. Many ask, "What are the virtues? What could be good about growing old?" First, consider the alternative to aging! Virtues of aging include both the blessings that come to us as we grow older and what we have to offer that might be beneficial to others. It's better to be 70 years young than 40 years old. This book offers good ideas and insights.
- 4. "The Reason for God, Belief in an Age of Skepticism" by Timothy Keller. Even ardent believers have questions and doubts. Keller singlehandedly dismantles each of them. "Why does God allow suffering in the world? How could a loving God send people to Hell? How can one religion be 'right' and the others 'wrong'? Why have so many wars been fought in the name of God?" He presents an intelligent platform on which true believers can stand their ground when bombarded by the backlash to religion.
- "Best Loved Poems from the Salesian Collection" compiled by Sara Tarascio. The title says it all. The book contains beautifully illustrated and lovely poems that are a pleasure to read and enjoy.
- 6. "Ready to Wed" by Melody Carlson, a novel about Grace Chapel. When Belle Bannister, a real Georgia peach, checks into Grace Chapel Inn on a MISSION TO FIND A HUSBAND AMONG THE ELIGIBLE BACHELORS OF ACORN HILL, the Howard sisters teeter between disbelief and awe. Belle sets off to plan her wedding, trusting God to supply the groom, and teaches them all an unlikely lesson about faith.
- 7. "The Innocent Man" by John Grisham, another legal thriller that is every bit as suspenseful and fast-paced as Grisham's

- other stories. A man who could have been the next Mickey Mantle stumbles and his dreams are broken by drinking, drugs and women. On a winter night in 1982 a young cocktail waitress is murdered. The investigation has led nowhere until, on the flimsiest evidence, it led to Ron Williamson. The washed-up small-town hero was charged, tried and sentenced to death in a trial littered with lying witnesses and tainted evidence a trial that let a true killer go free. Impeccably researched and grippingly told, it is filled with 11th hour drama.
- 8. "Adam" by Ted Dekker. FBI behavioral psychologist Daniel Clark has been stalking a killer known only as "Eve" for the past 16 months. When he traps the elusive psychopath in a face-off, Daniel becomes the next casualty, but then he is resuscitated. After dying once, he's got nothing left to lose in his obsession to stop Eve--or so he thinks. A high-octane thriller that exposes clearly the battle between good and evil.
- 9. "River Rising" by Athol Dickson. Welcome to Pilotville, Louisiana 1927, an isolated outpost on the Mississippi River, a stilt village bounded by swampland, an island of brotherly love in a sea of racism. Rev. Hale Poser, a stranger with a bad hip, has come looking for his roots. He is a humble man, a righteous man, a miracle man. In the swamp behind the tupelo and cypress lurks a lingering, sleeping evil. When the reverend silently slides ashore, it will sleep no longer. It will rain, rise up like a river and nothing but a miracle can stop this awful flood.
- 10. "A Lady of Secret Devotion": by Tracie Peterson, part of the Ladies of Liberty series that includes "A Lady of High Regard". Eager to ease the financial burdens of her family, Cassandra Stone is thrilled when she is hired to be a companion to Mrs. Jameston, a wealthy society matron who treats her like a daughter. Cassie begins to harbor concerns for her employer's safety, and her own, when Mrs. Jameston's son, Sebastian, exhibits resentment and cruelty toward his mother. When an insurance company suspects Sebastian of fraud, the company enlists Cassie's help, and the situation is quickly complicated by matters of the heart.

Lent is an introspective period during which we take stock of our lives and relationships.

In this period of quietness and reflection, give yourself a treat and savor the literary fruits of some Christian writers. In the library you will find authors who share deeper understandings of old truths and others who write Christian fiction to bring you reflective and joy-filled moments.

ANGELS AMONG US: The Bible is full of stories about angels. Some angels bring messages revealing God's purposes, others provide strength and courage, and yet others simply praise and worship God. From the majesty of the angels in Jacob's ladder to the protection of Elijah's guardian angel, this beautifully illustrated Bible story picture book celebrates the mystery of these heavenly beings as they appear to people on earth.

IN THE BEGINNING: 50 Devotions for Teens on Genesis.

You know the Creation story. You've studied Noah and the Ark, Abraham and Sarah, and Joseph and his brothers. But do you REALLY know these great stories of our faith? The author takes you on a journey through Genesis where you'll meet some familiar and some not-so-familiar characters. Then she challenges you to find your place in God's story and to cling to God's promises.

LOOKING FOR ENOUGH IN A CULTURE OF MORE: The author uses brief, thoughtful chapters to explore "The Good Book," "The Good Life," "The Good Work," "The Good Society" and "The Good Earth." The book's probing essays make the life of enough seem not only possible but a natural for Christians.

MY TUMMY TALKED IN CHURCH TODAY: And 51 Other Humorous Poems and Devotions for Adults Who Love Children. This collection of poems, Scriptures, reflections and prayers will bring joy and understanding to children and adults. Read these with the children in your life as you share, laugh and celebrate faith together.

GOD TRUSTED A WOMAN: Leadership Lessons from the Life of Dr. Frances M. Alguire, First Laywoman to Lead the World Methodist Council. Born and reared on a dairy farm in central Michigan, Dr. Frances M. Alguire rose through Christian service to become the first laywoman elected president of the World Methodist Council, representing 77 million Methodists worldwide.

<u>WHERE MERCY FAILS</u>: Darfur's Struggle to Survive – This book documents one of the greatest humanitarian crises of our time now underway in Darfur, Sudan. Veteran journalists Chris Herlin-

ger of Church World Service and Paul Jeffrey, a United Methodist Missionary and senior correspondent for United Methodist Women's "Response" magazine, show the conflict is political, environmental and intimately personal.

WALKING THE CHOCTAW ROAD: Stories from Red People Memory – The eleven stories in this book explore the heart of what it means to be Choctaw. The author doesn't shy away from describing the painful and tragic history of the Choctaws in the United States, but through this hurt, he reveals the deep faith, abiding hope and spiritual underpinnings of his people. (LARGER THAN AVERAGE PRINT)

PRAYERS AND PONDERINGS: This book is a collection of work by residents of Brooks-Howell, a United Methodist Women -owned home for retired deaconesses and missionaries in Asheville, NC. During their tenures, these women and men served God on five continents as physicians, nurses, pharmacists, social workers, educators, ministers and as God's servants in a variety of other capacities. (LARGER THAN AVERAGE PRINT)

<u>PLAY WITH ME</u>: Two Friends on a Spiritual Journey with Kids – Longtime friends, the authors find joy in following the winding path of wonder and wildness, silliness and surrender forged by their children. They discover hanging out in the park, building snowmen, and dealing with dirty diapers and ear infections can connect women to God and each other in deeply spiritual ways.

THE UNDERTAKER'S WIFE: Wisdom and Musings; Life in a Small Town Funeral Home – No one will forget the people who pass through the home of "The Undertaker's Wife." With warmth and humor, this initially reluctant undertaker's wife chronicles her journey from farmer's daughter to obtaining an advanced theological degree and becoming an organist in the small-town funeral home she shares with her husband.

STILL MY GRANDMA: Camille and her grandma have a special friendship. They have sleepovers, bake cupcakes together, go out shopping and giggle at old photographs. But one day Grandma forgets Camille's name. Then she can't remember where to put her shoes. This story gently introduces young readers to the realities of Alzheimer's disease and reminds them that love is more powerful than any illness.

<u>A LITTLE PIECE OF GROUND</u>: Twelve-year-old Karim Aboudi is stuck in his Ramallah home during a strict curfew, longing to be outside playing soccer with his friends. When the curfew ends, he and his friend discover a perfect site for a soccer field, but in this city there's constant danger even for schoolchildren. When soldiers find Karim outside during the next curfew, it seems impossible that he will survive. The author creates a fascinating metaphor for the Israeli occupation of Palestine allowing young and old to witness it through the salvaged play of Palestinian youth. (LARGER THAN AVERAGE PRINT)

THE OTHER GAME: Lessons from How Life is Played in Mexican Villages – A Bonus Book – Readers learn about democracy, economic well-being, the environment, and cultural and spiritual values from Mexican campesinos (farmers), while visiting villages that have existed for thousands of years. Villagers' way of life, work and families reveal alternatives for creating a sustainable future for all on the planet.

THE ROAD OF LOST INNOCENCE: The True Story of a Cambodian Heroine – The author's life story illustrates triumph over unthinkable adversity. The book recounts her childhood experience of being sold into sexual slavery and shuttled around Southeast Asia for a decade. This is also the story of an awakened activist and her brave fight against powerful forces stealing the lives of children around the world. NOTE: This book contains strong language and content.



Sitting here gazing out of the window at my now frozen and burned yard, hearing the furnace kick on, and contemplating the temperature vacillating from the 40s to low 20s and a predicted 15 degrees for Monday, I quickly realize that winter is here – brrrr. Then my thoughts quickly go to those hurting from the cold and to those helping others who are victims of this cold. Are you one of them?

I cringe at the thought of having to live outside, and yet there are many right here in our immediate vicinity and community who do. Not only are they homeless, but also hungry. In this morning's news, I read of persons in a car driving by a homeless group of men and women in St. Pete and throwing acid bombs out of the window onto these people -- man's inhumanity to man.

We in Serendipity are trying to help. Each month we have a pancake breakfast for the public. Our men routinely contribute cash and supplies. All monies go to those in need. We want to increase our contributions, and we want to more adequately support those among us who give beyond what we can imagine.

Such persons include Jerry Tanner and his wife Janet, both long-time FUMC members. They work as a team and give specific direction and needs information to us in Serendipity. On virtually a full-time basis, they support and help fill the needs of those "on the streets." They distribute food and supplies. They transport people to shelters. They talk with them and care for them, one on one -- "Angels of Mercy to the Needy." When you see Jerry or Janet, thank them for what they do. They are doing our Lord's will by feeding the hungry and so much more. God bless them.

Men and friends of FUMC: Our Serendipity group has grown from five men with a vision to 25 and growing. As we take on additional needed projects, we need more men to join us. As we study and discuss the Bible as it relates to our present world and contemporary living, good things happen.

- Hair shampoo and conditioner, soap, and other toiletry items can be used also. (Partial opened bottles are accepted. How many of us have bought a product and then discovered that it "just didn't work for us" and either threw it out or put it on a shelf, never to see the light of day again?)

SOME OF OUR OUTREACH MINISTRIES

World-wide: As a church we contribute about \$80,000 a year to missions on nearly every continent.

<u>Closer to Home</u>: We support a number of important ministries in our State. One of the most significant is The United Methodist Children's Home & Habitat For Humanity.

<u>Thrift Shop</u>: This valuable service provides clothing and household goods at very low costs to the community. Used computers, golf equipment, luggage, and various other items are also offered periodically.

<u>Food Pantry & Holiday Food Baskets</u>: We collect food, and have distributed 1022 bags of groceries and 100 Holiday Gift Baskets in 2009 to local families. The need keeps growing: 801 bags in 2008, 624 bags in 2007, 495 bags in 2006, and 492 bags in 2005.

SHARE: This food-buying cooperative offers top quality meats, fish, fowl, staples, and produce, at bargain prices to all who wish to participate in the monthly program.



We did not make our goal this past year, but hopefully we will make it in the New Year 2010. We will begin this year with a Fifth Sunday Offering on January 31st and won't have another 5th Sunday until May 30th. Of course, we are always glad to have contributions anytime during the year.

This is a wonderful ministry of helping children who truly need our aid. Some of the children and youth who come into the care of the Children's Home feel neglected, abandoned, rejected or have serious family conflicts and discord in their lives. The treatment programs at the Children's Home are engaged in the restoration of broken bonds and broken relationships, believing that such restoration opens the path to good mental health.

Mental health is enhanced through a personal relationship with God. Recent brain-scan research has demonstrated that the religious impulse is rooted in the biology of the brain. Their connection to God is especially important as they learn to know and trust the One who will never leave or desert them regardless of what life situations come their way.

February is American Heart Month



February is traditionally Valentine month. What is the symbol of Valentine cards? Mostly, it is a picture of the heart. February is also heart month. All my literature focuses on diet, exercise, stress relief, and medication. My new Harvard Heart Letter has 10 small steps to get you on the road to better health in 2010.

- 1. Take a 10-minute walk every day.
- 2. Give yourself a lift. Lifting a hardcover book or a 2 pound weight a few times a day can help tone your arm muscles.
- 3. Eat one extra fruit or vegetable a day. They are good for everything from your brain to your bowels.
- 4. Make breakfast count. Start the day with some fruit and a serving of whole grains like oatmeal, bran flakes, or whole wheat toast.
- 5. Stop drinking your calories. Cutting out just one sugarsweetened soda or latte can easily save you 100 calories a day, or a 10 pound weight loss in one year.
- 6. Have a handful of nuts. Walnuts, almonds, peanuts, and other nuts are good for your heart.
- 7. Sample the fruit of the sea. Eat fish or other sea food one time a week instead of red meat. It's good for the heart, brain and waistline.
- 8. Breathe deeply. Try this for a few minutes each day. It can help you relax and also help to lower blood pressure.
- 9. Wash your hands often. The flu, pneumonia and other infections can be very hard on the heart
- 10. Count your blessings. Take a moment each day to acknowledge your blessings in in your life. Gratitude is a very positive emotion and has been linked with better health, longer life and greater well-being.

Aristotle said, "We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, therefore, is not an act, but a habit."

Small steps are one way to get into the habit of excellent health. (Harvard Health Letter)

News from the Wooster's

We were so blessed to have both our boys here in Siberia over their Christmas breaks this year. [We had forgotten how much food, juice and milk two students can chow down.]

Although the temperatures were **way** below normal for this time of year, -45 to -53 F., they managed to snowboard and ice skate with old friends and were able to spend time on Baikal.

Our time was not without work...to the right is a fence Corey designed in the Village.



Lake Baikal: We've been many places over the past 13+ years; Lake Baikal is by far one of our top five fa-

vorites. Along with our co-workers, we spent four days camping, yes camping, near the shores of the lake. As crazy as this may sound, we did stay in winterized "yurts" or round tents. (Very warm and very cozy.) The snow was up to three feet deep and the lake was spectacular. It was in the process of freezing and there are



no words to describe how that occurs. What an amazing sight!

New Year and Christmas in Horinsk: New Years is a HUGE celebration, unfortunately it is usually one in which everyone gets drunk. This year we decided to have a major celebration with our fellowship in the village in an environment where there would be NO alcohol. We started making all the food in the afternoon, then about 7 pm we all got together and continued preparing the meal we would share later. The custom here is to sit down and eat at midnight....so we placed all the food on the table and had a MAJOR feast with all kinds of salads, fruit, and meat dishes. Of course no Russian feast would be complete without candies and sweets of all kinds. With over 40 people present, we began the New Year celebration around 11pm with a time of sharing what the Lord had done in our lives in 2009. Around 11:45, we ate a little "snack"...prayed in the New Year, watched fireworks, then around 12:30 sat down to eat our "feast"! We played games till about 4:00 am in the morning and then started taking everyone home. By 5:00 am we were all snuggled in bed. (Side note: There



was one family that did not come; they stayed home because they have a 4 month old baby. It was the first time in many years that the husband had not been drunk. He had stopped drinking when he started his new life with the Lord. Oh the power of prayer!)

A second Christmas: The Russian Orthodox Church follows the Julian calendar for its holidays and special services. For

this reason, we have the blessing of celebrating the "reason for the season" twice. On Jan. 7th we were able to attend services in the city and on the 10th celebrated with the folks in the village and were joined by some members of the worship team from Ulan Ude. Christmas "carols" are a relatively new thing

here, however, each year we hear of yet another beautiful hymn or carol that has been translated as we worship the newborn king.

Please join us in prayer for the young families in the village. There is so much pressure to drink and so much dishonesty



along with a high crime rate in the region...we have two young families and many young single mothers who are desperately trying to change their lives. Remember them often.

We also continue to remember Ivan as he works through his recovery. He presses on and looks better every time we time we visit.

Lastly, we ask for His provisions in our monthly needs. We are not in a desperate situation but are low and trust He will provide as always in His ways and timing.


