

### "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he/she is a new creation: The old has gone, the new has come!" 2 Corinthians 5:17

By Pastor Kip When I first saw it, I was immediately taken back by its obvious majesty. You could

just see how beautiful it was, even in its current condition. It was big; probably five feet wide and almost four feet tall. It had little drawers on the top of it. And larger drawers on its two sides. The wood was very rustic, rough, dried out and faded. It was most impressive.

It wasn't in the large room with all the other items. No, not this item. It was in a back room, sitting on a four wheeled dolly. The auctioneer promised that all of its pieces were there, even though they were not all in place. In fact some of the pieces lying under it were not real easy to identify as actually belonging to the original piece.

The moment I saw it sitting on the dolly, pushed to the back of this large room, I was greatly intrigued and knew in a heartbeat that it needed a good home; like ours. I asked the auctioneer if it was for sale, seeing that it was not with the rest of the items. You could tell he was at first surprised by my question, and then relieved that someone was finally showing an interest in it. He said it was for sale. I asked what he was asking. He sheepishly said; "Well, I'd need to get forty dollars for it." I was ready right then. Are you kidding me, only forty bucks for this beauty!

It turned out that not everyone was as excited about this as I was. And after closer examination it was determined that since we did not have a means of getting it home, and forty dollars for "firewood" was pretty expensive firewood – we left without it. It was not easy to do.

But alas, we stopped back by the auction house about five weeks later and I asked about it. The auctioneer said he still had it. This time it was in the larger room with all the other items that were to be auctioned off that coming Saturday night.

It was still just as majestic. It was still just as wonderful. It was no longer on a dolly. It had been dropped to the floor. And all the loose pieces seemed to still be either on it or at least near it. I asked the auctioneer if it was for sale, in that it was obviously going to be auctioned in a few days. He said it was. I asked what he would have to have for it. He said; "Well, I'd have to get twenty bucks for it." Are you kidding? The price dropped by half since the first time I had seen it. "O.M.G!" (just for you techie people – for you non-techie people – "Oh My Gosh!!)

I whipped out a twenty and the deal was done! When the other party came in to see what was taking me so long, I proudly announced; "Good News! He still has it! And it's ours! And it was only twenty **3** dollars!" The reply? "That's still a lot for pieces of fire wood!" As luck would have it, we just happened to have driven the truck and had plenty of room to bring it home. Oh happy day! (O.H.D.)

Today it sets proudly in our garage. I have not had the time to begin restoring it. I have only had the chance to make sure all the pieces were really there, and fit together. Good news! There were and they do!

So, what is "it"? A wonderfully old roll top desk. It is complete

with little drawers across the top under the roll top. It needs a ton of work.

And the beauty which it holds deep within it is just waiting to be released!

It is a creation which is just waiting to have its soul enliven with new life. There is indeed a glorious, majestic desk within the old dried out wooded pieces.



There is something new hiding within the old.

That's how we are. Before Jesus in our lives, we are nothing but dried pieces of life needing assistance (the dolly) to move through life. If all of our "pieces" are with us, we need divine help bringing them into relationship with each other so we may function as a whole unit. We need his divine love to keep us together.

As we move through life without Jesus in our hearts, we often feel as if our value is dropping (forty dollars to twenty dollars). And yet in the eyes of God our value is insanely astronomical. Yet when we look at ourselves in the mirror we may only see the dried out pieces of what should be a complete and divinely whole person.

That's what 2 Corinthians 5:17 is all about. For those who have Jesus, their lives are never the same. The old dried out pieces are gone and the new wonderful wholeness of God fills our souls. When we look into the mirror, we may still see only a rough exterior, but deep within our hearts, there beats a love so rich and wonderful that it can only be of God! So to all you "old roll top desk" out there, take heart, if Jesus is in you, your life is so much better than you may possibly ever believe. Praise God for that! And yes, that desk is in our garage just waiting to be made like new. God Bless you all... it is an honor to serve God in His Homosassa church with all of you! Pastor Kip



# **Planning for the Future**

### Psalm 90:12 "Teach us to number our days alright, that we may gain a heart of wisdom."

Most of us, regardless of our age, have been involved in caring for our loved ones as they have aged. We have either been directly involved in their care or in planning for it. Well, guess what; it is our turn to recognize the reality that aging is a time of transition. The time is now to "number our days" and start to think ahead to the financial, medical, and family issues we are facing as we age.

We have heard over and over about the need for Wills, Health Care Surrogates, Power of Attorneys, and Advance Directives; but what else do we need to consider?

It is inevitable that issues of independence will arise and to ensure that we have the highest quality of life for as long as possible, it is important to discuss topics of aging with our spouses, families, and medical and financial experts.

Couples need to know that eventually one partner will become the caretaker for the other and no one can predict who that will be. Now is the time to have the "what if" conversation with you partner and "cross-train your tasks". There

will also come a time when you 7 are no longer able to care for your partner or yourself.

Family and friends may no longer to be able to provide the level of care you need, nor is it fair to ask them. Reaching out for help is not a sign of weakness, but a sign of strength. While you are able, explore alternate living arrangements and your ability to pay for them.

None of us really wants to think of ourselves as "getting old", but by having a plan you can help yourself to maintain the lifestyle you or they want.

### <u>Flu and Pneumonia Vaccine</u> Clinic - October 13th

During this monthly pancake breakfast our Parish Nurse will also be doing a Blood Pressure Clinic. Immunizations will be covered by Medicare. Several insurances will also be covered: Humana, BC & BS, United Health Care, Cigna.

Insurance forms will be available at the front office prior to the clinic. Please fill out the forms in advance and bring them plus a copy of your health insurance information to the clinic. If you need to pay for the immunizations costs are: Flu: \$25.99 and Pneumonia \$79.99.

There will also be a sign of sheet to see if we have enough interest in having a clinic for the Shingles vaccine. Flu and Pneumonia vaccines can be given the same day, but in different arms. It is recommended to wait 28 days after receiving these vaccines to get the Shingles Vaccine.



THE WAYS OF THE KINGDOM by Jan Wise

For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. Psalm 139: 13-14

A quote from Judy Garland reminds me of the unique way God designed each of us—he planned for us from before the foundation of the world and individually formed us in our mother's womb. Judy said, "Always be a first-rate version of yourself, instead of a second-rate version of somebody else."

In our desire to belong, we often pattern our words, our actions and even our thoughts after some group's "in-behavior." The longer we do that, the more we lose track of the person we were designed to be as we become "like them." We fit in, but what have we lost of the God-given uniqueness meant to bring him glory?

Our kids often complained when their request received a parental "no," arguing that "everybody else was doing it." Their father explained, "You don't follow the style; you set it." They grew up believing that being unique was a good thing, although they didn't always like adhering to a standard different from their peers.

We find the "copycat" in the churches, too. The way we dress, the books we read, the standards we set, and even the language we speak testify to our belonging to the Christian fold.

One missionary warned, "You can't speak "Christianese" in the secular world. Our 'inside language' causes them to feel more separated from the church than ever."

The Bible does teach a certain "alikeness" that brings glory to God. As his children, he wants us to have a family resemblance. We are encouraged to listen to his Son Jesus as he invites, "Follow me." The apostle Paul speaks of a type of following that is Biblical, admonishing those who knew him: "Follow my example, as I follow the example of Christ." (1 Corinthians 11:1)

God delights in uniqueness. He gives us all different gifts and doesn't expect us to copy one another's giftedness. He created different personalities with different ways of expression. He made different sizes, shapes and colors of people, distributing us all over the world in different settings. God celebrates our uniqueness as he, in and through Jesus Christ, molds us together to form a Spirit-blended unity called the church.

You are his unique creation, designed for his unique purpose. How much of the uniqueness of his design have you lost in the pressures of societal acceptance?

I heard a saying that went something like this: "God created us all to be unique individuals; it's sad that so many die copycats." God wants to draw out our uniqueness, temper it to his purpose and use our individual selves to show the world what our God is like. Do we dare to be God's kind of different?

Father, help us each to be the "original" you designed us to be. Amen.


They have both been very active in FUMC since they started attending in 2008.


Nelson retired from sales last year, and he has been actively involved with Serendipity since. They have lived in FL for 3.5 years.

Let us explain...it was an organizational conference for the Asian region and we felt that Germany was a bit far to travel for a conference. More than that, how would that appear to the folks we've come to work with? Most people around us live on 200/month or less. However, after lots of prayer, we made the decision to go and what a blessing to see how the Father provided for the trip. It was wonderful spending time with fellow workers from across Asia; sharing prayers, stories, strategies, laughter, and tears. We want to share a story about the facility where our conference was held. More than 25 years ago, many groups of German Christians left Russia and the 'satellite' countries to return to their home country - Germany. Over time, the need for the center was done and the relocated churches felt this property still had a purpose. Fast forward.... this center is now used for church reunions, conferences, youth camps, etc. The word got out that a group that has been working in Russia over the last 17+ years was looking for a conference site. They immediately opened their doors and not only allowed us to use the facility (for free), they fed us four times a day and again charged us nothing! It was beyond words to meet these folks and be able to communicate in Russian as we gave thanks for His provisions!

Since we were already in Germany, we thought it would be a nice change to celebrate our anniversary and not work on the Lake doing camps or a project somewhere. Neither of us had ever been to Berlin, so we spent a few days there as well! What an amazing city. It hasn't been that long since it became unified a n d



west aren't always easy to recognize; that is unless you've lived in a former communist country where all the buildings had the same look. Germany has done an excellent job raising the standards and look of the former East side of Berlin. They've spent a ton of money to modernize the public transportation system and the results are you can travel anywhere in and around the city and out to other regions of the country with incredible ease! We were able to see what remains of the wall, a castle, a couple museums and a concentration camp not far from the city. The particular camp held 10,000 Russians as prisoners after the war. SO much history, so much August begins the tasks of bringing despair - but many found their strength in our gracious Father and survived!

we were off again...... Originally, we weren't going to help out with camps this year; however, we ended up helping out at a youth camp in July on Lake Baikal. There were 60+ kids in attendance and we were a few men continued to be discipled excited to have four of our youth attend as well. OK...you're thinking why did you work at the Lake again this year? Answer....in short, a team of folks from Florida came over to do sports, crafts and anything else that needed done for

an outreach youth camp. As 23 time got closer for their arrival,




# UMW SWEATER PROJECT NEEDS YOUR HELP!

When I mentioned there isn't a delete button on the computer that is our brain, that's something I know from experience - both that of others and personal experience. I found that since there was no delete button for the junk, some of the "stinking thinking" which existed in brain my needed to be reprogrammed. One of the most helpful tools was to write Scriptures which say who I am in Christ on 3 x 5 cards and put them where I would see and read them often and of course pray them. I suspect there must be someone who will read this who might need little а reprogramming otherwise the Holy Spirit wouldn't have prompted me to write this! 3. The <u>next finger</u> is the tallest finger. It reminds us of our leaders. Pray for the president, leaders in business and industry, and administrators. These people shape our nation and guide public opinion. They need God's guidance.

4. The <u>fourth finger</u> is our ring finger. Surprising to many is the fact that this is our weakest finger, as any piano teacher will testify It should remind us to pray for those who are weak, in trouble or in pain. They need your prayers day and night. You cannot pray too much for them.

5. And lastly comes our <u>little finger</u> the smallest finger of all which is where we should place ourselves in relation to God and others. As the Bible says, 'The least shall be the greatest among you.' Your pinkie should remind you to pray for yourself.

By the time you have prayed for the other four groups, your own needs will be put into proper perspective and you will be able to pray for yourself more effectively.
