to note people or families that are reflects the decline found in not in attendance. I try to make a mental note and check on them the following week. Often they are not there then either. On the other hand, some Sundays there are several new numbers.

Here is what I found. looked at the attendance for the first thirty-one weeks of this year. compared these numbers with the first thirty-one weeks of 2013. Obviously there were weeks when one year was higher than the other. This pattern bounced back and forth through the weeks. The totals are interesting. The total number of persons in worship (all three services) for the first thirty-one weeks of 2013 was 14,801, or an average weekly attendance of 477. The total number of persons in worship for the first thirty-one weeks in 2014 has been 14,766, a drop of 35. The average attendance to sign in for us. so far for 2014 has been 476.

It is disappointing that there is a too hard to think of thirty-five persons who no longer attend worship, creating the drop. good news that the percentage is amount is not the increase which we narthex. want to see happening.

Have you ever said to the Lord, "Just show me the way to go and I'll go"?

Isaiah told the Israelite people that one day the Lord would hear their cries for help and answer them. Isaiah said, "Although the Lord gives vou the bread of adversity and the water of affliction, your teachers will be hidden no more; with you own eyes you will see them. Whether you turn to the right or to the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you, saying, 'This is the way; walk in it." (Isaiah 30:20-21)


It's easier to have the Lord show us the way to go than to follow it. Recently, in our travels through Georgia, we used an atlas, a Google map and directions from a Smart phone. Our route was clearly mapped out.

The problem didn't concern the route, the name of the towns or the required turns. Questions arose as we traveled the rural roads between marked destinations. We asked, "Are we on the right road? We haven't seen a route sign in a long time—could we have made a wrong turn?" How relieved we were to discover a route number or a sign announcing the next village. Our doubts occurred between the clearly marked towns because there were no signs assuring us we were still on the right way.

Often in my Christian walk, I 15 have known the starting point for what God wanted me to do, and I've known how it was to be completed. But between the beginning and the end, came questions: "I wonder if it was really the Lord wanting me to do this" or "Have I missed the direction I should be going." The longer the time between, "This is the way to go," and reaching the goal, the more I questioned. Many times, I have begged, "Lord, show me a sign that I'm on the path where you want me to be." Sometimes, in his mercy, he sends a confirmation. But the more I have grown in faith, the longer I am expected to travel God's route just believing I am walking in his will.

As it is for us in our spiritual walk, so it is for Israel today. God's promise still holds for them in the midst of adversity and affliction. Their danger is the same as oursdoubting that God has a way planned for them. This results in efforts to work things out man's way.

Jesus said, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." (John 14:6) The starting point for anyone's spiritual journey, Israelite or Gentile, is the way opened for us through Jesus. As we pray for one another in our spiritual travels, let's also remember our Jewish friends. We can pray for them to discover God's way of faith that begins with a relationship to Jesus Christ.



Stephen Ministers: The After People

Frequently friends will ask, "I know you're involved in Stephen Ministry. Can you tell me exactly what a Stephen Minister is?" Stephen Ministers are the "After People."

Stephen Ministers are there:

- ... after you've washed and returned all the last casserole dish.
- ... after you arrive home following the funeral and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you.
 - ... after the relationship has ended but the wounds are still painful.
 - ... after the doctors have said, "there's nothing more we can do."
 - ... after the phone call you'd always hoped you'd never get.
- ... after the nursing home director shakes your hand and says "Welcome to your new home."
- ... after the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.
- ... after you find the pink slip inserted with what is now your final pay check.
- ... after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Stephen Ministers are the "After People". We are ready to come walk along side you—or your friends, neighbors, co-workers, or relatives—and provide comfort and support and confidentiality for as long 'after' as we are needed.

There are a number of medical studies that give evidence to the positive effects of laughter. Overall, laughter, or even a smile simply makes you feel good.

The Mayo Clinic in an article about Stress Management lists the benefits of laughter in shortterm and long-term effects. On the short-term lists is the fact that laughter stimulates a number of organs. It can increase your oxygen intake, stimulate your heart, lungs and muscles, and increase the amount of endorphins (the body's feel good chemical) released by the brain. It activates and relieves your response to stress by giving you a good overall relaxed feeling.

On the list of long-term effects, laughter can improve your immune system, assist your body by producing its own natural pain relievers, reduce blood sugar levels, improve mood, increase relaxation and sleep and the ability to "recharge".

How can you bring more humor and laughter into your life? Start with a smile; even if you have to practice in front of the mirror! I once had a nursing instructor who challenged her students to go directly to the mirror when they first out the classes.

send cards to members and friends who are hospitalized or those at home. Our goal is to let people know they matter to others, and that they are an important part of the body of Christ.



We're half way through the 2014 Hurricane 23 Season which is expected to feature below average activity according to recently updated outlooks by Colorado University and The Weather Channel.

That's the good news; however - there is no strong correlation between the number of storms or hurricanes and U.S. landfalls in any given season. It only takes one landfall to inflict tremendous and costly damage and destruction.

The key is preparation. It's important to be prepared for hurricanes and tropical storms every year, regardless of seasonal forecasts.

Have an emergency plan and insure that all family members know your plan. Have an out of area contact and keep them apprised of your whereabouts during an emergency. Have at least 72 hours supply of water and non perishable food. Comply with any emergency evacuation orders and be sure to have a re-entry pass for your area.

The sheriff's office website is an excellent source of information. Go to www.sheriffcitrus.org and click on "emergency management" at the top of the screen for weather advisories and things that you can do before, during, and after an emergency as well as community information and evacuation zones. Gooding, Texas obtains a double blessing with a veterinarian and a doctor coming to town, but when siblings Enoch and Taylor Bestman arrive, the discovery that the long-awaited doctor is in fact a woman, the town is up in arms. Karl Van der Vort is no exception but he becomes Taylor's first patient – against his will. Karl thinks Taylor has doctoring skills but thinks she has an unladylike occupation. Taylor just wants to prove that being a doctor is everyone else. Katz realized that he her life's calling. When Taylor's practice and Taylor herself are threatened, Karl's protectiveness flares into a different emotion altogether.
- 4. "Full Disclosure" by Dee Henderson, an acclaimed bestselling author, and we have many of her books in our library. - 6. Al & Joanna Lacy are prolific writers that we haven't heard from in awhile. They have now written a "Shadow of Liberty" Book 1 begins in January series. This story deals with 1886. persecution of Christians by the easy to read. Czar in Kiev, Russia. Vladimir Petrovna, a Crimean War hero, husband of Sasha and father of three teenage children, gather what

- 8. "Great Stories Remembered", published by Focus on the Family, compiled and edited by Joe L. Wheeler. There are 8 to 10 short stories by different authors and divided among the four seasons in this book. It starts out with Winter to Spring (January, February & March), moves on to Spring to Summer (April, May, & June), etc. The print is medium type, making it

My deep concentration God's promises during these couple of highly stressful months, otherwise helped me remember, study and learn a good recipe to overcome worry: (1) "Be careful for nothing" (Phil.4:6). Just refuse to worry about one single thing. God has promised over and over to take care of His child. We are told not to worry about food or raiment but simply to trust God to provide our needs. The promise of Philippians 4:19 says "But my God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus." Our Father even knows the number of hairs on our heads. He understands our troubles. So we are not to worry about one thing. (2) Pray about everything. When you have a desire and are tempted to worry, tell the Lord about it. "Casting all your care upon him; for He cares for you," exhorts 1 Peter. 5:7. Tell Him about your worry, about your care. Let your requests to known to Him. Ask for help to overcome the worry habit and take every single care to Him. (3) Be thankful for anything. It is difficult to worry about something when you are thanking God for it. One of the greatest cures for worry is simply counting your Get up in the morning blessings. thanking God for air to breathe, for your

health, for eyes to see and ears to hear; and go to bed at night thanking Him for the wonderful day, even if it was not too wonderful, for His protecting hand upon you, and above all, for His salvation.
