From the Paston Desk

Another idea for the 11:00 service is to "market" it aggressively as possible. We would do this with things such as the weekly ad in the paper highlighting the 11:00 service. We can use the sign out front to advertise this service. Now that Krissy is taking such great care of our Face Book page, we could use that as well. Then there is also our web site to utilize. The best means marketing is always the personal contact, where folks simply invite others to come to their church. My hope is to teach and encourage folks of every service to be more inviting and especially those in the 11:00 service. When you think about it, none of our services should drop in attendance so much during the summer. There are plenty of folks living in our community who do not attend church, enough to not only fill our three services but to also start another service. They are out

that they are simply waiting to be forward to seeing how things invited.

I think there is a lot we can and should do and are planning to do during the summer months to enhance our 11:00 a.m. worship. The summer months will give us see how they go. If they work out, great; if they do not work out, then we'll regroup and reconsider. I look summer.

It is time again for the annual Mind, Body & Soul Health Fair at our church. We will have some of our usual vendors, but there will be some new and exciting ones as well. There will be volunteer opportunities, entertainment, special interest vendors, education, as well as health screenings and health related facilities. The clowns will be busy helping set up and getting into trouble as well. The Life South bloodmobile will be there, and after you give blood you can check out the beautiful and unique cars that will be on display in the parking lot. Mark your calendar! There should be something of interest for everyone.

CATARACTS

More than 22 million Americans have cataracts. Cataracts are a leading cause of blindness in those over 80. They can sometimes be found in younger people as well as newborn babies, but ninety-five percent are considered age related.

What exactly is a cataract? It is the clouding of the normally clear lens of the eye which blocks or changes the passage of light into the eye. In the normal eye, light passes through the lens to the retina where it is changed into signals which are then sent to the brain. If the retina does not receive sharp and clear images, vision will be blurred. The eye works like a camera; if the lens is dirty or cloudy the camera cannot take a clear picture. A cataract can occur in one or both eyes, but does not spread from one to the other.

Although the exact cause of cataracts is not known there are thought to be several risk factors involved: intense heat or long-term exposure to UV sun rays, diabetes, heredity, German measles in a pregnant woman, eye injuries or inflammation, smoking, or long term steroid use. Most commonly, cataracts are formed as we age when old cells build up on the lens as our bodies create new cells.


If you have a cataract you should not experience pain or redness. You may experience blurred or double vision, ghost images, faded colors, glare from bright lights, poor night vision, or the sensation of having a film

over your eye. You may also see a milky or yellowish spot in the pupil of the eye. Light may seem too dim for close work or you might be overwhelmed by bright light.

It is extremely important to have a complete and comprehensive vision exam every one to two years. During this exam, where pupils are dilated, your doctor will be able to check for glaucoma, macular degeneration, and other disorders. Early treatment may save your vision.

Early treatment for cataracts may include new glasses, better lighting, anti-glare sunglasses or magnifying glasses. If these measures do not help and vision loss begins to interfere with normal activities of daily living, surgery may be indicated. Surgery involves removing the lens and replacing it with an artificial one which becomes permanent and requires no special care.

To protect your vision now remember to wear sunglasses and a hat to block ultraviolet rays, stop smoking, and eat green leafy vegetables, fruit and other foods with antioxidants. Get regular eye exams!

THE WAYS OF THE KINGDOM by Jan Wise

This man is my chosen instrument....I will show him how much he must suffer for my name.

(Acts 9:15)

Did you ever audit a class? Why did you choose to listen rather than actively participate?

Perhaps you wanted to accumulate information without the responsibility of contributing or taking tests that measured your understanding.

Many Christians choose to audit the Christian life, thinking to avoid the suffering involved with testing. But like Paul, we are called to actively engage in the battle between God's Word and Satan's lies.

When God called Paul, he was clear about the cost. In 2 Corinthians 11, Paul describes some of his physical sufferings—imprisoned, flogged, shipwrecked, always moving, in constant danger.

Paul's physical difficulties formed "arenas" within which he battled the temptation to sin. An arena suggests a contest. Any difficulty Christians face invites a spiritual battle. Satan will oppose us, fueling our fleshly desires with a need for self preservation. But God will be there for us, offering the power of his Holy Spirit to refuse the temptation to sin. The choice is ours—to side with our flesh or with the Holy Spirit's leading. The struggle may be fierce, as it was for Jesus in the Garden, or it may be less obvious as when we must choose between retaliation or forgiveness.

The denial of our fleshly desires will cause suffering; our self-

centered ego does not like being thwarted. For instance, Jesus tells us "do not worry." Having been raised in a worry-filled environment, whenever I encountered a problem arena I would worry my way through it. Then one day the Lord told me to stop "auditing" his teaching about worry and become actively engaged in the spiritual battle of denying worry a place in my difficulties.

No longer could I sit in my spiritual armchair, worrying my way through possible solutions. I rationalized—"every Christian I know worries so why should I change, what will I think about if I don't worry, things are different now—even Jesus would worry in today's world." How scared I felt learning to refuse worry, trusting God to bring me through a problem his way, and how amazed I was at the outcome. I lost some battles, but the ones where I tasted victory brought an exhilarating sense of his power. I am no longer in bondage to worry, but still fight the recurring temptation. However, I've discovered the joy of recognizing trouble arenas as opportunities for scoring a spiritual victory.

Hebrews 2:18 says, "Because he himself suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted." In the flesh, Jesus could have retaliated against his enemies, but his Father taught him to pray, "Forgive them for they don't know what they are doing."

If we're willing to actively enter the arena of spiritual warfare, we will discover joy in the suffering and power for the battle. How about leaving your spiritual armchair and embracing the challenge?

THIS STINKS!

The largest flower on earth, growing to 3 feet and weighing 24 lb, Rafflesia arnoldii, is beautiful! But you don't want it in your garden: the flower smells of decaying flesh to attract pollinating flies. It is endemic to the rain forests of Indonesia and is actually quite rare to find.



Curiously, the plant produces no leaves, stems or roots. It can only be seen when it is ready to reproduce. Living as a parasite on the roots of a tropical

vine, Rafflesia sends out thread like tissues that penetrate the host.





For our second study we remain in 1Peter looking at chapter 2.

STOP

Just as a refresher, go back and look quickly over our first lesson in last month's issue of *Genesis*. Please note there are two lessons in this issue to cover the summer hiatus of *Genesis*.

From our 3 part outline:

..Part 1 - The salvation of the Believers

..Part 2 - The Submission of Believers (this lesson)

..Part 3 - The Suffering of Believers

We don't usually think of Christ as a stone, yet we sing, "On Christ the solid rock I stand all other ground is sinking sand..." Christ was the stone thrown away yet chosen by God.

STOP

Try and think of yourself as a stone to be used in a building. Where would you best be used? In verse 11 Peter tells us we are aliens and strangers in the world. Does that make you uneasy?

Peter calls Christians by various names in this chapter. Read over the list and select the one that you believe fits you best.

CHALLENGE: Share your choices with some one else and get their opinion. Submission has been

abused for a long time. These scriptures need to be discussed outside the realm of marriage. As a member of this church, one question you were asked was if you would **submit** to the authority and discipline of the church? In the military you are required to submit to those having a higher rank than you. What Peter is calling our attention to is that being Christ-like is not easy.

STOP

After looking at chapters one and two of 1Peter, we come to the longest section of the outline,

..Part 3: The Suffering of Believers.

I suggest that if you are married, you read Chapter 3 together with your spouse. Sometimes hurtful experiences from a marriage infiltrate our minds and cause us to focus on that event all over again, (therefore not really forgiven), or we read only those things that apply to the other partner.

STOP

Some denominations insist on simple clothing and/or plain colors

as a way of following Peter's teaching. Although nothing is wrong in doing that, I'm not sure it follows the teaching of the beauty and value of the inner self. Do you follow? How does drab clothing create the".. beauty of a gentle and quite spirit"? I am of the impression that Peter did not mean diminish the outside and the inside will shine. Maybe he meant take better care of your heart, soul, and mind than you do of your shoes, dress, and hat! I would be guilty of false teaching if I did not emphasis 1Peter 3:7.

STOP

"so that nothing will hinder your prayers". Guys, that's pretty direct with very little room for interpretation. Yes, there may be a fog or a barrier over your prayers related to how you treat your wives. Jesus equated His relationship to His church (us) as a bridegroom to the bride. Don't allow our modern culture to diminish God's Word.

The last fourteen verses of this chapter probably should be read at least once a month if not weekly. "Turn from evil and do good." "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have." "But in your hearts, set Christ as Lord."

STOP

Examine the words "Christ" and "Lord". Compare and contrast.


PRAYER CORNER
